FISCAL IRRESPONSIBILITY.

The fire at the Custom-house Huero deposits has been a matter of far too serious moment to be allowed to pass without any further notice than a mere sketch of the conflagration, or a description of the building; and we are indebted to our very active colleague, La Prensa, for a very pungent article on the matter, which, in the general interest of commerce, we feel bound to translate. Further, we may add, that having looked in the authorities in English and American law, we find the cases fully bear out the responsibility of the government to make good a loss which was the combined result of negligence and crime, and not accidental, as provided by the Custom-house regulations. Not to fatigue the general reader with too lengthy a dissertation on the case, we limit our present re- marks to a simple translation of our colleague's article, reserving our own remarks with quotations from the English and American authorities for a future article.

The Press says:—

The great fire in the customs de- posits has awakened in commercial circles a desire to know where fiscal impunity terminates, and responsibility begins; and to meet the general enquiry the following views are thrown out, to show that the customs ordi- nances of 1866 call for amendment or reform.

Art. 304 says:—

The National Treasury will at once make good all loss of, or damage or injury to goods deposited in bonded warehouses; excepting in the following cases:—

1. Accidents such as fire, inunda- tions, and other unforeseen events that may occur.

Art. 305 adds:—Whenever consignees prove that their goods were lost or injured in the bonded warehouses, except in the cases above enumerated, or have been stolen, the fisco will make good the loss.

With these articles in force a fire takes place in the Custom-house de- posits, fed by alcohol, the conflagration threatens the whole quarter of the city, and merchants and consignees see their properties burnt up before their eyes to the extent of 20,000 pats.

The question now is, who pays this loss. The fisco allows excuse that it has been "caso fortuito," and mer- chants are supposed to stand calmly looking on and prepare to deposit fresh goods in the same deposits?

The Customs deposits are the only bonded warehouses in town; the Fisco charges storage on everything that enters these deposits, and merchants pay the charge as by law established. The Government is bound therefore to guarantee security for the goods and the good care thereof. A fire takes place in one of these open deposits, which is under the immediate charge of the Customs officials. The fire did not oc- cur in the middle of the night; the fire was not caused by lightning, nor by the roofs of adjacent burning buildings fall- ing in. The fire began in the deposit itself alongside the pipes of alcohol and it is an employe, a Custom-house official of the very deposit itself, who either fired the place, or through whose negligence the conflagration was pro- duced.

Can this be termed "caso fortuito," the real, unforeseen accident against which the Customs regulations pro- vide? This is the serious part of this question.

It is not enough that the ordinances excuse the Fisco for all loss or damage through unforeseen accidents such as fire or inundations, &c. It is essential to inquire into the loss to see if by proper precaution the loss might not have been avoided. It is not a mere accident, but a case of gross culpabil- ity which fixes the responsibility on the author, or the principal under whose care the goods suffered loss or damage.

Now in the present case, where the fire is traced to the act of one of the Customs employes, where the fire takes place in broad daylight, when every precaution might be taken, ev- ery remedy adopted, we are to be told that it was a "caso fortuito," an unfore- seen accident and inevitable?

Such a decision is impossible, for it would strip the whole commerce of Buenos Ayres of every guarantee against the commonest scoundrel, or drunkard, or private enemy.

The Customs ordinances cannot be so interpreted, and to establish the "caso fortuito," the case must be fully gone into, and depositions taken.

The Custom-house has officials, and especially has deposit guards charged with the care of the deposits. These employes have to respond to the Fisco for any loss or damage to goods in the deposits under their charge (Art. 308). The case is clear, therefore, the "Fisco" must make good this loss to the owners of the goods, since the loss was not caused by any inevitable accident, when it has been proved that the fire was the act of one of the employes or the result of his negligence. Such negligence should be guarded against by increased vigilance, which it is the bounden duty of the Government to employ when it holds in its deposits properties so immense, and for the care of which it is so well paid. The ordi- nances must be amended or reformed, for, as at present, no merchant who has goods in deposit is safe, and the payment of almacenage entitles mer- chants to demand of Government the fullest guarantee, if not against un- foreseen accident, at least against the act of a criminal; and the present loss, which springs from the negligence of an employe, cannot be termed a loss arising from "caso fortuito"; the loss has been the result of crime, or malice, or neglect on the part of those whose sworn duty it was to prevent it.

"The Englishwoman's Magazine" is brim full of subjects, patterns and cuts in which ladies delight. "The Sunday at Home" is replete with reading suited for those excellent people who decline to go out of doors, or even squeeze within them on the Sabbath. As we always spend that day out, we are, perhaps, a bad critic of the periodical in question; but the fact that its matter is of the most elevat- ing, instructive, moral and sometimes amusing description is incontrovertible.

"All the Year Round" is always good. "Willing to Die" is continued with unflagging interest; and "Fam- ous British Regiments" is peculiarly ex- citing, the annals of the Black Watch (the gallant Forty-two) and the Lite Guards recalling us to the most glori- ous foughten fields in our history. The miscellaneous articles are varied and interesting.

"Chambers's Journal" requires no criticism. It is this month simply as good as it has been, is, and ever will be as long as it lives, and may that be for ever and a day! It is the first mag- azine of its kind on the face of the globe.

In addition to the above which Mr. Daws, the well known librarian has kindly sent to us; he has on hand "The Family Herald," "London Jour- nal," "Good Words," and all the peri- odicals illustrated and otherwise, cur- rent in the United Kingdom and the States. Verily, without our energetic friend Mr. Daws, the River Plate Pub- lic would be in an extremely shabby way for magazines. He has made the business his own, and deserves the suc- cess always attendant on hard work. It is now as impossible to think of a magazine without Daws, as of Standard Court without the 70,000 ounces.
