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of novelty in a railway to be constructed chiefly on bridges, at such a height over the waters of the River Plate as to allow sea-going ships to pass under.

The first section alone counts four thousand iron bridges; the second section has 15 tubular bridges similar to that made by Stephenson over the Menay Straits, each being 450 feet long: the smaller bridges on the rest of the line are sufficiently numerous to keep all the ironmasters in England busy for years to come.

The necessary surveys are said to have been made by Mr. Julius Gasser between the months of January and August in 1870, but we are left in uncertainty as to the borings in the rivers Uruguay and Paraná, where the proposed line would cross, from Martín García to the islands, and thence to the Tigre. If the engineer in question has made the requisite borings for so many thousands of bridges, and calculates the total cost at 163 million hard dollars, we must say that the work seems a remarkably cheap one.

Nervous people might feel averse to such locomotion as crossing the mouths of the Paraná and Uruguay on iron bridges at a considerable elevation. Of course anything like a collision in such circumstances would be fearful to contemplate. Even during a pauper's oscillation of the endless bridges would be a disagreeable feature, and if the rivers were unusually flooded the view from the carriage windows would be awfully grand.

The projectors solicit a guarantee of \$4 per cent. per an. on a capital of 163 million dollars from the M. Videop Government, and the same from the Argentine, until the line be self-supporting. The works are to begin at once and the railway to be completed in five years; the term of concession to be 50 years, and the legal domicile of the Company at M. Video, with branch at B. Ayres.

The enterprise would be made to avail itself of the Northern Railway actually existing from Buenos Ayres to the Tigre, and the Figueras Railway now in construction by Waring Brothers from Santa Lucia to Colonia. The bridges across the river would traverse a firm sandy soil, at such places where the water has a minimum of 9 and a maximum of 18 feet, carefully avoiding the islands of the Guazua.

It is not likely the project will find much favor, but, as Stephenson said about a railway from England to Australia it is far from impossible, and merely a question of cost.

THE ENGLISH COLONY IN PARAGUAY.

Another of the colonists of Itapé has arrived down from Paraguay, and as there is a general desire on the part of the foreign public to know the real position of the colony, we give the following statement, which was made yesterday in our office by the deponent, "in propria persona."

Samuel Golland of London aged 44 married, deposes: That he left London about 7 months ago and came out as emigrant passenger with some 800 others per steamer Rydall Hall, for Paraguay, and received in London six shillings for 3 days delay of the steamer.

"I was engaged in London by Mr. Billiat, I came out to Paraguay less to be a farmer than to follow my trade as painter and glazier, having heard that there were 24 millions of people in Paraguay and no painters or glaziers; amongst my fellow emigrants we had tradesmen of every description. During the voyage the fare given was very poor. When we arrived here we were transhipped and proceeded at once to Paraguay. We only stopped a day in Asuncion, and were sent by rail to Paraguari where we remained 2 weeks, most of the emigrants being then sick and with swollen limbs. At the end of the 2 weeks we were ordered to Itapé and it took us 6 days to walk the distance, suffering great hardships, sleeping in the open camp; our trunks and things came on in bullock carts. Arriving at Itapé we found no preparation whatever for us, nothing but bleak camp with a few old tumble down houses; the poor Paraguayans about were in the most wretched poverty, only women seen, no men, and the women with no other clothes save a shift. When we arrived at Itapé most of us had a fever. We asked for our land, and every day and week we waited for the land to be measured, living in tents. At the night time we could not sleep in the tents owing to the ants. We received rations weekly, but we could not use the flour, and the meat was, owing to negligent killing, frequently full of maggots and useless; and when we complained of the meat they took it away from us and gave us nothing. The ground was never given to us, for it could not be found, and what was surveyed was claimed by the natives. Seeing that nothing could be done I determined to leave for Asuncion, and gave to a man a portion of my clothes to get myself and my wife carried in a cart to Asuncion.

"When I arrived at Asuncion my wife was so sick that she lay at the railway station for 2 days; the station master sent to Mr. Seymour to look after her and she was ordered to the Hospital, but I went myself to Mr. Seymour and he gave me and my wife a place to stop in for four days.

I remained in Asuncion about a fortnight, and found no work. I had no money; I sold my blankets and a suit of clothes, and my wife's clothes; I sold everything, till I got together about £6. I went to the captain to get down, and at last got a passage on board the Taraguay. When on the steamer I saw the American Consul, who stated that a subscription had been made up for the poor people; he himself had subscribed 50 pataconas;

but it appears that not a farthing of it had been given to the poor people. The American Consul paid my passage on board the steamer to B. Ayres.

"When I landed here I went to the Emigration Department, where I remained with my wife three weeks; being very sick, I was taken into the British Hospital, where I was well cared for a fortnight.

"I am now living in Calle Maipu, and am willing and anxious to work at my trade, but find it difficult to get employment.

"When I left the colony there were not 200 emigrants in the place; the rest had died or fled, and the poor people who remained were only too anxious to get away, but were so utterly destitute that they could not find the means of support; their condition is most helpless and truly shocking.

Any one wishing to give me employment can find me by leaving a note at the STANDARD office.

THE CUSTOM-HOUSE FIRE.

May 24th, 873. To the Receiver of Customs.

I beg to make a report on the fire which occurred on the 21st inst. at the Huerago Abajo deposit, at the charge of Don Cesar Gascon.

About 9.45 a.m. the second guard, Carlos Garcia, who was in the deposit of Garay Arriba, saw smoke issuing, and at once gave the alarm; whereupon the Alcaldede Villegas and the Inspector Castillo broke open the door, and sent word to the Custom-house and police.

The second guard, Osbaldo Garcia, was bearer of the news; and as you sent at once the fire-engines and pumps as well as the peons, under the direction of Alcaldede Gascon, the latter was the first who opened the fire-plugs in front of the burning store.

When the door was opened, the flames reached the middle, but the pipes were bursting on the side next to the Tigre, and the fire spreading to get them out, and the fire spreading to the other pipes, it was useless to think of saving anything in the deposit.

When the Police fire-brigade arrived they took charge of the work, leaving our custom-house men little else to do than aid in working the pumps or removing the casks of spirits from the neighboring deposits, to prevent the fire communicating with them and taking greater dimensions. In this manner we cleared out all the four warehouses adjoining, except the one next to our fire, in which there were some quarter-casks. As the deposits over these warehouses were full of sugar in baryels, we proceeded also to remove the latter, not only for the sake of saving the merchandise, but still more to relieve the strain on the walls and prevent fresh food for the fire.

Beginning with the first store on the south side down below, we took out the barrels that had got wet, and then emptied three deposits, until it was deemed unnecessary to clear any more. Altogether we cleared 8 deposits, the peons working with such good will that the operation was carried out in the best order.

All the employees of the Alcaldia behaved admirably, exposing their lives and straining every nerve to save property. Annexed is a list of those whose efforts call for special mention, and I regret to think that many names must escape my memory. The peons also did their duty, but I feel bound to specify the following:—

Jose Raymundo, master blacksmith, Juan Ortigosa, and V. Lopez, carpenters, Juan Hernandez, Mateo Campos, Teodoro Luxan, George Roberts, J. Sagastume, Pedro Falconi, Jose Urrioste, Francisco Benedi, Exequiel Farias, and Luis Ferrer.

Of the other departments of the Custom-house there are also some employees who have distinguished themselves:—

Messrs. Velasquez, Arancibia, and Morillo, of the Contaduria.

Messrs. Biancarlos, Vitela, and Borel, of the Resguardo, besides others whose names I cannot collect.

It is not easy when a fire occurs to take note of all the persons who gallantly rush in to render assistance, but I may be permitted to name Messrs. Vicente Casares and son, Francisco Casares, Sebastian Casares, Huergo, Pedriel, Barton and brother, Cané, Guinocchio, Molina, and some clerks of Corti Riva & Co.: the latter had their fire-engine promptly on the ground, and Angel Bonches and other citizens saved a number of pipes from the midst of the flames.

The Chief of Police, Mr. O'Gorman, with his firemen and police, powerfully contributed to get the fire under, the Chief personally exposing his life, and being zealously supported. The neighbors offered their houses to store the saved merchandise, and we availed ourselves of the cloisters of the Dominican convent for this purpose.

It is now my duty to report as to the origin of the fire. Was it accidental, or otherwise? The warehouse in question had not been opened for two days; but in the adjoining one the peons Cuatro Ojos, Macapan and Jose Pecos had been at work, without noticing any sign of fire. As an archway communicates between the two deposits, it would appear that some one may have got in to take out some liquor and struck a match, which perhaps set the casks afire; but the peons above named should have seen such person enter.

As the deposit had not been opened for 36 hours, it is impossible, the fire could have had its origin before that time, since so many employees pass and re-pass continually, and "serenos" make the rounds at night, and if any flame existed it must have been seen through the slits in the wall. The deposit not being dark, a lamp is seldom used there. It was any other season, we might suppose the spirits had taken fire from very high temperature.

The guard Gascon, in his report, declares his suspicions to fall on Segundo Rodriguez and N. Exposito, peons, who were accordingly arrested on the 21st. As yet the matter is a mystery, but the peons who had been working alongside might be able to give important evidence.

The losses are, in my opinion, less than generally supposed, and can hardly reach 20,000 hard dollars. As you were yourself present at the fire, you will have doubtless observed all the occurrences.

STATE OF ROSARIO.

There is something terrifying in the ominous word 'Comisiones,' and it would be a happy day for the Argentine Republic when it shall be obliterated from the vocabulary of the language of the country. This word 'Comisiones' means in plain terms the suspension of every description of legal guarantee for the unfortunate native; and even were the action of the authorities restricted to the letter of the law, it would still remain as a disgrace to Argentine legislation and to the Governments.

Foreigners who live in towns are hardly aware of the significance of the system of 'Comisiones.' I will give it its true name. It is our old system of Press or Crimp Gangs, that prevailed in England as late as the reign of George the Third, and by which seamen were violently impressed and made to serve in the Royal Navy. It is true that most of these men were professional seamen, and earned their living on the sea; but many unwary landsmen were violently entrapped and carried away from their homes contrary to all law and justice. The exigencies of a long and bloody war were more powerful than the law of the land. Public opinion, however, soon put a stop to these iniquitous proceedings. In this country the Press Gang is not only a system, but is sanctioned by custom and the law; and the Comisiones being composed of irresponsible Comisarios de Campaña, outrages and injustice are the order of the day. For the Comisarios it is high festival; for the poor native it is a time of tribulation and terror. The friends of the authorities, or those who can buy themselves off with the present of 'piñiro' or 'pajero,' are all right; those who have nothing to give are hunted down like wild beasts, ironed, and treated generally as malefactors. This is not the worst of it.

Like Jack Falstaff the Comisarios know where to go to gather the most profitable and the easiest harvest of recruits. There are plenty of idlers, plenty of lazy gauchos, who would make excellent food for powder; but these are difficult to get hold of; so the 'Comisiones' go to the centres of labor, amongst the agriculturists, the peons of large establishments, the railways, the colonies, and carry ruin and dismay with them. Their motives are clear enough. The hard-working man is easily taken, for he has a home, and does not resist; and many of them have a few dollars with which to satisfy the cupidity of their prosecutors. The majority, however, fall easy victims to the press gangs, and are hurried off, leaving their families destitute, and their 'patrones' in the utmost difficulties for want of hands. Mr. Perkins, the Superintendent of the Cen. Argentine Colonias (and I hope he will pardon me for giving his name), told me to-day that a great part of the most important work of the colonies, building houses for the immigrants, &c. had been completely stopped on account of the press gangs having carried off all the peons.

I talk savagely; I write savagely; I feel savagely! What business has the Government to make a raid on the working men of the country every time that a ridiculous loaf rampus sprouts up?

What business has the National Government to carry fire and brimstone into Entre Rios when a little peaceful common sense might have arranged everything peacefully? Senator Oroño was perfectly right. There was no necessity for this war.

What business have they to listen to the cock and bull stories of the Governor of Santa Fe, who is irighted at his own shadow?

And what business have the authorities to commission ignorant brutal Comisarios to hunt down peaceful industrious citizens, chain them up like criminals to send them to cut the throats of their own countrymen?

I have been some fifteen years in the country, Mr. Editor, and have naturally acquired some of the indigenous bloodthirstiness of the South American races; but I really cannot altogether approve of setting brothers to fight against brothers, unless the last hope of a pacific solution be dissipated.

There is always a heinous outcry from the public when a Pedro Luro is to be executed for his crimes; but for the butchering of half the population of a province there is not even room for commiseration, and not philanthropy enough to employ diplomacy before trying ball cartridge on the misled, ignorant Argentine citizens. Why, even the dangerous rising of Jack Cadé was put down by a timely speech from the boy Richard the Second! and the head of Cadé himself, cut off by Iden, effectually suffocated the rebellion. If the misled squeamishness of world-be public monitors did not prevent it, we'd soon have the head of the Jack Cadé of Entre Rios, and so save the throats of hundreds of far better men. It was one of the most sensible ideas that ever

entered into Mr. Sarmiento's head, to put a price on Lopez Jor dan's. But no! true to the old Spanish character, the criminal inspires compassion, the innocent victim none. Humanity would dictate that taking the head of the outlaw Jordan would preserve the lives of hundreds or thousands of good citizens.

But I expect you are tired of this subject. Let us turn to more pleasant themes.

The robberies committed almost nightly in Rosario would indicate a thoroughly organized gang of thieves composed probably of foreigners. The Police have not yet been able to get any clue. The robbery of a Custom House Deposit in the Calle Urquiza, must have been perpetrated through contederacy with the Sereno or Vigilante. A cart was brought to the very door, after being forced open, and the loot quietly loaded and taken off as if in the middle of the day. It is more than probable that the gang have a number of the Serenos in their pay. What else can be expected when, our day and night guardians are recruited from the class of criminals. It would not be a great stretch of imagination to picture the following scene:—

Scene.—Police-office. Enter into the sanctorum a Commissary with a half drunken ruffian, with a bloody face.

Authority.—Who have you there Commissary?

Commissary.—Juan de las Palotas, your Worship, who was sentenced for manslaughter last year and escaped. There is a suspicion that he has since been concerned in two murders and several robberies. Fulano, Comisario of the district of Heliado, caught him breaking into a neighbors house, and in taking him was badly wounded.

Auth.—Is this true, Juan?

Juan (quite at his ease).—Si, señor; pero no iba a robar, sino solo para pedir un trago de mi compadre.

Auth.—Is it true, Juan, that you killed Luciano after you escaped from jail?

Juan.—Si, señor; pero fue una disgresion. Awe were drinking, and my knife entered his side by mistake.

Juan.—O, I have friends here and there; and my compadre gives me an asado and a trago whenever I go to see him.

Buenos Ayres, June 9th, 1873.

The great money crisis in this market continues, and to-day the Provincial Legislature is busy discussing the measure giving the bank further powers to emit, and to open a branch bank in London. The general impression is that the bill will pass; it will increase our currency about three millions sterling. In Montevideo money is equally tight, but this is attributed to the effects of the epidemic paralyzation; and now that quarantine has been abolished, and all ports are open, it is thought that trade will recover its normal character.

The war in Entre Rios, we regret to say, gives us all here much concern. Lopez Jordan is perpetrating the most savage brutalities with a view to intimidate the people of Entre Rios and keep them from joining the Government forces. The Minister of War is at present at Parana directing operations, and the strength of the Government army is so great, that Jordan and his troops seem an insignificant rabble; still, the country is so open, the rebels so well mounted, and such thorough masters of the open camp, that it is difficult to compel them to fight.

Congress is in session, but as yet no measures of great importance have been passed, if we except the sanction of the Deputies to a law ordering the change of the National Bonds at present selling in this market to what are termed Hard Dollar Bonds, with a view to making them negotiable in England.

The health of the city was never better, and the weather is now sharp and cold.

Immigration continues unabated—every Mediterranean steamer entering being crowded with immigrants. The very sudden turn in our money market, it is thought, will affect wages, but at present there is no diminution in the scale, though there is a decided pause in the building line.

The land fever has entirely abated and stocks of every description have suffered a smart fall. Cedulas are down to 89.88, and look very weak; Bonds, on the receipt of the Neva's news, fell off 1 1/2 per cent.; and exchange closes for the Olbers' mail as follows:—

THE ENTRE-RIANO WAR.

SIEGE OF PARANA.

We glean from the *Prensa* the following important intelligence—

On 28th ult. a strong column of rebel cavalry advanced on Parana. There could not have been less than 1500. They took up position on an elevated ground about a league from the Plaza, pitching their tents as if determined to take matters easy. Scouts were at once thrown out.

At 2 p.m. same day the infantry regiment 5th Line, commanded by Lavalle, and two squadrons of cavalry under Barrientos with two Prussian field pieces and a battalion of the Santa Fe National Guards sallied forth. Colonel Ayala led the charge against the enemy's position.

Commander Barrientos advanced in loose order, when nearing the enemy closed, and received heavy rifle discharge. The Santa Fe battalion, coming to the support, was charged by the enemy's cavalry, and had enough to do to hold its own. Both fought well, especially the Santa Feinos, most of them peaceful tradesmen who had left their homes at the call of duty. Outnumbered by ten to one, they kept

a well sustained, deadly fire as long as their ammunition lasted, and then, nothing daunted, kept back the enemy with the cold steel. The loss on both sides was severe.

Many acts of individual bravery occurred, perhaps the most brilliant being that of a poor soldier who, cut off and surrounded by the half-savage hordes, cleared his way until, overpowered, he fell wounded and bleeding from every pore. The savage foe, unable to prize true valor, fell on the body and mutilated it in a most inhuman manner.

But for the timely aid of the 5th of the Line with the field-pieces, the Santa Feinos must have been cut to pieces.

The rebels displayed the greatest daring, and though decimated by grape and canister, they still re-formed and charged us over and over again. Our men, though unprepared for such stubbornness, behaved coolly, and reserving their fire for close quarters, delivered several most effective volleys.

A 4 o'clock, worn out with fatigue, we fell back on the town.

The enemy's loss exceeds 100 killed and nearly as many wounded. Ours is also heavy.

The rebels carried off their wounded, but butchered our poor fellows with fiendish delight.

On the night 29th the townsfolk were seriously alarmed by a heavy fusillade, and the hasty movements of the garrison rushing to arms. An outpost had been attacked but not carried. No less than five thousand shots are said to have been fired, and the assailants must have lost severely. So much so that the experiment has not been repeated.

For several nights the garrison have not slept. The rebels get no rest night or day. It is wonderful how they can stand it. Even ours are beginning to show fatigue.

Nothing has been heard, of Colonel Campos who left Uruguay with 4,000 men.

THE BATTLE OF PARANA.

Parana, May 29th.

The Commander of the Garrison to the Minister of War and Marine.

I have the honor to inform Your Excellency that yesterday about 2 p.m. I received notice that the enemy was marching in strong columns upon the town; whereupon I set off at once with an aide-de-camp for the hospital quarter, to reconnoitre the assailants. Seeing that they were in some strength I sent out skirmishers of the 27th March infantry and a piquet of cavalry to keep them in check till the 5th Batt. of the Line with two field guns could come up in support.

As soon as the enemy saw this manoeuvre they rushed down on the flank of the 5th Batt. before it could get into line. Happily the cool intrepidity of Major Levalle, who was ably supported by his officers and men, saved the occasion and repulsed the enemy with heavy loss.

My artillery was not able to be as serviceable as might be desired, as the infantry left no room for the guns to fire, and being in a narrow street no movement could be effected. Nevertheless a few shots were given with good effect.

My cavalry, comprising only a piquet of suburban horse and another of the Uruguayan squadron; undeterred by long odds, made a charge upon the besieging cavalry, causing some loss among the latter in killed and wounded. If our strength had been greater in cavalry the result of the day would have been a complete victory.

I cannot too highly applaud the conduct of Col. Viejo-bueno and Major Levalle. Our loss is trifling, including two of my staff wounded.

Congratulating the Government on the gallant behaviour of the forces and the flattering result of the day,

THE CUSTOM-HOUSE FIRE.

May 24th, 1873.

To the Receiver of Customs.

I beg to make a report on the fire which occurred on the 21st inst. at the Huelgo Ajaio deposit, at the charge of Don Cesar Gascon.

About 9.45 a.m. the second guard, Carlos Garcia, who was in the deposit of Garay riba, saw smoke issuing, and at once gave the alarm; whereupon the Alcalde Valdegas and the Inspector Castillo made open the door, and sent word to the Custom-house and police.

The second guard, Osbaldo Garcia, was better informed of the news; and as you will see, he had the engines and pumps under the direc-

tion of Alcalde Gascon, the latter was the first who opened the fire-plugs in front of the burning store.

When the door was opened, the flames reached the middle, but as the pipes were bursting on the side next the street it was impossible to get them out, and the fire spreading to the other pipes, it was useless to think of saving anything in the deposit.

When the Police fire-brigade arrived they took charge of the work, leaving our custom-house men little else to do than aid in working the pumps or removing the casks of spirits from the neighboring deposits, to prevent the fire communicating with them and taking greater dimensions. In this manner we cleared out all the four warehouses adjoining, except the one next that on fire, in which there were some quarter-casks. As the deposits over these warehouses were full of sugar in barrels, we proceeded also to remove the latter, not only for the sake of saving the merchandise, but s.l. more to relieve the strain on the walls and prevent fresh food for the fire.

Beginning with the first store on the south side down below, we took out the barrels that had got wet, and then emptied three deposits, until it was deemed unnecessary to clear any more. Altogether we cleared 8 deposits, the process working with such good will that the operation was carried out in the best order.

All the employees of the Alcaidia behaved admirably, exposing their lives and straining every nerve to save property. Annexed is a list of those whose efforts call for special mention, and I regret to think that many names must escape my memory. The names also did their duty, but I feel bound to specify the following—

Jose Raymundo, master blacksmith, Juan Origosa and V. Lopez, carpenters, Juan Hernandez, Mateo Campos, Teodoro Luxan, George Robert, J. Sagasiano, Pedro Falconi, Jose Urioste, Francisco Benedi, Exequiel Parias, and Luis Ferrer.

Of the other departments of the Custom-house there are also some employees who have distinguished themselves—

Messrs. Volasquez, Araucibia, and Morillo, of the Contaduria.

Messrs. Biancarlos, Videla, and Borel, of the Resguardo, besides others whose names I cannot collect.

It is not easy when a fire occurs to take note of all the persons who gallantly rush in to render assistance, but I may be permitted to name Messrs. Vicente Casares and son, Francisco Casares, Sebastian Casares, Huelgo, Pedriel, Barton and brother, Cané, Giococchio, Molina, and some clerks of Corti Riva & Co.: the latter had their fire-engine promptly on the ground, and Angel Borches and other citizens saved a number of pipes from the midst of the flames.

The Chief of Police, Mr. O'Gorman, with his firemen and police, powerfully contributed to get the fire under, the Chief personally exposing his life, and being zealously supported. The neighbors offered their houses to store the saved merchandise, and we availed ourselves of the cloisters of the Dominican convent for this purpose.

It is now my duty to report as to the origin of the fire. Was it accidental, or otherwise? The warehouse in question had not been opened for two days; but in the adjoining one the peones Cuatro Ojos, Macapan and Jose Pico had been at work, without noticing any sign of fire. As an archway communicates between the two deposits, it would appear that some one may have got in to take out some liquor and struck a match, which perhaps set the casks afire; but the peones above named should have seen such person enter.

As the deposit had not been opened for 36 hours, it is impossible the fire could have had its origin before that time, since so many employees pass and repass continually and "serenos" make the rounds at night, and if any flame existed it must have been seen through the slits in the wall. The deposit not being dark, a lamp is seldom used there. It it were any other season, we might suppose the spirits had taken fire from very high temperature.

The guard Gascon, in his report, declares his suspicions to fall on Segundo Bourgnez and N. Esposito, peones who were accordingly arrested on the 21st. As yet the matter is a mystery, but the peones who had been working alongside might be able to give important evidence.

The losses are, in my opinion, less than generally supposed, and can hardly reach 20,000 hard dollars. As you were yourself present at the fire, you will have doubtless observed all the occurrences.

Have you seen the news? was the question that rang round the Bolsa to-day. Never before do we recollect such a batch of bad news coming by one steamer. Wool, hides and tallow down and money up, and owing to the peculiar language of the telegram, the unfavorable nature of the news read still more unfavorable. Bonds fell 1/4 per cent at one-sweep from yesterday's prices, whilst cedulas held their own, but there was a veritable wet blanket over everything to-day, and up to 3 o'clock not a soul in the barruquero's room. As for money, the belief is that relief is at hand, and that next week the new law will be passed which will give to the market over 300 millions more currency. The position of the market is really more difficult than ever, and the matter was greatly talked of on 'Change yesterday the Bank discounted papares that had 6 months to run, this shows better, but the feeling is that the bank ought to renew everything "integro", and this only can help the market, as it is far better for the bank to help those who already in business operations owe the bank, than to give facilities to others to begin afresh. There can be no doubt there was much room for the censure afforded on all sides to the writer of the telegram, for the language of the message was every way calculated to cause pain, but things in Europe look very bad, and perhaps after all it is better to know the worst at once. Exchange holds up and was done to-day at 49 1/2 Bank, 49 1/2 Commercial; for Olbers' mails a tolerable large sum was passed.

Mr. Borna, the auctioneer, stated the Cordova lands ordered to be sold by the Provincial Bank were sold at the rate of 2,300 pats, per league, but that subsequently the business fell through. It was announced on 'Change that no less than 10 English vessels and a number of other flags cleared during the week in ballast, and but two vessels with cargo cleared during the same time. This speaks facts.

As regards money the brokers report money in the market most difficult; the banks are renewing which is a help, but things look awkward, all parties look forward to the new bank law now before the house to be passed on Monday, and improve the general state of things; there is certainly room for it.

Respecting the National Bank we learn that the total subscriptions amount to over 38 millions and close to 40 millions, thus the allotment of shares will not inconvenience the market inasmuch as the money already paid in by those who applied for shares represents 15 per cent on the shares that will come to them. The bank we heard to-day will be installed in August or September.

The news by the Neva came up to the club on Friday night announcing bank rate five per cent., and gold in the States at 118. This news has in nothing improved the market, and it is feared that it will affect the already depressed produce market. Parties who keenly watch the European markets are of opinion that we can have very little improvement from the other side owing to the short crops, and the state of the cotton market.

The mails from the Uruguay have brought us news of importance respecting the Salto and Santa Rosa Railway. Great progress has been made lately, 20 miles of earthworks are ready, with the rails laid, and be-lasted over a part of them, and the bridges nearly all complete corresponding to that length. Large gangs of workmen are pushing on the works in such a style as to leave very little room for doubt that by the end of October next the earthworks will be ready as far as the river Arapey, a distance of 50 miles, and the rails laid up to the river Itapepi Grande, 18 miles. The designs for the large iron bridge are all ready, and the materials for construction being sent from England as fast as the disturbed state of the iron trade will allow of. The bridges on this line are very heavy indeed, that at the Arapey river being the principal; it will consist of three spans or openings of 160 feet each and 60 feet high and 10 small openings of 50 each. Owing to the misfortune of the ship Stag having been lost on the English bank, the contractors have not been able to proceed late y with the laying of rails, and the first locomotive the St. Rosa was also lost in her, but ships are now fast arriving at Paysandu with rails sleepers, wagons and locomotives and coal. The Government made an in-motive and coal. The Government made an in-motive of the work a few days ago, with all the principal people of Salto in attendance among whom we may mention Sr. Castillo, Gefco politico Inspectors Mendoza, Martinez, and others, the work was very much pleased with the workmanship and progress made, which they said exceeded their most sanguine expectations. A champagne lunch was provided and taken al fresco, and done ample justice to. Toasts were given and heartily responded to, amongst others health to the contractors Messrs. Clark Punchard and Curry, coupling with it the name of Mr. Hman their agent, and the prosperity of the Railway was given with that of Messrs Webb and Gri per, the consulting and resident engineers. The work was a brilliant one, and the whole of the company seems well pleased at the work done, and the men entrusted to carry them out.

trip a trifle of specie (7700 pats.), and the Portefa in her last trip down to Montevideo took £20,000 in gold to Maua, and \$10,000 to the River Plate Bank.

The British barque *Mary Stewart* has brought from New York a complete consignment of tramway cars for the City of Buenos Ayres Co., and a set of some for the National Co. The arrival of railway, tramway, telegraph and gas material in the River Plate at present is something astonishing.

A very fine sample of Argentine Indigo is now on exhibition at the Bolsa. It looks well, but melancholy, like all the infant products of this country. When we ship from the Plate as much indigo as will pay for the silks, satins and high-heeled boots we import, then we may look for Cedulas again at 98.

By special private telegram received yesterday from Valparaiso we learn that a severe money crisis has begun there, but merchants think it won't last. Mr. John E. Clark will leave for Buenos Ayres in the *Illimani* about 10th inst.

The Minister of the Interior has very properly taken in hand the building of a new Emigration Asylum, and addressed a note to the Government of Buenos Ayres on the subject. We certainly want a new building for the emigrants, but we fear for the present we must stand as we are. Too many new buildings are in hand—new Provincial Bank, new Hypothecary Bank, new Post and new Railway Office. Station. Where is the money to come for all this? We say nothing about the new prison, since if we had to mortgage the Cabildo we must have a new prison.

Mr. Henry Correga, for whom the American Consul is advertising, is in Salto, Banda Oriental, managing the tramway in that town.

Perhaps if we except the packet news, the most important news to-day was the report of the Committee of Hacienda of the Provincial Legislature on the Bank and the crisis. Yesterday at noon this 'informe' was known to a few on 'Change, and hence the sudden jump of 1/4 per cent in Cedulas. The chief points in the report are—

First. Authority to the Bank to emit three times its capital, which is fixed at 15 millions pats. This will give an emission of 45 millions; the present total is under 30 millions.

The profits of the bank to be liquidated quarterly, and to be applied towards the amortization of the paper money.

The Bank is authorized to open a branch in London and to sell all the bonds and stocks it holds, at the best market price.

This report of the Committee is much and favorably spoken of. It will throw into the general treasury of the bank all the specie in the Oficina de Cambio, and beyond all question help the money market. But there are those who regard this as but a patch, and that retrenchment, more than expansion, is what is required.

The latest from Entre Rios to-day is that the rebels won't show fight. The War Minister made a rally from Parana, but could find no enemy around; therefore the siege of the town is raised, and this looks a little better. The Government has sent up three coal hulks with coal for the steamers.

Mr. Palemon Huergo has sent into Government a despatch accompanying his report, which adverts to the improved management of that road.

Messrs. Benn and Co. have despatched the American barque *Sarah* for Boston with the following cargo—16,390 dry hides, 73 bales wool, 637 bales sheepskins, and 35,076 horns.

The steamer from the Uruguay brought down crowds of passengers—Mr. Bell and family, Mr. Newton, and many others who due to the quarantine and port closing have been looked out for several months. Things up the Uruguay, on the Entre Riano side, are at a stand still. On the Oriental side they are brisk enough, and look improving.
