As Governor Acosta's message with reference to Bank reform insinuates that one of the first steps will be to realize all the properties it at present holds almost as dead capital, we may presume that as soon as the Provincial Bonds are disposed of in London orders will be sent to offer the Western Railway for sale. There is, we believe, a hitch about the title of the lands traversed by the line, but if the Government of B.
