SATURDAY JULY 5, 1873. THE AMERICAN RECEPTION.

General White's reception yesterday at the United States Legation, 190 Calle San Martin, was the most brilliant reunion that has occurred in B. Ayres for a long time.

Among the company we noticed Ministers Tejedor, Avellaneda and Dominguez of the National Cabinet, the Minister of the Buenos Ayres Govern- ment, the representatives of Great Britain, France, Austria, Spain, Chile &c., the Consuls of England, Germany, Chile, Austria, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Belgium and other coun- tries; the Postmaster-General Pos- a-

das, and about a hundred and fifty merchants and leading men of the city. The rooms were elegantly decorated, with a portrait of Washington over the table on which lunch was prepared. There were about 20 ladies, whom Miss White received in the Drawing-room.

General White invited the Presi- dent to take a glass of wine in honor of the day, and said—

Mr. President—We celebrate to-day the anniversary of our Independence, and in doing so we have to renew our assurance to mankind that Republicanism means order and good will, the advancement of the human race, and the great principle of self-government.

I have arrived in Buenos Ayres with the impression that Argentines are animated with the same feelings as my countrymen, that a cordial bond of sympathy unites the two countries, and that you are carrying out here the same programme as ourselves. (Here the General took the President's hand, and both drank the toast with good will.)

President Sarmiento replied—Mr. Minister, on behalf of myself and my countrymen I have to offer you our warmest congratulations, assuring you that our best wishes accompany you in the onward march of your great country, and that we are labouring to model our institutions after yours.

This day is one of rejoicing for all South America, and no where more celebrated than in Buenos Ayres (cheers).

After the President had left, Mr. Hopkins proposed the health of Dr. Rawson, as the distinguished son of an American citizen, the reply of Dr. Rawson was in his usual style of brilliant rhetoric, alluding to the wonderful development of railways, tele- graphs and commerce; still more to the superior system of public educa- tion; and lastly to the triumph of principles of justice as in the Geneva Convention, which he said reflected equal honor on G. Britain and the U. States. His speech was repeatedly applauded; and then Mr. Bean followed.

At 5 p.m. the reception still contin- ued, and everybody came away with the impression that it was one of the happiest occasions seen here for many years.

FINANCE MINISTER'S REPORT.

(Continued.) The General Post-office produced 28,891\$ 84 cts. more than the previous year, in the sale of postage stamps, but in order to arrive at the exact figure we should have also to include the proceeds of Mail-cars in the Inter- rior, an item not yet included in our revenue. Among other improvements I think it is time to adopt Post-cards, a new English invention that has ob- tained great success all over Europe.

Stamped-paper increased in ratio with our commerce, giving \$3,412\$ 46 cts. more than in 1871, which is partly due to the improved staff we have in this department.

The National Electric Telegraph, which now connects us with the utter- most bounds of the Republic, and with our neighbors, has begun to figure in our revenue. The tariff is excessively low. This was all right at first to ac- custom the public to the use of tele- graphs, but we must now make the revenue self-supporting, besides giving an income on the cost of construction.

Light-houses have also for the first- time appeared among our Ways and Means, the light-dues having for- merly belonged to private contractors. Our anticipations in this matter have been more than justified, the proceeds far exceeding the highest bid we had received from private parties anxious to farm this branch of revenue. The receipts up to December 31st were 19,129\$ 33 cts, but if we take the whole year they exceed 36,000\$. The Marine Department will give full de- tails, and suggest necessary improve- ments in view of the rapidly increas- ing tonnage of our ports.

I now turn to the items of expendi- ture during 1872. The Budget was 28,622,953\$ 40 cts; the payments amounted to 23,844,503\$ 57, leaving a surplus of 4,778,449\$ 83 cts, which I shall proceed to explain at length.

The Department of Interior was es- timated at \$3,677 735\$ 68c. and only expended 2,275 82\$ 44c, leaving a surplus of 1,401,907\$ 24c. Most of this last figure consisted of the item of 1,028,000\$ for the Rio Cuarto Rail- way, which will be paid out of next year's accounts. Another considera- ble item results from the Public Works vote having been left almost untouch- ed, leaving a surplus of 237,125\$ 17c. A third item is 25,000\$ for discovery of coal, awarded to no one. The other savings have been in salaries and minor details.

Foreign Affairs left a surplus of 21,143\$ 40c., mostly from new legations that were intended but have not been carried out.

The Finance Department, including the service of the Nat. Debt, stood for 18,845,928\$ 80c., of which the items may be summed up—

Int. on Pub. Debt... 7,886,648\$ 00 Ant. of Floating Debt... 8,840,000 Expenses of depart... 2,159,238 18,845,928\$ 80

According to the latest classification by English statesmen we may divide national expenditure under two heads, necessary and optional; among the former is Public Debt, with which our national honor is intimately bound up, there being no room either to reduce or postpone such obligations. Hence every well-framed Budget begins with the account of Public Debt, as a separ- ate and special chapter. I am happy to state that all our obligations have been most punctually attended to, as has always been the case since the or- ganization of the Constitutional Gov- ernment, and thanks to this the Gov- ernment has been enabled to raise the credit of the country to a level with the most powerful nations. There has been a saving of 997,216\$ 80 cts., chiefly from the difference of interest on the Public Works Loan, as the whole of the Bonds have not been put in cir- culation; secondly from the profit ob- tained by exchange operations in my department.

The interest on all descriptions of Home Debt has been religiously paid, and a large amount amortized. The National Bonds bearing 6 per cent in- terest and 1 amortization had 144,752\$ 84 cts. amortized, leaving now 18,055,623\$ 53 cts. in circulation. The other class bearing 6 per cent interest and 2 1/2 amortization shows 127,058\$ 83 cts. redeemed, leaving 1,802,352\$ 94 cts in circulation.

Roads and Bridges stock was amori- zed in due form, but as the Minister of Interior keeps emitting the stock we find that the amount has almost doubled during the year, coming up to 1,033,000\$.

The coupons of Foreign Claims, for indemnities agreed on by the Parana Government with foreign residents, have been reduced by amortization to 1,757,644\$ 72 cts.

The London Loan of 1824 is now reduced to—

\$ 841,000 in 6 per cents. 929,100 in 3 The first have reached par at Lon- don during the year, and the 3 per cents went up to 75.

The (Riostra) Loan of 1868 stood at close of the year at \$2,200,100 and the Public Works loan at \$5,885,900, including the Bonds held by Government.

Of the B. Ayres Provincial Debt transferred to account of the Nation the item of 20 millions emitted in May 1859 is now wiped out, the order hav- ing been given for the last payment. The emissions of 1861 and 1862 are now reduced to 1,546,000\$ its.

In a word the Funded Debt, home and foreign, was—

Dec. 31st, 1871... 74,643,312\$ 23 Dec. 31st, 1872... 72,539,671\$ 19

showing that the amortization or red- emption was equal to 2-1/2 per an- num. We paid Brazil during the year 1,158,779\$ 45c. on account of the two millions she lent us during the Paga- guayan war, and the instalment we are going to pay in July 1873 will leave the Republic free of this obliga- tion.

The Floating Debt was calculated in the middle of 1871 at other figures than turned out when beginning our financial year. Thus Treasury-bills were put down at 5 millions, and the amount on January 1st 1872 was only 4,480,833\$ 46c. Accounts-rending were put down at 2 millions and resulted 2,901,696\$ 38. The Bank loan was not effected till December, and then on such advantageous terms that we had to amortize nothing, although we had calculated having to pay \$1,800,000. These differences are inevitable when a Budget has to be made up long ahead.

Taking the last 3 items collectively there is a surplus of 1,557,811\$ 83 cts in our favor under the head of Float- ing Debt.

Another saving we have effected is in the interest payable on Treasury and Custom-house bills. The estimate of 600,000\$ was on the old basis, of 10 per cent interest. Viz—

On Customs-bills... \$100,000 Treasury do (5 millions)... 600,000 700,000

But, as I succeeded in reducing the interest on such bills to 7 per cent for most of the year and 6 per cent during 3 months, I was able to cut down the Debt in Treasury-bills by the end of 1872 to 2,428,253\$ 68 cts. or just half what it was at beginning of the year; and the Pending-accounts from 2,901,696\$ 38 was reduced by Dec. 31st to 2,469,809\$ 73. I may add that when closing my books on March 31st of the current year this item did not exceed 253,251\$ 55 cts.

Every item in my Department, ex- cept one, shows a surplus, without our having left anything unattended to. In the offices of Secretary, Accountant-General, and Receiver of Customs some savings have occurred. But I have studiously avoided any saving under the head of \$60,000 voted for Custom-house stores, since we are so badly off in this particular that it is imperative to repair the old and build new ones. This does not apply to the new Custom-house at Rosario, for which special funds were voted.

Summing up, we find an effective saving of 2,988,366\$ 87 in the Depart- ment of Finance, some items shewing great gain to the Treasury.

St. Patrick's Society.

FIFTEENTH ORDINARY MEETING. On Thursday evening the fifteenth ordinary meeting of this society was held; Mr. Thomas Armstrong in the chair, assisted by Vice-Presidents Mul- hall and Duggan.

Present: Rev. W. Walsh, secretary. Mr. Thomas Duggan, treasurer. Mr. James Brownie, assistant secre- tary.

And the following directors: Edward Murphy, Gamble, Rogers, Pippet, J. Harrington, Moore, Lynch, Dr. D. C. Kelly, Dr. J. Kelly, Lowe, Dennelly, J. Murphy, Cowan, Dono- van, Walker, T. St. G. Armstrong, Barry, F. Davis, E. Casey; and some seventy members.

The assistant secretary read the mi- nutes of the former meeting.

The case of Mr. Beahan was then gone into, and the committee reported that he was the right man, and the so- ciety might advance his passage mo- tion. Passed accordingly.

Dr. Haslam's colonisation motion was then declared in order, and at Mr. Walker's request, it was postponed for a week, owing to Mr. Haslam's illness.

The secretary then read the follow- ing letter from Dr. Gibbins respect- ing the poor emigrants from Paraguay at the Asilo de Mendigos.

Batucua, June 30th, 1873. Runchos, June 30th, 1873. To the Secretary of the St. Patrick's Society.

Reverend and Dear Sir, In compliance with the instructions of the President at our last meeting, I waited upon Mr. Wickens, at the Asilo de emigrantes, communicating to the latter gentleman the willingness of many members of the society to em- ploy the Lincoln, or Polish Emigrants, at the Asylum, in every case that the emigrant could be made use of or was suitable for any required purpose. Upon seeing two Polish families I could at once realise their inability for any camp employment or for anything in short that I could put them to, even if induced for charity sake to take a miserable used up fireman to the estancia; a big wife and a lot of little children put it out of the ques- tion. I testify with gratitude to Mr. Wickens, readiness to afford me every information. He took me over his well managed Asylum, and I profited much by the interview with this gentleman, being further convinced that this pro- vince is not suited for promiscuous em- igration, and that our society in the first instance should not lend itself of mix up with any scheme, however en- vied, to induce Irish families to come out here, save in such cases when they are sent for by their friends already established in the country or by known parties, requiring them through the society, when they would be placed immediately upon their arrival. Thus a young society like the St. Patrick's would be saved from vexatious com- promises. And I am still more con- vinced in my idea from the uncertainty of the climate for cropping.

Who knows better than yourself, Rev. Sir, the versatility of man, his love of change, Est Natura hominis Novitates avida? The Heuland other swindlers are positive proofs of the fact, in- ducing large bodies of men to change from one country to another, when any chance of success is held out to them. But by wisely having Directors in all parts of Ireland, when these Directors have consented to act, and are satisfied they may conscientiously fulfill the trust reposed in them in recommending men to leave his loved home for a foreign country. Then the society will hold a power of serving his fellow man and promoting an immense emigration; but the greatest punctiliousness will be re- quired between the Directors of the St. Patrick's society and their repre- sentatives at home, lest in any single case the latter may be compromised, and vice-versa, in suiting the society with what is required from the repre- sentatives.

In conclusion, I beg to add my un- limited admiration of the Rev. Father Leahy's lecture on Temperance, which contains statistics so clear and true; the sum collected by lines on the drunken soldiers is wonderful. I trust could we induce the reverend gentleman to publish a small pamphlet, to which we would all subscribe, and send it gratuitously through all the provinces, I am satisfied it would tend to much good; and now that lectures have commenced, let us entreat all the members at each meeting indi- vidualy to mention some subject or relate any circumstance from the own experience in camp matters, ex- periments made in farming, pruning, fencing, the best corral, and to teach horses to draw, sweep-wash and other matters, by which means all may learn something.

Mr. Pippet's motion, of which due notice was given, was then declared in order.

Mr. Pippet rose and said—Gentle- man, it is not my wish to bring for- ward ideas that are contrary to the spirit of this society, nor to go in op- position to those already-brought-for- ward; but, as there are so many dif- ferent ideas on the subject of immigra- tion, both practical and scientific, I take this opportunity to lay before you an idea which, in most instances, may prove both feasible and practical. The position which this Society now holds certainly justifies it in taking some steps to encourage emigration to this country, but to what extent must be entirely regulated by the demand for that labour. It would be a very dan- gerous scheme to bring to these shores a number of immigrants who may not have a fixed destination; as our num- bers are so few in comparison to other nationalities, so an excess of English labor would soon become a drug on the market from their being incapable of speaking the language. This to an Italian or a Basco, is much easier, for there are so many more of their countrymen here who naturally as- sist one another, therefore they do not find that inconvenience on first landing which the English or Irish in- variably do. In the first place let me divide the subject into three headings: 1. Can we find certain occupation for a number of fresh hands? 2. Thirdly, Is there any guarantee to these persons after they have landed here?

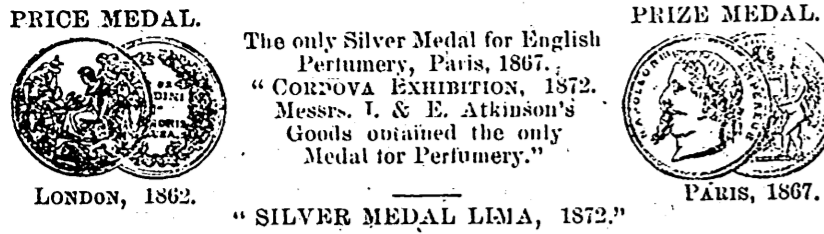
