THE PARAGUAYAN DIFFICULTY.

GENERAL MITRE'S REPORT.

Nothing can be more amusing than the subjoined account of the attack on Asuncion, which resulted in the defeat of the revolutionary army under D. Candido Barreiro and General Caballero.

Asuncion, June 22nd. To His Excellency Dr. Tejedor, Minister of Foreign Affairs. In my private despatch of the 14th I informed you that the telegraph and railway had been cut, throwing the city into great alarm.

Next morning (17th) Miranda again came, to say that the rebel army, 2,000 strong, was at Campo Grande, 3 leagues from town.

After mid-day the rebel outposts seized the Recoleta, one league out, driving in the Government videttes, and despatching an orderly with letters to Minister Magalhaens and me, signed by Candido Barreiro and Gen. Caballero.

Accordingly when leaving the President's house we sent an orderly to tell the rebels not to advance, as the city was under our protection.

While we conferred with the President on the demands of the rebels a courier arrived with news that the army from Paraguari was marching to his support and would arrive by next day at noon.

Pres. Jovellanos had twice insinuated that he would have taken measures to defend Asuncion but that he thought we should do so; whereupon we told him clearly that it was only for the interests of humanity we could interfere, but not become belligerents on his behalf.

Bales of hay, barrels of sand, stakes, and 4 guns formed the defences of the Plaza, in which Jovellanos, his two Ministers and all available forces were concentrated.

On the morning of the 18th of June our reply was handed to Barreiro and Caballero at the Recoleta by the Argentine and Brazilian secretaries of Legation. Barreiro said it placed him in an awkward position, as he wanted to attack the city at once.

On the 20th I continued the pursuit by Arroyo Lucas, again camping at sundown. Then, finding that Ocampo's force did not exceed 2000 men, that he was trying to effect a junction with Querencio, and at the same time draw me away till my horses should be beaten up and allow of his making a sudden descent on Concordia, which had no other garrison than 160 National Guards, I resolved to fall back towards that town.

On the 21st I set out for Yuquere-Chico, where I remained for seven days in sight of the enemy, with skirmishes daily in which the enemy hoped to surprise me.

Accordingly Col. Hermes and an Argentine officer informed Caballero he might assault the Government barricades, and the latter gave his guarantee to respect the town.

At 1 p.m. the rebel army of 700 horse and 300 foot, with one gun, assaulted the barricades in three columns. Caballero remained outside with the reserve. At 3 p.m. the rebels retired in confusion; just as the Government army under Ferreyra came up.

The only unpleasant incident was a group of rebels standing before the Brazilian Legation and saying we had treated them falsely, which obliged the guard to turn out and fire into the air.

In conclusion I may observe that the condition of the country is not hopeful. The revolutionary forces reformed a short distance from town and seem inclined to try another assault.
