St. Patrick's Society. SEVENTEENTH ORDINARY MEETING.

On Thursday evening the seventeenth ordinary meeting of this society was held at the reading-rooms of the Society—the President, Mr. Thomas Armstrong, in the chair, assisted by the two Vice-Presidents, the Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant-Secretary, and the following Directors:

Messrs. Harrington, Dowling, Murphy, Kearney, Pippett, Lynch, Cowan, Dr. D. C. Kelly, Walker, Rodgers, Lowe, Dr. J. Kelly, F. Davis, Rev. J. Davis (of Montevideo), Barry, Gamble, Hansen, Dr. Conyngham, T. St. George Armstrong, Denny, Peely and Moore.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting, which were approved, and in a brief address recounted the business of the society transacted during the week.

The letters and circulars to the various Directors in Ireland were, with the exception of three, all forwarded by the Boyne. Application had been made to the society to discover some particulars about the Eaton family.

The Secretary also stated that he had received a letter from the Archbishop soliciting a subscription towards a fund which is now being raised with the view to improve and civilize certain Indian tribes, and that at the next meeting he would bring the matter up in the regular way before the meeting.

As regards the Lampont and Holt question, concerning passages, application had been made to Messrs. Green and Co., and as yet no reply received.

Mr. Behan had been forwarded to Europe at the reduced passage of £10, and will return the money on his arrival in Ireland.

The Chairman thought that the Indian mission business was beyond the sphere of the society.

Mr. Mulhall stated that a very ancient and wealthy society exists in this city for the Indian missions.

The matter stands over till next meeting. The Secretary introduced the Rev. J. Davis, Director at Montevideo, who had just arrived from the Banda Oriental.

The Rev. J. Davis addressed the meeting, accepting the post of Director and promising every assistance to the Society in Montevideo. (Cheers.)

Suppose the uniform rate for ten words be made 50 cents. The distance to San Juan, Tucuman or Jujuy is about a thousand miles, something the same as from London to Rome, and half-dollar cannot be considered dear. Nor is it likely that the business would be any less, while the receipts would be exactly double what they were in 1872, making the account stand thus—

Art. 60. Commercial or trade-marks may consist of names, emblems, stamps, seals, engravings, letters or numbers upon goods or cases; or the particular form of packing.

Art. 61. Anyone may apply for a mark at the Patent-office in B. Ayres, or its branches, or the post-offices in the provinces. Parties abroad may do the same through an agent in this country.

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ment of value, and the sulphurous acid gas combining in the smoky atmosphere of London is well known to be the most destructive agent upon all soft stones subjected to its influence. It has been used in this form on a large scale at St. Paul's Cathedral, under the superintendence and with the approval of Mr. Penrose, the Cathedral Surveyor; also at the Houses of Parliament, Lambeth Palace, the residence of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and many other public buildings.

THE GLEE CLUB CONCERT. (By an Amateur.)

To the Glee Club, and several members of the Colou Orchestra, we are indebted for the most pleasant musical evening we have had this many a day. To all of us this concert has been quite a relief from the everlasting operatic performances we have been surfeited with these last two years, and we take this means of suggesting to the Glee Club how desirable it would be to afford us such another treat at an early date.

The selection of the programme was done in very good taste, presenting at least considerable variety; the glees are some of the most beautiful in that class of music, as the names of Lorenz, Marschner, Kucker, and Bishop, abundantly testify; the two humming pieces receiving special notice from the audience, that by Wilhelm being treated. Among the remaining glees, we think the Young Musicians, and ever popular Myrner Vanduck, were sung with much spirit, and pleased very much. We are sorry to hear several of the leading voices were somewhat out of trim, which will account for one or two little defects noticed here and there; but we hope on a future occasion, when the members of the Club are more accustomed to sing together, and in a milder season, to hear the glees sung in something like perfection.

We have to congratulate Mr. Tolkein on the marked improvement in his style of singing. The Bell Ringer, Wallace's lovely song, was, we think, remarkably well sung by the worthy president of the Club, and in due form the Forza del Destino, with the leader, Mr. Nicholson, it was hard to know who pleased the most, although Mr. Nicholson was troubled with hoarseness.

We can scarcely find words to express our admiration of the rendering of Beethoven's string quartet by Messrs. Panizza, Superti, Gbonatti and Ripari, the precision and delicacy of expression being the theme of general admiration, and then the beauty of the composition itself; here, indeed, we have the work of a master mind, and an illustration of the wonderful variety of effects that can be produced with a small number of instruments. The favourite piece of the evening was certainly Bach's Meditation; indeed it is scarcely possible to conceive a more beautiful strain of melody than this, the tones of the violin giving much intensity to the real merit of the composition. We think Sr. Panizza was not so successful in Piatti's Nocturn. We noticed a lack of delicacy in the colouring. We must not forget, however, that orchestral playing is fatal to an artist who has any pretension to solo playing.

To Mr. Albano the harpist is indebted much of the success of the concert; his playing of selections from Bonamilla, Lucrezia Borgia and Lucia were received with delight, his playing receiving applause from the numerous ladies present; he is doubtless an artist of much ability, and we may say to us in Buenos Ayres such execution on the harp is quite a novelty, as we don't remember to have heard anything at all approaching to the execution of Mr. Albano.

Of Mr. Hargreaves we can conscientiously say, he is a young musician of talent, both as a composer and pianist. We have only to recommend him to study, and to take care that his models are of the classical school. We should like at a future concert to hear him play one or two of Beethoven's sonatas or Mendelssohn's songs without words.
