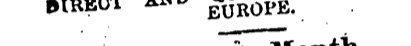

NEW CUSTOMS TARIFF.

The proposed Customs Law for 1874 now before Congress may be said to offer no alteration in the existing tariff except the reduction of export duties to 4 per cent. ad valorem.

As the Finance Minister calculates the revenue next year at 20 1/2 millions, or 25 per cent. over the receipts of 1872, and as Mr. Dominguez is always rather under than over the mark, the Congress will probably accede to this reduction.

Many people had looked for a similar abatement in import duties, but this is impossible in view of the Entre Rios rebellion.

At any rate it is better for the country that consumers pay more than producers, for it we want to compete with Australia, South Africa and other countries, in the European markets, our produce should go if possible duty-free.

For benefit of readers abroad we may sum up the proposed tariff for next year as follows—

Imports.

Alcohol, beer, wine, tobacco and the vinegar 25 per cent.

Coal, iron, lumber, salt, silk, farming implements, gold or silver worth 10 per cent.

Precious stones 3 per cent.

All other articles 20 per cent.

Duty-free—Books, printing-paper, presses, printing-materials, ice, live cattle, firewood, fresh-fruits, mizze (overland), machinery for steamers or new industries, gold and silver, coined or bullion, seeds, cure for sheep-sickness, and articles for religious worship.

Exports.—Hides, wool, tallow, beef, horns, bone-ash, feathers and hair—4 per cent.

All other articles duty-free.

The valuation to be alike on greasy or washed wool. The Custom-house to have 24 hours for seizing any imported goods on which the valuation appears too low, and in such case bills 10 per cent. over the invoice to be given.

Ten per cent. leakage to be allowed on wines from beyond the Line, six from Brazil, and 3 p. c. from the Rivers, besides 5 per cent. breakage for bottles.

Export-duties to be paid cash at the port of shipment, and import-duties in bills at 4 months. Duties may be paid in any part of the Republic either in specie or in B. Ayres paper-money.

The above is a precis of the project, as submitted by Government, and as soon as it passes through Congress we shall publish the law in extenso.

NATIVE ENTERPRISES.

THE MUTUAL GAS WORKS.

A scarcely less important enterprise than the Retiro Cloth Factory, of which we last week gave our readers full particulars is the Mutual Gas Company's establishment at the foot of Calle Defensa between the Boca and Barracas. The site is admirably chosen. On a low ground just at the outskirts of the town and in the heart of a dense, industrial population, stand the works, facing the General Brown station of the Ensenada Railway, and running back half way to the Calle Larga. They are surrounded on all sides by tramways running into the Plaza every ten minutes.

Few who knew this place a dismal swamp some years ago could recognise it to-day, so much has native enterprise done for the place.

The fields have been drained and ditched to keep out the river, and new houses run up on all sides. The Gas Works, covering 70x200 yards, are already walled in, and offices and sheds built, costing in round numbers \$26,500 sterling.

The quantity of bricks employed is something astounding, there being nearly as many below as above the surface; for not alone was it found necessary to sink foundations very deep, but in muddy places the level of the yards had to be raised. For solidity of finish there are few works in the River Plate to compare with it.

The whole front is taken up by the Company's offices and stores flanked on either side by the manager's quarters, and a large coal store 100x30 yards capable of holding 4,000 tons of coal. In the centre is the 'grand entrance, an arch, which is to be surmounted by a clock shortly expected out from England.

The coal shed is divided into three compartments of 33x30 yards each, provided with an elevator or tramping machine. The engineer calculates the saving effected on manual labor at 6,000 hard dollars or say £1200 per annum.

The retort house, about half the size of the coal shed, stands in the centre of the yard. All the retort beds are fixed in native brick and cement, space being left for the chimney not yet begun. The end next the entrance is raised to 10 feet high, and presents a well finished appearance. The retorts are not yet ready, but when completed will be placed in 24 beds, of 8 in a bed, in all say 200 retorts of various sizes, capable of making 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas per day.

To the right is the engine and boiler house; foundations are well in, and the brick work in both cases to 2 feet above ground, with door-frames erected.

The next in order is the excavated ground for the tar tank, about 16 feet in circumference and 12 deep. The cast iron plates are on the ground, and will soon be erected. Close to the tar tank is what is termed the 'scrubber,' this scrubber must be a monstrous affair, judging by the brickwork prepared to receive it.

The 'condenser,' the engineer informs us, will be placed in a tank fixed over the engine and boiler house.

The 'mixing' foundations are all fixed in very solid brickwork, ready to receive them on arrival from England. Columns of brickwork have been sunk near the rimfrms, to contain the iron coils for the purifying shed.

The purifying material will be partly of Cordoba lime and the remainder of 'oxide of iron.'

The 'meter and governor' house is next. Here daily supply is registered, whilst the 'governor' regulates the pressure on the different parts of the city. This structure is already half built.

At the far end room is left for two gasholders. The tank will be of wrought iron, and the gasholder 125x40 yards, containing when full 500,000 cubic feet of gas.

We notice that nothing has been done to either the tank or holder; the engineer waiting for a steam pump which is expected in the Leibnitz.

On the whole, everything appears to be splendidly planned out; tramways from the main road in Calle Defensa will run through all parts of the works, and as far as we can see the arrangements are made with the utmost care, and specially to suit this country. The capital is half native, and half held by Mr. G. Bower, of St. Neots, London, a gentleman of great fame in gas and water works; it is one million hard dollars, say £200,000, of which 50 per cent. has been called up.

The company hold the Municipal contract for ten years from 4 M. rch 1st 1874 for not fewer than 4,200 lamps at \$110 m.c. per month, which is equal to a yearly revenue of £50,000 for street lamps alone. We hear it is the intention of the Municipality to at once extend the number to 5,000 lamps, which will leave still the astounding number of 2,700 kerosene lamps within the Municipal radius.

The mains which completely laid will be about 100 miles, of which about 50 have to be laid by 1st March 1874. The main-laying has already begun in Calles Europa, Comercio, Estados Unidos and Paseo Julio, and the contractor's able representative, Mr. C. H. Smith, says he fully expects to light 2,000 lamps by the time contracted. In case of default the Municipality have a right to impose a fine of 2,000,000 m.c.

Few enterprises have been started in these countries under more favourable auspices, possessing the Municipal contract and having as shareholders some of the largest customers, besides working with the most economical and improved machinery.

Montevideo Co. gave £27,000 profit last do. gave £62,000 profit upon six months working.

So upon paper South American gas companies look very healthy.

The old company of Buenos Ayres has regularly paid over 20 per cent per annum, and we see no reason why with proper management the Mutual Company should not give the same. The district of their mains occupy 80 p. more area than the old.

In conclusion, the company and shareholder have our best wishes.

BATEMAN'S PORT PROJECT.

Minister Dominguez handed in to Congress last Monday the following supplementary report from the Commissioners Lavalle, Olazabal and Lindmark, which throws doubt upon the experimental deep-water channel that Mr. Alfred Moore is now making:—

B. Ayres, July 19th 1873.

The undersigned commissioners having read the report of Your Excellency to Congress think fit to make some remarks upon an erroneous interpretation into which you have been led by the conclusion of our report not having been sufficiently explicit.

For example we said it was impossible to give a decided opinion as to the stability of the channel until we could measure the quantities of matter from time to time deposited. On this point Your Excellency relied on Mr. Moore's statements, entirely overlooking our opinions on the matter.

Among our reasons for not giving a positive opinion was the fact that the experimental works only began so late as April 23rd, beginning to dredge a depth of 11 feet below ordinary low water for a length of 70 feet, then deepening to 12 feet, and after 140 yards adopting a uniform depth of 13 feet.

The width dredged varied from 70 to 84 feet, although we had agreed with Mr. Moore for only 60 feet, but we did not care to make any objection, lest he should think us hostile to the Bateman scheme. We never imagined Mr. Moore would assert that the channel was widened accordingly after the dredging, 20 feet extra.

All our soundings after the dredging show that the channel preserves exactly the same depth, but that, as we expected, the sides have given way, filling up the lower part. This proves nothing for or against the scheme, as the same result may be looked for under any circumstances.

The Commissioners, therefore, could not hazard a judgment in a question of such importance, when it was essential to ascertain, 1st whether the channel will fill up, 2ndly whether in such event it can be kept clear at a cost of 2 per cent. on the whole work. Moreover the experiment was to embrace both the channel and *toes*, in which latter no steps have yet been taken.

Hence we have been alarmed by the flattering assertions of Mr. Moore, lest Congress should accept as facts occurrences of a very different nature from what he would have us believe.

As yet no one can go beyond mere conjectures, but when the experiments are concluded we shall give our decisive report.

LATEST FROM CORDOBA.

OPENING OF THE RIO CUARTO RAILWAY.

Cordoba, July 24th.

The railway to Rio Cuarto was opened to public traffic on the 17th, the gentlemen who started from here, and took the new line at Villa Maria, arriving at Rio Cuarto precisely at the time fixed, and being much pleased at the satisfactory manner of all the arrangements. This line now connects the second city of the province with this capital, and Mr. Stuart is entitled to the freedom of Cordoba for the promptitude with which he has brought to a completion within 24 hours a railway of 80 miles in length, through a thinly-populated country, several hundred miles inland, exposed to constant drawbacks from drought, Indians and other inconvenient circumstances. Moreover, it is worthy of note that this line is one of the cheapest yet made in the Republic, and the only one constructed at the cost of the National Government. It is the same wide-gauge (5 1/2 feet) as the Central Argentine, to which it will be a feeder, and goods or passengers are now conveyed without change of gauge between Cordoba, Rio Cuarto and Rosario.

The prolongation of the line now completed to Rio Cuarto will be carried out by Messrs. Rogers to Mercedes, province of San Luis, on the same wide gauge. Even at present the advantage of reaching Rio Cuarto by steam shortens the route to the Andine Provinces by some days, besides tending to strengthen the frontier against the Indians.

The Provincial Bank of Cordoba created so recently as the 2nd inst. with fiscal privilege of precedence of all other creditors promises to be successful. The capital will be one million hard dollars, in 10,000 shares of 100 each. The Government takes 5,000 shares, and the public 5,000, the liets to remain open till Aug. 1st. The provincial Board of Directors comprises Messrs. Carreras, Bouquet, Funes and Malbran, all men of good standing.

Last week the Provincial Minister of Finance, Don Tomas Garzon, drew on Mr. Thomas Armstrong for \$40,000 to pay the first call, and intimated to the Board that he had received permission to draw up to 100,000 \$fts., the surplus to be deposited in the Bank to the credit of the Government.

LATEST FROM PATAGONIA.
