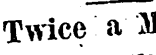

The first item shows an increase 15-fold, the second more than three hundred per cent., and the third multiplied 5-fold.

The war in Entre Rios during the last half-year made itself felt by the losses at the branch banks in that province, while the recent crisis in Buenos Ayres has also affected the shareholders, without, however, causing any positive injury to the Bank, or even obliging it to wind up any of its customers, as the Directors flattering call to mind in their report.

Comparing the half-year ending June 30th, 1873, with the previous one, we find the profits have increased 50 per cent., without any increase of capital.

Nearly one-third of the profits have been prudently set apart to cover \$80,000 in losses, three-fourths of this item belonging to the Entre Rios and Santa Fe branches.

Business at the head house in Buenos Ayres has been almost stationary, showing a slight increase in some items counterbalanced by a fall in others. Rosario on the whole shows an increase of 6 per cent. over the previous half year, Cordoba 5, Parana, 25, Santa Fe 30 and Concordia 50 per cent. increase.

The gross figures amount to 306 million hard dollars, a little over 1 per cent. increase on the previous half-year. In bills discounted there is a fall of two millions, equal to 8 per cent.; in fixed deposits an increase of 1 per cent.; in accounts current 1 per cent., and in general cash movement 3 per cent. over half year ending December, 1872.

The amount of business done by the Bank is very large in comparison with the paid-up capital. The latter is only £360,000 sterling, whereas the half-year's gross transactions foot up 61 millions sterling. These figures show the importance and high credit of the institution.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

Lisbon, July 29th.

The people of England are promised another distinguished Mohammedan guest, Mardocheo-Nahji, better known as the Sultan of Zanzibar, who has taken one of the Red Sea steamers, via Suez, for England, with the hope of being entertained like the Shah, especially on account of his condescension towards Sir Bartle Frere touching the abolition of Slave Trade.

Her Majesty's ship 'Thetis' has got into some trouble by firing on a number of Arab fishing-boats, which she mistook for slavers; she burned the boats, landed 216 Arabs in an island of the Red Sea and took 30 negroes to Aden; the latter afterwards declared through interpreters that they were fishermen.

The Marquis of Westminster lent his house at Grosvenor Square for the new Improved Cooking Association for the working-classes; among other distinguished guests was the Princess Louise, The Duke of St. Albans, Lord Hartington and Lord Cowper inaugurated the new Liberal Club at Nottingham, with a banquet of 600 covers. Parliament is to suspend its sittings early in August. Earl Granville sent Lord Lyons a copy of the amendments in the Anglo-French treaty of commerce, which will soon be presented by Duke Broglie to the Assembly.

The courts have been busy with the bankrupt estate of the Bloombury boot-maker, Robert Odger, whose liabilities are £272, and his assets only £6. The failure was caused by election expenses, and Mr. Spring Rice postponed judgment till Nov. 6th.

Prince Arthur, in passing through Copenhagen, solicited the hand of Princess Thyra, youngest sister of the Princess Alexandra and the Princess Dagmar; the latter is married to the Duke of Edinburgh. At the same time the Duke of Edinburgh was betrothed to Ingenheim Castle to the Russian princess Maria Alexandra, only daughter of the Czar. The Times speaks hopefully of the Russian alliance.

and will give weekly receptions, turn about, to the diplomatic, military, commercial and civil services. He intends taking a week's excursion with his wife and children to the family estate at Antun. By the advice of M. Magne he abandons the proposed tax of £100,000 on newspapers. Rochefort embarks this week for New Caledonia. MacMahon wishes to deal lightly with most of the Communists, except the leaders, and allow them to return from New Caledonia if they will settle down as farmers in Algeria. The evacuation by the German troops of French territory continues in the best order; Belfort is still in their possession. The Shah before leaving Paris, was presented by MacMahon with a grand dinner-service of Sevres' porcelain: he proceeded to Geneva, via Dijon. Jules Favre interpellated the Ministry as to what form of Government they were going to give France; the Duke de Broglie replied that it was not time to think of such matters, and this was affirmed by the Assembly, passing a vote of confidence in the present ruler by 400 votes against 270.

General Trochu is writing a pamphlet in defence of his conduct while he kept order at Paris. The Municipality has voted large sums for the improvement of Paris. The free-trade system is now fully adopted by the Assembly; the tax on raw materials was abolished a few days ago, and that on foreign flags last night. It is not true that France has recognized the Carlists, or means at all to meddle in Spanish troubles. Neither is it correct that Serrano was fired at near Biarritz.

A loan for Don Carlos has been raised in London, for one million sterling: one-third payable when he takes Bilbao, one-third at Burgos, and one-third at Madrid.

Old General Cabrera (75) has arrived at London from the baths of Wiesbaden, and is supposed to be shipping arms and supplies for Don Carlos. The Prince himself is besieging Bilbao, while his brother, Don Alfonso, is advancing with Saballs through Catalonia, having captured Igualada and being now on march for Gerone and Tarragona. Another Carlist force has cut off Pampluna, where the garrison must surrender, the Government republican army in the North is only 11,000 strong, the Carlists being more numerous: the latter obtained last week 4,000 rifles and some cannon from two English vessels which had been detained at Plymouth and then retained. Don Carlos published his manifesto on July 16th at Zagarzama, saying he hoped all Spaniards would help him to drive out the persons who had reduced Spain to her present condition. The Madrid Government is very active, but its power much restricted; the provinces of Seville, Granada, Malaga, Cadix, Salamanca, Tormel, Zamora, Gerona, &c. have rebelled, and even at Madrid an attempt was made to shoot Pres. Salmeron. The bombardment of Valencia is suspended, with hopes of an accommodation, but Gen. Pavia is bombarding Seville. Communications with the north are cut off, and the Government is sending a vessel to Bilbao with supplies for the garrison. The Communists are gaining ground in the south and west. Notwithstanding the wholesale murders the Madrid Government are firm in abolishing capital punishment, which increases the impunity.

Last night the Madrid Government abolished the Admiralty, confiscated all Crown properties, and ordered a War Loan. News from Valencia says the Government artillery passed over to the rebels, and another attack is to be made to-day. Two German frigates and one English have arrived at Cartagena, where they are high since the German corvette Frederic Karl seized the Communist sloop Vigilante. If the former had not released the Vigilante, it is certain General Contreras would have shot all the German residents; he goes about with a Phrygian cap, blouse and calico shoes, and has published a circular to Foreign Powers. At Toledo the excesses of Pierrad's battalion led the citizens to rise and disarm the soldiers. The German Government does not approve of the act of the commander of the Frederic Karl.

The Emperor of Austria is going to St. Petersburg in September. The Pope has named twenty-two new Bishops.

The American Government has confirmed the act of the United States frigate which protected the steamer Virginia at Aspinwall.

A great fire at Baltimore consumed one hundred houses, the loss being about £600,000 sterling.

PARIS LETTER.

(From our own Correspondent.)

July 14. The popular interest in the Shah's diamonds may be considered as ending with the illuminations of Paris, which the 'sigrette' was witnessed to most advantage under the influence of red, blue and white Bengal lights. It is very courageous on the part of the French to take so much trouble to please and to expend so much money to honor a potentate until the present as little known to them as the Khan of Khiva. Such, however, are some of the penalties for 'keeping up appearances.' In amusing the Shah Pagans amuse themselves, and the visit attracted crowds to the Capital, and consequently paid. What is singularly remarkable the crowds never cheered nor displayed the slightest enthusiasm for any members of the Government, from MacMahon down to the Minister of Agriculture, when alone, as in the company of the King of Kings competition was impossible. Despite his political failures and his weakness after his November message, the vast ma-

majority of the people thought of Thiers, regretting that ingratitude had driven that patriotic citizen into obscurity at the moment when the fruits of his labors were ripe. He planted, but did not reap, and it would not be too much to say that the very absence of Thiers brought him more vividly before the mind's eye. His successors must feel such to be the truth also.

The military review and the horse racing undoubtedly struck the Persian monarch more forcibly than anything else. It is useless to depict him as an artist—except from a child's point of view. At the circus, it was the tricks of the clowns amused him most; at the Louvre, it was the turning round of the statue of Venus on her pedestal under the influence of electric light, that enraptured him, not the speaking lines of the figure; at the Opera, the music, beautifully executed, where the humblest 'artists' is a celebrity, fatigued him; it was the ballet and its Oriental luxury that moved him. It is better to frankly avow, the fireworks being to wind and rain, were a failure; had wind and weather permitted the spectacle would have been magnificent; but the reputation of the French in this matter is so undisputed that fame loses nothing from the accident. The Elysees displayed a brilliant specimen of what the rest would have been. This is the part of the rejoicings in which the excursionists felt a bitter disappointment. Imagine citizens from Marseilles spending two nights and one day in what is ironically described as a pleasure train, and arriving finding no bed for love or money, and very little provisions for either, as the foreign element arrived like locusts, and found that families had laid in stocks for three days, as is usual on the eve of a revolution.

The military review was as much for France entire as for the Shah; there was at last an army, not a 'debris' of soldiers no longer looking cowed and afraid, but bold and resolute; their keeping in line was excellent, and uniformity of step, not a very great matter 'per se', and of accompaniment illustrating the success of discipline; the cavalry and artillery excited the admiration of the Shah; the horses were splendid animals and in excellent condition. An army, in France at all events, is not exactly a matter purely military; it is in addition the reflection of the nation. Without peace, order and prosperity, the reorganization of the army was impossible; Thiers secured the first, and thus developed the second. Reader to Caesar that which is Cesar's. The horse-races were the prologue to the illuminations, and the Jockey Club deserves every credit for organizing the pleasure. The question was on every tongue, why England omitted such an amusement from her programme of pleasures in honor of the Shah. The French quickly saw the omission, rectified it, and identified it, to naming the stakes after cities in Persia, with the illustrious visitor, who admired all, but did not clearly comprehend; and the 'card' of the race, a sort of folio-volume translation into Persian, did not much aid his majesty, as he quickly handed it to his prime minister to study, who passed it to his secretary, at once read up. Evidently the Shah remembered his visit to the circus, as he could not understand why the horses ceased after a round and did not continue a few more. Ten velocipedes have been ordered for Teheran, and what is not less important, the services of a professor secured to teach Young Persia how to work them. To judge from the packing cases daily leaving the residence of the Shah, tradesmen in Paris must be filling up fit orders; the King desires all his purchases shall arrive before him at Teheran, and the markets of the Western world will be formed into a kind of Exhibition for the benefit of his subjects. Then will follow his troubles: the Atreidic valley question awaits his decision; Russia or England; to be left or on with either. The Shah unhappily missed a great treat, a first-class row in the Assembly, but political passions, independent of the Dog Days, are so heated, that when he visits that People's Chamber the odds are, he will see something to his advantage.

The town of Nancy represents rather an honorable league in inviting M. Thiers to a quiet banquet of thankfulness for his efforts in liberating the territory, when the last Prussian shall have withdrawn. The proceedings will be carried on in a whisper, lest Alsace and Lorraine should hear the sound of feasting in their mourning. The Bonapartists organs charge the inhabitants of Nancy with getting up conspiracies, and hint, that for the safety of France, the authorities ought to request that arch-disturber of the peace, Thiers, to try change of air.

Disappointment is felt in the financial propositions of Magne. His economy on the war and navy estimates is not believed in—is too good to be true. These services must be organized ere being reduced. What is required is a rational income-tax easily collected, and relieving the hard-working classes from numerous indirect tariffs. An income-tax would be a capital means of preventing France going to war either for an idea or Providential geographical boundaries.

A very few followers observed the 13th inst. the anniversary of the death of the Duc d'Orleans, in July, 1842, from a fall from his carriage. It is often a favorite matter for reflection—what would have been the history of France to-day, had that most popular of heirs-apparent been spared. He lived four hours after the accident, and died in the back parlour of a small grocer's shop. Before the fatal moment, the doctor made a sign to lead

away the Queen. "No," said his mother; "I have received his first wish, and I desire to have the last one." Hereditary royalty has not been fortunate in France; since two centuries the succession has not been in the natural order of things, the son succeeding the father. The Duc d'Orleans, Duc de Berri, Duc de Reichardt, Louis XVII. was as Napoleon II.—all have failed.

Milliners appear to be as unfortunate in obtaining settlement of their bills as tailors. The ex-King of Spain's sister, the Princess Josephine Bourbon, owes her dressmaker 5,295 francs. All plans of dunning were tried, but without effect; even the Queen of Spain was applied to, who replied that she allowed her sister-in-law an ample income, sufficient to keep her out of debt, and declined all responsibility. The Princess has just arrived in Paris, with as much baggage as Nasreddin. Hardly was she comfortable in her hotel, when the bailiffs arrived and sealed the locks pending that the owner would explain as to the debt; as she failed to appear, the court has ordered the luggage to remain under provisional seizure until full payment of the claim.

One of the humorous journals, in announcing the order of the fetes in honor of the Shah from day to day, inserted the '15th' as a memorable date—that of quarter-rent day. This was the fly in the ointment. 'Memento quia pulvis es!'

A photograph of the Shah sells for one shilling; that where he is represented on horseback commands double the price. Persian names are bestowed on discoveries and inventions, and such will continue till the end of the week.

The newest practice for keeping the memory of distinguished public men green in the memory and soul of the public, is to affix an imitation postage stamp, with their likeness, on letters and newspapers. The postal authorities have been quite concerned on witnessing so many 'Jules Favres' in the sorting room. The 'duc d'Annam' is also in circulation, and in the South east of France, Gambetta is in vogue. The Bonapartists distribute tracts, with the legend of all the Napoleons, accompanied with flattering texts of scripture, and extracts from the speeches and writings of Thiers. The orderers attached to the Shah wear the Napoleonic livery; green and gold, and it is quite fashionable for Bonapartists to request that their remains be transported to Chislehurst for burial.

It is next to rank heresy to be living in Paris now, as it is the dead season, the liveliest part of the whole year. Among the many curious phases of this annual comedy is the formal manner people call on one another to bid adieu, professing to be in a hurry to catch the train to a country town or the sea side, when both parties know full well they have not the slightest intention of leaving Paris. The ceremony means do not call on me till November, do not expect invitations to dinner, note that the shutters are up, the holland on the furniture, the family gone into retreat and to economize for the coming season. The failure of the Vienna expedition causes Paris to be very full, and 'permanent' visitors display a disinclination to leave the capital this season.

It is well known that with Spanish ladies fans have a language, are veritable semaphores and can express, according as they are held or rather worked, whether a lady is married or single, a widow, or not disinclined to remake the experiment; they can be made also to express whether the lady is willing to flirt a little, and for what quality she esteems you. France for a long time employed jewellery, rings especially, to symbolize similar sentiments, and promises to return to the practice. It was the cost that killed the custom. A wig worn by a lady with pearls and garnets indicated a sad heart; a gordin knot in plain gold was an advertisement for a wife or husband; a doubt upon the sincerity of a lover's intentions was a ring in the figure of a snake with a precious jewel in its head-groove and the absence of all suspicion were symbolized by two hands joined together, as is to be met with on tombstones erected by widows to their lost partners, in simple gold.

Prince Napoleon is occupied with a volume on the true history of the late war. It is rumored that some very startling political disclosures will be made, and he has been solicited to the publication of it till the invader has definitely retired. Indeed that is an epoch that not a few persons regard with apprehension. In honor of that event 900 Communist prisoners are to be pardoned, and others will experience a partial reduction of their sentence, but no alteration will take place in the case of the ring-leaders. Prisoners liberated in New Caledonia can return to France if they please, but very liberal offers will be made to them to settle in Algeria. Marshal MacMahon has very decided views about that colony, and is resolved to make it of utility to France. Parts of the territory are to be endowed with Reformatory establishments, the siege of Paris and the Commune proving how fatal it is to have criminals concentrated.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The nip in the Weather was the general subject of maturational conversation yesterday morning. Forty five Fahrenheit with a wind that would cut an iceberg in two, and the barometer again on the gallop for 'Dry' is not a pleasant temperature. We have wroful complaints from the camp districts where water is so terribly scarce and there is far more dust than grass for sheep to feed on.

Prayers for rain are very seldom resorted to in these regions, but the time seems coming when this last appeal of sheep farmers will be necessary. An accident that suggested unutterable things in the "what might have been" way occurred to the 6 o'clock train from the Parque on Monday evening. It was as usual freighted with hungry millionaires en route for dinner, home and beauty, and as it approached Flores a bullock cart was observed ahead right across the line. The 'carro' dug at the brakes like mad, but in vain, and when the train was within 100 yards of him prudently bounded from the cart and saved himself. In three seconds more the line was strewn with beefsteaks, sirloins, shins, kidneys, and a beautiful supply of wood splinters for making lucifer matches. The daily bread men were shaken and frightened but not hurt, and alighted at Flores in safety. Had the engine been going the least thing faster the 'innumerable' list this morning would certainly have shown a most disagreeable increase.

We regret to hear of the death of Mr. Schwind, a well and favorably known merchant of Bahia. He died last month at Bahia House, Clapham. 'Pretty bad under foot to-day,' said one citizen to another, as they met in the street. 'Yes, but it's fine overhead,' responded the other. 'True enough,' said the first, 'but then very few are going that way.'

The Saint Patrick's Society will hold its usual weekly meeting to-morrow evening. A philanthropic English friend called our attention yesterday to the fact that the New Zealand Government grants free passages from England to Dairy women and domestic servants, asking us to bring the matter before the Public and the Society, which we hereby do, and wash our hands of the subject, as we don't like meddling with the sex.

The Right Rev. Dr. Stirling, Bishop of the Falklands, was entertained at dinner on Saturday last by Mr. Thomas Armstrong at his town residence in Calle Peru. On Monday his Lordship lunched with Mr. H. A. Green at Lomas, and in the evening dined with Mr. Wanklyn at his palatial residence on the Flores Road.

Daws, the magazine man, was up to his chin in the very latest papers and periodicals yesterday when we dropped in on him to buy a lead pencil. His store was so crowded with subscribers that we could scarcely get in or out. We won't have time, for a day or two, to review his usual batch of magazines.

There will be a change in the time table of the Western Railway on the 1st prox., which business men will find more convenient than the existing regulations. The next steamer of the Pacific line from Liverpool will be the Lusitania, to be followed by the splendid new vessel Potosi, of which we gave a description yesterday, and which is expected to beat even the recent famous run out of the Corcovado.

The mails from Central America announce four or five tolerably big fires in Panama, and that the city is stored full with kerosene, so that any day it may be a case of 'hic jacet' with the Isthmus city. The usual annual crop of rows and revolutions is springing up in C.A. Honduras has been invaded; there has been a military pronouncement at Chiriqui; Guatemala is pitching into Honduras; Costa Rica is making a railway, but has no money to finish it, and so on. Mexico is pretty quiet.

Gentlemen who believe in Temperance may find it useful to know that an eminent statistician has come to a conclusion showing that fifty-nine out of every ten thousand Englishmen get blinding drunk. The same number of Irishmen produces a crop of one hundred and forty-seven inebriates who look for a head to break. Nothing is said about Scotchmen; we suppose, because the 'wee' drop they take now and then is not worth mixing up with 'whuskey' statistics. (Quien sabe?)

The impossibility of stopping a tramway car in consequence of the guards being 'always engaged in electioneering gabble with their divers' is daily becoming a greater nuisance to the Public. The Commissioners are in favour of getting them out.

The Press of yesterday mentions a stormy meeting of the Cabinet at the National Government house late on Monday evening. The worthy row was so warm that one of the Ministers got up and left the room in disgust. Entre Rios and the Army was the thorny topic that caused the bobbyery.

The new tooth powder 'Marfilina' is causing a prodigious sensation in town, particularly amongst the dentists, whose teeth are clattering with fear lest they may soon find themselves in the position of Othello—their occupation gone. Marfilina sharpens, polishes, preserves, beautifies and generally fixes up 'grinders' in a way hitherto unknown. The head-quarters of this invaluable stuff are at Eastman's well known store in Calle Defensa, but every decent druggist in town feels it a pleasure to sell it to toothaching humanity.

The election excitement at Chilivco has quite passed away. The principal thing there now is dust, which, though disagreeable enough in its way, is not quite as indigestible as the pistol bullets going last Sunday week.

An unmitigated scamp promeditatedly kicked up a row the other night at the door of a house where an old invalid got a fright at the noise that she jumped out of bed and almost instantly departed for the next world. The ruffian is in the police office.

Mr. Ringuet's Railway Regulation has been sent to the Chambers by the Executive as proper to be converted into a railway law of this province. Most uncomplimentary remarks are daily made as to the filthy state of the Cathedral steps and environs. Whoever may be to blame, the fact is but too patent, and is really most scandalous. The connection between cleanliness and godliness is completely ignored by whoever has the care of the Cathedral in hands.

The latest news from Entre Rios is that a fight may be expected about the middle of next week near Concordia. Ingratitude thy name is Buenos Ayres! The subscription to raise a monument to the late Mr. Viale, hero of the American catastrophe, has burst up, the skilful admirers of his gallant and chivalrous deed relying on his being duly rewarded for it in the next world!!! The Vialto Mountains, at the Falklands, are the only monument the brave fellow will ever have. The tramway by Calle Cerrito to Pasaje las Duranas will be inaugurated at Montevideo on the 25th. A testary beef and native beer blow out will be given on the occasion.

The Customs officials ammunition the 71 cases of arms and cartridges in one other day. They had been sent from Montevideo in La Villa del Salto and Vesuvius, and were intended for the Jordanians. A respectable house in the town, Vienna and Co., were caught in, as they declared the packages were 'telegraph materials,' and they had been embarked at Montevideo as such. BOLSA TELEGRAMS.

B. Ayres, August 19th, 1873. To the Editors of the STANDARD.

Gentlemen, The commercial public of Buenos Ayres has long borne with patience the wording of the telegrams from Montevideo, but the time has at length arrived when it is necessary to make some remonstrance, which to my idea cannot be better done than by calling attention to the point in question through the medium of your widely read journal. We'll know how through the failure of Messrs. Camino & Pino, the run on the London and River Plate Bank, and the failure of the Oriental Bank, confidence was so shaken in this city that the tightness of money which we had flattered ourselves was a thing of the past returned with double vigor, and continues up to the present moment, but, at least we know the extent of the mischief, and the names of the parties involved.

Now for a second time an alarming telegram is written up on the black board of our Bolsa, and couched in such ambiguous terms as to alarm the whole community. "Se habia de la quiebra de dos barraqueros, un almaceenero, y un comerciante en cereales" says the dispatch. In the name of all that is common sense let the correspondent whoever he may be, state something positive or hold his peace. The same thing happened after Camino's failure, and nothing subsequent transpired to warrant the despatch. We wish to know all in order to know the extent of the mischief, but either that or nothing calculated to disturb the ordinary course of business by vague reports which injure every body and do good to none.

There was quite a stir in the market to-day, and the bearers have completely oversold the stock, and are now buying in to close their transactions for the end of the month.

The news from the Government House to-day had no effect whatever on the market. General Arredondo is dismissed and Dr. Avellaneda, Minister of Public Instruction, has resigned and resignation accepted.

National Bank, nothing done in stock to-day. Gas shares, 42 sold yesterday at \$2.60 per share, offered to-day at \$2.100. It appears that one influential party has entered the market prepared to buy 1 the shares offered. The gas company is now making more gas than ever, whilst its expenses are the same as two years ago, and the Municipality, as soon as it arranges its new loan, will pay the gas company off in full 5 millions; still the stock remains heavy.

Captain Morse, of the Republica, was welcomed on 'Change, and warmly congratulated by his friends on the splendid prospect of a gold watch to him by the commerce of Asuncion as a tribute of its esteem and respect.

Mr. Henry W. Benton, agent of the National Bank note Co. N. Y. was welcomed on 'Change to-day. Mr. B. says he is well pleased with the Buenos. The row firm of Hultsch and Vieyra was announced to-day, general brokers.

Sales in Cordoba at a late hour were made at 83 for end of month, and 89 for end of September.

Monor rails at 12 to 15; loans on stocks with good margin at 12. The Arucanica's mails arrived to-day. We give the latest news from Lisbon in another column. The Arucanica entered the River with 177 passengers on board, of whom 100 were for the Plata.

The French packet Erymanthe from Bordeaux entered Rio on 18th. She brings 88 passengers for the Plata. Her dates are anticipated by the Arucanica: she left Bordeaux on 24th, and made a splendid run out. The Erymanthe sailed from Rio for the Plata on 14th.

The Arucanica, according to the London papers, left England with 250,000 cts. for the R. Plata. The Globe of the 24th ult gives the following—'The Bank rate has been reduced to 4 per cent., but as the quotation of the open market is 3, the reduction does not seem likely to prove sufficient to enable the Bank to participate in the business offering.'

'Stock Exchange business' is rather dull after the recent improvement, notwithstanding that all the previous conditions of a favorable character, still exist. There is a change in the Funds, but Argentine Bonds, Italian, Spanish, and Egyptian show a slight advance upon last night's prices.

South American Bonds also keep firm. The news by the mail from South and Central America is more encouraging. The monetary crisis in B. Ayres was all but surmounted, and business was active in most capital cities and ports. From Paraguay, Entre Rios, Honduras, and one or two other Republics there is either no news or bad news. United States Government Bonds continue in active request for investment, and prices have further improved.

'The Arucanica has left with 250,000 in specie for the River Plata. The recent sales of wool brought out by the Arucanica are some of the most flattering recorded in this country for many years. Some of the h. uses have received account sales showing 44 per cent. profit, the news comes betimes, and shed sunshine over the wool portion of the Bolsa to-day; it rears other account sales showing lesser profits, but all give handsome results, which were indeed much required in this market, for we have passed through a period of great depression.

It may interest our mercantile readers to learn that in the opinion of a very experienced banker of this market the cash movements of the banks of this city have fallen off one third since last April. This is a very true and severe criterion to go by, and proves the great check which this crisis has been to general trade. Money still rules a bar and quite sufficiently scarce, but after all it is a good sign to see our monetary recovery slow y coming round, rather than a violent improvement which at it cannot last very long.

A private letter from Antwerp says—'To-day we welcomed on 'Change several River Plata men, Messrs. Von Eiken, Bracht, Eollenstein, Breit, Tomasini, and others.' It will be seen that the innocent mercantile system of welcoming friends on 'Change has extended to Antwerp.

It is really extraordinary what with all our telegraphic conveniences, correspondents at the Mount, and wide awake friends at both ends of the Plata, no one here knew anything of the very splendid specie remittance 250,000 on board the Arucanica announced by the London papers; there was a time when dozens of messages would have flashed the news with lightning speed, and every paper in town copied the news, but now-a-days half a million more or less seems to be but a bagatelle for the market.

Baron Maua is expected in this city on Thursday on his return from his splendid estancia, and the large beef preserving factory which he started in the Uruguay a couple of years ago, and which is now doing a most remunerative trade with Europe.

To-day they said on 'Change there was stiff work enough going on in Congress, the house having summoned the executive to give some explanations as to the state of the provinces. It appears that some very good news has come down from Entre Rios. A noted Oriental chief, who last month crossed over to Entre Rios to help Jordan, has returned highly disgusted with him and his campaign. So he t.
