NEW BANK CHARTER. The special committee appointed by the Provincial Chamber of Deputies

to examine the proposed reforms in the Provincial Bank have handed in a luminous report on the 3 principal points, leaving untouched 4 others

which they regard as matters of detail that can easily be settled in the course of debate when the House takes up the new Bank Charter.

It may not be out of place to express our opinion that Messrs. Eduardo Madero, Carlos Salas, José Maria Jurado and José Luis Amadeo, who formed the committee, have evidently given much labor, study and conscientious discrimination to the task.

1st. Is it expedient to divide the Bank into two departments, one of deposits and discounts, the other of emission? Sir Robert Peel, did so in the charter of the Bank of England in 1844, but this was unluckily followed by the crisis of 1847, when hundreds of great firms failed, among them that of W. R. Robinson, Governor of the Bank of England.

In the subsequent crisis of 1857 the Bank Act of 1844 not only failed to help matters but was supposed to increase the evil, until the Government had to suspend the Bank Act. At that time the cash reserve in the discount and deposit department was less than a million, while in that of emission it exceeded 7 millions.

A general reserve is much better for the Bank and allows more freedom of action; and although the Bank of Austria was constituted in 1862 on the model of the Bank of England there were special reasons in that case not applicable to ours, such as the stipulation to resume payments at sight in 1867, and keep specie reserve for all its emission over 200 million florins.

Neither can much weight be given to the fact that Congress has adopted such division in the National Bank, as its own notes may appear in the cash balance. For these reasons it appears more prudent to make no alteration in the Provincial Bank under this head.

2dly. Are the Directors to resolve collectively as at present, or in distinct committees? The second mode seems advisable, not only from the division of labor, but also from the aptitude of different persons to distinct duties. Meantime no one committee should be independent of the rest of the Board, but all act in harmony, as a Grand Jury of 16 persons, to whom the credit, trade and commercial activity of B. Ayres are entrusted.

3rdly. Should the law lay down a certain cash reserve in proportion to the currency emitted? This has been strongly supported by individual opinion as well as in the newspapers, besides having the authority of a Cabinet Minister, and the decision of Congress as regards the National Bank. Nevertheless, the law would be highly inconvenient, although it would be easy to get over it. Suppose the Bank emission equal to 30 millions fuertes, between currency and specie notes, with a reserve of 10 millions; there is a heavy withdrawal of gold, and the private banks and merchants take out three millions in gold in exchange for paper. Then the emission is reduced to 27 millions, the cash reserve to 7. Would you require the Bank under the circumstances either to sell its Public Funds or come down on its debtors?

Again, what proportion would you like to put? In England it is one-third of the emission. But then the lowest Bank of England notes are for £5, and the business is on a large scale, people using gold and silver for

daily wants; whereas in Buenos Ayres we have 138 millions (say one-fourth of our currency) in notes of 1 to 10 pesos (2 to 20 pence) that are indispensable for daily traffic, and cannot be sent to the Bank to ask for gold.

In Germany the reserve is one-third, but such writers as Wertheimstein and Hock maintain that any given reserve is illusory.

In the U. States the rule is 25 per cent in large, and 15 per cent in small towns. The American system of depositing Government stock as security is found to answer well, but we must remember that it was adopted less as a security for Bank paper than with the object of putting out Government stock, which must otherwise have fallen low during the long war against the South.

Hence we see that in August 1873 there were 1717 National Banks throughout the Union with a reserve of 108 millions in greenbacks and only 13 millions in gold. It is impossible to fail seeing that the ground-work of the U. States system, namely freedom of emission on the guarantee of Public Funds, has produced splendid results for the country.

To arrive at a mathematical ratio for gold reserve would be impossible, and John Stuart Mill only ventures to say, "Let the reserve be greater than the amount of specie withdrawn at any previous epoch." This would ill apply to our case, where the transactions are of three times the magnitude they were a few years ago. Besides that most of our deposits are of a permanent character.

The minor points left for discussion during the reading of the Bill are the following—Should the Chairman and Directors receive salary? Would it be well to authorize advances on Warrants or certificates of goods in deposit? Is it advisable to open a branch-office in London?

Should we have a Clearing-house here, as in London and New York? These may be adopted or otherwise, without affecting the 3 great points at issue as above, and the Committee feel satisfied that under a Reformed charter the Provincial Bank will be enabled to extend the sphere of usefulness for which it has already gained such favorable opinion among the public.

St. Patrick's Society. THIRTY-THIRD ORDINARY MEETING.

The usual meeting took place at the Society's rooms on Thursday evening. Mr. T. ARMSTRONG in the chair.

The attendance included Messrs. Duggan and Mullall, vice-presidents; Assistant-Secretary, and Directors Cowan, Barry, Pippet, Rodgers, Casey, Armstrong, junior, Denny, Feely.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. The question of naming a secretary was then declared in order.

The Chairman suggested that it was advisable to postpone the question of naming a secretary till the office of Irish chaplain were filled.

Messrs. Denny and Cowan were of opinion that it was not necessary to name a clergyman to the post.

Mr. Cowan moved, that a committee of three directors be named to decide the question of naming a secretary.

Mr. Mullall considered that the meeting was more capable of selecting a suitable secretary.

Mr. Denny was of opinion that by so doing a great loss of time would occur.

Mr. Duggan was of opinion that it was absolutely necessary to name the Irish Chaplain as Secretary, as only he could attend to the benevolent views of the Society.

Mr. Cowan moved that we resolve ourselves into Committee to decide whether a clergyman or layman be named. Mr. Denny seconded.

Mr. Mullall supported Mr. Duggan's views, and considered that it was necessary as far as possible to follow out the true, legitimate and useful programme of the society. That newly arrived immigrants repose entire confidence in a clergyman, whereas a layman to them carried no influence.

Dr. Lopez suggested that the question was one of convenience, but not of necessity, and as the possibility of a clergyman not being found suitable was to be thought of, he thought that the most suitable man was the right one, at the same time he considered a clergyman the proper party for the post.

Mr. Davis was also of opinion that it was absolutely necessary that the post offered be filled by a clergyman, as the most likely person to command the respect and attention of Irish immigrants, and to look after their wants.

After a long and animated discussion Mr. Rodgers moved that the question of naming a Secretary be postponed till this day week. Seconded by Mr. Cowan; carried.

The meeting then adjourned till Thursday, the 14th inst.

EDITOR'S TABLE. Mr. Lord Mayor Bunge where are you? As we passed the Great Emporium of our wool trade this morning, we noticed a crowd around a large hole at the corner of the street alongside the confiteria; conceiving that it was an auction or an election we stopped to see what was going on, when to our horror we saw our sturdy Onco friends listening to the effusions

of an indignant wool broker; we caught the following—

Hoosh, those ragged stones that Tram rails shade, Where heaves the dirt in many a mouldering heap, Each in its narrow collar for ever laid, The five "volones" of the farm's sleep—

Nor you, ye proud, impute to these the fault If Bunge's ore this hole no trophies raise, Where through the long old square and constant jail

The screeching cart wheels swell the donkey's bray. Full many a hole of rankest dirt—unclean! The dark unfathom'd streets of city bay! Full many a Bunge's horn to blash unclean! Nor waste his edicts as a Lord Mayor.

Goodall expressly state that their wine is made with Howard's quinine. The samples of Goodall's quinine wine we have examined have been of excellent quality, and remarkable for unprepared cheapness, which, in these days of dearth and scarcity, is in itself a great and unusual recommendation."

Piles of newspapers from England, New York, California, France, Italy, Wexford and almost every place under the stars except Central Africa were delivered at the Court yesterday. We did not look particularly at any of them except the London Times of the 10th ult, the latest in town. The Tichborne trial inclines every day more in favour of "our fat friend"; but the public interest in him and his fortunes pales before the Bazine Court martial, which is likely to prove to the world that the terrible disasters of France in 1870 were not exclusively due to the valour or skill of her foe, the Irons of Fortune, or the incapacity of her leaders, but that Treason of the worst kind disabled her for the fray. Marshal Bazaine, her ablest General, born at Versailles some 63 years ago and who left his home nearly half a century since as a private soldier, "with a Marshal's baton in his knapsack," now stands in his birth place charged with betraying "la Belle France" into the hands of her foes. The excitement on the subject in Paris bounded up to fever heat before the first days proceedings were half through. One Paris paper despatched five carrier pigeons to the metropolis that day with short hand notes of the indictment, which contains the most tremendous charges against the Marshal. Our Paris Letter received yesterday refers to this extraordinary trial, but the more detailed accounts in the London papers are too long for our limited space, though the "acte d'accusation" is like a thrilling romance in itself. After the "proces Bazaine," Bismarck's struggle with the German Catholics, and the inevitable Bourbon Restoration in France are what most attract the political attention of Europe just now.

We received a letter yesterday from an esteemed subscriber at Chascomus, whose escape from a severe illness we recently attributed to "a chew of tobacco." Though we purposely avoided mentioning names, the matter has been laughed over in Chascomus, and in justice to the eminent medical gentlemen who attended the patient we publish the following extract from our subscriber's letter, as we have not space to insert it all—"I think it my duty to say that, under God's holy will, to the skill and attention of Dr. Osborne I am indebted for my recovery. 'Tis true that the consulting doctors were of opinion I had no chance; perhaps my case was most critical at the time of consultation." All of us know Dr. Osborne's high reputation as a medical man, and we are infinitely obliged to him for preserving a valued subscriber to us; still, as ardent votaries of the "Weed" (we'll lay a sovereign to a paper dollar that the doctor is one also) we persist in thinking that the "chew" had something to say to it, while we feel great pleasure in rendering unto Osborne what is due to Osborne.

Turmeau the Teaman is again in the market with a new and delicious delicacy. Finding Corned-beef too pungent for this season of the year he has at immense expense and trouble invented and launched the Bath-Chap-Sandwich. We had the pleasure of lunching off two of the "chaps" yesterday and pronounced them at once to be an aristocratic edition of pig's cheek. Turmeau confessed we had hit the mark. He uses nothing but the joints of maize fed pigs of good breed, and is prepared to supply at moderate prices breakfast bacon from the same animal, his philanthropic object being to remove the bad character which the porkers of this country obtained in times when their daily bread was sardero refuse, a kind of food which the cheapness of maize has now happily abolished.

Consul Hutchinson, so long British representative in Rosario, has published, or is about to publish, another book, entitled "Two Years in Peru." None fitter than the Consul to write pleasantly about things he has seen and men he has known.

The splendid Italian steamer North America arrived yesterday with 1,000 immigrants after an extraordinarily fast run out, beating the head off the "Leinie and Royal Mail boats, and bringing three days later dates from Gibraltar. Owing, however, to the agents at the Rock being sound asleep we are without the latest London dates. Marker, score 500 for the good ship North America, and knock 'a life' off the agent at Gib!

The Charity Bazaar at the Negro Club was numerously attended on Thursday night. The street was lined for squares with the carriages of the Porteiro 'haut ton.' The rooms were full of lovely women and brave men, the latter spending their hard earned dollars generously. The 'buffet' and flower stall did the best business, and the receipts must have been very considerable, as no sensitive male could withstand the pleadings of the dozens of pretty girls and elegant matrons who presided at the stalls. The Fair closed last night.

We received yesterday the first number of a new South American paper started in London—the "Pacific Times." It is as like the "London and Rio Plate Mail" as one bean is to another in appearance, but deals exclusively with the West Coast and C.A. Republics, leaving Brazil and the River Plate to its older colleague. The proprietors are the same.

The enormous amount of the liabilities of Jay Cooke & Co, to which we referred yesterday, staggered our puny Bola: 786 millions of patacons!!! Overend, Gurney & Co's little splash of eight millions sterling in 1866 was a mere drop of water in a spoon to this almighty burst-up. In square smashes, as in everything else, Uncle Sam licks creation.

On Thursday night last there was a great manifestation by the students of the Faculty of Medicine and University, which shows their wish to learn. Over two thousand were present in the Victoria Theatre, without counting the number outside; and the crowd, including parents and friends interested in the welfare of the rising generation, amounted to some five thousand individuals. Speeches were made by many of the students, showing the necessity of reform in the programme of studies, which were loudly applauded. After the meeting was at an end, the crowd adjourned to the Plaza Victoria, where there were repeated 'vivas' to various persons, and the band of music played the National Hymn, after which the students quietly dispersed.

Mr. Ebbecke, the Auction King, will hold a splendid land auction tomorrow, on the Santa Fe Road, the future Boulevard des Capucines of Buenos Ayres.

The Saint Patrick Society's meeting on Thursday evening was solely occupied with the question of appointing a new Secretary. The matter, after some debate, was postponed till next week.

By latest advices from Rio de Janeiro yellow fever had completely subsided in that city, no case being recorded for five days.

For their own sake and ours we caution all our subscribers against eating Pork at present. The market inspectors pounced on a lot of it the other day in an abject state of disease in the Comercio Market. Beware, subscribers beware! The Indians recently sold an able-bodied captive named Peralta to General Rivar for 1000 mc. If the man is worth anything, this is cheap, and a public subscription might be raised to buy off all the captives in the hands of the savages. Women and children would probably be ransomed cheaper.

News from Entre Rios was expected anxiously yesterday, but none came down. "En revanche" lots of ammunition are being sent up every day. The thing, or rather the person (there is a difference) wanted up there is a General, and money cannot buy that.

Yesterday was the anniversary of the battle of Salspacha, where, in 1810, General Balcarce gave the Spanish armies a smart dressing.

Respecting Mr. Ashbury's party on board the Eothen, which may shortly be expected in the Plate we received yesterday the following particulars of an adventure which befel them with the Carlisle.

"The Eothen, steam yacht, Mr. James Ashbury, arrived safely at Santander from England, having touched at Bilbao. Mr. Ashbury's party, including himself, Viscount Neville, Hon. Wyndham Stanhope, and Dr. Coles, proceeded in the cutter towed by the steam launch from Portocello to Bilbao, each boat flying the British flag. On their way the Carlisle sent three shots after them, one passing close to Mr. Ashbury's head and dropping about ten feet from him. He then rowed under the lee of a large vessel for shelter, and sent one of his party, a resident, ashore with a flag to request explanation. Ample apologies were made, and the aggressors said that they did not distinguish the flag. From Santander the Eothen proceeded with its party to Gijon, Ferrol, Lisbon, and Madeira, prior to making a fair start for South America. The Eothen has proved herself a remarkably fine sea boat."

News arrived yesterday that some hundreds of Indians are hovering near Rojas and Junin, with an eye to all the live beef thereabouts.
