

A ruffian named Romero was locked up yesterday for attempting to murder his mother with a revolver. Brave fellow!

We received yesterday a copy of the first Mormon newspaper ever seen in Buenos Ayres—The Salt Lake Daily Herald. It is pretty much as other American papers, and is well got up and readable. A leading article on Plural Marriages, however, gives the paper a polygamic flavour that might be relished at Stamboul, but hardly in any Christian land.

We heard two interesting pieces of diplomatic information yesterday. First, the Chevalier von Gulich, who so ably represented Prussia here and in Paraguay some years ago, and read the STANDARD every day regularly, has been promoted, as German Minister, from Caracas to Tangiers, Morocco. Next, Mr. Christopherson, Swedish Consul-General here, is expected back next week, having made a most successful tour through Australia, where he established various commercial agencies.

On Friday night one of our subscribers witnessed a 'Nil Desperandum' race between three foreigners on the one side and the 'Bobbies' on the other. After a tremendous spurt two of the foreigners managed to clear the course, but the other was scragged by the 'Bobbies' and marched off to the celebrated hotel situated in the Plaza Victoria, under the superintendence of our countryman Mr. O'Gorman, who is so liberal that he gives board and lodging free, gratis and for nothing.

Parties living in the vicinity of the well-known steam flour mill in Calle Piedra have recently been making their last wills and testaments in hot haste, the Salubrity Commissioners of the parish having reported that the concern may explode at any moment. The noise and smoke from the mill are also serious nuisances, and the chances are it will be shut up.

Bad news was received by letter from Chilivoley yesterday. The dreaded 'polvillo' has attacked the wheat crop in many districts, and gloomy views of the coming harvest are more general than pleasant. It must, however, be borne in mind that reports unfavorable to our cereal crops are constantly set afloat every year at this season by speculators in grain; and anything damaging to harvest prospects is eagerly availed of to drive up prices. However, we received the above news from a most reliable source, and fear there is no doubt about it.

The Constitutional is about to be changed from a daily paper to a weekly periodical, the first number of which will appear this day week. Its mission will be as now, to support General Mitre's candidature to the Presidential chair, which it promises to do dispassionately and calmly, and we have no doubt the enlightened editors will fulfill this promise.

The Montevideo papers state that there are at present 1399 persons in quarantine at the Mount. Poor people, we pity them. Most of them came in the North America, the rest in the Valparaiso and Douro.

The Douro's passengers land to-day about noon, so anxious friends can slip down to the mole head about that hour and embrace them when they land. Mr. Neild's charming quinta at Flores will be sold by auction on Tuesday next. It is one of the neatest of the British villas in the locality and ought to be worth a pretty smart sum, even in these tightish times.

Professor Mazzei, the famous oculist, has just treated with great success an orphan at the Boca, and refused to take any fee. A lady named Jones has written to Mr. St. John enquiring about her son, one of the Paraguayan colonists, and thanking him for his great kindness in sending prompt aid to the sufferers.

THE LATE WILLIAM WHEELWRIGHT.

South America—more particularly that portion of it represented by this journal—will learn with much regret the loss of one of its greatest benefactors—who, both in the promotion of steam and railway enterprise, has been one of the earliest and most consistent pioneers. Though we scarcely anticipated so early a close of his distinguished career, at the same time the precarious state in which we knew him to be held out little hope of recovery. Indeed, considering the laborious nature of Mr. Wheelwright's career, the many years that he passed under constant anxiety as to the accomplishment of his plans, he may be said to have survived the period allotted to man, and he has literally died in harness, having only a few months since returned from the River Plate, after witnessing the successful realization of his railway to the port of Ensenada, destined, we believe, to prove of great value to the shipping and commercial interests of Buenos Ayres.

The Argentine Republic has special reason to honour the name of William Wheelwright, both with reference to this particular railway and to the far more important one of the Central Argentine, for which he succeeded in forming a company in London, under the auspices of some of our most eminent contractors, and for which he was also largely indebted to the then President of the Argentine Republic, General Mitre—succeeded under difficulties that would have daunted one of less intelligent perseverance. He has lived to see the accomplishment of nearly all that he had undertaken, the benefits of which are being reaped by the existing generation, but which will, in all human probability, be still more conspicuous in the succeeding one. We should not omit also to notice that Mr. Wheelwright has the merit of inaugurating railways as well as other enterprises in Chili and Peru.

Everyone acquainted with the late Mr. Wheelwright could thoroughly appreciate the simplicity and honesty of his character, which were indeed the talisman that enabled him to instill his views into minds at that time little prepared to carry out great undertakings in countries so little known as the Republics of South America, and the confidence inspired by these qualities may be termed the great secret of his success. Of English origin, he was a citizen of the United States, born in one of these which has produced many distinguished men. We believe his last wish was to have been allowed to die there, but Providence has ordained that his life should be ended in what may be called the land of his adoption, where he leaves behind him many valued friends, and we feel assured that South America will not be slow to pay a tribute to one who has devoted so large a portion of his life in its service.—River Plate Mail.

ENGLISH STATISTICS.

The most remarkable feature in connection with the returns relating to the Bank of England is the large increase in the note circulation. Between 1858 and 1865, the figures ranged from 20½ to 22½ millions; but since 1865 they have ranged between 23½ and 26½—undoubtedly owing to the destruction of a large amount of auxiliary circulation by the panic of 1866. The deposits which in 1858 varied between 19 and 20 millions, rose in 1872 to an average of 23 millions. The amount of bullion averaged in 1865 about 14 millions, and in 1872 about 22 millions.

The fluctuations in the price of Consols have been very considerable. In 1858 they touched 93½, a figure not since quoted. In May 1866 they were purchaseable at 86½. The difference between the lowest price quoted in 1866, and the highest paid in 1858, was fully 12 per cent, which, on a debt of £800,000,000 represents a difference of £100,000,000! In 1868 the highest quotation was 94½. Since then the fluctuations have ranged between 94½ (quoted in 1869) and 90½ (quoted in 1870). The average for 1871 was 92½; and for 1872, 92½.

The growth of the railway system has fully kept pace with the progress made in other departments of industrial activity. Here are the particulars for 1858 and 1871:

for the day's business hours, fully half must stand over for Monday; one met brokers running about to-day in every direction with large rolls of the new National Bank bills. Still spite of every thing first class commercial paper was offering at 18. So long as the new money keeps out of the hole the better for the market and the yet very little has come there. The National Bank checks look more much praised, as superior to the general run of check books used and with strong covers.

There was a rumour of high moment on 'Change to-day, that the Entre Riano was to be at once brought to a close; there seems some colour for the rumour, but as yet the matter is reserved. Mr. Hornet, the active news agent, held an affecting telegram in his pocket on 'Change. Owning to some dispute with the Bolsa manager, Mr. Hornet did not give his message to the Bolsa. Now the message announced a fearful accident to-day on the Central Uruguay Railway, near Florida—several persons would and some killed. The engine ran off the track.

Mr. Barra, who was named as Loan Commissioner by the Montevideo Government, and who resigned, has been replaced by the Oriental Minister of Foreign Affairs. The sales of stocks to-day were as follows—Cedulas—For cash: 1,500 82½, 2,000 83, 3,000 84, 4,000 84, 5,000 84, 6,000 84, 7,000 84, 8,000 84, 9,000 84, 10,000 84.

In National Bank shares nothing done to-day, but at late hours yesterday afternoon 100 sold at 95. National Bonds, nothing whatever done. As regards the new Buenos Ayres loan on the London market, which all the papers give out as done, there is nothing as yet come out beyond the fact that Mr. Aguirre has confided the matter to Messrs. Baring Bros, who will launch it when the proper time arrives.

In the liquidation prices fell off, and the market ruled very weak. The following sales were effected—20,000 for end month, 84½, 70,000 do do, 84, 10,000 do 10th Nov, at 84, 10,000 do 15th, at 83.

The sale of a cargo of Canada pine oil at St. Louis is reported at 15s. Exchange looks decidedly upward and bills were passed to-day at 49½ and 49½; payable cash and next week. On Antwerp bill, passed at 5.52 to 5.53. Exchange on Montevideo offered.

Capt. Ferguson, of the Thales, was welcomed on 'Change to-day, and congratulated on his fine run; he brings 650 tons for Buenos Ayres, 300 tons for Rosario and 300 for Montevideo; the Thales is a splendid steamer and built expressly for the Rosario trade.

On Tuesday some of the best located property at Ensenada will be sold by Bullrich, the ground is close to the port and high; it goes for whatever it will fetch.

In the North Wood Market to-day things looked a shade better than yesterday, and a good deal moved off. Some well-known woods from the following estates were sold—The Casca estate, Navarro; Gahan estate, Lobos; and Fox estate, Capilla.

Mr. Reid, of the Esparilla, was welcomed on 'Change. He reports camps—outside much improved, and things looking better.

Mr. A. F. Lamas goes out in the morning in a small steamer to the Douro to welcome Comendador Marquez, the director of the Platino-Brazileiro Telegraph Company, and bring him ashore.

A very large party leaves in the morning for Rio Cuarto to inaugurate the line. Amongst those leaving are our brother editor M. G. Malin, Dr. Veloz Saraceni, Sr. Hest. Gano, Chilian Minister, and Mr. Robert Crawford G.E. On Tuesday Messrs. Lloyd, Simpson, John Davidson and others leave.

At the landing of the Thales' passengers to-day Mr. Weber, the Maritime Agent of the St. Patrick Society, attended to look after the Irish emigrants coming ashore.

The sale of a neat site, 20x100, in the new town Saavedra at Nuñez, beyond Belgrano and close to the Nuñez quays, was effected to-day; price paid \$10,000 mpc.

Mr. John Oldham, the talented manager of the River Plate Telegraph Co., was welcomed on 'Change to-day, and much congratulated on his getting the cable into working order in such very short time. The history of the picking up and resplicing of the cable is as follows—On Saturday the last bit, the Mazzeppa was chartered for the purpose, and the afternoon with 4.30 p.m. Mr. Oldham started, and guided by long experience and unerring electrical tests actually grappled the cable within ¼ of a mile of the breakage. The other end of the cable was then grappled for and joined temporarily, after which the Mazzeppa made for Colonia and took from there about 200 yards of spare cable lying there.

Returning to the breakage, the Punta Lara end was lifted. Gutta-percha joints made and inside and outside wires spliced in the most efficient manner, paying out about 150 yards. The Colonia end was then lifted on board and the same operations gone through. During the first splicing communication was kept up on board with Montevideo and B. Ayres. The work could not have possibly been done at a quicker rate, and the Mazzeppa anchored in Montevideo at 9.30 on 6th having completed the job in 4 days and 6 hours. Mr. Oldham received every assistance from Captain Dryden of the ship, and also from Captain Chambers and his cabin-men, all of whom are in the employ of Mr. W. F. Henly, the famous cable manufacturer of North Woolwich. Mr. Oldham comes up now to lay the case before the Government, and demand protection for the future, besides full damages for the outrage and punishment of the offender who is known to the Port-authorities. The following letter from Capt. Chambers proves the malicious and wanton conduct of the Captain who cut the cable—

There is nothing particularly new or favorable from Entre Rios. The Jordan war still continues, and the Government is hourly in expectation of advices from the War Minister, who is still at Parana. General Vedia, the Government commander, at the head of 12,000 men, is in pursuit of the rebels.

To-day a special party leaves this city for Rio Cuarto to attend at the formal inauguration of Mr. Stuart's railway, which was built for Government account, and is now to be handed over. Dr. Velez Sarsfield will attend on the part of the Argentine Government.

The National Bank was opened during the week, and as it starts with the entire business of the National Government, and also the Custom House, it already works a powerful influence in this market. The directors have begun discounting liberally, and this has tended to cheapen the rate of money, and improve our money market.

The health of Buenos Ayres and Montevideo is excellent, and the weather pleasant. A quarantine of three days is imposed on all steamers coming from Lisbon, or calling at Brazilian ports, and in case of sickness on board during the voyage the term is extended to 15 days.

The works of "extending" the Great Southern line to Dolores have been checked by the exorbitant demands of the land-owners, which has induced Governor Acosta to urge the adoption of a strict law of expropriation.

The Central Uruguay line is now so far advanced that the locomotive will probably run all the way to Durazno, 135 miles, by Christmas day.

Immigration continues so strong that often a thousand new settlers arrive in a day. It is computed the number of arrivals will be 80,000 this year and over 100,000 in 1874.

Favorable impression is caused here by the flattering articles in the *Economist*, which presage a successful issue for the unlaunched enterprises of this country now before the London public.

INAUGURATION OF THE NATIONAL BANK.

This anxiously looked for event came off yesterday at 2 o'clock in presence of H.E. the President of the Republic and his Ministers, Governor Acosta and his ministers, and a large crowd of the leading men of the city and the principal shareholders of the Bank. The weather was eminently propitious, and long before the hour named for opening the proceedings the spacious patio and offices of the bank in Calle Reconquista were thronged by the shareholders invited, the pressure increasing as the hour for the President's arrival approached.

Shortly after 2 o'clock Governor Acosta accompanied by his Minister arrived, and was received by the President of the Board, Don Emilio Castro, and his fellow Directors, all in full evening dress. H. E. had scarcely finished shaking hands with the Directors when the President's state carriage, surrounded by the escort, drew up at the door of the Bank, a dense crowd of people having collected in the street to witness his arrival.

President Sarmiento was received by Mr. Castro and the Directors, and on being invited by the former immediately proceeded to inspect the offices of the bank, with which he and Governor Acosta expressed themselves much pleased, remarking to Mr. Castro that the building appeared excellently adapted for doing a large business.

The inspection over Mr. Castro conducted the President of the Republic and Governor of the Province to the head of the patio, where he took up position, with the President and Dr. Velez Sarsfield on his right hand, and Governor Acosta on his left, the crowd being so great that many notabilities could only get places on the skirts of it. Amid profound silence President Castro drew a paper from his pocket and read a short but eloquent address. H. E. alluded in felicitous terms to the event they had assembled to celebrate, tracing the efforts made from time to time to establish a National Bank, and congratulating the shareholders that an institution so much required was at last founded. He said that the fact that the capital asked for had been doubly subscribed from all parts of the Republic, and the presence of the Chief Magistrate of the nation at the inauguration of the bank were ample proofs of its National character, and that it would be supported by the people.

Dr. Velez Sarsfield then addressed the meeting in an eloquent speech, frequently interrupted by marked signs of approbation. He said that our economical institutions had now arrived at a culminating point which a few years ago seemed very distant. Invisible means were at work in society which even the present generation who use them have no idea of, the establishing of the National Bank being the result of a happy combination of circumstances which had no apparent relation to the event of to-day. He drew a comparison between the state of the Republic a few years back and the present rush of new enterprises, railways, telegraphs, steam navigation, immigration, the enormous rise in the value of land, and the political order maintained by a Constitution revered and respected by the people. These are the bases of our National Bank, and which will render it more powerful every day, as an evidence of social order and increased wealth. The erection of a National Bank will be regarded by Posterity as one of the most important events in the history of the Argentine Republic (loud cheers). All peoples understand the powerful effects of Banks on national wealth. When the Khedive established in Alexandria a branch of the Cairo Bank he said, "This bank will be for the commerce of this city what the Nile is for Egypt," (cheers). So will our National Bank fertilize the trade of the whole Republic. Dr. Sarsfield then traced eloquently the various ways in which the National Bank will serve the country; as a Bank of Deposit, which will circulate idle capital, and place it in hands competent to use it. The Provincial Bank, established in times when we had less population, less trade, less of everything, has 900 millions mpc. of deposits (cheers), and most of its branches deposits far in excess of their capital. Well may we look forward to the National Bank and its 20 branches having in a few years deposits that will far exceed both its capital and its note issue. As a Bank of Emission it must work good from the very day of its opening. Dr. Sarsfield concluded his eloquent address by saying that its Deposits and its Emission would not be its sole boon to the people, as it would likewise open up new avenues of Trade and Wealth for the whole Republic through the wonderful agency of CREDIT; and it was his prayer that it might always count on the primary element of public wealth—Peace in all the Provinces (Loud and continued applause).

President Sarmiento was then called on by Mr. Castro and made the speech of the day. H. E. alluded to the benefits of the institution he felt such pleasure in inaugurating, and dwelt on the necessity of Peace, and order to ensure the development of the advantages to be derived from it. He referred in energetic language to the state of Chaos that had been produced in one province of the republic by private hate and ambition disturbing the public peace. H. E. dwelt with great emphasis on the high credit the country now enjoyed abroad, and which had taken such an impetus under the Administration over which he had the honour to preside. This he attributed to the determination of the country's rulers to meet all its obligations with scrupulous exactitude, and now the external credit of the country stood on a par or above that of many old nations [great cheering]. He looked to the National Bank to raise the internal trade and credit of the Republic to a similar level, and concluded by declaring the National Bank of the Argentine Republic duly opened. Loud 'vivas' were given when the President concluded his speech.

Mr. Castro then called on Governor Acosta who in a few improvised and

gracelut words (H.E. was the only one of the speakers who did not bring his speech in his pocket) congratulated the Republic on the auspicious occasion, auguring a brilliant future for the bank under 'liberal and prudent management' (cheers). As H. E. concluded he bowed to Governor Castro, who joined blandly in the general smile at the hint.

The President, Governor, Ministers, Aide-de-Camps, &c. were then conducted through the offices to the Bank parlour, where refreshments were laid out, and prosperity to the new concern drunk heartily (without speeches) by the distinguished company present, in "the glorious vintage of champagne," the President and Governor taking their departure about 3 o'clock.

So opened the National Bank, and may it and the Republic prosper together is the earnest wish of us all.

NEW BANK CHARTER.

The special committee appointed by the Provincial Chamber of Deputies to examine the proposed reforms in the Provincial Bank have handed in a luminous report on the 3 principal points, leaving untouched 4 others which they regard as matters of detail that can easily be settled in the course of debate when the House takes up the new Bank Charter. It may not be out of place to express our opinion that Messrs. Eduardo Madero, Carlos Salas, José María Jurado and José Luis Amadeo, who formed the committee, have evidently given much labor, study and conscientious discrimination to the task.

1st. Is it expedient to divide the Bank into two departments, one of deposits and discounts, the other of emission? Sir Robert Peel, did so in the charter of the Bank of England in 1844, but this was unluckily followed by the crisis of 1847, when hundreds of great firms failed, among them that of W. R. Robinson, Governor of the Bank of England. In the subsequent crisis of 1857 the Bank Act of 1844 not only failed to help matters but was supposed to increase the evil, until the Government had to suspend the Bank Act. At that time the cash reserve in the discount and deposit department was less than a million, while in that of emission it exceeded 7 millions.

A general reserve is much better for the Bank and allows more freedom of action; and although the Bank of Austria was constituted in 1862 on the model of the Bank of England there were special reasons in that case not applicable to ours, such as the stipulation to resume payments at sight in 1867, and keep specie reserve for all its emission over 200 million florins. Neither can much weight be given to the fact that Congress has adopted such division in the National Bank, as its own notes may appear in the cash balance. For these reasons it appears more prudent to make no alteration in the Provincial Bank under this head.

2ndly. Are the Directors to resolve collectively as at present, or in distinct committees?

The second mode seems advisable, not only from the division of labor, but also from the aptitude of different persons to distinct duties. Meantime no one committee should be independent of the rest of the Board, but all act in harmony, as a Grand Jury of 16 persons, to whom the credit, trade and commercial activity of B. Ayres are entrusted.

3rdly. Should the law lay down a certain cash reserve in proportion to the currency emitted?

This has been strongly supported by individual opinion, as well as in the newspapers, besides having the authority of a Cabinet Minister, and the decision of Congress as regards the National Bank. Nevertheless, the law would be highly inconvenient, although it would be easy to get over it. Suppose the Bank emission equal to 30 millions fuertes, between currency and specie notes, with a reserve of 10 millions; there is a heavy withdrawal of gold, and the private banks and merchants take out three millions in gold in exchange for paper. Then the emission is reduced to 27 millions, the cash reserve to 7. Would you require the Bank under the circumstances either to sell its Public Funds or come down on its debtors?

Again, what proportion would you like to put? In England it is one-third of the emission. But then the lowest Bank of England notes are for £5, and the business is on a large scale, people using gold and silver for daily wants; whereas in Buenos Ayres we have 138 millions (say one-fourth of our currency) in notes of 1 to 10 pesos (2 to 20 pence) that are indispensable for daily traffic, and cannot be sent to the Bank to ask for gold.

In Germany the reserve is one-third, but such writers as Werthemastein and Hock maintain that any given reserve is illusory.

In the U. States the rule is 25 per cent. in large, and 15 per cent in small towns. The American system of depositing Government stock as security is found to answer well, but we must remember that it was adopted less as a security for Bank paper than with the object of putting out Government stock, which must otherwise have fallen low during the long war against the South. Hence we see that in August 1873 there were 1717 National Banks throughout the Union with a reserve of 108 millions in greenbacks and only 1½ millions in gold. It is impossible to fail seeing that the groundwork of the U. States system, namely freedom of emission on the guarantee of Public Funds, has produced splendid results for the country.

To arrive at a mathematical ratio for gold reserve would be impossible, and John Stuart Mill only ventures to say. 'Let the reserve be greater than the amount of specie withdrawn at any previous epoch' This would ill apply to our case, where the transactions are of three times the magnitude they were a few years ago. Besides that most of our deposits are of a permanent character.

The minor points left for discussion during the reading of the Bill are the following—

Should the Chairman and Directors receive salary?

Would it be well to authorize advances on Warrants or certificates of goods in deposit?

Is it advisable to open a branch-office in London?

Should we have a Clearing-house here, as in London and New York?

These may be adopted or otherwise, without affecting the 3 great points at issue as above, and the Committee feel satisfied that under a Reformed charter the Provincial Bank will be enabled to extend the sphere of usefulness for which it has already gained such favorable opinion among the public.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

The loan has been concluded and the papers have been signed with the German Bank, the Government paying at the rate of 13½ per cent. per annum on all advances.

To-morrow (Tuesday) at noon the Lamas telegraph line opens its branch at Porongos. The Mazeppa has fished up the broken River Plate cable, and much indignation is felt at its having been maliciously cut.

To-day, being the feast of All Souls, business was partly suspended. Over 5,000 persons visited the cemetery.

The new Calle Rincon tramway begins running on Thursday; there will be no 'dejeuner', but the Company devote the receipts of the first 3 days to the poor.

Don Exequiel Perez has expressed his readiness to accept the post of Financial Commissioner in co-operation with the German Bank for negotiating the proposed loan of 5½ millions sterling.

The Captain of the Port has passed a severe censure on the commander of the Puno and the Pacific steam Company's agents for having landed at Flores Island a sailor and a passenger sick of small-pox, one of whom died soon after.

ON 'CHANGE.

Nov. 7, 1873.
Cedulas to-day again showed the white feather, and were so down to 82½. In the morning the market ruled very weak, but in the liquidation one or two outsiders picked up all that were offering cash under 83, and prices at once improved, closing firm at 83 for cash.

There was a squeeze to-day at the National Bank, all the brokers in town were there; such an assemblage of discount brokers we never before witnessed. Of course all sorts of rumours were current in the Bolsa as to the magnitude of the discount, but there is much exaggeration in the reports; from what we can gather, the Bank directors are proceeding with much prudence, and the discounts for the day will hardly exceed 400,000 pata. The discount brokers have been too eager in their demands and asked for too much all at once; but in trade circles we heard to-day that the beneficial influence of the Nat Bank was beginning to be felt, and there is less of the hawking of trade bills about now.

Exchange looks upward, and a brisk business doing more in francs than in sterling. The rates are, on England 49½-49¾. On Antwerp 5.30-32.

Mr. Woodgate announced to-day that the fine telegraph cable steamer Mazeppa will be up here on Tuesday to load for Antwerp.

Respecting the City-Improvements Loan in London we heard on good authority to-day that the Government hold a letter from Mr. Aguirre stating that Messrs. Baring Bros. will launch the loan and that if necessary they will advance the Government £600,000 stg. Many parties think that the next steamer will bring out this gold, and that possibly the withdrawal of so large an amount for South America may have had something to do with the raising of the bank rate.

On next Tuesday the Neild property at Flores will be sold at auction; the property is one of the finest in our suburbs, and will be sold without the least reserve.

Last night the up train from Ensenada came in crowded to its utmost limits, over 700 passengers. The eight at the Central Station reminded one of Liverpool or New York. All the Po passengers came up from quarantine.

There was no steamer to-day from Montevideo. As the North America brings three days later than Valparaiso we telegraphed to Mr. O'Gorman to look for Gibraltar papers, and send up news, but his reply will be found in our telegraph column.

The Arnaldo, from Paysandu, entered Fal-mouth on October 8th; and the South America sailed on the 8th from Shields, for Genoa.

The Italian steamer North America has just made another splendid passage, beating both the Pacific steamer and the Royal mail. Her dates are three days later from Europe than those by Douro or Valparaiso. The North America brings 1,000 Italian emigrants, showing how well supported this line is on the other side. She left Genoa on the 11th and Gibraltar on the 17th, having been two days detained in that port, thus making the run out from Europe to the Plate in 10 days. If the North America were an English or American steamer we are free to say there would be much noise made about this splendid run out, but as she is an Italian nobody thinks much about her. Another point is, the Captain and the agent at Gibraltar are not so fast as their steamer, else they would have telegraphed to London for news, and sent us out the latest prices. Whoever the agent is here ought to wake up; now that as has the fastest steamers running he might stretch a point to bring out the latest news; the cost is a mere trifle. The North American might have brought us three days later news from London. The tide of emigration from Southern Europe is now tremendous, and we fully believe in Mr. Wilcken's figures, 20,000 emigrants for November and December, and 80,000 for the year 1873; and possibly 100,000 for 1874. This business is the real bone and sinew of the country and its progress.

On the 16th inst we hear the City of Buenos Ayres Tramway Company will have their Calle Cuyo curve all right, and the tramway will then run along that street. The lines of this company are now so numerous that it is difficult really to say where these lines do not run to.

On Sunday the sale of the Nunez property beyond Belgrano, at the new pleasure park called Saavedra, will be continued. At the last auction some fifty neat quinta lots were bought by mercantile clerks at an average price of 2600 m/c per quinta.

Mr. Haddid has started a new English paper in London, called "The Pacific Mail," to represent West Coast trade and interests. The move is a good one. We received a first copy by the mail.

We heard on 'Change to-day that the great excavation works at the foot of Calle Cangallo are stopped, and the contract thrown up by the contractors. The works will now be passed over to Mr. Newman, who will at once put new life into the affair.

The English papers contain some really very important statements respecting the extraordinary success of the ice-berf shipments from Australia to England. This ice business solves the long question. All our schemes and projects are at once levelled by this new trade, that puts the meat into England just as fresh as the day killed. At our leisure we purpose publishing something more about this, meantime we hear that three steamers with immense iron tanks are now being fitted out on the Clyde for the River Plate.

Don J. J. Mendes's new steamer for the live cattle export is due daily; it may succeed, and is certainly worthy of a trial, but the ice business is a leveller, and must lead to an enormous trade here, that will even eclipse our wool trade. Everything is on the cards.

The steamer Primer Argentino brought down a specie remittance the other day to the National Bank. This looks well to see specie coming down from the Interior to the new bank.

The Bank rate, it seems, was raised on the 14th in London, and telegrams to that effect were received at Lisbon. All stocks ran down in London on the 14th.

Dates from Rio show exchange up there at 26½ and money easy.

Latest from New York gives exchange there at 105½ on London, which is still unfavorable.

Money to-day ruled at from 12 to 16, and the money market looks improving somewhat.
