was attracted towards you. Remember also that the noble generosity of the Buenos Ayrean public is an unusual occurrence...

I therefore again call upon you as Englishmen to evince your sense of gratitude by your quiet and peaceful behaviour and your desire to work.

Let a committee be formed, on your arrival at Buenos Ayres, to call upon the editors of the British press—the STANDARD and Buenos Ayres Daily News—to thank them for their great kindness in advocating your cause.

I came to this country one year from this, quite unconnected with the colonists, nor had I any previous knowledge of Paraguay.

I was called upon some 6 months since to take charge of the colony, with a promise from the late manager to relieve me in 2 or 3 months.

At this time the colony was beyond the power of being reconstituted: provisions being scarce, and no relief from the Government, who would not recognize the colony.

Gradually our provisions failed; and those you well know who, from their position, ought to have rendered me support and advice, acted in every way antagonistical to me.

In every respect I was alone. I have suffered 6 months of unparalleled anxiety and misery.

Menaced on one side by the Government for doing too much in my endeavours to obtain food for you, and by the colonists for doing, as they imagined, too little, under the false supposition that I was provided with funds.

I again say I have done more than many men would have done; you well know that by my letters from Asuncion, I have been strongly advised to leave you.

Have I done so? All others had deserted you, like rats from a sinking ship. I have remained and suffered the same privations.

You will now be informed of my position, and that from the time I came here up to the present I have not received a single dollar from the Government nor any other source for your relief.

I have purchased food from funds raised by the sacrifice of articles of jewellery that I have possessed for years.

I had only a limited power for the hiring of the carts from His Excellency the Consul for Italy, which I have always paid for by orders on him.

I have not received a dollar from the Government for your relief or my own expenses; all I have paid for was from my own private funds.

The Administrator, Señor Keim, sent by the Government to dispose of the goods appertaining to the colony, did not give me the slightest assistance.

No seaman may be inscribed on the shipping list, until he present his certificate of discharge vided by the Consulate upon which the ship he was engaged in depends.

For the enlistment of seamen of their own nationality who have deserted from foreign vessels, the Consuls engage not to admit them until after it has been ascertained that they have not been claimed by the vessel they were in and that the vessel has departed, and in every case only after having consulted the Consulate to which belongs the vessel from which the seaman says he had deserted.

The object of the meeting having been attained, the President declares that he will communicate to the Consuls who have not attended, the result of the session, and that he will send the minute to all to be signed and approved.

Advices from Montevideo to our distinguished countryman, Mr. Chief of Police O'Gorman, state that a band of burglars, swell-mobsmen and thieves of every kind have decided on taking up their summer quarters in this city, Flores, Belgrano and other suburbs.

Another awful murder has been committed in the Banda Oriental. Don Mateo McEachen, brother of the well known Gefé Politico of Paysandu, has been murdered on an estancia he rented from the heirs of Gen. Flores.

The emigrant steamer Esther had sixteen deaths on board during her voyage out, twelve from cholera and four from other diseases.

The Mercuro of Rosario gives some particulars of the arrest of Mr. Gibbs (not Dudley), an Englishman, in Mendoza, the fact of which was announced to us ten days ago by special telegram. It appears that Gibbs was Sub-Delegado of the Department of Tupungato, and was accused of having incited the men under him to join the Segovia flare up.

Since the 1st of this month the immigration from Europe has been astounding. Including those new hands by the Esther, not yet come up from the Mount; the arrivals for the fortnight are over 5000 souls.
