original shareholder in any new undertaking has been compared to the traveller who leaves his bones in the wilderness; so invariably does it happen that the first to embark in a new business gets ruined by his pains, and probably those who come after him realize handsome fortunes.

The Argentine Cloth Factory started last June was the first serious attempt at home-manufactures in this country, since the term can hardly be applied to the breweries, macaroni-mills, Hesperidina, or other large establishments not strictly factories.

The paid-up capital was four millions currency (say £32,000 sterling) of which one-half went in the site and building, while the machinery cost over £10,000, thus leaving but a small balance wherewith to begin, and carry on so important a business.

This would show an apparent loss of 30 per cent in the value of the manufactures as compared with the cost of production, without taking account of interest of capital.

In fact but for the loss at the beginning the Directors would now be able to show a small balance on the right side of the book. Every day the working expenses will form a lower percentage of the gross earnings; nor is it to be wondered at that the first results were not crowned with success.

It would have been easy to make the present balance-sheet more pleasing to outward view, or to have avoided altogether publishing any report for a couple of years.

The principal business transacted at the meeting was the election of a new board of Directors, and additional interest was attracted to this by the fact that it was understood a strong attempt would be made to prevent the re-election of any of the members of the retiring board.

The result was, the following gentlemen were elected to serve on the new board by an overwhelming number of votes—

Two of these gentlemen Messrs. Esteves and Ellauri are evidently in their right place, as their names ap-

peared on both lists and each obtained the support of every shareholder present. At the opening of the proceedings Don Carlos Honoré protested against those persons holding powers of attorney from English shareholders being allowed to vote, grounding his objection on the fact of the powers having been granted some sixteen months ago, and suggesting that some of these shareholders might have since died, or disposed of their shares to other persons.

Mr. Tomkinson then proposed that the purchases of land in the vicinity of Stations, which had been made by the Directors for the Company, should be approved of and a deed to be by the shareholders.

To this Mr. Honoré objected and during the discussion which ensued Mr. Tomkinson explained that the Directors were prepared to accept the full responsibility of their acts, and take the land in question for their own private use. It was finally agreed that the meeting should ratify the purchases made. Mr. Honoré proposed that an additional clause should be added to the Statutes prohibiting the Directors from making any further land purchases, except for actual requirements of the Railway, and in this he was supported by Sr. Lastarria and others, while Mr. Tomkinson and Dr. Muñoz opposed the motion as unnecessary.

In this view of the case the Government Fiscal coincided, showing that the proposed clause was superfluous, the Board having no power under the existing Statutes to make any purchases of the kind and consequently that it was only the ratification of such acts of the Board on the part of a general meeting of shareholders which could give them retrospective authority, or release the Directors from the personal obligation of retaining the lands thus bought for their own account.

Hereupon, Mr. Honoré said it was censurable on the part of the directors to release Messrs. Waring Brothers from their obligation to provide the necessary land for the stations; but he was shown to be in error in supposing anything of the kind.

Mr. Congreve explained that the lands forming the subject of discussion were outside the railway, all lands necessary for the line and stations being for the account of Messrs. Waring Brothers, who had never asked to be relieved of their obligations respecting them, but who, on the contrary, either had, or were now in the act of procuring the title deeds of the same.

Mr. Honoré next complained of the action of the board in placing the station so far away from the town of Florida, and was met by a rather sharp rejoinder from the chairman, Don Cornelio Guerra, who said he was happy to inform him that this matter had, in the hands of a happier negotiator than Mr. Honoré, been brought to a conclusion satisfactory to all parties concerned, the people of Florida undertaking at their own cost to build a new station in the position they wish to have it, the present one being used until the other is finished to the satisfaction of the company's engineer.

In explanation of this circumstance it appears that Mr. Honoré was until comparatively recently a young Assistant Engineer in the employment of the company, and that during his engagement on the surveys of the line he made acquaintance with the people of Florida, which led them subsequently to get him to advocate their cause against the Board of Directors relative to the position selected for the station at that point (Mr. Honoré having in the meantime left the service of the company). Out of this sprang an angry newspaper discussion, which, no doubt, gives a clue on the one side to Mr. Honoré's hostility to the Board, and his opposing them at every step which would otherwise be inexplicable seeing the very unimportant number of shares to back him, while on the other hand it explains the apparent severity of the rejoinder of the Chairman of the Board to Mr. Honoré's complaint.

Another measure was carried namely the power to issue the 30 per cent. of the preference and ordinary shares, in accordance with the contract, so as to place the Oriental shareholders in every respect on a par with those in England.

The proposed present to Mr. George Cooper of Buenos Ayres, on account of his examination of and report on the Central Uruguay Railway was agreed to, and the meeting terminated with the usual formalities.

WEST COAST MAILS. THE CASE OF CAPT. HYDE. Valparaiso, April 11th. The arrest and detention of Capt. Hyde, who commanded the ill-fated steamer Taena, engrosses the attention of British residents, the more so as it appears to involve an international question, since the vessel appears to have been lost on the high seas, many miles beyond Chilean jurisdiction.

Moreover it seems a high-handed proceeding to take a passenger out of a British steamer as the Chilean Government did in arresting Capt. Hyde at Lota.

The protest of H. B. M. Consul is as follows:— British Consulate, Valparaiso, 31st March 1874. Sir, On the 10th of this month the surviving members of the crew of the British steamer Taena, arrived at this port, and I was requested by the Governor of the Port to instruct the master of that vessel to proceed with his men to the Judge of Crime for the purpose of giving their evidence as to the loss of the vessel. I did so; and the declarations of all the men were duly taken. In the meanwhile Capt. Hyde, was summoned by a Naval Court, at the British Consulate under the laws of Great Britain to answer for the loss of a British ship. That Naval Court examined on oath every member of the crew, including three Chileans.

The Naval Court arrived at its decision on the 21st instant, and I had no further control over the crew, as they were at liberty, no one of them having been found guilty of a crime which rendered them amenable to law. On the 24th inst. Captain Hyde informed me he desired to proceed to England, and I obtained his passage in the steamer Illimani. I considered it but courteous to make known to the Maritime Governor that he was about to leave the port, and I accordingly wrote to the following effect:—

"In reference to the loss of the British steamer Taena, I have to inform you that Mr. John Hyde, the late master, having given his evidence before the Judge of Crime and this Consulate, is about to proceed to England by the steamer which leaves this port to-morrow, by orders from this Consulate."

To this letter I received no reply. Yesterday at about 5 p.m. I was surprised to hear that, in accordance with a telegraphic order sent by you to Lota, Mr. Hyde had been arrested on board the British steamer Illimani at that port, and brought back to Valparaiso in custody. I called on you to ascertain the cause of the arrest of Mr. John Hyde, a British subject, and you informed me that he had been arrested in order to stand his trial before the Judge of Crime of Valparaiso for the loss of the British steamer Taena, I now most solemnly protest that the Taena was a British vessel, her master, Mr. John Hyde, a British subject; that the Taena foundered on the high seas, and not within Chilean waters; that no crime whatsoever is proved or even alleged against Mr. Hyde, that he has been arrested and taken out of an English steamer bound for Lpool, on board of which he was a passenger; that there is no cause for his imprisonment; that in any case no jurisdiction by Chile can be exercised over acts occurring on the high seas.

Considering the circumstances of the case, that Mr. Hyde lost all his property in the much-to-be-deplored foundering of the Taena; that he was taken to prison at 5.30 p.m. in the clothes in which he stood, and that no crime is attributed to him, I cannot but express my surprise that such strict surveillance should have been exacted as to have forbidden the gentleman sent me to see Mr. Hyde to hold any communication with him.

I have &c. James de V. Drummond Hay. The protest of Capt. Hyde is as follows:— I, John Hyde, ex-captain of the steamer Taena, of the British mercantile marine, beg to state as follows:— I have been brought from Lota as a prisoner, after being taken out of the steamer Illimani; in which vessel I, together with my family, was proceeding to England, under the protection of the Consul of my nation, and with the full knowledge of the maritime authority of Valparaiso. Up to this moment the cause of such an unwarrantable proceeding against my person has not been made known to me. I am aware, however, that an investigation is being made in your Honor's court respecting the loss of the Taena, and I presume that your Honor believes that I, as captain of the lost steamer, ought to be considered guilty until a court of this country has pronounced a verdict on my conduct. I therefore, hasten to decline in due form the jurisdiction, not only of your Honor, but also of any other authority in this country.

The lawful judges upon the loss of the Taena, and upon my conduct as captain, cannot be Chilean authorities. There is proof that the loss of that vessel took place more than nine miles outside of the waters in the dominion of this republic. The evidence taken before your Honor, the official reports that have been published, and the accounts published in the newspapers agree upon this point.

"On the high seas," says Bello in his Commentary on International Law, chap. III, sec. 7, "the vessels of a nation, whether belonging to the war or mercantile navy, are subject to its jurisdiction. If a crime is committed on board a vessel on the high seas, the nation to which the vessel belongs alone can judge and punish the criminal." Bianchi expresses himself in like manner in his Code of International Law, in which he calls vessels floating parts of the nation under whose flag they sail, and adds that the jurisdiction of the nation to which a vessel on the high seas belongs, is not limited to the vessel itself, but extends even to the waters that surround it.

Such being the case, how can the Criminal Court of Valparaiso, how can any Chilean authority exercise jurisdiction over an occurrence that has happened outside of Chilean territory? The Taena was an English vessel, and had never sailed under any other than the English flag. Consequently the right to judge the case in question belongs to the British Court of Admiralty. This is the only tribunal that can taken cognizance of my case, so to I am bound to give an account of my acts as captain of the British mercantile marine, and its decision will, I have no doubt be my complete vindication. I long for that decision, and I have entire confidence that it will be founded upon justice.

Therefore, I pray your Honor that, having accepted this plea of declinatory of jurisdiction, you will order me to be placed at liberty immediately. JOHN HYDE. The following is a translation of the decree of the Court:—

"Valparaiso, April 1st, 1874. "The accident to the Taena, which has given rise to the present enquiry, having taken place within Chilean waters, the vessel having besides sailed from this port, and the survivors moreover having arrived at Chilean territory, the plea of declinatory of jurisdiction adduced by the prisoner John Hyde in the preceding petition cannot be granted."

As regards the causes which may have led to the loss of the vessel, the following letter from an experienced seaman is of interest— "I am under the impression that the ship had, from some cause or other, become partially water-logged. There are numerous ways by which a steamer may get a considerable quantity of water into her hold without it being discovered—by the bursting of a pipe, a side light being broken or unsecured, sea cocks left open through carelessness of the engineers, all of which I have known to happen. And the same may have happened now, and led to the lamentable loss of life, together with a fine little ship and cargo."

"I would suggest that the board might have been composed of men of more practical experience in such matters. Officers of the Royal Navy cannot be expected to know much about merchant ships or merchant affairs. "WILLIAM GRAVES, "Commander S. Loutie." (Note.—We learn by telegrams published last week that Captain Hyde has since been liberated. It is possible, meantime, that the British Government may consider his arrest was illegal, and demand damages.)

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HORRIBLE MURDER AT LAS HERAS. This morning the village of Marcos Paz was thrown into a state of excitement by the report that an atrocious murder had been committed close to the estancia of Sr. Diaz. The murderer is said to be the noted assassin Moreyra, from Navarro, with an accomplice, and the victim an industrious Frenchman, who hailed from Moron and went about the camp in this neighbourhood (for years) in a cart, selling bread and getting in return greases, hides &c. To certify myself of the fact I mounted horse and set out to the place indicated, about a league from the station, and there, sure enough, lay the poor fellow stiff and cold, with 17 stabs and several bullet wounds in his body, his cart with 3 horses standing a few yards from his side.

The murder is said to have taken place at about 12 o'clock yesterday (27th) but was not discovered till near 3 of same day, when Señor Diaz with 4 others mounted and armed set out in pursuit of the villains, but too late to overtake them; their horses fagged and the party had to return, but not before finding out that Moreyra had taken the road to the Villa Lujan; the question is, how long he would keep on the same route? Word in the meantime had been sent to the authorities in Las Heras, but up till 12 to-day no one had been sent to take charge of the body or cart. Last night a partido of armed mounted police from Merlo passed through Marcos Paz in chase, but had of course to return without any success. Moreyra it is said wears a coat of mail, carries 2 trabucos, 3 or 4 revolvers and as many daggers. He is dreading by all. Would it not be advisable for Government to organize a body of resolute men to go in pursuit of this bandit until finally caught, and shot, and the country thereby rid of such a monster in human shape. May I hear remark that robberies in this partido are of nightly occurrence, the parties suspected are well known, but until caught in the act, their living amongst us must be endured.

We commend to the attention of builders and bricklayer the following particulars of the building of a two story house in a single day, nayless, in 10 1/2 hours. Of course no one but Uncle Sam can do these things; the feat was performed in the town of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. "The house is twenty feet by thirty on the ground floor, two stories in height, and contains eight rooms. There were in all upwards of one hundred workmen employed. The cellar foundation was already laid, and at precisely 6 o'clock on Friday morning the men went to work. Mr. J. T. Reading, photographer, was present with his photographic apparatus, and took views every fifteen minutes of the building and the workmen while in motion. At 8 o'clock a.m. the structure was advanced to the height of one story, with two floors—ground and second—laid, partitions in, and lathed and partly plastered, doors hung, stairways up and a view taken. Ten o'clock a.m. view taken of western front on Price street; second story brickwork two-thirds up, with carpenters ready to lay the floor, and plasterers commence lathing; western front painted and brick penciled on first story, and masons run short of brick and then some delay in consequence, but it was remedied in a short while. Eleven o'clock a.m. the bricklayers are up to square of ceiling for third floor, with corners raised to the height required to receive the rafters for roofing. Timbers waiting. The process of white-coating is now about completed in the first story. 11:18 a.m. first rafter for the roof laid. At 11:12 the last brick was placed upon the chimneys, and the bricklayers are done. Roof sheathed and tinnars begin to lay roofing. 12:50, scaffolds all removed from building. 2:30 a.m., sash in windows of first story and painters finished up; washboards down and rubbish cleaned away. At this writing the tinnars are leaving the building; roofing and spotting completed. Plasterers still at work in the second story. The building has been insured, and in the course of a few hours will be ready for a tenant."
