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The Gironde Mails. IMPORTANT FROM EUROPE. London papers of June 3rd and Lisbon of the 8th have the following news: A disturbance was caused in the Assembly of Versailles on June 4th by a Bonapartist deputy, which caused the session to be closed.

It is impossible to exaggerate the importance of immediate relations between this country and England, for no matter how we view the matter it will produce immense benefits to the trade and advancement of La Plata.

Many people predict, with much truth, that it will be harder to make money now than before. This is all the better for the country.

Just as bill-discounters complain when money is cheap that they cannot earn their 18 or 24 per cent. usual interest.

Whatever puts a stop to large individual profits, whatever prevents speculators from "rigging" the market, whatever leaves trade profits equally open to all classes and excludes the monopoly of a few, must be an incalculable boon to the community.

But if the day of big profits to a few mercantile houses be for ever past, so also in a great measure will be obviated the ruinous over-stocking of our market which has caused the crisis that weighs on us since 18 months back.

Telegraphy will so much facilitate the interchange of products and shipment of merchandise that people will be less disposed to send us out goods till such are actually wanted.

Neither shall we be subject to such fluctuations in our produce market as at present, since every day we shall have the prices of the previous afternoon in all the ports where our wool and hides are quoted.

It may not be hazardous to assert that our stocks and securities are likely to be favorably affected, seeing that English capitalists will be ready to invest in Argentine Bonds, Cedulas or the like, which they will now begin to see quoted in the London papers every morning.

They can buy or sell such stocks by telegraph at any moment, just as they would French Renten or American Five-twenties: no necessity of sending orders by steamer, but transact such business from Lombard St. to Calle San Martin as easily as from B. Ayres to Montevideo.

The Brazilian cable is the longest yet laid down, being double the number of miles of the Atlantic cable-laid in 1865.

It may not be generally known that the first telegraph cable was proposed by Francisco Salva, from Barcelona to Majorca, in 1797.

The real inventor may be said to be Dr. O'Shaughnessy of Calcutta, a full-blooded Irishman, who in his leisure moments made a cable across the Hooghly, insulating his wires with tarred yarn, enclosed in split rattan, again covered with tarred yarn.

A couple of years later (in 1849) Professor Wheatstone advised the House of Commons to make an electric cable to France. In 1842 Professor Morse laid down an india-rubber cable from the Battery (N. York) to Governor's island; and shortly after Lieut. Siemens worked a galvanized-perch cable across the Rhine at Cologne, half a mile in length.

The first cable laid across the Atlantic was by Cyrus Field and an American company in 1858, but it broke in eighteen days, having transmitted 400 messages, in all 4395 words. An English company successfully laid the cable of 1865, and a second in the following year, both of which, we believe, are at present working, as well as the French Atlantic cable. Since then British enterprise has penetrated every sea, laying cables to Australia, China, etc.; and our American cousins are actually taking soundings across the North Pacific to connect San Francisco with Japan and China.

The Atlantic cables yielded splendid results to their spilted originators, and we may hope for similar success in the great enterprise now brought to a completion. Baron Maaui was the first to construct a railway in Brazil, and the first to put steamers on the Amazon, was the concessionaire of the Brazilian cable, thus by a triple title establishing his claim to rank among the foremost men in South America.

THE LATE GEN. ZAPIOLA. The oldest soldier in the Argentine Republic, perhaps in all South America, died full of years and honors on 28th ult. and his remains were on Monday borne to their last resting-place at the Recoleta, attended by a numerous cortege of friends and brother-officers.

Gen. Zapiola had far outlived his generation; and his name takes us back to the heroic period of Argentine history, more than half-a-century ago, when the Granaderos-a-Caballo broke the Spanish legions on the fields of Maypo and Chacabuco, the Marathon and Leuctra of South American Independence.

The lapse of years in no way dims the recollection of the gallant achievements of the patriots of those days, many of whom, like San Martin, Bolivar, Bolgrano and Baez were allowed to die in exile or obscurity, victims to the passions of the hour. The twilight of history throws a luminous aureole around the men and deeds of the revolution, which grows brighter year by year, like constellations rising from a murky horizon to the clear zenith of imperishable fame.

South America is at last connected with Europe, and admitted into the fellowship of nations. We have been behind China and Australia in the race, and but for the enterprise of Brazil many more years would elapse since this continent became united with the rest of the world.

Don Pedro has had the satisfaction of exchanging congratulations instantly with all the crowned heads of the Old World, and our Rio neighbors

for the past seven days have been in receipt of hourly news from Europe. There is still a gap between the River Plate and Brazil, so that news reaches us 5 days old. This, however, will soon be remedied and we may fairly count on direct daily communication with Europe by some time next month.

The Brazilian man-of-war Mague has received orders to return to Rio de Janeiro, and will probably leave this on the 1st of July. It is said that she goes merely to change her guns, but I think that it is more probable that the Brazilian Government intend to retire nearly all their naval fleet from these waters, for the sake of economy.

Last night I went to that very favorite opera La Favorita, in which the new Prima Donna, Middle, Sanz, made her debut. As usual, the theatre was crowded, although I noticed fewer of the fairer sex in the 'cancels' than on former occasions, whilst the 'lucernas,' 'palcos' and 'silones' were all taken.

The Sanz made her appearance amidst thunders of applause, which was notable as her being the first artist of this new company that has been received in such a manner before being heard; her voice is good, but rather weak, but it is what the natives call "una voz simpatica," and she is good-looking and has besides a handsome figure; she took in the hearts of the audience at once, and was again rapturously applauded at the finale of the third act.

Mr. Castelnary, the tenor, was excellent, and in the duo of the second act he shared the honors with the Sanz. Celada also acted and sang exceedingly well, in fact the whole opera was well given. It is rather too bad, however, that this company do not vary the operas more: in this 'temporada' they have given but three different ones, viz. Norma, Traviata and La Favorita, in six performances. It is certainly annoying to have to go and see the same opera given two or three times in succession.

PIGEON SHOOTING AT MR. DAVIDSON'S. Those who intended to go out to the well known estancia Santo Domingo on Monday, and didn't, missed a great treat. Whatever may be urged against pigeon-shooting upon the ground of its inhumanity, it certainly is a very exciting sport, and the lookers-on on Monday evinced great interest in the various sweepstakes that were decided.

The number of operators (ten in all) was much lower than expected, but we suppose some of the gentlemen who failed to attend after promising must have overslept themselves.

However, the sport went well. 'Nimrod,' 'Balacava' and 'Sir Walter Scott,' shooting excellently, shared the spoils. The former gentleman killed 10 of the 13 birds he shot at, and 'Balacava' in the early part of the day astonished the natives by killing seven birds in succession.

A very excellent lunch was laid out near the shooting ground, which was done full justice to by the visitors, and Mr. John Davidson's health was proposed and responded to with 'His a jolly good fellow' and three times three.

In returning thanks, Don Juan said he was never so happy as when promoting a little sport and seeing many jolly British faces around him; but he regretted that of late the visitors to his estancia were becoming less numerous, and he begged all his friends, present and absent, to remember that the doors of Santo Domingo were open to all of British nationality, and moreover he was always delighted to see any one who was willing to take 'pot luck' (which 'pot luck,' by the bye, we know to be excellent).

At about 5 p.m. carriages were in attendance to convey the visitors to Estacion Juan Davidson, and all returned to town much pleased with their day's outing. 'En voyage' home a rifle-shooting competition, open to all, was arranged for the 9th of July, and we are told it will be brought off somewhere in the neighborhood of Lomas.

EDITOR'S TABLE. Victory again! The first through Cablegram from Europe to Rio and thence by steamer to the Plate reached Buenos Ayres on Monday. It is scarcely necessary to add that it came to the STANDARD, our invincible Montevidean henchman, Mr. Standby O'Gorman, being the transmitting medium. We published a bulletin; we caught the long, and in 5 minutes had our office crowded with the special community.

The Goug here, but we handed them a bulletin with the news of a great victory of Peace—the opening message of the first South American Cable. It seemed awfully funny at first to be reading London news of this day week past, but such was the case, London 24th June. We congratulate everybody all round on the auspicious event.

The French mail steamer Gironde arrived at Montevideo on Monday and this port yesterday morning. She brought the great cable news from Rio. Bankers, brokers, Cedula men and even editors were all on the broad cent in the Bank of England rate of discount. There's nothing very particular in the way of political news.

Another Saturday has come round, and business still remains the same, but the heavy sales of Deuda Interas that have been made during the past week were much talked of, as the amount sold is more than the actual stock, and they are to be delivered at the end of the month, consequently the sales to-day have been on a small scale, as follows:—

The Progresso Oriental shares have also fallen in price, and the only sale was that of 50 shares at 365 for cash. In exchange some very heavy amounts are said to have been passed, amounting in all to £15,000, at 51 pence per national dollar.

Some transactions also took place in discounts, but to what extent I am not at liberty to state; the rates, however, were 7 and 1 per cent.

Produce is still at a stand, and is likely to remain so until we get some favourable news from Europe and the United States. The only transactions that I have heard of to-day is a small lot of mestiza wool, at 33 rials.

The steamer Saturno, of the Fluviales line, arrived this morning from yours, and brought down 105 passengers, and to the London and River Plate Bank £25000. This fine steamer is commanded by Captain Manasco, who is well-worth of the post he holds, and leaves again for Buenos Ayres and the Uruguayan ports to-night, and will probably carry up a large number of passengers, who take this opportunity for the purpose of diverting themselves during to-morrow and Sunday's day; here, 'bailies' 'tertulias,' and a swell dinner for Monday are on the tapis—at the latter your correspondent hopes to attend, and forget the troubles of this life in passing a social evening.
