for the first three years build a room with tile or zinc roof. By the end of 8 years he must have 400 trees, and for the same term pay 1,000 m. a year.

7. At the expiration of 8 years he will receive his titles for the land free of cost.

8. He cannot sell his title before the 8 years are up, and the 8 instalments paid. Any delay in instalments to be charged 5 per cent interest.

9. A prize of \$20,000 in each of the new partidos to be given at the end of the 8 years for the best plantation.

10. The settlers to be exempt from taxes for 12 years.

11. The proceeds of the instalments paid by settlers to go towards paying the Commissary and building public offices.

12. The Nat. Government to be asked for 2,000 rifles for the settlers, who are exempted from military service.

13. The Provincial Bank to open a credit of 4 millions currency for the carrying out of this project.

This many industrious man may be some owner of 400 cuadras or 1800 acres of land at a nominal price of \$8,000 m. or £25 sterling, payable in a period of 8 years, or longer if he can show just reason for delay.

The settlers require only 60 cattle or 48 sheep, representing a capital of about £100.

It may be objected that a poor gaucho cannot make up even so much as this, and that the better class of 'paisanos' will be slow to go and settle on the frontier.

However, few deserving gauchos whose 'patron' will not give them 60 head of cattle to enable them to start for themselves. And if it be said that the land-grants ought to be free of any cost it must be borne in mind that they will be practically so, as the sum of \$8,000 m. may be put down for taxes during the term of 12 years that the settlers are exempted.

The project is a decided move in the right direction, and it it give good results we hope to see it extended.

MONTEVIDEAN LETTER. July 10th. The non arrival of the Royal Mail steamer Boyne this morning caused some anxiety among our commercial body, till it was known that the active agent, Mr. Frederick Humphreys, had received a telegram announcing that owing to the low tide the steamer had not been able to get away from B. Ayres, we however expect her to-night to sail from here to-morrow morning at an early hour.

Among the passengers that are already prepared to embark are Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Pealer, to whom I wish a pleasant voyage and a quick return to this city, where his good qualities have been much appreciated.

The Bolsa to-day has been rather quiet and only the following small sales were made—Deuda Interna, 2nd Series, 60,000 at 61 for end of month.

The arrivals to-day have again been heavy, and between this and yesterday no less than twelve cargoes of coal have arrived, which in all probability will affect our market to some extent, though some of the cargoes have been already sold for the river ports.

Capt. Pucke was warmly welcomed by his numerous friends on his arrival from the Falkland Islands, where he has resided for some years, and now leaves in the Boyne to revisit the scenes of his boyhood.

A duel took place to-day between Don Eduardo Flores de la Idea, and Don Hector Soto of the Patria. Pistols, one loaded and the other not, Flores won the toss, and fired in the air.

Amongst the passengers by the Britannia was Dr Don Pedro Bustamante, who is the last of those who have come back from trying to raise the new Uruguayan loan in London. Mr B, however, looks all the better for his trip, and apparently the hard work he has had has not damaged his constitution.

Last night the first of the Winter Evening Lectures instituted by our worthy chaplain, the Rev Mr Hoskins, took place, attended by a large number of our English community. The whole was sublime, and did credit to the exertions made for the occasion. The singing was exceedingly good, and the correctness shown in the gloss

under the able leader was very praiseworthy. Mr Crawford interested every one present by his description of "A Trip from Liverpool to Chile; Across the Andes in Forty Minutes;" and his witty remarks were a source of amusement to all.

Great preparations are being made for the 18th instant, we have balls, banquets, &c., &c., on the brain, though we are much disappointed at the non-arrival of the Duke of Genoa, as I, for my part, would prefer killing two birds with one stone, and not go to any extra expense on the arrival of this prince.

PARIS GOSSIP. (From our own Correspondent.) Before the opening of the Assembly the Marshal-President took fashionable physician's holiday and visited the central districts of France.

Contrary to what some monarchical journals led us to expect, the Marshal was able to stand a running fire of 'rives' for the Republic—probably the only vives ever to be heard. Saluting the cry as chief magistrate must, unhappily for the Marshal, be included among the capital sins.

He committed a further transgression, or rather his cook did, by serving partridges at one of his banquets, when the game is according to law forbidden fruit. Thiers made the same mistake, and was roundly abused for his violation of the game laws; perhaps it had something to do with his fall; at least it was on par with the reasons adduced for his overthrow.

During the President's absence a white frost, the white emblems are causing much annoyance in the country, attacked the vines more or less severely, and the proprietors of vine yards swear they are ruined. Perhaps the misfortune is not after all so great, as it would be difficult to find a spring when the vines escaped the frost and their owners did not go into platonic mourning in memory of their losses.

Wine as a consequence is prophesied to be as dear as an outlet of dog during the siege, but some way or other the penny loaf ever remains at a penny. It is gratifying to find that no one accuses the Republic solely the cause of the vines having been frost bitten.

Piron said of Voltaire's comedies, that it is impossible to hiss when one yawns. So the country fatigued with casuistic politics, is weary without being exhausted or dispirited. As things are coming to the worst, they must according to the proverb, mend. The word 'crisis' is again heard, as if that bugbear was not as much used up as the others. It is unknown what the Legitimists will do; it is easier to indicate what they ought not to do. But being angry and spiteful that the Comte de Chambord makes not an inch of progress in the affections of the people—except the deeper resolve not to accept him on any terms—prudence is not to be expected.

They might be even rash enough to vote that 'act of reason' the dissolution of the Assembly, and thus earn despite of themselves the gratitude of the country. It would be well to recast in a fair and liberal spirit, in the interests of 30 millions of people and not of exploded parties, the electoral laws before the break up arrives. However, no matter what way these laws may be manipulated the next Assembly is certain to be overwhelmingly republican, and it is only by conciliation that its Radical character can be eliminated in advance.

As it is the fashion to cheer M. Thiers when he appears like any other citizen, Cincinnati has requested that his admirers will remember he is still at the plough, and that ovations are out of season. This request does not apply to Frenchmen living abroad; their addresses are ever welcome, and compensate for whatever ingratitude political antagonists extend to him at home. It is singular to remark that his countrymen dwelling among cool-headed and unprejudiced strangers, select Thiers as the only statesman worthy of their gratitude and esteem, and as the sympathetic representative of their views for the reorganisation of France. It is a spectacle full of lessons and reflections for disputants, who fight like devils for reconciliation, and hate one another for the love of country. It is gratifying to learn that Thiers sees nothing to be frightened or discouraged at in the present political mess and muddle.

The Bonapartists would seem to be suffering from their late superhuman efforts to cut an imposing figure before the world. Since they are now viewed as of only secondary importance in the coalition they powerfully aided to form, they are becoming small by degrees. However, if they do not increase, they will not become beautifully less—once a Bonapartist, ever a Bonapartist. Some documents recently given to publicity, and which have the appearance of being authentic, make it seem that it was the Empress pushed Napoleon to the bellicose decision he reluctantly adopted in July,

1870. This revelation will not affect the judgment of France on the dynasty—which is decided. It would require several 40-pairson powers to convert Frenchmen to the belief that Sedan added to their glory and the loss of Alsace was for their advantage. Parisians are enjoying a good laugh at the expense of Imperialism.

In the annual exhibition of fine arts now being held, much influence was brought to bear to secure the admission of the portrait of the Prince Imperial, or rather a work on Bonapartism—the mourning violet, the Legion of Honour, 'Mon' Uncle, &c. The whole was on a par with those sentimental companion pictures of the young lady regarding the departure and the arrival of the swallows. It may be hard, but it is the truth to state, the portrait proves the laughing stock of the exhibition. Formerly kings selected their consorts by judging their miniatures. France will never fall in love with the Prince Imperial from his picture. One of the leading Bonapartist organs asserts the likeness is no likeness at all, as it represents a sickly lad, pale and miserable looking. Another leading organ of the party goes into ecstasies over the painting, declares it is 'a sublime work, calculated to make every beholder of it instantly a Bonapartist.' Thiers on viewing the picture expressed with one of his sly looks, half over and half under his spectacles, 'l'Empire est fait! To add to the glory or shame, the portrait cannot be removed till the exhibition closes. The Orleansists are at last avenged.

There is a little war going on in the fashionable world between ladies respecting the practice of wearing the hair over the forehead. Be it understood, that real 'elegantes' do not follow the example nor submit to the counsels of the 'Capillary artists.' The forehead being the part of the head reflecting intelligence ought never to be veiled, all that covers such portion of 'the dome of thought' injures the gracefulness and frank expression of the physiognomy, and should be avoided. While on the matter of wars, hostilities may be expected to break out in the paddock of the race courses if the Jockey Club does not interfere. The chairs in this sanatorium are not very numerous, and it is the custom that once occupied, though subsequently not, a new corner however fatigued is expected to regard them as a sacred ark. Indeed gentlemen monopolise often three chairs to rest their feet and arms. It is now intended to occupy any chair when vacant, coding it when its first proptor arrives. In the Champs Elysees and out-door concerts some exquisites turn down a few chairs in their vicinity, thus suggesting possession, in order to keep off a crush.

The Morgue is about the last place in the world to expect a robbery, but even there persons can be found for whom like the 'Sapeur,' nothing is sacred. It is the custom to preserve the clothing &c., of all the unrecognised dead for twelve months and one day after the remains of the wearer have been buried. It has been found, that the most valuable articles of clothing have disappeared from the stores—the employes pilfering, and after making the articles as good as new disposing of them to the old clo' fraternity.

EDITOR'S TABLE. "Diez y Ocho de Julio!" To-day is the anniversary of the Independence of the neighbouring Republic of Uruguay. We salute the B O fraternally, and hope she may get the £5,800,000 Loan. There will be high jinks at Montevideo to-day, while poor Buenos Ayres has its nose to the grindstone, and on Saturday too.

How often have I bled at the coming day, When 'Till remitting lent its urn to Play, And all the broker in from Bolsa rose, Went out to Buchanan's upon a spree, And still as each repeated cock-tail fired, Succeeding grogg the mirthful band inspired, We hope our friends at the Mount will enjoy themselves thoroughly, and be freshly inspired for business on Monday.

We have papers from Asuncion to the 10th inst. There is not much news, The river was very low, and the repairing of the Hole in the Mole up there suggested. The Railway Station was being repaired, trees planted in the Plaza, and other trifling improvements going on. It was feared that if the river continues so low steamers will be unable to get near Asuncion. It is said that the Government, seeing itself utterly unable to meet the interest or amortization on the Loan, is about to send a Commission to Rio to ask the Imperial Government to take charge of the said Loan in London—in other words, to make itself responsible for it to the Bond-holders. The empire is most unlikely to do anything of the kind, as it will be remembered that, before the Loan was issued it refused to guarantee it, but contented itself with announcing in London that Brazil had no objection to its being launched.

The announcement of the death, early yesterday morning, of Professor Murray caused sincere regret amongst his wide circle of friends in this city. The funeral leaves his late residence in Calle Cuyo to-day at 3 1/2 o'clock.

Mr. Thos. O'Brien, native of Buenos Ayres, seems to have at length solved the vexed question of fresh preserved meat, having invented a new system by which animal food can be preserved fresh without the aid of cooking. The inventor has had over half a century's practical experience in the handling of animal food in the saladeros of this country and the Banda Oriental. On Monday the system will be put to a final test. A box which has lain in the Austrian Consulate for over 15

months, will be publicly opened in this office on that day at noon. All who have the good of the country at heart are expected to attend.

Don't let our native colleagues consider this as a "cosa del STANDARD" we can assure them and our readers it is not. The Liverpool Mercury is responsible for the following:—"An extraordinary coincidence.—An efficient officer in connection with the county police at Fairfield is just now the hero of the day there on account of an extraordinary coincidence with regard to the birth of his children. The gallant officer has been married about 10 years, and is now blessed with a family of 5 children. The 4 first were boys, each of whom was born on the 29th of May, and the fifth is a girl, who was born on the 28th of May last." This is STRAN-

DARD luck with a vengeance, and we hope Mr. Police officer will enable us to record similar coincidences in due time.

Our Santa Fe colleagues are really too good for this world. We don't mean that they are too well edited, to be read, but that their principles are heavenly. Some of the papers in that primitive city have thrown out a suggestion to the holders of National Bank shares, that they should devote the first dividend they have received, to purposes of charity. The suggestion does honour to the Santa Fe editors, amongst whom we'll be bound, there are not many shares; but the class of hardened sinners that usually hold shares in joint stock companies have one fixed principle as regards charity, viz. that it ought to 'begin at home.' The sums lavished in charity on this system by shareholders all over the world are enormous.

We perceive that the National Government have subscribed for that pleasing publication "El Autografo Americano" to the extent of 320 hard dollars.

A romance of the Pampas is reported from Junin where a Christian family of seven persons has just arrived, having effected their escape from the Indians. The mother has been a captive ever since the time of Bossa; she fell in love with and married a christian, who was likewise in captivity, and after long years was enabled to escape with her six children, thanks to the cacique Affear having died of cholera. She says this dread disease is now sweeping the Indians off the face of the Pampas with terrible rapidity. None of those attacked live more than four hours, and the wilderness consternation and confusion reign amongst the tribes.

A ruffian named Lucero with six murders on his conscience has just been arrested at Montevideo. No wonder the River Plate has an evil reputation for bloodshedding.

We had a visit from a Concordia subscriber yesterday. He says everything is quiet just now in Entre Rios, and that the rumours of revolution published daily in the Buenos Ayres papers are unmitigated fudge. The Eastern Argentine Railway is being pushed on rapidly from Federico under the energetic superintendence of Mr. Betts, C.E.

Mr. Lewis Joel, H. M. Consul at Rosario, leaves town this morning on his return thither.

We call the attention of connoisseurs to the unequalled exhibition of Paintings now open to the public at No. 80 Calle. Bólvivar, and the property of Don Julio Arraga. This collection has no equal in Buenos Ayres. It includes famous works by Murillo, Rembrandt, Rubens, de Vinci, Wouvermans, Paul Veronese, Teniers, Salvador Rosa, Correggio, Canaletti, Van Loo, Poussin, Caracci, Van Eyck, Gainsborough, Amfield, Leslie, Glover, Turner, Wilkie, Stanfield and several other great painters, amongst them Domingo. Two cabinet pictures by this artist were lately sold in Paris for 5,000 and 75,000 francs. The first was subsequently resold for 20,000 francs, and the buyer of the other refused 150,000 francs for his bargain. The object of opening Mr. Arraga's splendid collection to the public is to raise a fund towards the building of the new church at Caballito, and for this purpose the modest entrance fee of 10 paper dollars is charged.

The morning papers of yesterday were insufferably dull, most of them being taken up with the report of the Committee of Congress on the Buenos Ayres elections. The debate on the report began yesterday, and in some quarters there were fears of disturbance, but nothing occurred.

The report that a secret society had been unearthed at San Isidro is declared by some of the papers to be a lark. The neighbours there are evidently of a contrary opinion, as they attacked the house of the band a few days ago and burned it to the ground. The Prensa gives a thrilling account of the head-quarters of the so-called society—skulls, bones, daggers and all sorts of stage properties were found in the house. It is said the skulls were taken from the cemeteries to play off the joke.

Unpleasant news from Europe. The Britannia brought intelligence of cholera having broken out badly in Silesia, in various districts simultaneously. To eyes not accustomed to high financial schemes it seems to be so much against all reason that one cannot forbear to ask whether it is a point of miscalculation or of over-friendship and benevolence to the military class.
