AR BETWEEN BLACKS AND WHITES MUSSELL SHELL GOLD-FIELDS.

PROHIBITION OF AUSTRALIAN

CONVICTS. New York, September 23rd. The conflicts between blacks - and whites have become general all over the Southern States. On August 22nd at Lancaster, Kentucky, the democrats under Kennedy and the blacks and republicans under Seller commenced hostilities; the death of Kennedy's brother-in-law caused such excitement that the blacks had to barricade themselves in Seller's house. The democrats then proceeded to set Colonel Clark came up with the Fedewould guarantee their lives. As the blacks proceeded to do so the democrats opened fire on them, to which Colonel Clark replied, killing several and putting the rest to flight. At Trenton, Tennessee, 16 blacks were put to death, including Julia Hayden, a wellknown school-teacher. In Alabama both blacks and whites are under arms, but no bloodshed has occurred In Todd County, Kentucky, a negro named Linck was murdered by men poor man's son. At Monterey in the the position of 800 peaks, discovered

General Haves, formerly of the Conederate army, and Senator Spencer arrived at Washington on the 31st to demand some protection for the negroes in Alabama : Hayessaid his own ife was in danger for having voted the Civil Rights bill, and that the whites had attacked a coloured man's house and killed 10 persons by firing through the windows. Senator Patterson and others from South Carolina report sinilar atrocities.

The Attorney General had evidence that it was a widespread conspiracy, got up in New Orleans, to prevent the blacks in the Southern States from voting; he therefore proceeded with the Secretary of the Treasury to Long Branch, to confer with Pres. Grant in his country-house.

On Sept. 2nd the President wrote to the War Secretary that no civilized Government could tolerate such outrages, and that the Enforcement Act must be promptly applied. Meantime the news arrived of another massacre White-league men entered Coushalta to depose the Republica authorities and put democrats in their places; the mising to spare their lives if they left States. the State at once and went into Texas. On the road they were all murdered in cold blood.

The Democratic party of New Or leans published a manifesto on Sept. 6th to the effect that for 2 years they had groaned under the tyranny of Governor Kellogg, who was now managing the electoral lists to his own fancy, that the taxes were intolerable, the tribunals notably corrupt, and that Governor Kellogg got up this pretend ed war of races in order to keep his party in power by a reign of terror, and that the only hope of the citizens was in the Federal Government. Last week the police seized numerous boxes of arms, whereupon/a public meeting was called on the 14th in Canal St. to protest against such seizures. 
