Governor Ibarra of Santiago telegraphs on Sunday evening that he is glad to hear from President Avellaneda that the Province of Tucuman has withdrawn its claim against Santiago, and that he hopes the two Provinces will in future be friendly.

Governor Belhugno of Parana, and Governor Bayo of Rosario telegraphed on Saturday (24th) congratulating the President on the victory over Rivas. The telegrams are in yesterday's Tribuna.

The Gefé of Rosario telegraphed on Sunday also congratulating the National Government, and promising a similar victory to-morrow or after over General Arredondo, as he was sending horses from Rosario to Colonel Rocca's camp.

He adds that he is collecting all the horses left behind by Rivas, as Colonel Campos directed him to forward at once all available horses.

The Siglo of Montevideo says that amicable letters have been exchanged between Presidents Avellaneda and Ellauri, so it is understood diplomatic relations will be resumed as before the unhappy rupture.

The Government contradicts the rumor of a battle going on since Monday at 2 p.m. near Chascomus, adding that no despatch has been received to such effect, although the wires are working.

Governor Civit of Mendoza, says the Nacional, has written to Col. Rocca that he has cut off all the water-courses for a length of 120 miles, to prevent Arredondo's taking Mendoza.

EDITOR'S TABLE.
