This man must have changed his surname at least since the Franco-Prussian war, for the chances are five millions to nothing that he never got his present appellation from his father.

Why he should select a surname so lugubrious for the dynasty whose name he received at the baptismal font is amazing. If he had changed his Christian name also and called himself Moltke Sedar, or Frederick William or Frederick Charles Sedar, we could understand it, but Napoleon Sedar is a funny selection.

A lot of Montevidean Lottery tickets were seized the other day by the tide waiters on the mole head. The Pacific Steam Navigation Company have reduced their fares from Montevideo to Valparaiso. A first class ticket to Valparaiso now costs £26, and a return one £23; formerly it was £10 each way, although the journey is only half that from England, which costs £35. We must congratulate the company on this move; the former fares to Chile were out of all reason.

Mr. Edward Madero, Provincial Bank Commissioner, we understand returns to the Plate next month; we suppose Mr. Commissioner Huergo will accompany him, there is nothing much to be done in London at present. This was rather a money day, arriving at 4.50, and one party who had 500 boleros for shipment was pursued to-day by all the shipbrokers, but we have no news of the arrangement.

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The Deuda Interna brokers of Montevideo had a refreshing change on their Bolsa yesterday caused by Messrs. Prange and Witt exhibiting on the Bolsa some very splendid fleeces clipped on their respective estates. All that has been current about the tender of 6 Montevidean Banks to the Government amount to simple bosh. The rice that came out in Xelaco from Antwerp has sold at 1,50 and 900 sacks or Kepler at 1,50.

In the wool market this morning there were more sellers than buyers, wool came in now much faster than buyers come up, nevertheless the sales to-day were about the average, the farmers will consult their own interests by not flooding the market with their wools at present, freights and exchange are both rising. The Royal Mail Steamer Mondeo will leave full of cargo, sales 40-45. Some ship brokers say that as yet they have not been engaged at 50s. and one party who had 500 boleros for shipment was pursued to-day by all the shipbrokers, but we have no news of the arrangement.

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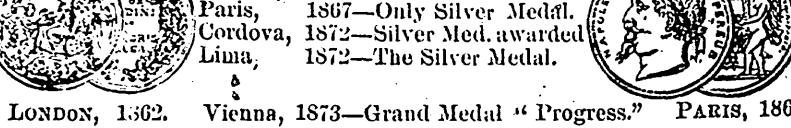
