Such was the confusion that ensued that the patrex conscript; did not know where the large come according to the confusion that ensued that the where to turn : some accused the Chascomus contractor with put ting on too much steam, while others declared that the Ense nada engine ran maliciously inte the other. The general opinio seems to be that both were guilt of fast driving, whereupon th of last driving, whereupon the Chascomus contractor deposited one million currency, as half for future good conduct, and the rival enterprise made an unequivocal apology for the accident, adding that it had not perceived the Chascomus train a-head, and that the signals were wrong Thus, instead of "Chascomu ," was up "Chascomu ng ;" there was also a m's ot go take of 6 for 7, which comple cated the Ensenada drivers stil

immediately after the concussion, the Ensenata engine was backed, by a turning table, on to its own line, and Mr. L. giving a load whistle, and finding the road clear, pushed his train right into the Camera station. ### Cotton Growing in Bucaca

We learn by the last mail that numerous cotton-growing comboth in England and Belgium, for the purpose of growing cotton in Venezuela, Chili, Banda Oriental, Venezuela, Chili, Banda Oriental, and other parts of South America. Buenos Ayres, however, is left out. Probably the people in Europe think that we are so well off, that we don't need foreign capital, or more probably still, perhaps that these other South American countries had their American countries had their agents at work, extolling the cheapness and fertility of the soil, and the abundance of labour. However it is, one thing seems certain: that hundreds of thoucertain: that hundreds of thou-sands of pounds sterling are find-ing their way into the adjoining republics, for the purpose of growing a staple which leaves wool far behind. The following particulars concerning cotton-growing in Venezuela, we extract r the benefit of our readers :-

Cowing to the present and recent exigencies of the cotton trade, great endeavours are being made to proote the growth of cotton in sh all countries that are available for its cultivation. Some of these countries, which are available present much greater advantages for this and than others. It is claimed that among the former is Venezuels-on account of its geographical position, fertile soil, cheap labour, etc. On this subject we have received from Mr. Florence Ribas, late Charge u'Affaires from Venezuels, the annexed statements which will be found of much interest.

Cotton of different colors grow vild in Venezue's, and cotton culture is quite general among the planters Nearly 2000 bales were recently shipped to Philadelphia in three wasks from Poerto Cabo lo. and 5000 bales are ready for shipping at La Guavra for New York .- From Cabruta to the mouth of the Ormoco river, fifty thousand acres have been planted, where never a pound of cotton was raised before. The rich soil of Espino estate, pear Caracas, has produced some excellent cotton of spontaneous growth, and at an elevation of three thousand feet above the vel of the rea. Some of the remain ing trees of a deserted cotton estat in the western province of Marsesibe have produced some very fair cotton In fact all the soil of Maracelbo, bigl and low, brings forth most excell cotton, surpassed by none raised in any other country.

Now, to show the advantages South America possesses over the Southern States of this country for the cultivation of cotton, we but say that land is much cheaper there than in the South: also labor,—for the hi hest wages paid to a man for a whole day's work is 50 cents. - In many places the cotton tree lives five or six years With these important advantages over the South, it can be said with safety that 20 to 25 per cent. con'd always he realized If Americans would tur their attention, enterprise and industry to Venezuela as a cotton field they could realize large fortunes.

A cotton company has just bee nounced for producing that art ele, in Venezuela. The list of directors is

well calculated to inspire confidence and in that list we find the name of a Liverpool merchant, Mr. A. B. Forwood. In the prospector the company

in an indentation of the mainland opposite the Leeward Isles. There is on doubt whatever that cotton can be grown th re in any quantity if la bor and capital can be obtained. The company will find the capital and they are satisfied that sufficient labor will be available. Queensland and Venezuela have a great advantage over India. The Asiatics are numerous, but peculiar. The history of the Indigo planters deters from any reliance being placed upon the h nesty or continuous industry of the natives. The government, too, be a great deal better than it is if any profitable results can be expected. The cotton company of Manchester, ware of this fact, declines to under take growing cotton; all it pretend to do is to purchase cotton when grown. We might supp-se that it hardly needed a company to accomplish this necessary business of trade In Oncepsiand and Venezuela the isborers would be more amenable to subordination, and, at present at least the means, of transit from the one or the other would be as cheap as it he ever been from New Orleans or Mubile. The Black Ball line would be very glad to enter into a contract to bring cotton from Queensland at the same rate of freight as has been paid, on the average, for cotton from the

If the war in America continues. ow fields for the production of cotton are certain to be opened up. Once opened up they are not likely to be speedily abandoned, and they may very possibly compete successfully with Louisiana and Alabama. A speedy termination of the war might, ever, affect the new interests.

## Destruction of the Congress

I was reading a lately received newspaper with much interest, and so I replied, 'Don't interrupt me ; I am busy.' It's no joke,' he answered, the is coming down this time.' Sure enough. there was the strange-looking hall slowly steaming down the river: but she turned and seemed going back, se if after a trial trip, and we began to think it was a fa'se alarm that had stirred us up. We might as well have fired at a moving icel The shot gla ced off her iron sheath ing like hailstones off a tin 'roof.
