NATIONAL DEBT PARANA BONDS.

Dr Velez Sarsfield's speech

In the late session of the Natio nal Senate (16th inst.) the follow-ing bill was handed in by the Fiance Committee:

Art. 1st. Out of the proceeds of the additional import and export duties placed at the disposal of Congress for the payment of the National Debt confracted by the Government of the Confederation, and pending further arrangement, the necessary sums are hereby or dered to be paid---

lat. For the interest and sinking fund of the Bonds created by lay of the Confederation, Ist. Oct. 20, which may have been legally transferred—and for this end the Executive will make proper investigation: the sums corresponding whatever Bonds may have bee illegitimately transferred, to be lodged in Bank pending the final

ecision of Congress.

2 Also for the collection of a monthly fund equal to the amoun of Duties received in Bonds Treasury bills and Notes, at the Custom-houses of the Confedera tion, by virtue of the law of 24 th July 1861—which fand shall be estimated by the Executive, after proper investigation, and des-tined for the liquidation of all such documents, in public sale, as the Executive shall ordain.

It has received throu whout the 13 provinces, and no ver was a cry of discontent rai-

sed against its authority.
This government could, there fore, make what laws it pleased it could incur liabilities in th form prescribed by its constitution. In a word, it could subsist as best suited or pleased. Its acts creating personal rights, could not be re voked by uself, when amounting o a contract in everything bu

form. Let us examine the facts.

Nor can any power, la er constituted, assume the aculty of judging the acts of the Parana government, to condemn or m dify the same. They are as indepéndent of all power on the face of the globe as was the authority which made such contracts.

The Nat, Congress, being forme of the coalition of the two fractions which lately divided the Republic. cannot arrogate a jurisdiction which could only originate from trea ies be tween the parties so co-alescing; of by virtue of the Constitution. I ask gentlemen, which is the treaty who rcby Congress has acquired the right of sitting in judgment on the obliga tions contracted by the Parana Government with private individuals, within the orbit of its inherent facultiés, and without any usurpation of national power? What article of the Constitution authorizes the revi cati n of its powers at a time when the nation yet existed; thus legislating for the viols ion of laws already passed by the provinces in the pleni Inde of their legal faculties? what ar jele of the Const.
