AMERICA.

ARRIVAL OF THE CITY OF BALTIMORE.

Cape Clear, Tuesday Night.

The "Cape Clear," New York and Philadelphia Companys' steamer City of Baltimore, from New York on the 16th instant, passed Cape Clear about ten p.m. She was enroute for the Magnetic Companys' boat, having left Liverpool telegraphic despatch, proceeded immediately for Queenstown and Liverpool, all well.

New York, January 16.

The news is good to-day. It is reported that Stuart's Confederate cavalry made a raid upon the right wing of the army of the Potomac, but report is not certain, however caused anxiety, as it is believed that Stuart's forces are insufficient to effect the purpose of importunity.

Charleston, December 11, report the Confederate General Longstreet had been reinforced by 1,000 men, so that his force now consists of 34,000 men and 12,000 cavalry. He has concentrated all the available men at Cleveland, Ohio.

The Federal General Hancock is strength to recruit his army to the strength of 50,000 men.

The Anglo-Confederate steamer Due has been captured and destroyed by the United States steamer Monitor, off the coast of South Carolina, by last evening from the two latter vessels, off the coast of South Carolina, 18 miles northeast of Georgetown, light.

The Richmond papers of January 13 report that a Union steamer had been blown up by a mine off the coast of Wilmington, North Carolina. It is thought that the steamer exploded it the gunboat ironclad.

The New York "Herald" advocates the removal of the national capital to a more secure and central position than Washington. It says it would be better for the country if the seat of war were to be ended by land fighting.

Senator Lane has introduced a bill into Congress to prohibit the United States from loaning or giving to any foreign power any sum in gold at a higher price than paid in New York by United States cities per capita, except for exportation to pay debts.

A bill has been introduced in the Congress to tax outlandish Treasury notes.

The Governor of New Jersey, in his message to the Legislature, recommends a constitutional convention to discuss that dissolution of the Union should be the object of the war.

A nation-wide convention for the nomination of a candidate for the Presidency will be held in Chicago on the 1st of March.

The "New York Times" has come out for the nomination of Mr. Lincoln to the Presidency.

The arrival report on the condition of the Brasilia in Broadway, New York, has been received. Sixty-four men were found dead in its room 15 to 20 feet square. Many had been dead for months, with no decomposition for sixteen months.

Vietnam, Jan. 26.

The Danish Ambassador, Baron von Roskilde, has been welcomed by his Government to the Court of Cambodias yesterday, to present his credentials.

The Secretary of the Legation will probably undertake the affairs of the Embassy.

The Reichsrat will meet on Friday

to discuss the demands of the Government for a credit of 100 millions of dollars.

London, January 13.

The King this afternoon received a deputation composed of members from the House of Commons, to inform him of the present state of affairs in Ireland.

The Majority accepted an address from the delegation.

Königsberg, January 26.

Intelligence received from Lithuania announces the formation of fresh corps of insurgents in that country.

Advices from Warsaw state that under the name of political prisoners, consisting of 10,000 persons, were sent away to Russia. Numerous acts of resistance have recently taken place in Warsaw.

Hamburg, Jan. 9.

Mysterious rumors are in circulation here concerning our conflicts between Prussia and France, and between Prussia and the Kingdoms of Hanover and the Netherlands.

It is said that the Prussian Government has the power and opportunity to express itself. Should, however, Prussia and Austria ally themselves, the Prussians, supported by their local authorities, firmly resolved to give their support to the cause of annexation of both Schleswig and Holstein if that power is given them.

Advices from Paris state that the Prussian Government has the power and opportunity to effect the annexation of Hanover, bringing it to a general peace.

The rumor that the 2nd brigade of artillery is under orders for Copenhagen is incorrect.
