JUDICIAL REFORM.

There is nothing in this country which so imperatively calls for reform as our judiciary. Verily it would seem as if Argentines were de natura un qualified for the bench. It is a melancholy undeniable fact that the bench not only fails to command respect, but positively has lost caste amongst us; and the cause of this is, in a great measure, the conduct of the judge themselves. If the judges were elected by the people we could attribute the present degradation of the bench to the improper homination of unqualified persons, but democracy has not as yet made such strides. Our judges are nominated by the Governor or President and their Ministers; the conse quences is, therefore, that either the same carelessness with which some of our diplomatic agents have been named is pursued in the nomination of judges or we have no Lord Tenterden or Chancellor Kent amongst us.

The most repeated complaints about the tedious law-suits come daily to our ear. There are cases at present pending, the legal documents of which are

piling up of stamp paper was the only evil to be complained of, we might be content that a succeeding generation introduce the necessary reform. The lamentable and humiliating fact, that the judge's ermine has been so outraged that even now-a-days it is not uncommon to see a judge sitting to try another judge, has drawn our attention to the sad state of the Argentine judi-

Yesterday the Supreme Federal court was occupied in trying the Federal judge of Mendoza for an illegal arrest. A few months ago our readers may recollect the charges adduced against the judge in the Villa Mcrcedes, the character and reputation of some our civil judges in the camp is so scandalously notorious that it is absurd to suppose the bench in the River Plate can excite any thing but derision and contempt. If our criminal and civil code of procedure were framed after the English fashion there would be less opportunity for corruption and despotic acts sapping the foundation of our judiciary. We will not go so far as to say with

some, that if all the judges in the nation were assembled together, not ten of them could define the inrisdiction of their court, or the difference between common and statute law; but from the sad state of the courts at present and the repeated charges brought against the judges, we do say that a comprehensive reform in our ju-

diciary system is sadly wanted. Political lawyers become judges and ministers, and even governors in this country. But these are not the men who will elevate the character of the bench in any country, much less in this. where amongst a certain class, authority of every kind is despised. A man may be a good billiard player, a good stump orator, and even a good lawyer, but still make a bad judge. Had we but another Acevedo amongst us, we have no doubt the reforms which we speak of would be carried out. Where is Dr. Sarsfield with all his legal lore that he does not attempt the task 2

LATEST FROM ENTRE RIOS.

Some of our Oriental colleagues date that Urquiza is busyenlisting the National guards, and that in a very short time the Entre Riano army will cross the Uruguay to side with the government in defending the country against Brazil. The invasion of Brazil with Banda Oriental has caused a rather nervous feeling amongst the Entre Riano politicians and many of them who were formerly friends to the National government are now very indignant at the callons indifference which the government displays in a matter of such extreme importance.

The Concordia Railway is a scheme highly calculated to advance the counand meets the approbation of all It will run through the very richest portion of the province, and will con nect Brazil and Corrientes with the Uruguay. The estancieros and others will readily subscribe to the stock, if a greatly increase the value of their land and products.

Cattle are in very good condition and very abundant. More saladeros are wanted in Entre Rios. In a few years there will not be room for the cows. Urquiza alone has over, a million of horned cattle of his own mark, and his generals and friends have as much

THE SAN JUAN, MINES.

OFFICIAL REPORT.

Among the official documents published in the 'Nacion' of Wednesday are two reports on the actual condition of the San Juan mines, from which we learn that the El Dorado of the Repub lic is almost deserted, and exposed to the visits of wandering gangs of rob bers. There is every proof of immense mineral wealth, but an utter lack of workmen; and the abandonment of some mines where large sums had been expended in machinery shows, that insecurity for life and property has blasted the hopes of the individual and the resources of the nation. Don José M. Martinez was entrusted

with a special commission to visit and report on the whole mining district of San Juan, which he informs us 'extends 40 leagues from North to South and 15 from East to West, being studded with veins of gold and sifver, although only explored within a circumference of a few leagues." In the month of May he made preparations to visit La Huerta and the adjacent mines of Sierra del Valle, but, being unable to procure from the Governot of San Juan an escort, he was afraid to undertake a journey of fifty league through a desert infested by high wayman. He however prevailed on a gentleman named José Godoy to carry out so perilous a commission the first underfaken in three years since the Chacho and his hordes frightened all the miners away. In Tontal he states, there are eighteen mines at work, and sixty totally abandoned; but there are hopes that workmen may be procured this summer, and then the works will be resumed as Major Rickard's factory is within a day's journey and almost finished. There is at pres ent a rush to the new mines of Castaño. about eighteen leagues from the factory of Hilario. No fewer than 108 claims have been already allotted here, and it miners could be got all these would be in active play, the results being extraordinarily successful (with a ley of thirty marks) and the veins from one to four feet in width. The gold miners of Gualila and Huachi, the silver mine of Tontal and Salado, and several cop per mines, all situate in the distric of Jachal, are deserted in spite of their great riches, owing to a want of hands and capital. He concludes by stating that the San Juaninos are fonder of agriculture than mining, and Govern ment must give some aid to foment the development of our great mineral re

Mr. Godoy says he received the com mission on the 8th June, and set out from San Juan on the 11th, accompanied by a surveyor and a few ser vants, making a tour of 60 leagues On the 18th he arrived at Sto. Domingo and on the following day measured out and gave possession of the mines Sta. Domingo, Quirquincho, Felicidad and Socorro. On the 27th, he reached Quebrada del Señor, and gave possession of the Petrona del Sc a visit next day to M. Heraut's fur-naces and works at La Huerta. Thênce to Quebrada Argentina, to give possession of Bella Isaura, Argentina, Virgina, and the Bronze Co. On the 2nd of July he crossed the San Pedro range, where he found several mines abandoned, and entered the district of Marayes (here our friend, Mr. Klappenbach, has some mines): the mine Merceditas was measured and given in Victoria, Marsellesa. oves Virginia. Baltazar, Union, Oriente, San Miguel, and Dolores. On the 11th he set forward to Merado, but learning there was not a single inhabitant, nor any mine wanting measurement, he returned. He also left the rich silver mine of Guayaguay unvisited, as that place. having been astroquent resort of the Chacho's bedonins, is now completely abandoned, except by scattered bands of freebooters. He returned to San Juan, July 15th, and remarks, in conclusion, that the deserted state of the mines is lamentable. Throughout the immense mining territory visited, there are but eight mines in active work; one at Quebrado Señor, one at Poronguitos, and six at Marayes, the last being the only ones fully supplied with hands: he advises the

The mines are seldom more than ber. 15 or 20 yards deep, except Sto Domingo which is over 69; the neighborhood abounds in wood, water, and pastures, and the temperature is mild. There are three factories for the extraction of metals : that of Messrs. Presilla & Suarez has sufficient furnaces for smelting the silver of the neighboring mines, but its utility is very limited owing to the want of experienced work-That of La Huerta is on a smaller scale, but works with great success and only needs a little capital to extend its operations. The Olmeda establishment at Chacaritas has a pair of furnaces, with stones (trapiches) and a hydraulic wheel, but is completely

It will be seen that Mr. Godoy did not visit Major Richard's districts of Tontal and Hilario. Of 35 mines which he reports on, only eight are working; Sr. Martinez says there are in Tontal 18 at work and over 60 deserted. The above report throws much light on this important subject, and will be read with interst not only in Buenos Avres, but in Europe.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

THE GERMAN CONCERT. Montevideo, Aug. 23.

The Salto arrived early this morning from Buenos Ayres, and the 'Tribuna' of Sunday brings us the intelligence of this port being closed by the command of the Government. This intelligence must have been conveyed either by the underground telegraph or by a balloon voyage. The port was partly closed for two days, but not by any human decree, but by Nature, which visited us with a dense fog that made the navigation of the river very dangerous, and the steamers very wisely deferred their sailing, as announced, until better weather presented itself. The alarming intelligence of this city being besieged has as much truth attached to it as the .. other news of Fray Bentos being deserted, when we have neither Flores, &c., anywhere near us, much less is Fray Bentos without defenders. It is generally believed that the correspondent of the 'Tribuna' is the celebrated and ancient defender of this country. Don Pasqualon Dias, which in a measure accounts for the correctness of its intelligence from the Banda Oriental. The accounts from 'our' army are that they have crossed the Santa Lucie, twelve leagues from this, and had relieved Porongos from the Flores partidasi. The Italian Consul went out to see Don Venancio yesterday, with despatches from Sor. Barbolani. What the tenor of said despatches is, remain quite secret, but as no Government official accompanied Sor. Raffo, it is generally supposed that there is nothing very favorable towards peace to result from this mission: he is expected back again to-day. It is a great pity that we cannot give Mr. Wells some encouragement to come to Montevideo to celebrate the 25th of this month, one of our national anniversaries; but I fear he would find it very unprofitable in the present state of political affairs. If he could induce Don Venancio to make an ascension with him and manage to take him up and drop him into some of the huge marshes in Rio Grande, I have not the least doubt but he would meet with great encouragement, and a splendid donation, besides doing an act of benevolence by putting an end to this human butchery. Every day we have accounts of some new victim who has been murdered by the cause of liberty. The fact is, the camp people are born to see bloodshed, and live like the wild beasts, on nothing but flesh. I remember seeing at an estancia an animal killed and in fifteen minutes afterwards the meat roasting on a spit before a fire in the rancho, and fifteen minutes afterwards people squatting around it, cutting off huge slices and eating it with much gusto, without salt, bread, or any other accompaniment, while at the same time the flesh on the same animal was warm as you could possession, and afterwards the Eliza, see the nervous twitching of the muscles. I asked one of the gauchos why they did not use a fork with their knife, as thus they would not be so likely to burn their fingers and cut their nose off, as they seize the meat with their teeth, and cut off a piece with their long knives, cutting upwards. His reply was not wanting in wisdom, which was, "Amigo, if we use a fork, we must have a plate to put the asado on, if we have a plate, naturally we require a table, and as a matter that follows, with a table we require a seat or chair, all from using a fork." I saw the explanation was not without good reasoning, and contented myself with not urging modern innovations any further.

Wednesday, Aug. 24.—I see, by the Standard' of yesterday, that you state that the detention of the Tevere, inlnot arriving on the usual day, was because she went to Colonia. This is a mistake

altogether, as I mentioned vesterday it was on account of the thick fog. The 30 Oriental fair lady singers, dwindled down to one, who drew forth much applause by her performance on the piano, Miss Elena Tomkinson, a lady famed for her musical talents, of Oriental origin. This is not by far the first time she has displayed her skill before the public. Several of the newspapers announce this morning the death of Major. Ambrosio Fernandes, Aide-de-Camp to the Minister of War, but more generally known as Sr. Contradancer, while another paper contra-dicts it, and says notwithstanding that he is not dead, he well deserves the praise contained in the obituary notice.

NOTES ON PATAGONIA.

(Continued.) Mr. Editor, The wind being fair on the morning of the 6th day of our stay off the pilot's castle, we started with the first of the flood for the town of Carmen (called by the inhabitants Patagones); we arrived at a ricketty wooden wharf off the town in five hours; the river has five fathoms water, more or less, the whole of the way up. A vessel drawing 12 feet can load with a plank from the shore, but the stream is most rapid; we had some beautiful views both of wild barren Nature and of civilisation-picturesque granite and sandstone hills on the north side turning back the flow of waters, on the south side numerous substantial houses surrounded with vineyards, orchards of apples, walnuts figs, quince and forest trees, all now clothed in the gorgeous gold of autumn. The mind of the wanderer returned to his home beyond the sea, where in a lovely spot like one of those the kiss of affection and peace awaits his return. The country at the back of the hills is nothing more than a sandy and gravelly desert for hundreds of miles, useles, to man, containing everywhere evidences of the sea having covered it in times past; the settlement of the Negro is therefore confined to the lands border ing on the river, the soil of which is a deep dark sandy loam, well adapted for the growth of all kinds of wheat, the average production of which is from twelve to fifteen thousand fanegas a year, twelve for one considered a good yield: but this year the locusts ate almost the entire crop, not over a thousand fanegas were saved; the price of wheat down there is always about 30 payer dollars less than the price in B. 
