

London, March 26th
There was another short discussion in the House of Lords on the arrangement with the Boers, and Earl Cairns gave notice that on Thursday he would call attention to the subject and ask for explanations.

In the House of Commons, Colonel Barne gave notice of a bill for securing the greater purity of beer. Lord G Hamilton resumed the debate on Mr Stanhope's motion respecting Caudal. Among others, Mr Pickett, Mr Bourke, Lord Harrington and Sir Stafford Northcote took part in the discussion. The motion was eventually rejected by 336 to 216 votes.

An official announcement is made in the *Gazette* of St. Petersburg that the funeral of the late Emperor will take place to-morrow.

The trial of Ryssakoff and others implicated in the assassination of the late Czar will open on the 30th inst. It has been decided to proceed against the woman Perovskaya, the accomplice of Hartmann and Jejelsova, separately from the other prisoners.

A telegram from Newcastle, of yesterday's date, states that no official announcement of the conditions of peace with the Boers had yet been made, and that increasing dissatisfaction is felt as the nature of the terms transpires.

Our special correspondent at Pietermaritzburg says that, had the war continued, the British camp at Mount Prospect would have been attacked on the first misty morning.

It is stated that the Ottoman delegates have presented their final proposals to the Ambassadors of the Great Powers, and have declared that the Porte could neither code Crete nor any part of Albania. The line of frontier which they have proposed is understood to go considerably beyond that described by the Turkish Note of Oct. 3rd 1880. The territory now offered in Thessaly comprises Larissa, Trikala, Turnovo, and the whole valley of the Saliambria, but excludes Prevesa and Metzovo. No part of Epirus is comprised in the proposed line. Turkish troops continue to be despatched to the Greek frontier.

Mr Barr's financial statement was published in the *Gazette of India* yesterday. The accounts for 1879-80 show that the revenue amounted to £85,455,000, and the expenditure to £89,663,000, leaving a deficit of £1,183,000, including the frontier and Panjab Northern Railways £6,125,000 is brought into the account, of which £355,000 is contributed by Government loan, thus leaving an Imperial surplus, exclusive of the war expenditure, of £4,607,000. To the end of 1880-81 the war expenditure proper is estimated at £16,605,000, and provision is made in 1881-82 for a further outlay of £21,510,000, on the basis of the evacuation of Southern Afghanistan being completed by the end of May.

Corrupt practices are reported by the Gloucester Election Commissioners to have prevailed extensively at the election in March, 1880. More than half of the whole number of electors who polled are believed to have been bribed. A number of persons holding official positions in the town are scheduled.

William Prowse, assistant-master at Greenwich Workhouse, was so severely wounded yesterday morning by an assassin who attacked him with a chopper while in bed, that his life is in danger. The would-be murderer was brought before the Greenwich magistrate yesterday and remanded.

The late verger at St. Andrew's, Tavistockplace, was charged before the Westminster magistrate, at the instance of Archdeacon Dunbar, with having committed perjury in the recent divorce case. No one, however, appeared to prosecute, and the summons was dismissed, it being afterwards ascertained that the solicitors for the prosecution had made a mistake as to the date of hearing.

An omnibus driver was fined 40s at Marlborough-street Police court for driving his vehicle through a troop of the 2d Life Guards in the Haymarket, and breaking the formation.

In the stock markets yesterday foreign bonds were in demand at an improvement, especially Egyptian, Russian, and Turkish. A decline, however, occurred in English, American, and Canadian lines, and Consols were neglected. Business generally was inactive. The sum of £123,000 gold was withdrawn from the Bank for New York.

It seems that the Municipal Theatre at Nice, which was burned down under such appalling conditions on Wednesday evening, was a very old building, which had been restored under the Sardinian Government about fifty years ago. It was in the Italian style of architecture, the interior being beautifully proportioned. Much surprise has been expressed at the rapidity with which the flames gained ground; but it should be borne in mind that most of the stage fittings—as is the case in Italy—were of a very light wood, and that the scenery was painted on paper and not on canvas.

The subscription for the widows and orphans of the persons who per-

ished has already reached the amount of 100,000 francs.

Sir Charles Reed, M.P., chairman of the London School Board, died yesterday morning at his residence, Earlsmead, Tottenham. His illness commenced last Sunday week with an attack of faintness, which was attributed by his medical advisers to a slight chill, developing into pleurisy. It appeared to be passing away on the Monday, and Sir Charles rallied very quickly, and seemed each day to be gaining strength. About one o'clock yesterday morning, however, the illness returned, and after half past six Sir Charles died. He was born in 1819, and was consequently in his sixty-third year. Sir Charles was vice-chairman of the London School Board in 1870-73, and has since been chairman. He represented Hackney from 1868 to 1874, and was elected for St. Ives in 1880.

It is now understood that the German Ambassador at Constantinople will at once proceed, in conjunction with his diplomatic colleagues, to define a frontier line between Turkey and Greece; and that this line, which will probably be a compromise between Greek claims and Turkish concessions, after being submitted to the Great Powers, will, after all modifications have been made, be presented to Europe as the final award of the Porte in the matter under dispute.

It is stated that the younger Boers are dissatisfied with the present settlement; but the older men, it is said, have every confidence in President Brand and General Wood.
