We have had to send such a big gun as Dean Dillon to Ireland with a view of inducing some such immigration of Irish to our shores; whilst in Wales such a work is already done for us by somebody, and the result is such a spontaneous immigration that our agents or authorities have no trouble in the matter beyond forwarding them from their port to their destination. We hear on good authority, that even this good office will not be needed long, as arrangements are likely to be made with the P.S.N.C. Company to land them on the spot.

And this Welsh immigration is quite unique. H. M.'s emigration inspector at Liverpool reported of the recent arrivals here, that such respectable looking emigrants had never left the shores of the Mersey before.

Our immigration officials are tounded at the quantity of luggage appearing to them, in comparison with the 'baul' of the Spaniard, or the carpet bag of the Italian. And it would really astonish our estuaries to see the innumerable comports a Welsh peasant requires about him to make up his home. It is the universal point of surprise to native visitors to Chuquí, the all pervading tidiness of the merest hut, and the attempt at the decencies of life under the most rude circumstances. These things have a significance beyond the additional wealth brought to the country, and that is—a sign of rooting to the soil. The Welsh immigration is nothing abnormal, but rather a simple outpour of population seeking a rest; and its aggregation towards the same points as only the social aspects of the individual characteristic of love of comfort.

We trust General Roca will see that no blunder of his subordinates will in any way frustrate this invaluable element of our prosperity. Some time ago we pointed out that we must look to the people to make good our footing in the Manzanas after Gen. Villegas' brilliant sweep thereto. Mr. Jones is the only man to make permanent our success. He knows every oasis in the intervening travesias, and has the full confidence of both colonists and Indians. His people are experienced hard-miners, at the same time that they are agriculturists; and should he avail himself of the present influx of settlers to push forward, no encouragement of the Government should be wanting to second him. It must be apparent to all that Mr. Jones's appointment as Commissioner has brought about a renewed interest and confidence in Wales to incite the present immigration.

With a steady set of Welsh immigrants, it is clear the valley of the Chuquí proper will soon be occupied, so that now is the proper time to pave the way further in. After all, Chuquí is but the stepping point to the vast territory beyond, and its people have been trained for the undertaking. Let no puerile disprecision stand in the way.

ANGORA GOATS.

Buenos Aires, July 1831.  
To the Editor of the Standard.  
Dear Sir,

If you take a great interest in all matters that tend to the welfare and prosperity of the Argentine Republic, a few notes on the Angora goat may interest some of your readers and lead the result that many estancieros will try this useful and profitable industry.

The Angora goat was first introduced into the Cape of Good Hope in 1836 by Captain Henderson, and the stock obtained from them found its way into the divisions of Callan, Swellendam, Graaf Rijsen and Richmond. A large German firm, Mosenthal, Brothers, having establishments in the two latter divisions, appreciating the value and importance of a fleece-bearing goat, tried to obtain some pure-bred animals from Angora, and in 1836 succeeded in doing so, after many trials and disappointments.

Many farmers in the colony now boast of large flocks of pure-bred animals, and have obtained as high a price as six shillings per lb. for their clip at Bradford, the metropolis of the mohair trade, whilst samples from Asia Minor were valued at three shillings and sixpence sterling per lb. Softness, fineness and lustre are the prime qualities required by the manufacturers in mohair.

Angoras are the prettiest and merriest of domestic animals, and to see them coming home through the fields and bushes in the evening, is a sight any lover of animals would delight in—they look like animated streams of pure milk flowing towards the homesteads, while their gambols and pranks, very much like practical jokes, which they play off on each other, are very amusing.

Owing to their being all white, and to the circumstance of their generally lambing at the same time, as many as a hundred kids a day being dropped on a farm with which I was connected, they require some care in the lambing season. The animals themselves seem to be puzzled to recognize their young, and for a day or two the kids have to be given to them.

Each Angora goat yields from three to five lbs. of mohair annually.

The fleece is generally in perfection in July, and it must then be taken from the animals, as otherwise it begins to shed the best hair, July being one of the coldest months at the Oape, there is some danger if it does not a cold rain should set in, as with their coats off they cannot stand very inclement weather, and sheds are considered indispensable to shelter the goats for a week or two after shearing.

The advantage of breeding Angoras is, that they scarcely interfere with the pasture of sheep, and will often live on herbage the latter discarding, whilst the fleece, if improved, commands a high price, and is an important addition to the exports of a country.

Although mohair only began to figure on the exports of the Cape of Good Hope in 1862, the quantity increased to 1,036 lbs.; in 1871 it increased to 336,292 lbs., valued at £43,000; in 1874 it increased to over a million lbs., valued at £107,139, and in 1880, it increased to 2,719,850 lbs., valued at £263,711 sterling. The whole of this Republic is well suited for Angora, and especially the provinces of Cordoba, Santiago del Estero, Oatamarca.

#### EDITOR'S TABLE.

The French had the whole city to themselves yesterday. Such a turnout has not been seen in this city for years, and everybody was surprised at the number of French flags flying from houses of all degrees—from the highest to the lowest—in every street and in all the suburbs. It was as good as a sumptuous table, as nobody had supposed the Gallic population to be so large.

No wonder that French customs, French cookery, French dresses and French doings are so ineffectually stamped on Buenos Aires, as we now see that half its citizens come from 'la belle France.' It was really hard to select where to go to the best look at what was going on. The French Hospital was a sight almost from dawn, such was the crowd of poor to whom meat and drink were distributed gratis with a lavishly generous hand. At noon Plaza Rojas looked like the Place du Carrousel in Paris; it was filled with French couples, with bands; the children of the French schools and an enormous crowd all talking French. The march down to the Florida Gardens was a grand affair. At the French Legation and the Municipality the procession stopped, the bands playing respectively the 'Marseillaise' and the Argentine Hymn, 'wives' being heartily given for both. At the Florida Gardens the soubrettes were something terrific, and the Marseilles was sung and played by M. M. Dangon and Barbo and the united bands and orchestra, the cheering being enough to make Roger de l'Isle rise from his grave. Addresses by Messrs. Darcoux, Ebelot, Peyret and St. Ours followed. At one o'clock the French Minister, Count Amelot de Chaillou threw open the Legation, which was speedily filled by members of the Legion of Honour and a continual crowd of French residents, to compliment the Minister. A guard from the French war vessels in port did duty, and the uniforms of the different officers attracted great attention. The banquet at the Legation, which was attended by President Roca, many of the highest State officials and the Corps Diplomatic, was the most superb thing of the kind ever attempted here. Afterwards there was a concert, to which all the French residents were invited. The French Theatre was open gratis and encouraged to suffocation, and the same may be said of the concert and ball at the Coliseum, and the balls at the Opera House and Skating Rink. We must not omit to mention the splendid and artistic specimens of flocks bearing goat, tried to obtain some pure-bred animals from Angora, and in 1836 succeeded in doing so, after many trials and disappointments.


