STATE OF IRELAND.

Four hundred military and police were engaged yesterday at Glanvein, county Cavan, in protecting Mr. Moore, agent to Lord Annaly, while serving ejectments. Four houses were visited and found empty, and then, as on the last visit, the bailiff refused to proceed. Finally, a local journalist mediated between the parties, and the tenants undertook to pay the rent as soon as they were able. At Boyle, a bailiff named Barnett, when endeavouring to serve processes, was chased into a house which he barricaded. The people, however, forced an entrance, destroyed the processes, and made the bailiff swear not to serve any more.

A Parsonstown telegram says that on the sheriff of the district, and his bailiffs proceeding yesterday to serve some writs for non-payment of rent, on the property of Mr. Hamlett Thompson, near Banagher, they were met by a body of over a thousand men, who had assembled to prevent the service. No armed forces accompanied the bailiffs, and they were obliged to return without effecting their object.

A body of 100 police went yesterday to Seven Churches and Ballinahowen, about ten miles from Newbally, county Westford, to protect a process-server in the service of Mr. Williams. The constabulary were met by some thousands of persons at all points and they had to retire. It is stated that the military are to go from Athlone to-morrow to aid the police in protecting the process-servers.

A telegram from Tullamore states that 200 police, under the command of three resident magistrates, went yesterday to Don, King's County, to protect an attorney's clerk serving writs for rent. They had to walk 12 miles, being refused cars. Nearly 1,000 people assembled. Stones were thrown by women at the police, and two of them were injured. There were eight writs to be served, but in every case the house was deserted and the door removed, so that no legal service could be effected.

THE LAND AGITATION.
Mr John A. Lambert, of Agard, Craughwell, county Galway, who was fired at on Tuesday, gives the following account of the outrage: "It occurred between 11 and 12 o'clock a.m., within two miles of this house. My son and self were driving in a croydon, when three shots were fired at us from behind the road wall. The first man fired two shots, and when we got about 30 yards further on another man fired one shot. How we escaped I cannot conceive, as the men were very close to us. The arrest of the secretary of the Gort Land League took place on Tuesday. A band accompanied the suspect to the railway station, played national airs, and afterwards, followed by a crowd, marched to the lodgings of Sub-Inspector Shaw who effected the arrest, and groaned at him. At night an attempt was made to burn the sub-inspector in effigy, but the police dispersed the crowd and arrested some persons, including a soldier of the 20th Regiment, who had shouted, "To H-- with the Queen." In conveying the prisoners to gaol the police were so hard pressed by the mob that the sub-inspector had to draw his revolver. The crowd then fell back, and the police were enabled to effect their duty.

At 5 o'clock this morning our arrests under the Protection Act were made in Ennis. The persons arrested were John and Michael O'Callaghan, sons of a respectable farmer living at Ballinashinch and Poor Law Guardians of Tulla Union. Edward Stewart, son of a small farmer living near Bodke, the scene of a recent collision; and Michael Hussey, of Coolcarr, Scariff. Michael O'Callaghan had served three years in the Army, and purchased his discharge not long since. Hussey is a harness maker, but for some time has not been at work. They are charged in the warrant with rioting and assaulting the constabulary. The prisoners were conveyed to Limerick Gaol.

A riot took place in Dromahair, county Leitrim, on Tuesday night. Several prisoners who were brought into the village to be charged at Petty Sessions for riotous conduct were rescued from the police, who in self-defence, were forced to use their staves.

On Tuesday night the house of a farmer named Cusack, at Killowny, near Ferbane, King's County, was burned down and the occupants narrowly escaped.

The Judges of the Queen's Bench Division to-day granted a conditional order to change the venue of the trial of Broder, the process-server, who is charged under the verdict of a coroner's jury with the wilful murder of two of the people engaged in the affray near Cloughjordan Sligo.

One hundred men of the constabulary force, under the command of Sub-Inspectors Lennon and Warburton, and 100 soldiers, under the command of Major Simpson and Captain Lindsay, of the Brigade Depot, proceeded to-day as an escort with the sub-sheriff and four bailiffs to evict two families in the Umavane district, Connemara, on the proper-

ty of Mr J S Kirwan, Blindwill, Thom; nine families at Belleek, on the property of Mrs Sufield, Olddon; and two families at Derryguley, near Clifden, on the property of Mr John Tyndall, of London. The Constabulary were drafted to Galway from different stations and were marched to the docks where Her Majesty's ship Merlin and Imogene, were in readiness to proceed with them. Two resident magistrates, Messrs Beckett and Denney, accompanied them. The militia marched from Killarney Barracks, and were composed of equal numbers of the 57th and 84th regiments. They were preceded by the regimental bands. A large crowd assembled to witness the departure of the expedition. It has been arranged that a military escort shall remain at Quinnes for two days to protect the process servers, who have to serve a large number of ejectments and civil bill processes. The expedition will then proceed round the coast of Clifden to carry out the evictions at Belleek and Derryguley, after which the flotilla will return to Galway.

The persons arrested were John and Michael O'Callaghan, sons of a respectable farmer living at Ballinashinch and Poor Law Guardians of Tulla Union. Edward Stewart, son of a small farmer living near Bodke, the scene of a recent collision; and Michael Hussey, of Coolcarr, Scariff. Michael O'Callaghan had served three years in the Army, and purchased his discharge not long since. Hussey is a harness maker, but for some time has not been at work. They are charged in the warrant with rioting and assaulting the constabulary. The prisoners were conveyed to Limerick Gaol.

A riot took place in Dromahair, county Leitrim, on Tuesday night. Several prisoners who were brought into the village to be charged at Petty Sessions for riotous conduct were rescued from the police, who in self-defence, were forced to use their staves.

On Tuesday night the house of a farmer named Cusack, at Killowny, near Ferbane, King's County, was burned down and the occupants narrowly escaped.

The Judges of the Queen's Bench Division to-day granted a conditional order to change the venue of the trial of Broder, the process-server, who is charged under the verdict of a coroner's jury with the wilful murder of two of the people engaged in the affray near Cloughjordan Sligo.

One hundred men of the constabulary force, under the command of Sub-Inspectors Lennon and Warburton, and 100 soldiers, under the command of Major Simpson and Captain Lindsay, of the Brigade Depot, proceeded to-day as an escort with the sub-sheriff and four bailiffs to evict two families in the Umavane district, Connemara, on the proper-

ty of Mr J S Kirwan, Blindwill, Thom; nine families at Belleek, on the property of Mrs Sufield, Olddon; and two families at Derryguley, near Clifden, on the property of Mr John Tyndall, of London. The Constabulary were drafted to Galway from different stations and did other duty. Connor, the hooligan, was sent outside, placed him over his head, combed his hair, and then, as far as the place in 2 hours. The marauders then visited the house of a neighbour who had been evicted. A respectable gentleman named Wiseman, who holds some lands in the neighbourhood, was to be about to pay his rent, and threatening notices were served on him. Since these misses were sent his gates and doors have been pulled down. No arrests have been made.

Fifty marines embarked yesterday at Queenstown for Schul, to be stationed there during the present crisis. An armoured military force of 40 men has been sent to Mill-street. In this district it is reported, a caretaker to Mr. McNamee O'Leary has been attacked, but the motive of the outrage is not apparent.

It was expected that the tenant on the Kingston estate, near Mitchelstown, would be evicted by his landlord. The execution of the writ was delayed, and the law must now take its course. Two evictions are yet to be carried out, and as the attitude of the people is as firm and defiant as ever, it will be necessary to aid the civil authority, with an overwhelming military and police force. The efforts are being made by local clergy and laymen to avert the people against assembling and attempting to offer resistance.

Yesterday a process-server, while serving processes at Donoughmore, near Ballynacor, where a land meeting was recently held, was surrounded by a crowd, who attacked him, stripped him, and then dipped him in the river.
