Bull, President Roca, with Madame Roca, entered the saloons. Up to half past 11 o'clock there was still dancing room in some of the saloons, but at midnight, notwithstanding that the whole suite of magnificent rooms were thrown open and the guests promenaded through the Halls, (a perfect 'Glorietta' of bouquets) such was the pressure that dancing in any of the apartments was completely out of the question. Some friends recently arrived from London declared their astonishment at so magnificent a sight, really one that they only could have looked for in the Court circles of Europe. The dresses of the ladies completely defeat us; styles and fashions that we never before saw in our lives bewildered us. The ladies were covered with flowers and pearls from head to toe, and blazed with diamonds. The uniforms of some American navy officers, the peculiar dress of H.E. the Nuncio, and the gold-laced uniforms of some of the Argentine officers, gave a fresh lustre to a scene the most dazzling ever witnessed in B. Aires.

Supper was served in the grand dining-room, a baronial hall: nothing to rival it, we believe, in South America. The tapestry, carpeting, furniture, &c., represent a capital of several millions of dollars. As we strolled through this palace of luxury, admiring the art and taste, combined with the lavish outlay, reflected in every room, we thought of the old days in Buenos Aires when canopied chairs and whitewashed walls were all in fashion.

It is, of course, impossible to give the names of all the guests. All the Buenos Aires 'haut-ton,' and all the illustrious strangers in town seemed to be there.

The Umberto and La France's Mails

Gibraltar, July 24th

The Morning Post publishes a telegram from Berlin announcing that Count Scobell has been charged with a secret mission, the object of which is to form an alliance between France and Russia.

According to the terms of peace made with the Boers, England recognises the complete independence of the Transvaal! The elections for the Volksraad ('Boer Government') of deciding how to separate Misiones

will take place immediately. The sum the English claim from the Boers amounts to half a million.

Mr Gladstone stated in the House of Commons that Lord Dufferin had received instructions to intercede in favor of Midhat Pasha.

The Ottoman Government has despatched fresh reinforcements to Tripoli.

Telegrams from Bombay augur badly for affairs in Candahar; great agitation prevails, and considerable bodies of troops are moving.

Slight shocks of earthquake have been felt at Lyons and Grenoble. The heat in France is unbearable. Dozens of deaths from sunstroke and suffocation are reported, and the hospitals are full of patients from all kinds of complaints induced by the heat. In the theatres the actors were frequently obliged to stop in the middle of the play and leave the stage, overcome by the tremendous heat.

The coolness between France and Spain in consequence of the Oran affair is patched up, and the former will pay damages.

At the assault on Stax the Naval

Brigade formed the 'enfants perdus.'

Commander Miot, of the Alma, was the first in the breach; he tore down the green flag and planted the tricolour in its place. The Arabs fought like tigers, from house to house; nevertheless, the 'élan' of the French was so irresistible that the fight only lasted one hour. The loss of the French was only twenty killed and 50 wounded. The city is in ruins. Six hundred Mussulmen were killed. An indemnity of 15 millions francs has been demanded from the French.

We have to return our best thanks for an invitation to attend the Chasconas Catife Fair next month either as a buyer, a seller, or a spectator.

As for the first and second fairs, absence of both cash and cattle preclude the possibility of our appearing in them; but we have occasionally succeeded in the part of a spectator, and, W.W.P., will try it again at Chasconas next month.

A meeting will be held at the R.R. Society's rooms this afternoon to consider Messrs. Gazzano's proposal to connect all the principal towns and estancias in the province with telephone wires.

The Servants' Registration Bureau has broken down. The Municipality has suspended the obnoxious edict. Public opinion has won for once.

England will have the largest square (656 square metres) of any foreign power at the Continental Exhibition; then come the United States, France and Germany with about 550 each; Brazil, 300; Italy, Spain and Belgium, 200 each. The city of Buenos Ayres will have 3000 square metre, the province 250; Santa Fe 200, and all the other provinces 150.

(Concluded.)

There may be sound reasoning in capitalizing French railways at 4 per cent, and even Spanish at the same rate, on the supposition that the present progress will be maintained, but surely the same principle cannot be applied to those enterprises the dividends of which have been mostly earned by ephemeral business. Legitimate or not, a time will come when the public will not swallow new companies with fabulous pretensions and subscribe to foreign loans leaving large commissions to those who float them; and as most of our so-called banks have lived on this trade I think it is risky, to say the least, to take their dividends earned in this way as normal revenue. Here, again, I may be permitted to cite a few examples. The Banque de Paris et des Pays Bas ranks among the best of what are called banks in Paris. Its shares stand at 1,340/- per 500/- viz., a premium of nearly 200/- each. Its last dividend was 60%. Thus the shares yield 4% per cent on the investment. The Banque de l'Union shares of 500/-, with only 125/- paid, stand at 1,275/- that is to say 300/- per cent premium. The last dividend was 16.25c, or about 14% per cent. There are many other cases—for instance, the Credit General Francais, whose shares of 500/-, with only 125/- paid, stand at 750/-, which, in my opinion, is wrongly considered cheap because their dividend was, in certain exceptional circumstances, at an average of 92c. Of course, I do not mean to express an opinion on all these enterprises. I merely want to show that what has pushed them to their present prices was not the hope of a dividend, but simply an expectation that somebody else would take them in turn, leaving a profit to the last holder.

There is no doubt that these so-called banks have contributed in a large measure to the present speculation by providing the funds for it. They all lend money on their own paper, and thus facilitate the purchase of thousands of shares with a very small margin. They even use a large part of their deposits to lend upon stocks and shares, and when I say that one of these banks alone, the Credit Lyonnais, according to its own balance-sheet, has lent in this way 170,000,000/-, you will see that the total sum of money lent for speculation is enormous. Indeed, the principle on which operations are carried on does not always seem to the soundest. Thus the Credit Lyonnais only recently doubled its capital, raising it from 100,000,000/- to 200,000,000/-; 200,000 shares were issued and allotted in preference to the holders of the existing 200,000 shares. Nothing could be more legitimate. But, as the shareholders mostly had not the money to subscribe for the new shares, the Credit Lyonnais lent the money to those who wanted it on the security of their shares. Thus the capital to the extent of these loans was not raised at all, but simply a debt created. It is true that this proceeding has been much blamed, and I do not believe that many have dared to imitate it, but, at the same time, it shows that the present state of things may turn the coolest heads. Again, I wish it to be well understood that I do not blame the financial system here. It has wrought much good, and the odium that has attached to promoters in England would not have been countenanced here. Those who labour and risk are expected to get as much gain for it as they legitimately can, though if they step out of the law, the Law Courts show them little mercy. At the same time our banks here are really financial syndicates, and as they are known to have been successful the public want a share in them, and, with a natural tendency to exaggeration, they magnify the results to come, and it is to a great extent their own fault if they find themselves deceived in the end.

I am often asked, what will be the result of the reaction when it comes, as it surely must come? Many who do not know France and the special organization of the different stock exchanges, anticipate a general collapse, a crash such as was witnessed in Austria in 1873. I am convinced there will be nothing of the kind. To begin with, there is here an amount of floating and investing capital out of all proportion and comparison with other countries; and, secondly, the intermediaries who really bear the brunt of the responsibility are so strongly constituted and so wealthy that they stand the heaviest shocks. Let us take the Paris Bourse. Here there are 60 authorized agents appointed by the Government. They are an organized body, under the control of the Minister of Finance, with an autocratic powerful committee of directors. Any infraction of the rules is punished by a simple order of the Committee to the agent to sell out. His successor must be approved by the Committee and by the Government. Each agent has to furnish caution money to the amount of £14,000. The posts are sold for about £30,000, and there are many whose private fortunes amount to upwards of £500,000. Thus far there has always been a tacit joint liability among them. The body has

paid the debts towards the public. This body, then, stands between the speculator and the lender on stocks or shares, and in this way the lender has the treble guarantee of the stock on which he lends, the client of the agent, who is the real borrower, and the agent. The provincial Bourses have similar organizations, though, of course, much less powerful. But apart from the authorized agents are hundreds of brokers, called "commissaires," some of whom, with large fortunes, though not recognized by law, do the same business and prosper. The facility of lending and borrowing with them rests, of course, only on their special credit and the securities they offer. It is, then, on these intermediaries that will fall the responsibility of these transactions which have no real cash basis. If they accept the risk of buying thousands of shares for ladies who have no right to transact business without the approval of their husbands, or for shopkeepers who can hardly pay their rent, they will ultimately, when the tide turns, have to scramble as they best can out of their difficulties. On the whole, there is a great deal of honesty in this world of speculators, and those who lead them into temptation count upon their husbands' help, on the trust of people who will pinch for years to make up for past losses. The fashionable towns tout will have to sell the pictures and china they now buy at enormous prices, and finally the community will have to reckon up their fortunes at the reduced prices of the stock list and only that will be finally gone which has been spent as easily-made gain always spent.

PRES. GARFIELD'S WOUNDS.

The accounts received, which are full, though necessarily as yet disconnected and contradictory, must be regarded as satisfactory and giving reasonable grounds for hope that the malevolent intention of the would-be assassin may be frustrated. There are, of course, many peril still to be encountered. Secondary internal hemorrhage may occur when the bullet is accidentally or surgically displaced, either extensively inflamed or blood poisoning is possible; but looking at the case as a whole, and recalling the history of similar cases, it is impossible not to feel that a good hope is permissible. It is as yet impossible to obtain a detailed account of the case from medical sources, and nothing could be gained by summarising the telegraphic reports. We can, therefore, only base our notion of the condition of the patient and the probability of his recovery on general information. Such data as are at our disposal seem to justify an encouraging view, and with the reserve indispensable in dealing with a case of this character and importance this view may be maintained. It may be assumed from the surgical history brought to this point that the course taken by the bullet must have been such as to avoid injury to the most important structures. It is scarcely possible that any of the large vessels can have been injured, and the hypothesis of complete severance, or even a severe injury of the great nerves, is not necessary to account for the pains in the lower extremity. The liver, if wounded, could hardly have been extensively lacerated; the kidneys, bladder and intestines must also have escaped. If, therefore, President Garfield survives the perils of the next few days, and the bullet can be extracted, there will be no medical reasons—al least arising out of the general character of the injuries he has received—why he should not do well.

The distinguished patient could not be under better surgical care than is to be found at Washington. The vast experience gained during the War of the Rebellion in the United States has diffused an immense amount of knowledge concerning gunshot wounds and their treatment among the army surgeons in that country, and several of the most eminent among them are connected with the Surgeon-General's Office at Washington. The information regarding the special description of wound from which Gen. Garfield is now suffering was greatly enlarged during that war. In the history of the war no fewer than 170,000 gunshot wounds of the liver are recorded as having been under treatment in the United States hospital; and, secondly, the intermediaries who really bear the brunt of the responsibility are so strongly constituted and so wealthy that they stand the heaviest shocks.
