THE EXHIBITION

At the far end of the Capital Section, in the corner wing of the machinery department, are the exhibits of machinery made in the capital. Messrs Schwartz, the Krups of South America, have a small six-horse steam engine that drives an electric machine a few yards off. We will not say that this machine in its present state is equal to the best English machinery, but certainly every piece of same can stand comparison with the articles imported. All the fixtures are clearly cut and there is not a flaw in the steel. The electric machine is a species of incognita; as we have not yet seen it uncovered; the wheel of same, driven by the Schwartz machine, is supposed to perform 700 revolutions per minute. The cables of same are insulated and go up to the ceiling, transmitting the current to several burners in the Capital section, the vestibule and in the Argentine provinces department. It such a machine as the present one is required to generate electricity for only a few lamps, we doubt very much in the success of electric lighting in Buenos Aires, as the expense must be exorbitant. Next to Messrs Schwartz's machines there are several miniature ones for grinding coffee, maize, etc, but little can be said in their favor; they are doubtless laudable attempts, but certainly they do not amount to much. Nearly all the pieces are badly cast, full of flaws, loosely joined, and in fact, they

represent embryonic attempts of machine making. These small machines are made in several shops in town.

The Parque has some very complicated machinery for making remington cartridges. These machines are made in the country, and visitors to the exhibition will soon have an opportunity of seeing them working.

We repeat here what we said of Messrs Schwartz; the machinery is up to the mark. The Parque Arsenal, the Western Railway shops, and Messrs Schwartz represent today the manufacture of machinery in this republic, and the articles they exhibit can easily compete on a small scale with the machinery introduced from Europe. The man was coaxed away by a policeman in a state of utter prostration. This should be a caution to the Hanging Committee. Never before have we seen an indifferent painting having caused such deplorable results. But for a glass of the splendid rum exhibited by our friend and neighbour Mr Tom Sheil, the popular Irish Consul, the Basque would have done the spot. We see that our distinguished colleague *La Nacion* praises Mr Sheil's exhibit of rum as first class. It certainly saved the Basco's life, when he was all but murdered by an oil painting.

The members of the Municipality yesterday held a prolonged Session up to 5 o'clock p.m. The lottery reglamento was discussed and passed, some few alterations made; the period for collecting prizes, on Mr Mulhall's motion, was extended from 90 to 120 days, after which if not collected it will be lost; his motion to prohibit the sale of lottery tickets in the street was however lost, as also that of Sr Legarde to prohibit the sale of Provincial lottery tickets. The business is now closed, and the lottery will be given to the public in a few days. Respecting the sale of the Riaehuelo, it was decided before discussing this all-important matter to publish the reports and 'informes' on the subject. The 'Comision de Seguridad' has refused to allow the Passion play to be performed in the theatres during the Holy Week.

The news from Lima is flabbergasting, a fraudulent emission of 8,000,000 pesos, authorised by President Garcia Calderon, has been discovered! Poor Peru!

The newest thing in dances at home is Bread and Butter parties, a protest against the present extravagance. Lord Provost Ure of Glassgow started it, and it is considered quite the thing now. The invitations are peculiar, here is a copy of one received:—

Bread and Butter 'Dancing'

They are too utterly utter for that.

The Minister of Justice's note to the Fiscal about the law's delays in criminal cases is praised in all circles. We have no space for it today, but it is indeed a relief to find that the Minister has taken up a vital reform which all his predecessors neglected.

The Chaco Indians have made a riot at Rome and bagged some cattle, but not many.

Mr Ringuelet handed over the management of the Western Railways yesterday to Mr Brian, a worthy successor. Mr R. rocked the cradle of this great railway, the reputation of which for good management is second to none in South America; he goes home to France, but his friends hope to see him out here very soon again.

All the rumours about the Admiral Brown and other Argentine warships being under orders for Montevideo are the purest moonshine.

Lord Melbourne's policy—'do nothing'—is the very best for this country in the present rumpus, which is sure to blow over.

TWYFORD FUND.

Pursuant to notices published at a meeting was held in St. John's Church schoolroom on 27th inst of the subscribers to above fund.

The Rev. Dr. Smith having been voted to the chair, referred to the notice calling the meeting, and explained that this meeting was necessary on account of the death of Mr O H Twyford for whose benefit a sum of money had been collected and put into the hands of two trustees, Messrs G B Perry and R Carlisle, the interest on said money to be remitted to Mr Twyford, the principal to be returned at Mr Twyford's death to the subscribers.

Mr G B Perry, the only trustee now present, stated that the accounts which he then presented might be examined and approved; he explained that the sum of \$1,586 had been placed in the trustees' hands and had by them been invested in Puentes and Caminos, and which the nominal value of the securities now in his hands is \$1,900, also that the sum of \$1,583 had been collected as interest of which \$1,428.50 had been remitted to Mr Twyford, and he suggested that the balance of \$1,29.72 which had accrued since Mr Twyford's death be remitted to his widow, Mr Leslie having put this in the form of a motion, which was seconded by Mr McClymont, it was unanimously agreed.

Mr Leslie proposed and Mr Green seconded that the accounts presented by the trustee be approved: this was carried unanimously.

Mr Ziemer then proposed that the funds be liquidated in accordance with the terms of subscription, and placed at the disposal of the subscribers by the trustees; Mr W. Jacobs Jr., having seconded this was carried unanimously.

Mr Krabbe proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Perry for all the trouble he had had, and for the care taken of the funds entrusted to him, Mr. Leslie seconded this which was carried unanimously.

A vote of thanks to the Chairman concluded the meeting.

Some of the gentlemen present at the meeting having announced that Mr. Twyford's widow was in very destitute circumstances, it was proposed to renew a trust in her favor, and several of the former subscribers at once agreed to return their money, for this object, and it is hoped that all who can will follow this charitable example.

THE VOLFI AFFAIR

Finally, I may add, that we are all in perfect accord as to the steps to be taken, this unity being the only guarantee of success, and the strongest bond of union between you and our country's naval force here.

The Consul, therefore, will take the initiative in all measures which the gravity of the circumstances may require.




