THE LONGMUYL AFFAIR.

Another important despatch has reached us about this unfortunate fight between Chilean and Argentine troops in the Andes. The despatch we give is at foot; and although, perhaps, it throws no light on the skirmish, still the fact that the Chilean commander has sent his lieutenant under arrest to Los Angeles, to be tried, shows pretty clearly that the Chilean considers his subordinate in fault.

Perhaps the most disreputable feature of this Longmuyl fight was the conviction it gave rise to, at least on this side of the Andes, that the Chileans were protecting the Indians, and that these savages, who for so many generations' swept off their cattle, had sniped quatters enough in the valley of Longmuyl until rooted out by the indefatigable Villegas.

We cannot for one moment admit that the Chilean authorities were in league with these Indians, yet it looks monstrously akin to it that the despatch now at hand, and the arrest of the Chilean officer Rodriguez, are welcome proofs to the contrary, and Commander Cid appears not only to have been prudent in his instructions, but also energetic in his conduct to a blunder which affects the honor of his flag.

Supposing that most of our readers will have read through the papers and documents published in connection with it's fight, we believe they will be of accord with us on one point; namely, that the upshot of the whole affair is a very convincing proof that Argentines can shoot, and shoot pretty well. The Chilean pique, although supported by a column of Indians, had to retire before the fire of a mere handful of "our boys."

In one of the despatches the Chilean officer stated that the fire from the Argentines was so murderous and well-directed, that he and his men would have all shot down, had they remained there many minutes longer. We of course, deplore the sanguinary event, still we always derive satisfaction that, blunder that it was, the colonists have adopted

Argentines came well out of the blunder, and proved the greatest efficiency of their fire.

Commander Drouilly's "informe," which we give at foot, is a fair, honest, plain-spoken document, and we commend him on it. He seems to have behaved well in the emergency, but the Indians in the Andes got a sharp lesson which they will not soon forget, and now that Villegas holds the Bariloche Pass their cattle trade is over, and the sooner they surrender and become colonists the better.

The following is the despatch:—

Santiago, 27th.

Commander Drouilly sent in his report to Government on the affair at Longmuyl. From it, it appears that the territory on which the fight took place is undoubtedly Chilean. After describing the territory, he says that the delimitation on both sides so command the boundary line that even a person knowing nothing of the places could not fail to see it.

He disapproves the conduct of Lacau Rodriguez who commanded the Chileans, who disobeyed the orders he had, not to take any steps without consulting Commander Cid, in case Argentines should cross the border.

He characterizes as "military unskilfulness" the fact of Lieut. Rodriguez having given orders to return the fire, and to charge, as he had to cross a sandy waste of 300 metres before he could reach the ditch occupied by the Argentines, and under their fire, and beyond besides that the enemy were well hidden.

For these reasons, he placed Lieut. Rodriguez under arrest, and sent him to Los Angeles to be tried. Drouilly promises to report more at length on the questions in connection with the occupation of the Cordillera both by the Argentines and Chileans, on territory formerly occupied by the Indians.

Implementos de Labor, Maquinaria and Vehiculos. They have 211 ploughs, and 113 harrows, 6 threshing machines, 25 reaping machines, 11 water mills, one wind mill, 66 hand mills and 4 steam mills; 117 wagons, 50 carts and 32 carrioles,* which have cost \$46,069.

Buildings.—There are in the colony 144 houses de material* of 30 of adobe and 141 of mud and "quinchos" which have cost \$119,933.

The river Chupat runs through the whole extent of this colony in the middle of the valley in a serpentine manner, and with a current of about two miles per hour, according to the season of the year. The mouth of it is situated in latitude 43° 20' S., and longitude 65° 4' 30" Greenwich Meridian, and the cultivated lands begin at 7 kilometers more or less from the mouth of the river, where the town Rawson is situated.

The soil of this valley varies in many parts, and is principally composed of alumina, sand and gravel, which is nourished by the melting snow from the Andes and the rains of the Interior.

The river overflows periodically, and this is solely due to the colonists who have made much time and heavy labour to defend for the present the irrigation of their lands. Very high winds prevail, and are generally S.S.W. E. and N.W. the east wind seldom blows. The climate is healthy and dry, though the temperature is very variable.

Geographical Position of the Colony.

The colony is nearly 75 kilometers long by 9 wide. This valley begins at the mouth of the river Chupat, and extends in a southward direction as far as 78 degrees West, closed by groups of rocks, and at which point the high table lands on both sides of the valley nearly meet, being divided by the river.

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Foundation of the Colony and its development.

The colony was founded on the 28th July 1855 with 156 Welsh colonists, and until 1877 when they numbered 700, they suffered very much, and had to be supported by the Government. From the year 1878, when they began a splendid harvest, prosperity began to smile on them, and has continued to do so up to the present; last year's crop being the largest and best yet.

The crop last year reached the high figure of from 25,000 to 30,000 fans, and
