PRESS TELEGRAMS.

The following episode of the latest news by telegraph, from all quarters, is taken from our colleagues:

Montevideo, 12.

HOME STEADS.

Notwithstanding all our land sales,
all our land auctions, and the millions
that have gone within the last few
years into land purchases, there is not
a single office in town where three
Welsh families just arrived can buy,
rent or acquire homestead farms for
their families. Even the very "chacareros"
around San José de Flores,
men who come to town daily with ar-
tifacts, and are paying high rents for
their "chacras"—complain that with
all their experience, with all our newspapers,
with all our brokers, they
don't know where to apply for the pur-
chase of a decent farm of land on easy
terms.We call attention to this matter
with the view to awaken the owners of
land to this great want in this
great land market.A respectable Italian "quintiero,"
with wife and family, applied to us the
other day in the hope of getting
him a chaco out in the camp which
he could make a home for his family.
We made many inquiries in his be-
half, and the result of our inquiry
is that unless he has at least 10,000 m/c
to begin with he must hire as a peon
in town or camp, as even if he had
100 squares of land on ten years' time
to pay for it, he could not start his
farm with less than 10,000 m/c.It occurs to us that as there are
hundreds of our readers who have
purchased good lands and have neither
the means nor the inclination to stock
them with cattle and sheep, they
might be very glad to give a free farm
of 100 squares to a family, on
every square league they own. The
gift would really be nothing compared
with the greatly increased value
the rest of the land would take by having
even but one chaco of 100 squares
on a square league. We want brokers
and agents to look this up and
push this business, as already the land
business is beginning to look flat and
lacks a little enterprise on the part of
the owners more than auctioneers' ad-
vertisements.There are hundreds—not to say
thousands—of small sheep and cattle
farmers in the inside camps of this
provinces who, if the way was smoothed
for them by the agency of a good
broker, would be only too glad to
move out with their little stock to these
new lands, and make a new start on
fair, liberal terms that would result
most favourably for them and give
some small yield per annum to the
owners of the land.

Can any one in Buenos Ayres say
how much money has gone into frontier
estancia lands within the last three
years, and which to the present has not
been given one penny return on the invest-
ment? There are lands in Lincoln,
Gauja, Italo, Trequebaqua, Guan-
mini, Puan, Carhue, which, with a little
push, might be all more or less stocked
and settled on, and which at present
are as idle and waste as when old
Calfcure flourished. Strange fact,
that with all our enterprise, with all
our vast speculation in lands, there is
not a single office in town where a
newly-arrived emigrant can ap-
ply for a homestead farm and a trifle
to help the family to make a start, say
for the first year.

The mails in yesterday bring impor-
tant news from Santa Fe. Several es-
tancieros are cutting up the lands,
splitting them into farms and chacras,
and starting, as it were, colonies on
their own lands without intervention
of Government or joint-stock company.

We want a homestead farm office in
this city to methodise this business.
The wants of the people and of the
camp are great. Farmers are done
up paying 10,000 m/c a year per peso,
and in a letter received yesterday from
Bragado we read that the whole coun-
try out there is on the move, owing to
an Irishman buying a flock of mestiza
Lincolns for the Loto camp, and the
sheep start to day.

Homestead brokers are needed more
to-day than even Cedy's brokers; and
it is in the interest of the landowners
that Homestead offices be at once
opened.

THE NEW SEAT OF WAR.

In 1773 the great explorer James
Bruce, of Kinnaird, was painfully work-
ing his way homewards from the Soudan
and Fazkole, in lat. 11° 20' upon the
Blue Nile, was considered to be the
first of Egyptian jurisdiction in that
direction. The rivers Rohal and D'U-
der flow through a most fertile district
east of the Blue N. Between those
rivers and the Atbara which enters
the Nile in N. lat. 17° 40', a da's
march south of Berber, a magnificent
extent of fertile land represents the
ancient Xerxes. This is inhabited by
nomadic Arabs, who generally evade
direct taxation.
