PRESS TELEGRAMS.

Madrid, 30th.—The refusal of Prince
Bismarck to recognize the previous
Sovereignty of Spain over the Caro-
line Islands has elicited a note from
King Alfonso's Government, com-
plaining of the illogical conclusions
of the German Chancellor, and insist-
ing on the recognition of Spanish rights
to the possession of the disputed
islands.

Berlin, 30th.—Commenting on the
Caroline Islands question the North
German Gazette states that the proceed-
ings of the Spanish Minister of Foreign
Affairs are of a most doubtful
nature.

Philipopolis, 30th.—The war fever
has greatly subsided. Schools have
resumed classes, and shops have been
reopened.

Cairo, 30th.—Sir H. D. Wolf has
arrived in this city, accompanied by
the most distinguished personages of
Alexandria. The reception given to the
British Envoy in this city was of un-
precedented magnificence.

Berlin, 29th.—The appointment of
Delegates to elect the Prussian Par-
liament are decided in favor of the Ger-
man Liberal party.

Madrid, 30th.—An express train from
Lisbon to Madrid went off the track
on the bridge over the Tejo, near the
frontier, and fell into the river. Many
people were killed, and others seriously
hurt by the effects of this sad
accident.

New York, 30th.—A special telegraph
to the Post stats that President Diaz
is negotiating a loan with Germany
which will restore the financial equi-
librium of the country.

Hayethayo (Burma), 30th.—A
steamer has arrived from Mandalay
where grave excitement at present
prevails, owing to the expectation of
an ultimatum from the Indian Gov-
ernment.

East Saginaw (Michigan), 30th.—
Two drowned bodies have been picked
up in the river, near the scene of the

recent disaster. Up to the present
therefore, three persons perished in the
unhappy accident.

San Juan del Sur (Nicaragua) 30th.
Great excitement prevails in conse-
quence of general fear that the insur-
gents, concerting with those in the
country, will make an invasion.

Yesterday a sailing vessel left Union
having on board the Nicaraguan emi-
grants Linco, Fischer, Lucio and Gu-
tierres with 600 rifles and 9000 car-
tridges. It is believed they will pass
through San Bernardo to the Depart-
ment of Chiriquá.

General Bodilla has left with 2,000
rifles for Carlos Alegria. The coast de-
fences are being strengthened.

Santiago de Chile, 30th.—Advices

from Lima report a bloody engagement
between the advance forces under Gen-

eral Rojas and the insurgents under Iu-
lio Cespedes. The rival forces met
at Oroza. Cespedes was ignominiously
defeated and fled.

Sure, 30th.—The Chamber of De-
puties interpellated the Minister of
Foreign Affairs on the extradition of
certain Peruvian subjects. The Minis-
ter, in reply, stated that the affair was
being satisfactorily arranged with the
Peruvian Representative. With regard
to the political drift of the question, the
Minister said he could say nothing, as
he had presented his resignation.

EUROPEAN TRADE DEPRESSION.

Notwithstanding all that is said and
printed of the crisis in the Plate, the
"Curso Forzoso," and what not, we learn
from some of the principal merchants
in this city, that trade never was brisker
or sales better, and one leading mer-
chant tells us, that although we have
had a year and a half to work to
sell his goods, and foresight to keep his
house supplied with the staple articles
of imports, for which it stands amongst
the first in this market.

In yesterday's issue we published
the impressions of a Buenos Ayres
English merchant on Rosario and its
trade movement, after an absence of
13 years; and those who knew the upper
provinces 20 years ago and now re-
visit them, find the same wondrous
improvement in everything. We call
attention to these, to show that,
even without comparing our situation
with that of any of the European
markets, there is really no cause for
merchants to complain; all our shops are
crowded, all our warehouses doing a
