HAVAS
Constantinople, 1st.—Kheridine Pasha,
who figured prominently in the events
of the last war, died today.

Rio, 1st.—Marshall Moraes Ancora has
been named Minister of Agriculture.

Galveston.
Paris, 31st.—During the performance at
Nice last night of the opera "Le Roi de
Car," the audience rose and cheered
wildly for France and Russia.

Berlin, 31st.—Baron Berlepsch has been
named Prussian Minister of Commerce.
For many years Baron Berlepsch has held
this portfolio.

Vienna, 31st.—The strike of Bohemian
glass-makers is spreading. The military
maintains order.

Lisbon, 31st.—New regulations for the
army have been issued. Several old Gen-
erals are placed on the retired list. This
is the first step in the reforms sanctioned
by Government.

Athens, 31st.—Telegrams from Crete
report many recent murders, both of
Turks and Christians.

Constantinople, 31st.—Five new ships
for the Turkish navy were launched yes-
terday here. The Minister of Marine
and many military officers and civil func-
tionaries were present.

Yonkers, 31st.—Three thousand workmen
held a meeting yesterday at Brim and de-
cided to make a grand demonstration on
that day in favor of eight hours daily work.

London, 31st.—It is said that the Duke
of Cambridge will, in October, resign the
command in chief of the British army in
favor of the Duke of Connaught.

THE MENDOZA REVOLUTION.
Mendoza, Feb. 1.—The armed group who
attacked the Government house is said to
have consisted of six men only, but it is
said that there were others to reinforce
them in the event of resistance being offer-
ed. It is not known, however, how many
men attacked the Government house, and
the report that there were six is not
believed. It appears, moreover, that the
Governor had 40 soldiers in the house at
the time, on seeing whom the aggressors
fled to flight. Political animosity is as
usual.

General Boech arrived last evening, but
nothing yet known. Great anxiety in all
quarters. The Governor continues to do
a mass of operations of the Administration.

The second of the Mendoza revolution
ended in the hands of the Commander
Kratzenstein. There may be some more
to-morrow at the elections. No one knows
what is going to happen. Nothing known
about the President or what he thinks.

General Boech is staying in the Gran
Hotel. He was received at the station by
the Governor and a large party.
Colonel Ortega nowhere to be seen.
They say he has gone to Buenos Aires.

Parana, 1st.—Weather fresh and rainy.
A "fronton" has been started here.

REVIEW FOR EUROPE.
The principal event of the fortnight has
been the arrival of the Brazilian Minister
of Foreign Affairs, Mr. Quintino Bocay-
na, who has come on a special mission
near the Argentine Republic. Both
Argentine and Brazilian Ministers of For-
eign Affairs signed the Mission protocol
at Montevideo last week; this settlement
is one of the "referendums" and must yet go
to the Legislatures of the two Republics. It
will inform quarters it is understood
that the settlement of the Mission ques-
tion has been merely a pretext for dismis-
sing the real aim of the Brazilian Mission
to the Argentine Republic. It looks as if
an intentional agreement has been
reached at whereby no non-archaic
treaty can be contemplated on this
continent. Another feature of the
mission is the agreement that all interna-
tional questions in the future shall be set-
tled by arbitration. After the reception
which Minister Bocayna has met and
the success supposed to have crowned
his mission, we think that Brazilian Con-
servatives may abandon all hopes of an
imperial restoration, for the 12 or 13
South American Republics will join
in some agreement to preclude such an
eventuality. Our distinguished Brazilian
guest is present in Cordoba paying his
respects to President Juan Manuel de
Rosas, and to the Argentine Republic,
and the President, to give greater "célé-
brity" to the electoral, has invited several
Governors to the electoral city.

The political weather-glass has been
pointing to stormy weather at the foot
of the Andes for the last week, and af-
fairs looked so threatening at one time
that Vice-President Pellegrini, who holds
the reins of power during the absence
of President Juan Manuel de Rosas, thought
it expedient to send General Urquiza as a
special mission to Mendoza. It is expected
that the presence of the Commissioner
will suffice to avert the storm. Both the
President of the Republic and the Vice-

President are determined to nip any re-
bellion in the bud, though the sedition
movement be got up by members of the
very national party. It is a coincidence
that this time last year a similar state
of affairs prevailed, the overthrow of the
Government of Mendoza being effected by
Dr. Wilde, Minister of Interior. No im-
portance whatever is attached to these
revolutionary movements; they are
worthy the name. The whole affair is
merely a family squabble between Mon-
tagnards and Capoteles that anything else
Political affairs, otherwise, are quiet all
over the country, and there is every hope
that this calm will continue till the end
of the year. The most important politi-
cal event of the fortnight has been the
election of Dr. Julio Costa by unanimity
of votes to the high post of Governor of
the province of Buenos Ayres.

The first dock of the Madro Port was
inaugurated with great éclat last week.
The presence of Vice-President Pellegrini,
the members of the Cabinet, Quinto Bocay-
na, and an influential assemblage. In
another column we give full particulars
of the ceremony. The works are being
pushed forward with wonderful activity,
and great credit on the energy and manage-
ment of the contractors. In another year
the works will embrace the whole water
front of the city; large ocean steamers are
already anchored at the foot of the Calle
Venecia. The La Plata port works are
also doing good service now. With a
large enterprise the La Plata Estrella
Company now runs their steamers on cer-
tain days from Montevideo.

Induena is raging both here and in
Montevideo; in the latter city the doctors
report several thousand cases. Here in
Buenos Ayres the epidemic is beginning; it
appears in a relatively mild form, but is be-
coming very general. Doctors agree that
it has been imported and presents the same
symptoms as the disease that rages over
Europe. The first cases occurred in quar-
antine on the island of Flores and were
partially cured.

Commercial affairs continue very active
in exports, but dull in imports. The
visible fallowing of the latter speaks to the
impoverishment of the masses. In finan-
cial circles there is quite a dead-lock. All
stocks, with few exceptions, are at a
standstill. The market. Bolsa speculation is
not a shadow of its former self. The
money market continues tight. The gold
premium has suddenly weakened and has
fallen to 180. It is not probable that there
is no ostensible cause to account for the
sudden improvement, but few believe in
its duration. Many think that the splendid
harvest of this season will have the effect
of putting down gold; still, all the pros-
pects of enormous grain shipments have
failed to make exchange advance.

Our foreign readers will be glad to hear
that the common sense has at last prevailed in
the Municipal Council, and that the Lord
Mayor's fantastic budget of 20 millions
for the current year has been reduced to
half that amount. Municipal credit here
is lower than ever; as an instance, we may
state that Municipal \$100 Lottery Bonds
are selling at 45/6, and difficult to sell at
all. The Municipal Council has decided
not to take up the new Municipal Loan
for 20 million gold dollars, in view of the
badness of the Municipality and the heavy
burdens already weighing on the population
of the city.

Affairs in general are in a period of
stagnation and no revival of activity is
expected until the gold premium falls
much under 100/0. Speculation in lands
is suffering from quite as great a collapse
as stocks, and states in the central parts
of the city, however, keeps up in value.
The Sunday sections have fallen off in an
alarming manner; in fact the land specu-
lation is quite fazed. The shrinkage is
all the greater now that no Central issue
can be expected for at least a year to
come.

In Montevideo, the financial situation
has suddenly improved. A great collapse
was expected at the stock-exchange settle-
ment of month, but the market recovered
and everything went up at a moment when
all prognosticated blue ruin. The election
of Dr. Herrera Obas to the Presidential
chair is not settled, and no opposition is
spoken of.

In Paraguayan affairs are very quiet.
The railway now runs from Asuncion to Villa
Rica; the latter place has made great pro-
gress, owing to the presence of the railway
terminus and the works of the line which
are now being carried on by the Argentine
engineers and contractors.

We cordially congratulate Mr. Madro
and those associated with him on the com-
pletion of the first dock of our great port
of Buenos Ayres—an enterprise which has
entailed an enormous amount of work
and arrangements, but which now seems
likely to be an accomplished fact in the
near future. The vast amount of work
done greatly surprises us. From our own
inspection we can vouch for the capital
quality of the work which Mr. Walker has
been carrying out, and from the news at
the moment of his departure, we can fully
believe that the figures which we heard
yesterday morning, that 14 thousand cubic
metres of masonry have been put into the
dock No. 1 in one month; and that we
believe to be the largest amount of work
accomplished in one dock in a similar
time.

What the whole proceedings of the in-
auguration passed off most successfully,
we could not help missing the presence of
the late Mr. T. A. Walker, who was the
contractor for the works, and was present
at the inauguration of the South Basin
last January. As fortunately Mr. C. H.
Walker, one of the trustees, is here in
charge of the works, everything will
be carried on precisely on the same
lines, and we look forward with a good
deal of anticipation to the day when the
dock will be completed, a day which we
believe will inaugurate a revolution in the
trade of the River Plate.

The dock, which is a large one, is 570
metres long by 160 wide, with a depth of
24 feet at low water, having an area of 23
acres. Its exterior side was found to be
37 feet of water on the sill.

It is interesting to note that the dock
is entered from the South Basin by a
lock 20 metres wide and 135 metres be-
tween the sills. For the purpose of keep-
ing up communication between the two
sides, the lock is crossed by a swing bridge
and between each dock, as completed, there
will be swing bridges, the one of which
will be between them. Mr. W. Mitchell,
who is in charge of the masonry depart-
ment, has some 50 to 600 men under him,
and we promise ourselves the pleasure of
seeing the dock and the bridge, and the
works fairly staggered us by their
massive strength. The stones employed
came from the contractors' quarries in the
Banda Oriental, where 600 men are em-
ployed under Mr. Ballou. The number of
total number of men employed by Mr.
Walker at present on the works is four
thousand—an army worthy of old Chespe.

An idea of the enormous amount of
work accomplished by the contractors may
be gathered from the following data, which
we resume the details published periodically
in these columns:—

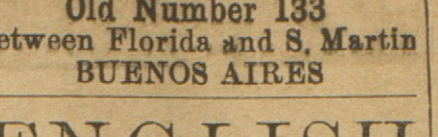

Monday, February 2nd

The gold market opened this morning with an abundant supply of specie, but towards the close of the day it was found that the demand was larger than expected

and the premium, which had fallen to 115, rebounded to 116, closing here with 115 to 116, 1/2, closing at 116

A quarter of a million was sold at weak rates and the market closed changed hands for gold at 115 to 116, 1/2, closing at 116

There was a stirring demand for Cédulas this morning, no doubt owing to the large amounts of money required for the redemption of the National Debt

The demand, however, was limited to the cheap Provincial notes, National Bonds, and the Provincial P. jumped to 65 to 66 and closed here at 65; M and N went to 94; National D. were done at 93 and 94

All stocks were neglected to-day, nothing being done outside of Cédulas and National Bonds

Construction Shares, Seven hundred Cédulas changed hands at 48 and 49, and 200 Cédulas at 47 1/2

Distinctions fell away to 6.40 and 6.50

In exchange circles, sterling paper was neglected more plentiful than the other rates
