London, 18th.—Sir Richard Owen, the famous English naturalist, has just died, aged 92.

Hamburg, 18th.—Epidemia of cholera, causing great loss of cattle.

Hamburg, 18th.—Last week there were 21 cases and two deaths from cholera. The population are not alarmed, as it is believed that the precautions taken by the authorities will prevent the disease assuming alarming proportions.

Paris, 18th.—The Panama scandal continues to cause great excitement. The investigation committee are taking sterner measures every day, without respect for persons of any class what ever.

Barcelona, 18th.—The National Club has summoned its members to meet in January to discuss the annexation of Canada to the United States, or its independence.

Paris, 19th.—The Protectionists are showing fresh energy on the strength of the increase in foreign trade in November.

Opposition to the Franco-Swiss treaty is increasing. Nevertheless Government is resolved to resist rather than to let the treaty be overruled.

Rome, 19th.—A sensation has been caused by an article in the *Espresso*, showing that there are only eleven army corps instead of twelve, and that some of them are short of horses and guns.

The whole press cries out for a remedy, or proof of the charges, and an investigation commission will probably be named.

At the sitting of the Ecclesiastical Commission in Dublin on Monday the Bishop of Down was present in reference to the retirement of Mr. Murphy from the Commission, and that gentleman has since, in a published letter, given his reasons for withdrawing.

The Commission have since taken the evidence of Canon Keller and other witnesses. The Executive Committee of Irish Landowners have resolved to withdraw from taking any part in the proceedings of the Commission.

At a meeting of the *Anglo-Tenants Association* in Cork on Sunday the speakers professed but little confidence in the Commission, and one of them recommended evicted tenants to reinstate themselves in their own homes.

The *Figaro* reports from Rome that the Pope recently granted to M. Gambon, the French Ambassador in the Holy See, would always support the interests of France both in the country itself and in all parts of the world.

Sir Charles Tupper has been to Paris with a view to the conclusion of a commercial convention between France and Canada.

According to a Moscow despatch, a Chinese force, 1,000 strong, has advanced towards the Russian camp of 165 men left by Colonel Yonoff on the Pamir near Marghah, and as this detachment is believed to be in a critical position, it has been resolved to send a small expedition, accompanied by artillery, to its relief. At this season the undertaking, it is added, will be one of great difficulty and expense.

A telegram from Shanghai states that two American college students have safely crossed Asia on bicycles, "via" Tashkent, Kulja, Urumqi, Hami, Suichuan, Lanchoo, Sengai and Paotingfu. They were everywhere kindly treated.

A great fire took place at Tokio on Saturday, destroying 600 houses.

A cavalry detachment sent out from Sukhin to operate against Osman Digna has returned after victory. The leader is reported to be at Amet, gathering reinforcements.

THE LATE MR. JOHN JACKSON.

After a long illness this estimable gentleman died at his residence in Montevideo on Saturday 17th inst., being close on 60 years of age. His father was one of the early English settlers in this country, and he himself was a merchant; he married a native lady of the Errasquin family, and caused his children to be educated at Stonyhurst and other English schools. Esposing the business matters he acquired by degrees a number of estates in Uruguay, at prices ranging about \$800 per acre, and at his death left a large fortune to his children.

John Jackson and his brothers Peter and Albert were educated at Stonyhurst, after which John was placed a clerk in the house of Rathbone Brothers at Liverpool, one of his fellow-clerks being Mr. Lidstone, late Chairman of the Bank of England.

On his return to Montevideo he started a "barraza" for receiving hides and wool, and worked as hard as any of his employees, early in life, having inherited most of the enormous property of a large fortune from his father, and married Miss Huxtable, the worthy and amiable wife who suffered from the cholera in 1849.

Mr. Jackson was a man of great energy, often breaking into his house at midnight under the pretext of searching for arms, broke down his health and he proceeded to Europe to make a tour of Spain.

It happened, however, that he landed at Barcelona and a revolution occurred in that city, which so disgusted him that he left Spain at once. His brother Peter, who had remained in England, after leaving Stonyhurst and devoted himself to the turf, suddenly dropped dead on the race-course at the Derby. Soon afterwards the third brother, Albert, died on the Playa Ramirez, near Montevideo, having fallen in a life of pleasures of water. The only one of the sisters who married was the present Mrs. Heber, whose husband was a respectable German wool-broker; this gentleman's son, had he lived, would have inherited most of the enormous property of John, Peter and Albert Jackson and their sisters.

Our readers will remember the sad circumstances of his death a year ago, when he fell between the rafters of a magnificent mansion that Mr. Jackson was building for him at Plaza Cagancha, on his ending age. This young man's end may have affected Mr. Jackson's health, which was never robust.

Year after year the wealth and estates of Mr. Jackson and his sisters increased. The estates of Cerro Colorado and Mansuervilla, Timoteo are well-known, besides which the Beckons and others in Rio Negro, Tucumán and elsewhere. Whole blocks of houses in the city of Montevideo likewise belonged to Mr. Jackson, and it is estimated that his fortune must exceed \$200,000,000 in 1840-50 years. He was rather cautious than enterprising; nevertheless he was mainly instrumental (with the late Eugene O'Neill) in founding the Commercial Bank at Montevideo. In conjunction with Mr. Gilbey he built a dock at the Cerro, for repairing vessels. He was one of the founders of the Sociedad Pastoral del Tucumán, and of the Cultivo del Gold-mining Co. He kept aloof from politics, and from the Wild Cat speculations that caused such disaster to Montevideo in recent years.

He was shy and peculiar in his ways, living very retired and without a carriage. It was said that he had never been known to invite a friend to dinner. The world believed him penurious, and this may have been partly true.

But his defects were as nothing compared to the sound points of his character. He was true as steel every relation of life, the soul of honor and sincerity, and munificent in his deeds of charity. Although he disliked speaking English (and this was one of his peculiarities) in British subject in Montevideo ever appealed to him in vain for assistance. He sent home dressed families to England, paid for the funerals of poor people, and was, moreover, one of the principal men in the Society of St. Vincent de Paul. When the Yellow Fever broke out in 1857, he quitted his wife and home, to nurse the sick in the Caridad Hospital, and never returned to his house till the plague had ceased; his example had a splendid effect on the citizens. In 1864 he hastened, with some others, to rescue 5,000 citizens expelled during the siege of Paysandó, who had taken refuge on an island in the Uruguay, bringing them to Montevideo.

He built at his own expense, and his sisters supported wholly, an orphanage for 120 girls near Paso Molino, having brought out French Sisters of Charity from Bordeaux, to manage it; he built a beautiful church, *Santa Gotthelie*, alongside the orphanage. He and his sisters also bore a share in the building of the Franciscan nunnery and church near the Cordon. In 1880 he invited from Hutton Garden, London, the Fathers of the Mission, to found a Catholic English community at Montevideo, and on their arrival he presented them with a house and chapel, completely furnished.

Montevideo loses in him not only a man of prodigious wealth but of inflexible honesty. Nothing on earth would be able to induce Mr. Jackson to say or do that he considered unworthy. In this respect he was a "proux chevalier," and we echo the sentiments of our readers in tending to his bereaved widow the expression of our profound sympathy and regret. The Catholic religion loses in him a conscientious and generous benefactor.

BIRDS VERSUS LOCUSTS.

In a report recently issued in the U. States upon "Damage by Locusts," Professor Riley reviews the incursion of these troublesome insects, not only in the States, but also in Manitoba and Canada. The entomologist had an important staff of "field agents" at work observing the locusts, their habits and descriptions.

Mr. Coquillett was the special agent in California, and in his report he gives some curious particulars of the habits and descriptions of these locusts. Of course, among these were to be found a few of the large insectivorous birds, among them being the Californian butcher bird (*Lanius gambeli*), which in some districts, where there were not readily available for impaling insects, according to the habit of these birds, had adapted itself to circumstances by decorating the barbed wire fencing with a locust on the wire, and thus rendering it unpalatable to the locusts.

Among other species of birds feeding upon the locusts are the Arkansas kingbird. In confinement one of these birds would eat about 120 locusts in a day. Remains of these insects have been found in the stomachs of the great horned owl, burrowing owl, and sparrow. What struck the inspector especially was the comparative scarcity of locusts where the locusts occurred. This would suggest that these locust migrations are not so old or so regular as supposed; otherwise it is probable that some insectivorous bird would have adapted its habits to keep pace with the locust swarms. There is a lizard found preying upon locusts; it is called *Sceloporus occidentalis*, or western fence-lizard, and also the "Swift." They destroy large numbers of locusts. Among the insect enemies are a black wasp. The wasp catches these insects on the wing, and stipples them by several stings; the locust becomes motionless, when the wasp drags the larger insect into its burrow, where in due course emerges the offspring of the wasp. The wasps thus destroy large numbers of locusts.

No note is made of any fanged enemies of the locusts, nor of any internal disease which may be cultivated artificially and spread, so as to cause an epidemic among these devastating insects. It would be well worth while to carefully consider the subject of such artificial propagation of disease. It seems so hopeless with the present systems to cope with the millions of locusts which occasionally appear, that we may occasionally look in a new direction for the required aid. If only some epidemic disease can be artificially cultivated and spread, it seems within the bounds of possibility that some of us may live to see locusts as rare as the American plagues are as now the lions.
