tion of steam vessels, a hope which Dr. Elgar, an eminent authority, thinks is likely to be realized. The same kind of competition is appearing in India, and it is feared that a new departure in China may lead to the exclusion of foreign manufactures by the development of native industries, and the writer in the *Contemporary* considers the general outlook of the manufacturing and commercial interests of Great Britain as very threatening.

In looking for compensating offsets to these unsatisfactory prospects, the author of the article in question finds great consolation in the probable construction of the Nicaragua Canal, which will probably surprise the world some of these days. The coming importance of the Pacific, and the practical certainty of a new entrance into it by the Nicaragua canal, are cardinal facts of the present situation. The steady growth of Australia and New Zealand, the sudden rise to power of Japan, the probable future awakening of China, the construction of the trans-Asian railway by Russia, and her coming acquisition of an ice-free port, to supersede Vladivostok, the recent opening of lines of first-class steamers from Canada to Japan, and from Canada to Australia and New Zealand, are all important factors to the question. The effect of the Nicaraguan canal will be to restore the balance of commercial advantage as regards geographical position in favour of Great Britain, by providing an effective counterpoise westward to the inevitable and unfavourable eastward shifting of the centre of gravity of the world's trade due to the Suez canal. Thereby Great Britain will be placed once more at the centre.

The writer of this very able article has overlooked the great importance of the Transandine railway now rapidly approaching completion in this country, and also the very handy highway which the New Zealanders and Australians have made through the Straits of Magellan. The Nicaraguan canal is a scheme that has now been before the world for the last fifty years and never yet amounted to anything, and we very much doubt if it will ever possess any of the influences capable of shaping the national destinies to which the writer in the *Contemporary* so ably alludes.

## THE MAGDALENA'S MAIL.

TRIAL OF REFORM COMMITTEE.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S DESPATCH.

London, Feb. 28th.

The preliminary trial of the members of the Reform Committee was continued at Pretoria on Thursday and yesterday. Lieutenant Dekorte, of the Rand Police, gave evidence as to the action of the Reform Committee during the crisis. Mr. Eugene Marais, editor of "Land en Volk," said he attended the meeting of the Reform Committee on December 31 at the request of the Government, to which he conveyed a message from Messrs. Phillips and Leonard that they wished to settle matters peacefully. Three Johannesburg constables declared that they were insulted and hindered in the performance of their duty by the armed men in the streets. Arms and provisions were brought in and entrenchments dug. Another witness stated that in an interview which he had with Colonel Rhodes and Messrs. Leonard, Hay, and Lacey, in the Goldfields Offices, he was told by these gentlemen that Dr. Jameson was coming to Johannesburg, at their invitation, to preserve the peace. Yesterday a number of Johannesburg detectives were examined.

In a lengthy and important despatch on the Transvaal Crisis addressed by Mr. Chamberlain to Sir Hercules Robinson, the Secretary for the Colonies reviews the causes that led up to Dr. Jameson's raid, enumerates the grievances of the Uitlanders, and puts forward a scheme of reforms. He suggests that the Rand should be granted a limited Home Rule, and that President Kruger should, if possible, visit England. Mr. Chamberlain in speaking of the Convention of 1894 upholds in plain terms the rights of Great Britain over the external affairs of the Transvaal.

Replying to a deputation of farmers from the eastern counties, who waited upon him yesterday with reference to the subject of agricultural depression Mr. Balfour made a provisional statement as to the intention of the Government. He warned them, however, that it would be impossible for legislation to do all that they required. He confessed that, speaking for himself, he still retained the views he had long held on the currency question, which he regarded as a serious factor in the cause of agricultural distress.

Formal notice is given in the *Gazette* of the resignation of Mr. Shirress Willing the member for the Moutrose Burghs. Mr. Wilson, the Tory candidate for the Burghs, addressed a meeting at Forfar last night. An amendment against him was carried by a large majority.

Mr. Schwann, M.P., was last night elected President of the newly-formed Manchester 1895 Club, which has been established on the lines of the Eighty Club, to further Liberalism in the Manchester district.

Further progress was made yesterday with the trial of the Haggerston election petition. Early in the day Mr. Justice Wright announced that the Court would not trouble Mr. Dickens with regard to the personation cases or Rollin's case. There were, however, three distinct matters that he must apply himself to. The first was the excess of the maximum expenses, the second the charge against Mr. Lowles in respect to the distribution of tickets, and the third the charge against Protheroe. Mr. Dickens then addressed the Court on these points. Mr. Willis began his reply for the petitioner, but had not concluded at the adjournment.

Over two thousand birds have been entered for competition in the Annual Exhibition of Canaries and British and Foreign Cage Birds, to be opened to the public at the Crystal Palace to-day and continued till Wednesday evening.

At the Kempton Park February Meeting the National Hunt Flag Race was secured by Baccarat, the Surbiton Handicap Steeplechase by Gladness, the Halford Maiden Hurdle Race by Quilon, the Park Hurdle Handicap by Delvin, the Stewards' Steeplechase by Forester, the Thames Valley Hurdle Race by Hiatius, and the Littleton Steeplechase by Prince Edward.

On Wednesday the remains of the late Prince Henry of Battenberg were deposited in Whippingham Church, in the presence of the Queen.

On Monday the body of the late Lord Leighton was laid to rest in St. Paul's Cathedral, where on the following day the funeral service of the late Sir Joseph Barnby was held.

The Brixton election has produced an overwhelming Unionist majority, and Mr. Storey has failed to unseat his Unionist opponent at Sunderland. Mr. Asquith has taken part in a London demonstration against the claims of the voluntary schools, and among other speakers briefly reported are Mr. Mundella and Mr. Labouchere. Mr. Gladstone has been expressing an opinion on the Egyptian question. Mr. Rhodes has arrived from South Africa, but declines to be interviewed. In Irish politics the only incident of importance is the resignation of his leadership by Mr. Justin McCarthy.

Sir Howard Vincent and Col. Bridgeman write in opposition to the report of the Prison-made Goods Committee, and among other matters dealt with in letters which we quote are the proposal to grant degrees to women at Oxford and Cambridge, the neglect of London shipbuilders by the Admiralty, the defacement of scenery by advertisements, the latent military strength of our country the management of the National Lifeboat Institution, and the spread of rabies. In this last connexion a muzzling order has been resolved on by the London County Council.

After Chipperfield, the young clerk who was accused of the murder of his wife in a cab at Islington in December last, was yesterday indicted for the crime at the Central Criminal Court and convicted notwithstanding an attempt by his counsel to show that the woman might have died by her own hand. When Mr. Justice Lawrence passed sentence of death, concluding with the usual formula, "May the Lord have mercy on your soul," the prisoner callously added, "and yours as well."

Remarkable evidence was given at an inquest on the wife of the Revd. Dr. Stephen Sheppard Maguth, who blew out her brains at Nunhead on Sunday last. The husband admitted that he met the deceased in September last, visited her repeatedly, and made her an allowance. He called her "Magdalene," loved her very much, and thought that he could make a bright woman out of an unfortunate. The jury found that Mrs. Maguth committed suicide while of unsound mind.

It appears from the Board of Trade Returns, issued, that during January exports increased by 2,903,000, or 15.8 per cent, and imports by 1,730,000, or 4.7 per cent.

The Stock Markets were quiet yesterday, but apart from a few realisations prior to the settlement next week the tone was fairly steady. Consols hardened to 108 3/16 and the account. South Africa mining shares were active and firmer in tone, while in miscellaneous markets the feature was a sharp rise in Allsopp and Guinness Ordinary stocks. 185,000, in gold was taken out of the Bank for export. Silver rose to 30 1/2 p. per ounce.

## THE NEW NAVAL PROGRAMME.

AN OUTLAY OF £9,500,000.

FOURTEEN WAR-SHIPS AND SIXTY TORPEDO DESTROYERS TO BE BUILT.

London, Feb. 28th.

The *Glasgow Herald's* London naval correspondent states that the forthcoming British naval programme will involve an outlay of nine and a half millions sterling, of which £5,500,000 will be given out to private contractors.

The vessels to be built are four battleships, to cost £750,000 each; four first-class cruisers, to cost £460,000 each; six third-class cruisers, to cost £180,000 each; and sixty torpedo destroyers, costing £60,000 apiece.

The total displacement of the new vessels will be 136,600 tons, and the total

horse-power 560,000. The machinery will be given out as private contracts. One battle-ship, three first-class cruisers, five third-class cruisers, and the whole of the destroyers will be built in private yards.

It is possible that the number of third-class cruisers may be increased. One battle-ship will be built at Chatham, one at Portsmouth, and one at Devonport, and the fourth, as stated, will be contracted for.

These vessels will be of similar type to the *Renown*, but rather longer and of more beam. The first-class cruisers will be of the *Pelorus* type, while the torpedo destroyers will have a speed of from thirty to thirty-three knots.

A correspondent at Sheerness says:—The new twenty-seven knot torpedo-boat destroyers, *Dragon*, *Janus*, and *Contest*, were passed out of the dockyards at Sheerness this morning as ready to commence their duties. The vessels have been commissioned for the training of engine-room ratings attached to the depot ship *Pembroke* in the working of water-tube boilers. They have been in the dockyard to fit engine and boiler-rooms with the electric light.

The tug *Meteor* passed up the River Medway this afternoon, for Chatham, towing the new torpedo-boat destroyer *Opossum*. The *Opossum* was to have carried out her gun trials to-day, and it is supposed she is temporarily disabled.

Bankers and financiers (says the London correspondent of the *Scotsman*) were a good deal exercised in their minds by the announcement that after the holding of the Cabinet Council on Tuesday Lord Rothschild had an interview of some duration with the First Lord of the Treasury. The impression created was that the meeting was connected with some impending financial operation of magnitude, probably relating to an increase in the navy. Recent events and the accompanying naval and military expenditure have led to a considerable expenditure, and the belief is that very extensive outlays of a permanent character are in contemplation which may entail further heavy outlays, that will have to be provided for by means of borrowing. The speculations indulged in were of a more or less vague character; but the idea was widely entertained that the naval and military spending departments will be very busy for some time to come. It was therefore not unnatural that Lombard-street should have assumed a more conservative attitude, which it did by hardening the discount rates.

## NEW MARKET FOR OUR WHEAT.

FAILURE OF AUSTRALIAN CROPS.

No less an authority than *Bradstreet* writes:—

"All cereal crops throughout Australia have suffered from the drought, and it appears to be absolutely certain that not only will the colonies be unable to export wheat, but that they will have to import. The Queensland wheat crop, always inconsiderable, is almost nil; the New South Wales and Victoria crops are estimated at about one-half of those of last season, and the South Australian at something less than last season. As the harvest is not yet finished, these estimates must be regarded as provisional, but assuming them to be fairly correct the position for 1895-96 will be something like this, viz.:

The deficiency is thus likely to exceed 5,000,000 bushels, but towards this there are the stocks to be brought forward to the new season. The net deficiency will be made up chiefly by importations from San Francisco, from which port there are already three or four cargoes engaged for Sydney.

The much-prized South African demand for Australian wheat and flour cannot be met during the new season, and the question remains to be solved, whence will the Cape draw its supplies? New York may be able to secure a portion of the trade and San Francisco another portion; but the nearest source of supply is the River Plate, and Rosario and Buenos Ayres may obtain a footing in the Australian breadstuffs market during 1896.

The Australian barley crops will be exceedingly light, and for the chevalier description recourse will doubtless be had to San Francisco, as in previous years of scarcity. Oats and hay are also light crops, and fodder of every description is going up rapidly in price. With suitable shipping arrangements, steam being preferred to rail, the River Plate should be able to find a good Australian market for hay and maize during the coming months.

## LONDON LETTER.

"IMPERIUM IN EMPORIO."

(From Our Own Correspondent.)

January 29th.

In the *Westminster Gazette* of the 27th inst. the heading I have taken forms the motto under the royal arms over the porch of "The British Empire, unlimited—The Greatest Show on Earth—All the Best Bits Secured—See our Special Line in Crown Colonies—Under the Personal management of Mr. Joseph Pushful."

It is not often that our political caricaturists are very profound, but Mr. Gould is a politician as well as an artist. By accident or design he is a hard hitter. He is now one of the editorial staff of the paper his pen and pencil adorn. He is allowed full liberty. His caricatures do not always tally with the sentiments of the journal, but they fully represent a strong and sound type of Radicalism above ordinary party prejudices and unsifted by middle-class cant and virtuous fads. In the *Times* of the same date—27th—you will find the first connected and authentic account we have received of the Jameson raid. I refer to the *Times* because it has space for full reports. Otherwise all the papers contain the same account in various degrees of abbreviation. It is taken from the *Cape Times*, and is a report of an interview with Captain Thatcher, a volunteer aide-de-camp of Sir E. Willoughby, the military chief of the Jameson expedition. Captain Thatcher joined the troops as they crossed the frontier, and gives a faithful narrative of the ride, the attack, the defeat, the dropping freely of the men, and of the final surrender. He himself, not being in uniform, escaped by pretending to be a newspaper correspondent. The dear good natured Boers, who almost shed tears at the sight of some of our youthful troopers they had to shoot at, and who afterwards treated their prisoners so well, were equally obliging to the "correspondent." He was tall and thin, and got through the lines comically dressed in the clothes of a kind burgher who was short and fat. My business at this moment is not the narrative. But I may say from Captain Thatcher's account, that our early information was more or less correct. The nominally English troopers—they were mostly Afrikaners, or what we should call Creoles—numbered 480. The rest, making up the total of between 600 and 700, were blacks—that is to say native horse-leaders and bearers. Captain Thatcher describes the battles at Krugersdorp and Poornkop as a fight between the troopers in the open and "puffs of smoke." After the surrender the Boers, hitherto invisible, seemed to start out of the earth in all directions and swarmed round the ill-fated band. The number of the Boers he estimates at 8,000 to 4,000. This, however, may be exaggerated. But Thatcher is an old soldier who has seen a great deal of service in India and elsewhere. His narrative is plain and unvarnished. He is not likely to be much mistaken. He says the Bechuana police were the finest body of men he ever saw, and Jameson is the finest fellow that ever breathed. In addition to the documents named, I must draw your attention to a letter published in *Ons Land* from Mr. Schreiner, late Attorney-General of Cape Colony, and consequently a colleague of Mr. Cecil Rhodes. Mr. Schreiner denounces the whole affair at Johannesburg and Mafeking as a "Capitalist conspiracy." You will also see of about the same date certain opinions of the provincial press in England and Scotland in regard to the celebrated letter sent by the Uitlanders in Johannesburg to Dr. Jameson. Of this letter there seem to be different versions. One published by the *Times* on January 1st! Another by *Ruter* which was received via Berlin. The supposition is that the letter published so early by the *Times* never came from Jameson or from Mafeking but from Capetown only, where like its duplicate or rough draft in Johannesburg it had been kept in readiness by the conspirators. Like Jameson's impetuous ride, the publication of the letter in the *Times*—the London organ of the conspiracy—was premature. The whole thing was blundered, and it was finally smashed by the astuteness of "Oom Paul," who entertained the revolutionists in Johannesburg with an armistice while he netted Jameson and his men.

This, as you see, is the old idea we had from the first, but we had no evidence beyond imperfect telegraphic despatches. Evidence now abounds that Jameson and his troopers were to have been followed by the Rhodesian horse from Bulawayo, and that everyone excepting the British Government and the dual directors of the Chartered Company in London knew that the objective of the forces collected on the Transvaal frontier was Johannesburg. Some have the audacity to say that the motive of all these military preparations was to indemnify the Chartered Company for its disappointments in gold-seeking in Mashouland and Matabeleland by the possession of the mineral wealth of the Rand; others with more charity and we hope more truth, say the only object was to hasten the conservative Boer mind in acknowledging the necessity of granting civil rights and religious education to immigrants in the South African Republic.

Of these matters we shall know more when the "Moor" with Mr. Cecil Rhodes arrives. Bad luck seems to follow him. The ship's machinery broke down. She will be three or four days late. Jameson for his sins of impetuosity is appropriately doomed to steam 8 to 10 knots in an old transport, Parliament, which assembles on the 11th prox. will be getting into train when he lands amid the cheers of an enthusiastic populace who see no wrong in the man who risks his life to save women and children and for the honour of "Mother England." This is the title of a patriotic song sung nightly by Mr. Colin Cooper in the "Shop Girl" at the Gaiety. The character he takes is that of a returned colonial millionaire. His get-up is superb, and he sings with all the energy and action of a fat business man whose voice—such as he has—is suffocated by "fizz" and the fumes of patriotic sentiment. When we think of all this, why does Mr. Gould caricature the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain? He at least, if he contributed to the capture of Jameson, saved the nation from the charge of filibustering. Mr. Gould must have thought that Mr. Pushful, like Esop's trumpeter, incited others to filibuster. In a mild way he did. One can filibuster with "special lines" as well as with rifles and maxims. The Germans are adepts at special lines and hate us as rivals. For the same reason they are not prodigal in their applause of their Emperor's late action towards this country. I am told that two rascally young medical students knocked a German's hat over his eyes in a London street a day or two ago. As soon as he could see and find his voice he said—"You think because the German Emperor is a fool we are all dam fools?" The German, I am informed, turned red and gave the students a good drubbing. I hope he did. The Germans, as you will see again by this mail, although I have alluded to the subject in my late letters, are very sore at finding their English business falling off. They say it is not because the English provincials boycott German goods, as they will always buy the cheapest goods, whosever's they are, but because the political situation has fairly roused the English merchants and manufacturers to emulate the industry and pushfulness of the German commercial travellers. This "pushfulness" used to be called by many virtuous epithets, such as perseverance, emulation, competition, and inculcated in the young mind as one of the noblest of qualities. Parson, pedagogue and professor of political economy meant well. Not being philosophers, they did not remember that in the abstract there are no such things as virtues and vices. Practically a vice may be an exaggerated virtue; a diseased acquisitiveness becomes lust. Many of the wonders of our century have been due to capitalism, under the style of "finance"; it has become corrupt, and at this moment befouls Paris and Berlin, London, New York and Johannesburg. The attendant red spectre is after all war, not socialism. Socialism glows rather with the coming sun that will not foster such growths as Panama and Tonquin, Goults, Balfours, Rhodes, "pushful Joes" and German bagmen.

## LA PLATA.

(From our own Correspondent.)

Feb. 28th.

The law dated 24th January 1894 authorized the Government to sell 400,000 square metres of land in this city. In October 1887 it was found that 426,504 metres had been conceded, presumably for the establishment of factories and business in accordance with the terms of the law. Besides these lands a very large amount in the quintas had also been conceded. The Engineers' Department recently asked the Ministry of Public Works for information about all these lands but owing to the woful state of the Government records all that is known is that 373,244 square metres were actually granted with title-deeds. Amongst the names of those who secured grants are those of Mackern and Maclean for a printing establishment and of Luis M. Campos for a stud! In the the majority of cases as may be supposed the concessionaires have never established the businesses for which the lands were solicited.

The Directors of the Provincial Bank decided to-day that as soon as the moratorium law has been promulgated their functions must cease. To-day 14 is the number on the Board but the new law provides for only 6.

## EDITOR'S TABLE.

The tenour of things in general yesterday was even as a billiard table or an editor's temper. Politicians were in a peripatetic as usual; but this is nothing new. The Chilean question was still fast asleep, at least as far as the public was allowed to know. Old Everybody said he was beginning to think at last that the confounded imbroglio will end in blessed peace. Havas announces that "les braves Belges," unwarned by the fix in which the Italians find themselves in Abyssinia, are going to declare war on the derelicts of the Congo. That Dark Continent is becoming a regular cockpit. We weep to see that our Brazilian as well as our Chilean friends are going to the financial dogs. The rate of exchange in Rio yesterday was the lowest on record.

What a sell for our truly unfortunate junior editor! The passengers of the *Bresil* were sent to quarantine yesterday on Martin Garcia, owing to the "casos sospechosos" on board. If he had only come up in the river steamer when he went on shore at Montevideo to embrace Stand-by O'Gorman he was all right. To be quarantined with Horace's lost ode to Erin in his pocket is really too bad. It is the first of the great poet's odes that has ever been quarantined.

We feel great pleasure in welcoming home our gallant and distinguished friend General Mansilla, who has arrived in the R.M.S. Magdalena, and looks twenty years younger after his short sojourn in the old world.

Spain is on the edge of a row with Uncle Sam for the sympathy shown for Cuba in his Senate. The Madrid papers are waxing furious, and there is a good chance of the United States Legation having a visit from an angry mob.

One man's meat is another's poison. In Australia they have had such awful heat and drought that 80 people per day dropped dead in the streets, and it was not safe to go out except at night. The crops are all burned up, and the losses in flocks and herds are enormous. Then came a fearful "temporal" that did as much or more damage than the drought.

We pity our Australian cousins, but their misfortunes won't do Argentina any harm. Quite the contrary.

There is something wrong with the telegraph office at the North Pole. Dozens of telegrams have been sent to Nansen asking him how he is enjoying himself there, but he hasn't answered any of them.

Vive la France! The birth rate is at last rising in fair France, and the death rate decreasing. 1894 shows an increase of 39,768 births and a diminution of 51,906 deaths. M. Leroy Beaulieu, in an interview on this grave subject, declared that so far the only hope of augmenting the population lies in the decrease of deaths. The causes of the falling off lie in the structure of French society, legally and morally. The postponement of marriages until late in life, the restrictions put upon child labour in the poorer classes, and even the feminine movement which, by providing women with work, makes marriage no longer their only settlement in life, all help, according to the noted political economist, to cause a dwindling of births, which will eventually make itself felt all over the world. This is by no means a pleasant outlook; but Monsieur Prettyplace is by no means infallible, and has now and again expressed peculiar notions about Argentine currency.

Did you ever ladies? At the Kermesse in Montevideo the Committee made the tremendous mistake of entrusting the sale of the Cédulas to men. Only a few were sold, till several lovely girls came forward, and then the business began to "hum", and some 9,200 went off like rockets.

The end of the world must be at hand. The most astounding thing on record is now taking place in France, where a mountain on the river Gard is moving towards the stream at the pace of fifteen feet daily. The noise it makes while moving is the most awful thing ever heard on earth. Thousands of people gaze at the spectacle speechless with awe. In its progress towards the river the mountain has destroyed several valuable mines. Moving mountains, photographs of the invisible; cures for hitherto incurable diseases; wars and rumors of wars; flying machines, etc., etc. Are not these some of the Biblical signs of the Wind-Up?

In the height of the excitement about President Cleveland's Message, the New York Tribune began a slashing article on the situation with the following most amusing exordium:—"There are portents in the sky. Birds for some time have been flying crooked. Chickens bought in the open market have been sent home without giblets. Dogs of high pedigree have shown symptoms of usefulness by barking opportunely and catching something in the nature of the marauder besides the omnipresent flea. High class cats have convened and taken steps—chiefly back steps—toward a more unanimous understanding. These things are

not to be laughed off. Cicero, of course, treated this kind of thing in a vein of levity when he said that the fact that mice had eaten up his volume of Plato's Republic gave him no anxiety for the safety of the commonwealth; but Cicero said a whole lot of things that are out of date. As, for instance, nothing that he ever said could count in favour of the Boers in the now raging international controversy; because he was an augur himself. But aside from the portents of birds, dogs, and cats, everything else that carries omens and makes business for soothsayers is loaded gunwale-deep with presages and warnings such as have not been observed since the various Olympian gods got mixed up in the difficulties around Troy. (Priam's, not Edward Murphy's) There's trouble everywhere. The ghost of James Monroe hovers over Venezuela, saying "Hands off!" Cuba is between hay and grass, and in an unsettled condition; Denmark wants to sell us the Windward Islands; Hawaii has only half settled down from an eruption of Mauna Loa, a revolution and a stiff rebuke from her nearest relation; Italy is having a heap of trouble with dependencies so remote that until it broke out no one ever supposed she had ever sent so much as an organ-grinder to them; Turkey has opened a slaughter-house in Armenia, to which all the world objects, but no one really kicks; there's a row in South Africa that threatens to embroil all creation; the Kaiser has stirred up his grand-mother; and Grose is in eruption because he cannot get his Sunday beer at a side door. Everything wears a dreadful aspect."

### ON 'CHANGE.

Friday, February 28th 1896.  
Gold Premium.

FIRST RING ..... 201.70%

SECOND RING ..... 200.50%

The gold market turned, reeled, and  
plunged this morning, proving to satis-  
faction that the February situation is near-  
ly liquidated and that gold will remain  
over. The speculation was active and  
feverish, and the fall in the premium was  
sharp and sudden. The supply of gold  
was much heavier than expected, and  
brokers displayed some eagerness to-day,  
as well as anxiety, when confronting ac-  
counts. Affairs promise to go off smooth-  
ly enough, comparatively speaking.

The news from London continues cheer-  
ful. Argentine Funding Bonds in Capel  
Court held out this morning at 83 1/4—top  
price up to date. The Public Works  
Loan was quoted at 76—top price also.  
The boom in that quarter shows no signs  
of fizzling, but we remark that there are  
no fresh orders from London, Berlin, or  
Frankfurt-am Main to buy National Cedu-  
las, Internal scrip, or Municipal Bonds.  
It is said that yesterday a large amount  
of National Cédulas F was offered to a  
leading house, but refused, as the limits  
from Europe are 85.

Produce news was favorable. Wool is  
firm on the Continent and wheat is rising  
in Antwerp on the strength of the advices  
cabled from here that over half of the  
wheat crop is lost and the export will  
show an enormous deficit, compared with  
last year. Thus affairs all round favored  
the fall in gold, more especially the fact  
that the heavy covering operations of  
the gold bears were nearly finished. Over  
half a million gold changed hands for  
cash; the premium opened at 204 1/4, fell  
headlong to 201 1/4, and closed at 201.70  
%. Three hundred thousand dollars  
were sold for to-morrow; the premium  
opened at 204 1/4, fell to 201.60%, and  
closed at 201.70%. A quarter of a mil-  
lion was sold for the end of March; the  
premium opened at 207.50%, fell to 204.50  
%, and closed at 206 1/4—say 4.80 points  
contango. About one hundred thousand  
dollars were sold for the end of April;  
the premium opened at 210 1/4, fell to 208  
%, and closed at 210 1/4—say 8.30 points  
contango. It is well to watch the heavy  
difference paid in time bargains. The  
gold business of the first ring this morn-  
ing exceeded 1 1/4 million dollars.

Stocks and shares displayed a some-  
what more variegated array to-day, but  
there was not much business done. Na-  
tional Cédulas F were quoted at 84.50.  
La Plata Cédulas stood their ground at  
19.30—the Series P advanced to 20.70,  
Series N at 19.20. Internal Bonds of 1891  
rose slightly to 76.80. Banco de Comer-  
cio shares were quoted in advance also at  
65 1/4. Spanish Bank at 110.50. Catalinas  
shares receded to 4.80. One hundred  
shares of the Colonizadora del Riachuelo  
changed hands at 10.50.

The comparative Budget figures, rated  
at different gold premiums, which we  
published in our last, were the main topic  
of discussion at the ring and in the hall  
to-day, and spread a pretty general con-  
viction that the National Government will  
not view with favor any decline in the gold  
premium under 200 %. It is not prob-  
able, therefore, that any heavy specula-  
tion to force gold down much lower can  
succeed, since the interests of the National  
Treasury are jeopardized thereby. We  
may here call attention to the change  
made by Minister Romero in the "modus  
operandi" of the Treasury. His prede-  
cessor, Dr. Terry, used to hoard paper  
money in the Banco de la Nación, but Dr.  
Romero is a wise man in his generation  
and hoards gold in the Bank of England;  
this latter policy is decidedly the better  
one, and we see that the Government has  
safely lodged in London all the money  
needed for debt service till near the end  
of the year. Dr. Romero has always a  
substantial gold balance on hand.
