yet you give me this warm welcome. Whatever blame attaches to me you are yet glad to see me back, recognising the higher motives upon which I acted. I still hope that by steady action we shall arrive at the object we all desire, that is securing just rights for every white man south of the Zambesi." Mr. Rhodes accused the Africaner Bund of dividing its energies on two main objects. "One of which was a South African Republic and another the destruction of himself." In forming these resolutions Mr. Rhodes observed that the Africaner Bund had submitted to the dictation of a foreign state. After the crowd had sung the National Anthem Mr. Rhodes drove in his own cart to Groote-Schuur. Mr. Schirmer was present during the reception. He was a fellow passenger of Mr. Rhodes in the Tantallon Castle, and received when on board about as much notice as the mate of the steamer did. The ships in the docks were all decorated with bunting, and English houses in the town displayed the Union Jack in honour of Mr. Rhodes's arrival.

The British squadron under Admiral Rawson is now in Delagoa Bay. Lord Salisbury is anxious for peace and quietude, but Chamberlain, Goschen and Co., are longing to proceed to business.

**DEMAND FOR PROSECUTION.**

**MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S REPLY TO PRETORIA**

**PUBLICATION OF THE OFFICIAL CORRESPONDENCE**

A Blue-book has been issued dealing with a variety of subjects concerning affairs in South Africa. Among the despatches is one from Lieutenant-General Goodenough, who on June 19 last forwarded to Mr. Chamberlain the following telegram received from the Government of the South African Republic:

"Acting under instructions I have the honour to acquaint your Excellency, for the information of her Majesty's Government, that with a view to the welfare and peace of South Africa this Government is convinced that the proofs in the possession and at the disposal of her Majesty's Government now completely justify and compel the bringing to trial of Messrs. Cecil Rhodes, Alfred Beit, and Dr. Rutherford Harris, as has already been done with Dr. Jameson and his accomplices. In the interests of all South Africa this Government feels itself obliged to press the taking of this step upon her Majesty's Government. I have also the honour to request your Excellency to communicate this despatch by cable to her Majesty's Government in London.

"This Government regards with great regret the delay in the matter of the inquiry with respect to the complicity and responsibility of the British South African Company in connexion with the raid of Dr. Jameson and his band within the territory of this Republic. This Government considers it its right duty to press for a speedy holding of the inquiry, not merely because it is the injured party, but also because of its interest and share in the well-being of South Africa, whose interests, as repeatedly intimated, are also dear to her Majesty the Queen. This Government is also convinced that it is urgently necessary that the entire control and administration, as well civil as military, be taken out of the hands of the British South Africa Company, and transferred to her Majesty's Government, and I am instructed to press this point on behalf of this Government. I have further the honour to request your Excellency to cable this despatch to her Majesty's Government in London."

Mr. Chamberlain on June 25 telegraphed the following reply to Lieutenant-General Goodenough:

"Inform Government of South African Republic that her Majesty's Government have received their telegrams of June 19, which were published in London almost simultaneously with their receipt by me. Her Majesty's Government do not require to be reminded of their duty in regard to recent invasion of South African Republic to dictate time and manner in which they shall fulfill their obligations. I am unable to understand the reasons which have influenced Government of South African Republic to make representations which are inconsistent with their previous statements. On April 18 and on May 15 the Government of the Republic appeared to be satisfied with the assurance given them by her Majesty's Government, from which there has never been any intention of departing. It would not be in accordance with English ideas of justice to condemn British South Africa Company and deal with its powers as proposed in telegrams before inquiry had been made, and before the Company had been heard in its own defence. With regard to the demand of the Government of South African Republic, that the three gentlemen specifically named shall now be placed on their trial, you will remind them that her Majesty's Government can only act in this matter upon the advice of the Law Officers of the Crown and in accordance with the principles of English law."

**LADIES' LETTER.**

(From our own Correspondent.)

Paris, April 24th 1897.

There are two Women's Rights Leagues in Paris; one is led by Madame Schmahls, the other by Madame Hubertine Auclerc. The first lady leads the moderates, who aim to redress the legal inequalities their sex labors under by degrees; they are "contented in little, but canti in mair". The second demands out-and-out, and instanter, perfect equality for the sexes; she is a Madame Rupert in her tournaments against those who differ from her, whether male or female. She denounces the Prefect of Police because he declined to allow the divorced Princess de Chimay, born Clara Ward, and an American, from giving "tableaux vivants" representations at a Music Hall. The Princess is still rich, and eloped with a Bohemian gipsy fiddler, and lives with him. He is followed everywhere by his wife and three children, the funds being subscribed by persons who have decided to punish the "divorcee" in that manner. The Prefect did not prevent the Princess from appearing in animated pictures with the scantiest of clothing. As it was well-known her appearance would create a riot, for her conduct exasperated the public, and who had pity for her two young children in the custody of their father, he said to the manager: "I cannot prohibit your representation, but on the first appearance of disorder, I shall shut up your establishment". He would do the same if the performer had been a man likely to cause a riot.

Madame Auclerc cannot find in all this any injustice towards our sex. The Princess disgraces us by her conduct. She and Rigo visited the Salon in the Champs Elysees on the day before the formal opening, and known as the "Vernissage". The crowd hooted and hissed them, and might have gone to extremes, only the police rescued them in time. Her relatives intend to impound her fortune, and to demand that she be examined by six leading all-wits. A divorced woman, though she has been accorded the right to see her children once a month, cannot be allowed, in their interests, to pursue a life that Society unanimously reprobates.

Easter was rather dull; but there is much to excuse the lack of mirth. The season is unpropitious for high spirits, and the Shadow of War overshadows the Continent. Many go as far as to assert, they can "hear the beatings of the wings of the Angel of Death". The churches never were more crowded, especially by women; it is ever the case in troubled times; "per contra" men repair to the theatres to find oblivion for their cares; or rather to the Cafés Concerts, which are in a fair way of emptying all the theatres. Not many people quitted Paris for the holidays; the war broke out so inopportune. The same motive may account for the absence of excursionists. Citizens do not appear to be in any hurry to secure summer residences. I was round several of the attractive suburbs a few days ago, and the number of houses to sell or let, and of apartments disengaged, was unusually large. This is the more significant, as Parisians generally commence to make their migratory arrangements in February. The early bird gets the early worm; only this year the birds are absent.

I cannot recall if the Spanish Embassy ever threw open its grounds and rooms—and both are splendid—for a Fancy Fair. The end of June is spoken of as likely to witness a gathering of this character, to collect funds for the Sick and Wounded of the armies engaged in the wars in Philippines and Cuba. Spanish families are prepared to well stock the booths with free, will offerings, and as the Spanish ladies—all beauties—are intended to preside at the counters in native costumes, the Fair should be a thumping success. In the matter of helping forward any good work, Paris is inexhaustible in practical aid and ingenuity. All Red Cross Knights and Ladies instinctively feel plenty of work is being prepared for them.

Ought collegians, from a certain age, be afforded facilities, as on board men-of-war, to smoke a cigarette when at college? Many object, but the few see no harm, if the privilege be limited and not abused. Many students get into terrible scrapes by smoking anything when tobacco cannot be obtained. Extern students are envied because they can burn a cigarette or indulge in a weed. The Rectors of the colleges will not listen to any proposition for controlled smoking in the establishment in any form. They have the medical attendants on their side and also the mothers; but the students threaten open rebellion, and hint a general strike in the matter of studies if some rational concession be not accorded them. Why not, it is asked, have as in the case of the soldiers barracks, a canteen to supply authorised students to purchase cigarettes? It is such a *fin de siècle* time that perhaps parents may yet find in the details of the Lyceum bill, an item for tobacco.

The Butchers' Society are again urging the Lord Mayor to crush the poor-hawkers of meat in the streets. Every year there is a fresh attack made on these unfortunate men. For pity's sake let them alone.

**ARGENTINA IN IRELAND.**

(From a fair Correspondent.)

Cork, Ireland 21st.

Dear STANDARD, Yesterday a bunch of Buenos Aires papers came to remind me of the "land of my adoption," and make me rejoice that I had left it temporarily for the "land of my birth." I read that you have been having a tropical summer of seven months' duration—that it has not rained in places for two months. Well, just read the enclosed cutting from the "Cork Examiner," and you will be able to judge of the kind of weather or rather spring, we are having in the South of Ireland. When I add that my stay here has extended over four months of incessant rain, that it was "misting" when I landed, that there has not been a dry week since last October, and that it is and has been raining since Monday night, you will readily understand that we are having too much of a good thing too. Why are not the goods of this world more evenly distributed, and how can agriculture, industry, or anything else prosper in a country like this where it rains incessantly and abnormally? Nevertheless, after an absence of nearly twelve years, I find things and people rather improved. There is apparently less poverty, and depression in trade, if it exists, is not much heard of, neither is the cry of "bad times." Not being a political economist, or member of "Recess Committees," I can offer no explanation of this apparently satisfactory state of things. I leave it to you to comment on sagaciously in your "Editor's Table," which I perceive has not lost its wonted breeziness, spite of your being "floored by the heat," and frizzling in your own fat. I could do with a little of that sensation just now. It tries to freeze off and on, to vary the monotony of the rain, but abandons the attempt before morning, and turns on the waterworks again. I am rejuvenating under the process, and when I go back to Buenos Aires, I mean to take ten years of my real age, and look twenty years younger than I did when I started for "el viejo mundo" last November—availing of the privilege universally accorded to my sex and its weaknesses. If ever any one did "propaganda" for the Argentine, and that gratuitously too, say "yo." You might bring the matter before Congress, or the Minister of Foreign Affairs, or anybody you like well enough. I deserve at least a vote of thanks—a form of mutual admiration largely cultivated in Boards of guardians and Town Councils in this, my native city.

"Hasta la vuelta," dear STANDARD—"le prochain retour."—I pine for sunshine and blue skies. Meanwhile,

Sir—The following particulars of rainfall as recorded here from the 1st March to the 17th inst., will doubtless prove of interest.

During this period of 47 days there has only been 6 days of absolute drought, viz.,—when less than 1-100 of an inch was recorded—leaving 41 "wet" days. The average for the corresponding periods during the preceding five years, the only figures at my command, being 27 "dry" and 20 "wet". The total fall has been 8.90 inches, an excess over average of no less than 5.52 inches, and of no less than 7.72 inches over the total for the same period of 1895.

Perhaps the most remarkable feature of the present season has been the frequency of heavy falls, for on no less than 15 days in the period under review the amount recorded has exceeded a quarter of an inch, while four more were within three hundredths of this amount.

This is a wonderful contrast to the number of such falls during the corresponding periods, when the average number was only four, and in two of them only one!

Small wonder that farmers are growing uneasy at the sodden state of tillage lands.—Yours, &c.,

**HORSES FOR THE BRITISH ARMY.**

May, 14th 1897.

Thursday was a red letter day at Curumalan, on account of the visit of the British Officers forming the commission sent to this country for the purpose of buying horses for the British Government. The party, consisting of Colonel Treman, Major Wood, Captain Peters and two Veterinary Surgeons, accompanied by Mr. Murray their general agent, arrived by the mid-day train in a special carriage under the care of Mr. Miles G. Pasman, President of the Curumalan Society, and were welcomed at the house by Mr. Smith, the Manager, and his wife, who is well known to be the most charming hostess in the Province of Buenos Ayres. After lunch the party rode to the mountains to inspect the potros, but owing to the great demand both by this Government and by the Police on the Curumalan 5-year-olds, the number of these was somewhat limited, the best having been picked out; nevertheless a good few of them were purchased.

On the following day several more horses were bought and the racing stud examined, this last being very favourably commented on by Major Wood, one of the best living authorities on racing stock.

The "clon" of the day was the "domada," which offered great amusement to the visitors, this being their first view of the splendid riding qualities of Argentine horsemen; eight potros were saddled, one being ridden bareback. As regard polo, the officers say that they will have but little time to indulge in this form of sport, as they expect to be very busy trying to get two shipments of horses off to Africa before the end of June. The officers left by the night train for Colina, well pleased with their visit, and will inspect several other estancias before returning to Buenos Aires.

**SPORT.**

NOTES AND ANTICIPATIONS.

There is a splendid card for discussion to-day, and as the weather looks like holding up, we have every prospect of seeing a big attendance and good sport. The track has had ample time to be in trim again, so that we are not likely to see many big upsets, though that the favourite should win with entries plentiful as sloes and so many horses running into form, is hardly probable. However, this will give additional interest to the picking. The classic is knotty in the extreme. For the Luro Stakes, \$4,000, 1100 metres, with penalties, we have over 51 entries, amongst them many who have not yet sported silk, though enjoying a great stable reputation. However, it very rarely pays to take any heed of stable talk, and the task of sifting should be confined to the names of Balazore, 25 de Mayo, Pillito, Yanguetru, Devona and perhaps General Hornos. Pillito will undoubtedly be well backed and probably made favourite, but we fancy Yanguetru has the legs of everything, and still pin our flag to him. Then Glycinia, trained in the same stable, should account for the second event on her last running, as she finished well in front of some good performers. The Selling Stakes lies between Rigolo, Flecha and Independente, a gift for the Stud Paris horse in any kind of condition, though we prefer to place our trust in the Lincoln colt until Rigolo has done something worthy of his antecedents. Veras seems to have got some of his old form back, and might win the 2500 metres with 46 kilos; still Alcide will undoubtedly run well with 56 kilos and carry more confidence. The sprint lies between Favette, Voladora and Damara, and it is about a toss up which will win. Pickpocket will probably win the Mile and Don Gonzalo the last, which makes our selections.

**LA PLATA.**

May, 15th. I hear on good authority that the revenue of the province is seriously falling off, and a deficit of \$3,000,000 probable at the end of the financial year. One of the reasons for this falling off is the "Guia" tax reduction owing to the loss of the crops, and the decreased trade in this port, due to the general commercial depression.

The Supreme Court has decided the question between the two Chambers, in reference to the increase of their salaries, in favour of the Senate, which refused to sanction it.

**THEATRES AND AMUSEMENTS.**

We have to mark down another triumph for Ferrari with Puccini's Boheme sung last night in the Opera House for the first time this season. The house was crammed, and to put down the names of all the stately dames and fair damsels, many of the latter being debutantes, would be to fill a column of our paper, suffice it to say that all Buenos Aires, the fashionable part of it of course was there. De Lucia, who sang the part of Rodolfo for 18 consecutive nights in the Scala at Milan, Sr. Ferrario, who created the role of Mimì shone in the really brilliant interpretation of their respective parts. De Lucia looked the ideal of a poet and he may well be called "il maestro del bel canto" for he manages his voice in a masterly way, while his acting is equally fine. He threw his whole soul into the beautiful solo "son un poeta" and had to repeat it, while Signorina Ferrario was likewise applauded and had to repeat "mi chiamo Mimì". The duet between Rodolfo and Mimì in the third act had also to be repeated, the way in which the latter sang "Addio doles svegliata" brought the house down. Marcelo found an excellent interpreter in San Marco whose low baritone was heard to advantage through. Com. Mascheroni also came in for a good share of the applause, neither must we forget Muscato, Signorina Torosella, who also sang in very fine style.

Aida will be performed to-night with an excellent cast which includes, Bignonia, Carmen Bonaplata Bau, Mariacher and "la Guerrini."

"Ratto delle Sabine", the side splitting comedy in which Erneste Novelli plays the role of Trombone, will be performed in the Politeama to-night. Once seen always seen. Novelli will also recite the famed monologue "Sciopero dei Fabbri".

**EDITOR'S TABLE.**

According to the La Plata Wiggins, there should be rain to-day and, as the moon is at the full this morning, perhaps there will. The winter buzz has commenced in all classes of society, and promises to be loud and long. It's all for the good of trade.

There seems to be no chance of peace yet in Europe. The Sultan evidently does not want it till Edhem Pasha takes Demokos, which he will probably do to-day. (Sunday has always been a favourite day for battles). There are fears in Athens that Prince Constantine will evacuate the place, and fall back on the classic Pass of Thermopylae, where strong fortifications have been thrown up, and, if the Greeks do their duty, the invaders will never be able to get through. In Epirus now the Greeks are winning, and have thrashed the Moslems in a stiff fight in which the Italian Legion did splendid service, and routed the enemy at the point of the bayonet. It is becoming evident that the Turkish people are in no humour to stand any meddling or mediation of the Great Powers, and the attempt at it will probably fail.

The news from B.O. yesterday was as usual contradictory. Bordá says the rebels are pumped out, and will have to throw up the sponge instead of the poncho before a month is out. On the other hand, our well informed contemporary *Tribuna*, says that Lemas knocked General Muñiz into half a dozen of cocked hats in the last fight, capturing 3 guns and 1500 uniforms of the Government troops. 'Unitarios!' Queer kind of booty!

The convicts at Tierra del Fuego are to be made to work for their bread without butter in future. The saw mill at Ushuaia is to be handed over to the Director of the Prison.

The new telegraph service to the Artillery encampment at Villa Mercedes San Luis, has been opened to the public.

The torpedo boat Turbina, whose motive power consists of Parson's steam turbines in place of the usual engines, has made a mean speed of 22 1/2 knots on the measured mile. The boat has been started from a state of rest and attained a speed of 23 1/2 knots in 20 seconds and has been brought to a rest from that speed in 55 seconds.

We feel much pleasure in saluting our esteemed colleague *Tribuna* on its sixth anniversary. As it says itself, it has slowly but surely gained in prosperity and public estimation ever since it started, and it well merits its success. Always well informed, calm and dignified in the discussion of the most burning questions, always high-toned, our contemporary is a credit to the Argentine Press, and we sincerely wish it increased prosperity.

The friends of Mr. F. W. Greene of the Port Works—and their name is half a dozen legions—gave him a sumptuous banquet last night at the "Gri" in Calle Piedad, to speed him on his way to Europe. Some eighty gentlemen sat down to a menu fit to place before the Czar of Russia. Numerous speeches in honour of the guest of the evening, were made and, with the assistance of a good piano, "the feast of reason and the flow of soul" was kept up till an early hour this morning.

In reply to the question: "Which are the better paid naval officers—the Brazilians or the Europeans?" we beg to say that the former take the cake, and eat it too.

The honorable Senators of the nation had another attack of no-quo yesterday, so there was no law-making.

Readers, be good enough to read the advertisement of the great Quilmes Brewery in another column, and you will find pleasing news in it.

The tattered uniforms used by the N. G.'s at Denbeay are being patched and washed for the "Doctrinales" in July, August and September. This is the first step in the heroic retrenchment which the full-payment programme of Congress has forced on the country.

There was a little farewell kissing in the dulcet tongue of fair Italy yesterday on the departure of that ocean-flyer the Sirio. Judging by the number of people in the G. P. O. even at "ultima hora" with its double postage, she must have taken a big mail.

Senator Coker, of Texas, was once pitted in some kind of race against a man named Cole, who was an eloquent speaker, and was getting rather the better of him. The Coker party gave a big barbecue, but their best speaker could not be on hand. The

committee discovered that no talent was available, except a rough-and-tumble fellow, who had been a coal-miner in West Virginia. He consented, when called on, and the committee was in fear, trembling, wondering what he would do. But they didn't fear and tremble long. "Feller-citizens," said the speaker, "I am here to-day to talk to you about Coke and Cole. You know me, and you know I know what I'm talking about, and I want to ask you if you know the difference between Coke and Cole. But it ain't necessary; every man of you knows that the difference between them is the gas that is in Cole."

Last year's Locust history is repeating itself. We all remember how the pests turned up in midwinter, and everybody wondered. The insects are now in Entre Rios, taking a look round, no doubt for operations in the Spring. The sooner Professor Brewer hurries down from the Big Republic and starts work the better.

What a racket we shall have when young Queen Wilhelmina of Holland comes here—the first European crowned head that has ever set foot on American soil. Once she shows the way we may certainly entertain the hope that some of the others will follow her excellent example. It is really a wonder that none of the European monarchs thought of the trip before. We'll lay some odds that Kaiser William will be the first to follow Wilhelmina's example.

A Georgia newspaper man is going to give up journalism, because he thinks editors are not treated fairly. "A child is born," he says: "the doctor in attendance gets \$10, the editor notes it and gets 0; it is christened, the minister gets \$4, the editor writes it up and gets 0; it marries, the minister gets another fee, the editor a piece of cake or 000; in course of time it dies, the doctor gets from \$5 to \$50, the minister gets another \$4, the undertaker gets \$25 to \$40, the editor prints it and receive 0000—and then the privilege of running free of charge a card of thanks."

Mayor Pingree of Detroit, U. S. reminds us very much of the late Don Torquato Alvear as the right sort of man to "run" a big city. Here is something about him: "Hazen S. Pingree, mayor of Detroit and governor-elect of Michigan, began his career cutting leather soles ten hours a day at the rate of four dollars a week. Though now a middle-aged man, he was entirely unknown till about eight years ago, when he was requested to run for the mayoralty of Detroit by the Republicans, who were then in a small minority. This nomination, given as an empty compliment, was taken by Mr. Pingree in earnest, and after a remarkable canvass, in which he preached reform night and day, he found himself elected. His first reform was to reduce fares on the street-cars to three cents. The corporation ridiculed this idea, but the mayor boarded a car, offered three cents to the conductor, was put off, brought suit against the company, and after a two-years' litigation, the desired reduction was accomplished. His next moves were to gain for the city control over its public lighting, to secure cheaper gas for consumers, and to have the streets paved directly by the board of public works. These acts have made him both the enemy of the corporation and the idol of the people. The "potato-patch" movement, however, was the thing that turned all eyes on the "Hon. Potato Pingree," as the *Sun* calls him."

### ON 'CHANGE.

With gold remaining over very weak from yesterday, and the fortnightly settlement coinciding with the usual Saturday's requirements, both bears and bulls expected to see things moving very briskly, naturally each side to its own mind. The result satisfied neither, as the rally was of the very flimsiest kind, certainly not of a stamp to base hopes upon of anything very definite later on. The fall has been arrested, but the bulls have made up none of the lost ground; the six points fall is still there. Thus it must be confessed that the bears have the best of the argument so far, and if there were any outlook at all reassuring as regards exchange for the next three months, the conditions might be considered satisfactory. But with produce well high exhausted, exchange can only keep firm conditional on gold shipments, a phase not calculated to keep quotations on the decline. It seems to be a pretty general impression that gold shipments are at an end—a consummation devoutly to be wished. If there were no requirements perhaps it would be so, but it is very certain that the banks cannot enter the market without sweeping everything up and precipitating rates, a result they will strive to avert at all hazards, which must mean necessarily falling back on the extreme but always efficacious recourse of shipments. The cry of "wolf" is on every lip. People keep up an endless iteration of the absolute paralysis of trade, to convince themselves perhaps that nothing is being sold and no remittances to be made. In part, even to a great extent, it is true, but for all that trade is never so dull here but there is lots of life, stir and business. A leading banker tells us the depression complained of on all sides is greatly exaggerated, so that the remittances have to, and are, going forward. This means demand for bills, and the supply will necessarily be very meagre for some months, which would seem to point to a higher premium. Yet we have to report the gold market weak, unmoved and almost untinged; quite abnormal.

The fluctuation in gold to-day was quite insignificant. Prices at the first hour may be said to have moved within the narrow margin of a point, which is remarkable, inasmuch as nearly 1 1/2 million dollars changed hands altogether. The rumours of emission and news of the locust invasion in Entre Rios seemed to have no effect, at least they did not influence prices, which opened at 298 and closed at 298.20, a 30 cents pass being paid for end of month and about 1 1/2 point for June. After the hour there was very little done and rates remained unchanged. Stocks were quite neglected.

Circulars handed round to-day announces the purchase of Mr. George Mackern's stationary business by Mr. W. Krafft of directory fame, the well-known lithographer. We understand that another leading stationary business, in the Calle Florida, has also changed hands, though the details are still kept in reserve.

The reported arrangement of the Government with the railway companies for construction of the new Central Station has caused a very favorable impression in the market, since so long as the Government held on to its expressed intention of doing the job itself, there was little prospect of a start ever being made. Then again the Government's resources are not so plentiful as to admit of much testing as to elasticity, so that for various reasons of moment such an arrangement as would take the business off its hands on reasonable terms is to be hailed with satisfaction. Mr. White on behalf of the several companies proposes to do the business for about 3 millions of gold dollars, which would be raised on bonds bearing 4% interest and 1% amortization, thus making an annual service of \$150,000 gold. The Government estimated the cost at 4 millions gold, but we understand is favorably disposed towards the proposal, always reserving right of expropriation, or to increase the rate of amortization. The main point is that the station is almost a vital necessity, and the Executive should make as little delay as possible in taking final steps.

We are glad to hail the reappearance of the New York Life again in our midst. It was a source of regret that the bias against Foreign Life Assurance in Congress should have driven out the New York, Standard and Equitable, so that it is with pleasure we notice the return of the first. 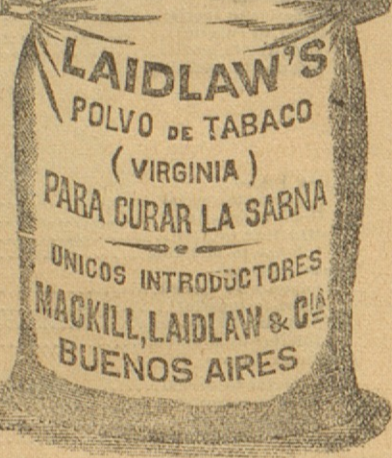
