There is some confusion about the several
jubilee funds. I wired that the subscrip-
tion to put a memorial in English Club
amounted to \$60, quite a different matter
from the Jubilee fund for the ball and to
build a Victoria hall, which has already
reached the neighborhood of \$2,000 and is
constantly increasing. This is the last
telegram I shall send for the present.

Mr. Brooks, Manager of the British
Bank, left to-night for your city to join
the branch there. Judging by the crowd
of friends of all nationalities at the mole,
to see him off, he is one of the most
popular bank managers we have had for a
long time. Mrs. Brooks accompanied him.
Both will be much regretted.

An official bulletin, in regard to recent
events up the river, was issued this after-
noon and I had to send it entire.

The *Montevideo Times* undertakes to
correct some of my statements re the
firms that proposed for constructing the
port. One of its corrections is in regard
to an error which I made, and subsequently
corrected in STANDARD, about the person
who represents the firm of Greenwood, a
correction which the *M. V. T.*'s Editor had
seen at time of writing. As to the Green-
wood's being out of it, I am informed, on
reliable authority, that the Government
asked for modified plans, upon which new
tenders could be made, to be handed in on
May 15th. Pearson's representative did
present such a new scheme on date men-
tioned, whereas Sr. Harispu, in represen-
tation of Greenwood, handed in a tele-
gram to the effect that the Greenwoods
were not prepared, in the present state of
the country, to offer any fresh proposal;
the practical result of this is that Pear-
son's is the only firm in the field. It is
absurd to suppose that Pearson's would
now, after meeting all the requests of

Paris, 12th—The Deputies resumed to-
day the debate on the explosion in the
Grande Combe mine. There was a crowd

ed gallery. It is said that the Government
is sure of a large majority when the final
division takes place.

Vienne, 12th.—There is much comment
here on the news from Sofia that the Bul-
garian Government is preparing for war
rapidly, and has ordered a large supply
of artillery abroad. It is stated, further-
more, that the army will be largely in-
creased in the three arms.

London, 12th.—There has been a rail-
way accident at Wylshampton (Wales),
where a passenger train ran off the line,
and nine persons were killed and 25 in-
jured.

Calcutta, 12th.—A violent shock of
earthquake was felt to-day on the North
East coast of India. At Hobrah, not far
from here, several houses, were tumbled
and their inmates killed, and in this city
the walls of many houses were cracked.

Algiers, 12th.—A fierce cyclone has
done much damage in the Southern and
Western districts, and the vineyards have
suffered greatly.

Paris, 12th.—The Grande Combe debate
has just ended in a victory for the Gov-
ernment by 306 to 195 votes.

Rome, 12th.—King Humbert and Queen
Margaret left to-day for Naples, to unveil
tomorrow the statue of King Victor Em-
manuel.

Barcelona, 12th.—Fifty more Anarchists
were expelled from this city to-day and
sent across the French frontier.

Paris, 12th.—The Navy Committee of
the Deputies approved to-day a vote of
260 millions of francs 200 of which are to
be spent in building new cruisers of
great speed.

Salonica, 12th.—A band of Bulgarian
bandits have appeared near Menlik in
Roumalia, and a small detachment of
troops has been sent to deal with them.

Athens, 12th.—The Italian Ambassador
here has forwarded to the Greek Minister
of Foreign Affairs a note protesting
against the bad treatment to which Italian
volunteers in Greece have been subjected.

The note furthermore cites several cases
fully justifying the protest, and makes
special mention of the fact that the vol-
unteers lost all their baggage.

London, 12th.—A telegram has been re-
ceived from Seoul reporting that a plot had
been discovered there whereby it was pro-
posed to compel King Li-Houi of Corea to
abdicate in favour of Li-Chok heir to the
throne. The leading conspirators have
been arrested, and it appears that many
of them will be shot.

Buda-Pesth, 12th.—The rivers Maros
and Theiss have overflowed their banks,
flooding the neighborhood. Considerable
damage has been done in Szeged, and
the population is alarmed fearing a repeti-
tion of the floods in 1879, which all but
destroyed the city. Many people in Szeged
have left their homes.

Madrid, 12th.—At a Cabinet Council it
was resolved to grant the widow of Dr.
Ruiz, who died in Cuba, an indemnity.

Madrid, 12th.—The Press of this city
has expressed uneasiness on account of
the intervention of the United States
in the Cuban Question. The official organs
are the only papers which treat the matter
lightly and attribute the origin of the news
to the Cuban Revolutionary Committee.

Premier Cánovas del Castillo has thought
necessary to authorize newspaper re-
porters to declare the rumours of an
intervention as completely false.

The Premier declared that he was convinced
that President McKinley yet entertained
friendly feelings towards Spain. The
Premier made the following final state-
ment: "I repeat that I have every con-
fidence in the prudence and friendship
which the President of the United States
displays. However, should the Presi-
dent pursue a hostile policy towards
Spain, he will find our country in a
position to defend its rights without being
at any disadvantage."

THIS MORNING'S TELEGRAMS.
(Received after Midnight)

Athens, 12th.—It is announced from La-
rissa that the Turkish Governor appointed
by the Sublime Porte to take charge of
the Province of Thessaly; has issued to-day
a decree threatening with the confiscation
of their property all those who within 15
days do not return to their homes. Greece
will present to the Powers a protest against
this decree.

Bombay, 12th.—The Black Death is
again increasing in violence. During the
week just ending, there have been regis-
tered in this city 413 deaths almost all
after very brief suffering.

London, 12th.—A despatch from Pre-
toria announces that there is in the Orange
Free State Volksraad, a large majority
secured in favour of the treaties of Com-
merce and Alliance, signed ad referendum
between that Republic and the Transvaal.

Calcutta, 12th.—A fresh and violent
shock of earthquake occurred here this
afternoon. The tower of the Cathedral
collapsed killing eight natives and injur-
ing several others. The Town-hall and
several fine buildings as well as some of
the barracks, and a number of private
houses have suffered injury. Great terror
reigns amongst the populace.

THE BUENOS AIRES PORT.

The entry of the large Italian packet
Regina Margherita into one of the dry
docks on Friday, the anchoring in the
docks of a whole division of the Argen-
tine fleet, and the Government decree ap-
pointing the 21st inst. as the date for the
official inauguration of the Northern Sec-
tion of the port, have attracted public at-
tention to these noble Madero port works.
Whilst we are writing these lines a com-
mittee is sitting to devise the means of
raising a monument to the late Don
Eduardo Madero, thanks to whose energy
and perseverance, we see the port at the
gates of this city. In fact, the Madero
Port is the absorbing topic to-day.

Of all the wonderful changes we have
witnessed in this country, the Buenos
Ayres port is by far the greatest and
most striking in importance it ranks
with the federalization of Buenos Ayres.

The thousands who yesterday and the day
before visited the North Basin and new
dry docks must have made the same re-
flection, as they watched the noble Italian
liner manoeuvre in the North Basin and
sweep into the graving dock, and admired
the beautiful Argentine fast cruisers
snugly moored in Dock No. 3. The whole
population will turn out on the 21st to
witness the official inauguration, when
the cruiser 25 de Mayo will pass from
Dock No. 3, through Dock No. 4, into the
magnificent North Basin.

To give our readers an idea of the
magnitude of these port works and their
practical value, we need only take up last
month's figures of the movement in port.
We see that during the month of May
831 vessels with 292,000 tons entered the
port, whilst over 900 with 270,000 tons
left: these figures include foreign and
home navigation. It would be impossible
to give the imports of the month, item
for item, but a list of the principal ex-
ports of the month will show at a glance
what is going on at the gates of the city.
According to the official statements of the
Custom-House the exports during May
from the Buenos Aires port were:—

The above is nearly the complete direct
movement of the Buenos Ayres port
during May, but there still remains the
enormous business of transshipment of
produce in port from the vessels laden
with produce from up-river. As the
classification of the latter is not uniform
in kilos or units we cannot make room for
same; the list is long enough, but would
fall to give any exact idea of this feature
of the port business.

The above shows the extraordinary activity
of our port, and the business is grow-
ing so fast that the engineers of the works
are already taking steps in anticipation of
an inevitable extension of the present
works. Thus the public will have an
opportunity of seeing on the 21st inst., at
the inauguration, that to the South East
of the North Basin a large area of low
ground has been left, in case another dock
should be required. We, for our part, are
inclined to believe that before the North
Channel is completed the Government will
have to order an extension of the works
to keep up with the growth of business.

MEMS IN THE MEDITERRANEAN.
VI.
Genoa, May 12th.

There are so many things to write
about Genoa which are not to be found in
the books, and which would doubtless in-
terest your readers that I find it hard to
know where to begin. Within the last
year they have almost abolished horse
tramways and horse omnibuses, and elec-
tricity is now the great motive power in
this beautiful city, which has been aptly
called "The Superb." The electric cars
quietly, noiselessly, and without any of
the bother of the Buenos Aires trams, run
through all the principal streets of Genoa
and out to the suburbs, and up the moun-
tains along the sea shore and through
tunnels. On the top of the high, fortified
mountain overlooking the city, 1,200 feet
high, they have opened a beautiful restau-
rant and hotel, and they call it the Rigi.
The electric tram takes you up to the top
and stops at several stations on the
mountain side. We breakfasted at the
Rigi, one delightful Mediterranean morning
with Mr. and Mrs. Pollinini, and their
daughters, and Miss Fynn. From the
breakfast table, we could see all Genoa
beneath us, and the lovely Mediterranean
calm as a pond as far as the eye could
reach. There is really no use in attempt-
ing to describe the enchantment of that
breakfast party: we lingered over the feast
until late in the afternoon, and then re-
turned in the electric tramway down the
stupendous mountain with far greater
ease than in the tramway car that runs
from the Plaza Victoria to Caballito. On
another occasion we visited the little
suburb of Sturla where Dr. Marengo has a
most delightful residence, the windows of
his dining room overlooking the Mediter-
ranean; on the road to Sturla we passed the
house where Lord Byron in vanished
years lived and sang, we also passed the
monument on the sea shore erected to
mark the spot where Garibaldi with 1600
followers embarked 36 years ago for Sicily.

There is a little monument in Genoa to
the boy Balilla, a lad of 15 years of age,
who threw a stone at an Austrian soldier,
which led to a popular rising that culmi-
nated in the emancipation of Genoa from
Austrian rule, and that little stone thrown
by that little boy to defend a poor woman
from an Austrian soldier, is possibly one
of the most remarkable events in Italian
history, since there were 40,000 Austrian
troops quartered in Genoa at the time,
and they were all expelled at a moment's
notice. This wonderful event shows the
stuff of the Genoese public. Close to the
Boisa I visited the house where the great
Daniel O'Connell died 50 years
ago, and there is a slab over
the hall door to the memory of that
great man. They are knocking down
some of the narrow streets or vices in the
old city, and opening beautiful Boulevards,
and they have finished the new circular
road called "Circovallazione, a Monte"
which is a magnificent route laid out in 1876
on the hill at the back of the town, and af-
fords to tourists a splendid drive. I visited
the Albergo dei Poveri, which is an asylum
for the poor, founded in the 17th century;
it accommodates 1,300 persons. Another
beautiful drive is the new street Circo-
vallazione al Mare, leading from the Plaza
Cavour around the fortifications; nearly
all the streets in Genoa are lighted by
electricity. The Plaza Corvetto may be
termed the Plaza Victoria of Genoa, and
here our old friend Mr. Pollinini resides.
I visited the Palace of Figoli in the Via
Balbi, it is a noble pile, the owner was
out in Buenos Aires last year and spent
a few days with Mr. Buckland at San
Blas, the Via Luccoli is the Lombard
Street of Genoa, you have to go down
about 50 steps to get into it, and it is
about half the width of Calle San Martin.
It is, however, one of the busiest streets
in the city. Bankers, merchants, brokers
and shippers have their offices there.

Messrs. Pollinini, Maccio and Co., who
now rank as one of the first private bank-
ing firms of Genoa have their Bank in
this street; most of your readers will re-
member Mr. Pollinini, who was the founder
of the Banco de Italia in Buenos Aires; he
retired from the Plate about eleven years
ago and in company with Mr. Maccio
(who is also well known in Buenos Aires
having filled the high post of President
of the Bolsa there); started his bank with
the most signal success, as will appear
from the following list of the banks of
which they are the agents and represen-
tatives in Genoa.

Besides the foregoing banks of which

I shall not detain you with any further
menus of the Mediterranean, as I leave to-
morrow for Turin to visit the head of the
Salesian order, in order to get him to es-
tablish a mission at Las Palmas, Chaco
Austral, where there is neither church,
priest nor sacristan, although the place has
a population of several thousands.

AT THE DRAWING ROOM.

MY PERSONAL IMPRESSIONS.

(By an American Debutante.)

My first impression of Buckingham Palace was a sense of disappointment. Perhaps no one thinks so much of a monarchy as a Republican, and I had expected something even grander and more gorgeous than the array of soldiers outside and the ordinary kind of awning near which we waited to go in.

It was a grey day. There was not a gleam of sunshine to enliven the outlook, and the wind, which blew about our veils and feathers, and raised the dust in small whirlwinds, served also to ruffle one's temper.

Inside the Palace, however, the venue was sufficiently imposing. There all was gold and glitter, and big mirrors reflected an endless array of people passing up the different red-carpeted stairs, while the picturesque Beauforters as they stood about still dressed in the garb of Henri Deux persuaded one even more than the powdered flunkys of the splendour of regal estate.

We had joined the rank of carriages at one and obtained so good a place that we entered the palace at ten minutes past two, and were soon safely seated in the first drawing room, which I noticed was hung with a beautiful blue paper (not silk), and draped with very beautiful silk curtains of the same bright shade. Everything looked very new, as though got up for the occasion, and although at first sight there seemed no one very interesting to be seen, by degrees one picked out different important people, all of whom were named to me by my chaperon, and their social eminence explained.

A tall, slender woman with dark hair and eyes, and features that reminded me of portraits of the Dowager Lady Dudley, proved to be Lady Yarborough: she wore an exquisite gown of white satin embroidered with diamonds; a train of white and gold brocade was slung from her shoulders, with white roses tucked into her yellow tulle sleeves, and her diamonds were lovely. Near by was Lady Parker, very pretty in white with Louis XVI. knots of mauve, and a train of violet velvet; she also wore a magnificent tiara. Lady Helmsley looked so handsome in pale pink brocade, with becoming lace lappets in her hair, and with her Lady Gwendolen Little and Miss Muriel Chaplin, the latter all in white, with lilies of the valley; her white feathers were prettily arranged in her bright red-golden hair. Another Miss Chaplin was with them (a debutante cousin), who looked so smart in white, with her hair quite charmingly dressed. Miss Van Wart wore a wonderful Worth train of green velvet, lined with black and green shot silk, brocade with crosses, and there were emerald and gold embroideries on her bright pink satin gown, the bodice of which was covered with diamond brooches and ropes of pearls. Mrs. Edward Sassons looked very handsome in a Lefebvre frock of turquoise-blue satin, embroidered in turquoises and chastened with Alencon lace, her beautiful train was pale blue brocade in stripes of tiny pink roses.

I noticed that Lady Yarborough had got in by favour after the room was supposed to be filled, and I was amused to notice, too, how Mrs. Bischoffsheim was also not allowed to stand like a Peri at the barrier or gate, but was immediately admitted, while presently she had worked her way quietly to the very front of the room, and was amongst the first to pass out when the entré people had gone in. A quiet push is the great motive power in America, and here in England too (so said my chaperon) it is the secret of social success!

Then came the ordeal itself, and I own I felt very nervous when at last my train was taken from me and spread out. A debutante in front of me got a sudden fright, and went wildly in the wrong direction, then got so bewildered that one of the officials had to pull off her gloves. I wonder if she ever recovered her self-possession, and if she ever kissed the Queen's hand.

I caught a glimpse of Mrs. John Hay, who gave me the kindest smile, and looked very handsome in pale green and lovely lace, most beautifully made and embroidered with topazes and silver; and Miss Hay looked so bright and nice also in green and white, with the prettiest green sash—she was evidently much amused with all she saw. Some one whispered to me that the Duchess of Devonshire was there and I caught a glimpse of some one very handsome and stately; then as we entered the next room, I saw the Duchess of Roxburg with her two daughters dressed in blue and white.

But this room was really quite a blaze of beauty. There was the Duchess of Portland, tall, elegant, and picturesque, in white satin embroidered with pearls, and with such wonderful jewels—a tall tiara of diamonds and sapphires, and diamonds and sapphires round her neck, as well as ropes of diamonds and pearls. With her was Lady Henry Bentinck, a vision of loveliness in silver, with a soft train of pale green chiffon veiled in white and three big feathers erect in her hair.

The Duchess of Manchester was there, strikingly handsome in a black satin Empire dress, with a train of violet velvet hanging from a silver embroidered black collar; her dress was hemmed all round with silver, and glittered with diamonds as well. I felt very proud of my compatriots when I saw Mrs. Pelham Clinton looking sweetly pretty in orange velvet over white and orange brocade with nauturiums, and very proud indeed too when I saw Lady Naylor-Leyland coming in as I went out, looking most beautiful in an exquisite Worth dress of cloth of silver applique and flounced in soft lace, with a train of turquoise velvet, held on to her shoulders with a big diamond and sapphire brooch, and trails of pink roses. Her jewels were superb, quite covering her neck and rising in a tall crown round her head. Mrs. Scarisbrick, her sister, looked very smart and pretty, also in white and silver with pink roses.

Another American, Mrs. Roosevelt, who had arrived the day before from Paris, was in a Paquin dress of white satin embroidered with a quaint cut train veiled in delicate embroideries of silk and baby ribbons on gauze, and a diamond chain looped round her neck was caught up with a diamond butterfly upon her bodice. Mrs. Howard Kingscote, who has taken Warwick House for the season, was with her, and her dress also came from Paquin's: it was a lovely dress of pale pink veiled in white chiffon and lace, and a train of primrose silk embroidered all over in diamonds was fastened on with full-blown yellow roses tipped with pink. But lovely dresses were so many. Lady Cairns, all in white with diamonds and pearls, looked perfectly sweet. Mrs. Asquith was as smart as could be in pale green and white with purple irises, and Mrs. Errington looked nice in lovely lace embroidered with sequins and an apple-green train. The Duchess of Newcastle was pointed out to me, and I saw for a moment some one tall and fair, carrying an exquisite Arcadian bouquet of white orchids.

Last, not least, I saw Lady Londonderry looking beautiful in white lined with lily of the valley green, and wearing most wonderful diamonds and pearls. With her was Lady Helen Stewart, so handsome in white all sparkling with silver; and she presented both the Mrs. Becketts, who made quite a sensation. Mrs. Rupert Beckett, who as Miss Muriel Paget was a beauty of last season, looked really lovely in a picturesque white velvet train worn over a dress of white satin, veiled in the softest rose chiffon with roses and carnations, and a lovely bouquet of malmaisons, while Mrs. Gertrude Beckett was all in white, with lovely lace and clusters of mauve flowers.

Altogether the loveliest women at this Drawing Room were (in my humble opinion) Lady Naylor-Leyland, the Duchess of Portland, Lady Henry Bentinck, and Mrs. Rupert Beckett, and all were so beautifully dressed and wore such very lovely jewels. On the whole, I thought my countrywomen more than held their own. I am persuaded, too, that there is something more in Royalty than mere pageantry and state. There was something so heartfelt in the cheer one heard outside as the different Princes and Princesses arrived. I felt a thrill myself when the band struck up "God save the Queen" as her Majesty left the precincts of the Palace, having held her last Drawing Room in this her Jubilee year.

EXHIBITION OF PAINTINGS.

The annual exhibition of the work done by her pupils attracted many to Mrs. Annie Newbery Thomas's residence in Calle Rivadavia 1613 yesterday afternoon and evening. The pictures exhibited were only show that great progress has been made since last year, but also that the love of art has taken great hold upon the young ladies of this city. That Mrs. Thomas has become a great teacher is

clearly shown by the fact that sixty six pupils are exhibitors; and the exhibits number upward of two hundred. Amongst the various exhibits are many pictures that would grace an art gallery of the first class, and the result is most creditable to Mrs. Thomas and her pupils. A group of roses on porcelain by Mrs. R. Doyd is most true to nature, the flowers standing out as if they were ready to be plucked. The same artist also has a splendid landscape "Harvest Moon," a picture from nature, "Oranges and Lemons," and "A girl with Turkeys," all of which are in the first rank. Mrs. J. H. Higgins also exhibits a landscape "The silver Dart" and "Roses." The work done by Mrs. R. L. Phillips is full of detail, and her "Azaleas" on satin and white and purple lilacs are so startlingly true to nature. Mrs. Showler shows two very clever examples "Pansies" and "Geraniums" both on porcelain. Mrs. Billoch has some remarkably good works "Roses in bowl" "Alone" and "Caught in a shower," the last named being particularly good. Miss Bertha Lumsden has a pair, "Spring" and "Autumn" that would do credit to any painter. Miss Julia Noguera exhibits many works the chief amongst them being "There's life in the old dog yet," "Mother and Child," "A Sea view" and a pair of Terra Cotta vases, in sepia. This young lady is not quite sixteen years of age, and should she continue to improve, her work will be worthy of a place in any gallery. One of the most beautiful works in the exhibition is an altar cloth by Miss Maria Capdevia "Wild Roses" on white satin, designed for the Cathedral in Yapeyu. Miss Maud MacLean exhibits a very pretty landscape and her sister Miss Florence MacLean has a beautiful example "Birds and Daisies" on porcelain.

The above works are exhibited in the vestibule and sala, whilst in another room are many beautiful examples of the work of Mrs. Thomas herself, and her daughter Miss Vera Thomas. Amongst them must be mentioned some beautiful screens, some excellent work on tapestry, and a series of twelve pictures for which Mrs. Thomas gained a Silver Medal.

The exhibition will remain open to-day and to-morrow, and Mrs. Thomas and her daughter will be pleased to see their friends.

NOTES AND ANTICIPATIONS.

After Friday night's rain we should expect to find the going pretty thick to-day, which will tax calculation not a little, and give some queer turns and twists to form. Indecisa, though a terribly slow beginner, Osado, Plaisanterie and Devona are the pick in the next, with a casting vote for the Paris mare, whilst Don Gonzalo should prove the best of the four acceptances in the long-distances. Electrica seems to be over-weighted with 55½ kilos in the Mile, but the rest are not very high class, so that it is hard to say what might not win. In the 1,500 metres Tanger should make an excellent show, as should also Hipolito and Extra, whilst Estudiante and Hugonote should prove good backing in the final. Our Selections are—

Rise early, put on your best toggery, bolt your breakfast, go to church, and then, good readers, you can have your Sunday out with a clear conscience and a light heart. In the way of sport and pastime you have hunting at Hurlingham, racing at Palermo, lots of football, some Golf, and if you care for none of these things, order your carriage and join the procession at Palermo, or if you don't happen to have a carriage, take a tram, or walk, to the Docks, to see the great Italian liner Regina Margherita having her screw repaired. If none of these foregoing things please you, then stay in bed all day, "the world forgetting, and by the world forgot."

Yesterday was lively enough especially amongst "Los Ingleses" in a double sense, as most of them were preparing for the Jubilee, and the rest collecting accounts, which led to many a secret wish that they might meet with lots of orange and banana peels in their path while going their rounds, and forget to look before them. There was no surplus of local or home news, and that from Europe was very flabby. The wily Sultan and Emperor Second to None seem determined to spoil or delay the peace negotiations, but the Powers are now thinking of cornering the Sick Man by sending him a joint ultimatum to give a straight forward answer about Thessaly at once, or they will "go for" him. The question is, will Germany sign this ultimatum? Meanwhile, the Sultan is secretly giving the fanatical followers of Mahomet to bowl for a continuance of the war. The Powers have now virtually abandoned the blockade of Crete, and their squadrons are dropping away ship by ship. Another sign of the times is that our gay, festive and mercurial Crimean allies are beginning to perceive the hollowness of their alliance with autocratic Russia, and are getting sick of it! The fickle Moderns! Only a few months ago, they went off their heads about the Czar's visit to their beautiful country.

To our innumerable correspondents on Jubilee preparations we appeal for some forbearance. Apart from the utter impossibility of publishing all this correspondence, it would be utterly confusing to hearken to all the suggestions and complaints made. Nothing short of chaos and night primæval would follow, even if but a fraction of these communications were taken into consideration. The official programme of the Commemorative Committee has been published, and it would be well if excessive zeal and loyalty interfered with that programme as little as possible.

The honourable Senators of the Nation indulged in a "no quo" yesterday. The weather was too moist and "soft" to even think of public business.

We are requested to say that the Hurlingham races for the 17th inst have been postponed till the 9th of July, with the same programme.

The news from Montevideo last night shows something rotten in Red Rose quarters. Borda has dismissed General Arribo (it is rumoured) from his command in the field; there is a crisis in the Cabinet; and the Ministers of War, Foreign Affairs and Fomento are expected to resign at once.

Stand-by-O'Gorman favoured us last night with a copy of a lengthy bulletin issued yesterday in Montevideo composed of various telegrams, from General Tajes and Minister Frías, giving news of what is going on in Salto, and the neighbourhood. It is in these telegrams asserted that the rebels, who are admitted to be closely besieging Salto, have been repeatedly routed with but slight loss to the garrison. The gunboats Suarez and Vidella are stated to be firing on the rebels and that Lamas with the main body of his army is encamped near the Prades.

Prades has passed. Some prisoners have been made by the Government troops, but it is evident that the garrison can do nothing but defend Salto itself. Dr. Frías says that the rebels occupy their present positions to protect the passage of revolutionary bands from the Argentine coast, adding that he hears that there is a rebel encampment near Salto.

Many mills will be unable to work unless the growers of cane reduce their prices, which they cannot do without blue ruin to selves and families, and eight mills are already on the retired list. Grant want is already seizing on the working classes, and the papers call for a general moratorium. This is fearful news; but Tucuman's suffering is for the good of the people of the whole Republic, who have been robbed for years to bolster up the artificial sugar industry that has now come to the beginning of its end, which will come when General Roca takes office, and the Gold Eagle goes tumbling down to 100 premium, or lower.

All the Courts in Europe are trembling at the visit of the Shah of Persia, especially the Court of Saint James, where the visits of his predecessor are still remembered with shuddering horror. His habits were so filthy that all the carpets and hangings in the rooms he occupied in Buckingham Palace had to be replaced and a general fumigation resorted to. Let us hope that the present Shah will have more respect for Western ideas of decency and personal cleanliness.

THE VICTORIA SAILORS' HOME.

The Queen Victoria Commemorative Committee have begun sending forward the circular published at foot or is an appeal to all British subjects, to all descendants of Britishers, and to all sympathisers, to subscribe for the erection of a memorial to commemorate an unique event in British History, and that memorial is to take the shape of a Sailors' Home—there would be no nobler tribute to the sovereign who rules the waves than a refuge for the toilers of the sea. In the loyal, charitable, unsectarian object let all join hands and answer the appeal according to their respective means.

Apart from the great event that the Memorial will commemorate at the gates of our city, within hail of the docks—there is in this resolution of the British residents to build a Sailors' Home a breadth of view, a field of action, that silences all differences, and must weld all the elements of the community into one common aspiration to see the generous idea immediately carried out. We have no doubt that all will respond to the charitable call, and help in the cause.

The following is the circular sent out by the Committee to the British residents and descendants of Britishers in the Republic:

Commemoration of the 60th Anniversary of Queen Victoria's Accession.

At the meeting held in Prince George's Hall on 21st April, 1897, a Committee was appointed to consider various schemes proposed for the commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the accession to the throne of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

The Committee submitted its report to a general meeting held on 6th May, 1897, and recommended the following—

1.—A congratulatory telegram to the Queen, and a request to employers to give their employees a holiday.

2.—A free entertainment at the Circus for children.

3.—Performance of the opera "H. M. S. Pinafore."

4.—The erection of a Sailors' Home as a permanent memento of the event, to be handed over to the Sailors' Home Committee on completion.

These proposals were adopted. The above Committee has been appointed to carry them into effect, and it now appeals to those who sympathise with the object for subscriptions to the fund required for the purpose.

The land for the proposed Sailors' Home has been granted by Congress free of charge and for the erection and furnishing of the building it is estimated that a sum of about \$80,000 will be required. Statistics submitted to the Committee relative to the working of the present Home (the rent of which is \$300 per month) show that with a more suitable building, free of rent and properly equipped, the institution would be almost self-supporting, so that, while it will be a lasting memento of an event which is unique in the history of the British Empire, it is not likely that there will be an increased call on the annual subscribers for its maintenance. Appended will be found a few particulars of the work done by the present Home.

It would be very appropriate were the fund completed by the 22nd of June, and the Committee will feel obliged if you will kindly fill up the annexed form and send it with the amount of your subscription to the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. R. Inglis Runciman.

Were it not that the anæmia of the market is indisputable, we should be forced to the conclusion that it looks with indifference on the glowing "vista" of amelioration and promise that the solution of the Presidential Campaign holds forth. For we see that in London the mention of his name as Candidate of a party has galvanized stocks, and that, without the English public or English bankers being in possession of the data that would carry to them, as they do to the market here, the conviction that General Roca is virtually elected. Here we know that there is no opposition, and that public opinion echoes the famous Tucuman calling Cincinnati to the honours of office again in the interest of the commonwealth. We have had enough of Fabius Cunctator—presidential makeshifts tiding over bad times; for when all is said and done, since the bullets began to patter in the Parque in the year of grace 1890, no President has been better than a stop gap, scraping the crippled vessel out of the vortex of the storm. Nothing can minimise the glory Dr. Pellegrini earned in those troublous times by quelling with a firm hand the bubbling convulsions of civil strife; Dr. Saenz Peña was a Fabius Cunctator, but too feeble to last, and Dr. Uriburu has since very ably played the role of Contempriser. But the country has pulled itself together, times have mended, and another stamp of Statesman is now required. That public opinion is aware of this can be gauged from the unanimity with which General Roca's name has been hailed, whilst that London opinion is also unanimous, we have the clearest evidence in the surging upward movement in stocks. Yet gold keeps shifting about, indifferent, apparently, to the radical change in conditions, and there is still the low, feeble pulse-beat expressive of lassitude and depression. But it will all come right in time—the great healer. We have still to contempriser and wait over on the recovery and revival that is to put stir into the system, strengthen the organisms and rejuvenate the patient.

In spite of the cash gold requirements running to close on the half million, the aggregate of sales only reached 800,000 dollars, a very meagre total for a weekly settlement day, though with the speculation paralysed, nothing else could be expected. The price opened weak at 295.60 dropping in a swoop almost to 294.60, after which it rallied to 295 again, leaving off between buyers and sellers at 294.90, which was also the after-hour rate. Business for end of month was done at a steady backwardation of 80 cents, and for July with a contango pass of barely half a point, so that on the whole it must be candidly admitted that prospects do not favour the bulls much. Dealers say that cash gold seems to be scarce, but heaps offering for dates. Stocks were absolutely quiet. Catalinas just manage to hold their own, not more, but Santa Fe Consols done at 39.50, shews improvement. Some Nat. F. and G. Cédulas were done at 83.20 and 83.80 respectively.

The death is announced of Mr. Joseph Ruston of the great firm of Ruston, Proctor and Co., Engineers, Lincoln, whose agents in this market are Messrs. Agar, Cross and Co. He died on 10th inst., one of the representative manufacturers of Great Britain, with world-wide reputation, and had sat in the House of Commons for many years. The firm of Ruston, Proctor and Co. supplied a great part of the excavating machinery employed in the Suez Canal, the Manchester Ship Canal and Madero Port Works. About seven years ago it was successfully converted into a limited liability company, and the fact that during the last few years the shops have been working over time shews the great success of the concern. Mr. Ruston was well known to many holder of Argentine securities and shares. Another old Buenos Ayres landmark going! The pick-axe of the Italian laborer is now demolishing in the Calle Bolivar, block between Calles Belgrano and Venezuela, the old building where the Ar-

gentine Post-Office was installed for so many years in the old days that preceded the seventies. Shades of Posadas! How times change in this River Plate world of ours! How many of our readers cherish the memory of the old tumble-down office, its primitive fixtures, its genial much-travelled Chief! Then a French and a British packet came and went every month. The letters were delivered at the respective Consulates, to be forwarded stamped by the Consuls. The old STANDARD office was round the corner in the Calle Belgrano, and many a favor the editors received at the hands of the veteran Posadas. The old postal building, one of the oldest in Buenos Ayres, is now fast disappearing to make room for some modern, cage-like structure, no doubt, such as one sees in the Avenida de Mayo.

Amongst the passengers booked for the old city by the R.M.S. Nile, sailing on the 25th inst., is Mr. Sidney Englefield, who goes to London for a short trip and who will return with his family.

Specie shipments during the past two days have run to £66,000 the Rio, Alemann sending forward in the La Plata £10,000 to Rio, a supplement to £15,000 embarked in the Clyde and all which goes to cover exchange operations. The London Bank, meantime, shipped \$204,280 gold to Montevideo for same purpose, the total thus running to \$390,280 gold dollars.

Judge Amuchastegui has declared bankrupt the firm of Castro, Rogueta and Company, proprietors of an oil factory in Calle Estados Unidos.

Mr. Hortensio Mendez Frías has retired from the firm of G. Arning and Company. Messrs Guillermo Arning and Belizario Lynch remain with the business.

The sale is reported from the South of the province of 200 novillos for export at \$80 gold each; another sale of 800 is reported for grazier at \$20 each and 1,000 cows from an establishment in the West, including 10% novillos, at \$28 each. Mr. Marcelino Ugarte sold to Mr. Nelson 400 novillos for export from an establishment in Junin at \$82 each.

It is announced on good authority that next week the Home Secretary will lay before Congress a project for the leasing of all the National narrow gauge system, except the Andine. The exception even is a mistake, as the less a Government has to do with railways, except to encourage and push forward the building of them, the better, whilst the working of them has invariably shown that the Executive is about the worst type of railway manager in existence. At least so experience in the R. Plate has served to show. The sooner, therefore, private enterprise is enticed into action the better.

With the packers gone, the exchange market was of course quite stagnant today, nothing doing. Rates, however, keep firm and cable transfers were spoken of at 47 1/2. We quote nominally

London—47 7/8 15/16d.
Paris—5.01 fcs.
Antwerp—5.02 1/2 fcs.
Hamburg—4.08 mks.

The Rio rate keeps steady at 7 1/4. There is no change in discounts which, are easy at 5% to 6% gold and 7 to 7 1/2 per cent. paper.

The withdrawal of gold from liquidation today was only a miserable \$908,000, which shows the dead-and-alive state of the market. There was no auction.

The commercial cables to-day give findings in London at 88, maize at 13/3 rye terms, and linseed at 28/6. The combined B wool in Antwerp is quoted at 88 1/2 fcs.

The sales in the markets this morning embraced:

80,000 kilos wool.
400,000 " maize.
160,000 " wheat.

We hear of a movement on foot to start amongst members of the Bolsa de Comercio a Provident Association similar to that in force with the Brokers. We understand the idea meets with many adherents.

Advices from Entre Rios report a locust flight in Colon which is doing a deal of harm.

There is a grand conclave of railway managers in Bahia Blanca, to see the Bahia Blanca and North Western inaugurated to Toay. Nearly all the general managers in the country are there, and we suppose will make a trial trip over the Strawberry Railway before coming back.

According to Messrs. Devoto, Balbueno and Co's valuable circular, which has moved off very briskly and sold well during the week, and as the arrivals have been meagre, the stock stands at 1 1/4 millions of kilos at most. Light dry hides and sheepskins have also found a most favourable market, due to better news from European markets, and small stocks.

Business in gold at the second hour was a trifle lighter as a mere bagatelle. The rate opened at 294.60, dropped to 294.60, rallied to 295 and closed at 294.90; but though we talk of fall and rally, there is neither one nor the other, but an indifferent oscillation, void of point and consequence. After the hour there was next to nothing doing, the price remaining over at 295. In stocks there was more movement, but kickshaws is the word for it, not movement, as the market is down-at-heels, out-at-elbows, and quite lost to importance. Even stock brokers complain that many of the operations reported and posted are 'gates'—mere kites flown to trim up or prune down prices to the taste and fancy of the dealer.
