**Turkey insists on a War Indemnity.**  
**Perilous Position of the German Emperor.**  
**Great Heat in France.**

London, 25th.—The Emperor of Germany was nearly the victim of an accident yesterday. It appears that His Imperial Majesty embarked at Kiel in a small yacht and was on his way to the ironclad Columbia when the craft began to rapidly fill with water. The officers of the Columbia saw what happened and hastened to send off a boat to the Emperor's assistance, but were stopped by His Majesty who ordered the sailors on board the yacht to row to the Imperial yacht which was reached in safety.

Lisbon, 25th.—Mr. Thomas Ribeiro, ex-Portuguese Minister at Rio Janeiro, to-day published a protest against the programme of the fetes in commemoration of the fourth centenary of the discovery of India by Vasco de Gama. Mr. Ribeiro thinks the programme does not do honour to the occasion.

London, 25th.—Telegrams from Portsmouth say that last night's strong wind has ceased, and that the preparations for the review have been concluded. To-day's papers publish a list of the vessels which will take part in to-morrow's review. Her Majesty will go to Spithead in the yacht Victoria and Albert. The men-of-war will steam past the Royal yacht and then through a series of evolutions. It is asserted that Her Majesty will promote several officers in the navy the same day.

Berlin, 25th.—The session of the Reichstag was closed to-day, but no date is fixed for its reopening.

Paris, 25th.—The Deputies approved to-day by a large majority the conventions with Argentina, Guatemala, Bolivia, Peru, Costa Rica, Brazil, Chile and Paraguay for the protection of trade marks, copyright etc.

Rome, 25th.—The Court of Appeal has rejected that of the anarchist Acciarito who attacked King Humbert, and his sentence to the galleys for life stands.

London, 25th.—The Lord Mayor gave a grand lunch to-day in the Guildhall to the English and foreign Princes, the Diplomatic Corps and the Cabinet Ministers. In his speech the Lord Mayor, specially addressing General Davoust, one of the French Ambassadors, said that France and England should always act together for the good of humanity at large. The General answered referring in eloquent terms to the great benefits Her Majesty's glorious reign had conferred on civilization. The Prince of Naples spoke for all the foreign Princes present, and so well that his speech was loudly applauded.

Rome, 25th.—The Senate is now debating the Army Reform Bill which is considered certain to pass as already voted by the Deputies.

Heligoland, 25th.—King Leopold of Belgium arrived here to-day, and went on board the Imperial yacht "Hohenzollern" to visit Emperor William.

Berlin, 25th.—The official organ announces to-day that Emperor William and the Empress will leave on the 7th of August for St. Petersburg and will remain there till the 10th, and will then leave, possibly for Vienna, to visit the Emperor and Empress of Austria.

Brussels, 25th.—L'Etat du Congo denies the rumoured massacre of Baron Dhanis' expedition. The Government has as yet received no official news whatever of such a catastrophe.

Paris, 25th.—The evening papers announce that Judge Potierin, who is trying the Arton case, has summoned Charles de Lesseps, now in London, to appear before the French Consul there and make declaration before him of what he knows about the Panama scandal.

**THIS MORNING'S TELEGRAMS.**  
 (Received after Midnight)

Paris, 25th.—The Senate voted this afternoon, by a large majority, the Bill exempting from the "abattoir" tax all non-alcoholic drinks.

Leighorn, 25th.—The Portuguese war-transport Africa arrived here this afternoon with 200 marines on board and ammunition for the iron-clad Adamaitor which has been constructed here for the Portuguese Government. The Adamaitor will probably leave within 15 days.

Paris, 25th.—Great heat is prevalent throughout France. Storms have occurred in several districts, especially in the Gironde region.

Amsterdam, 25th.—The definite elections for the Deputies give a majority of six seats for the anti-Clericals.

Athens, 25th.—The Government has received a note from Lord Salisbury declaring that it is impossible to obtain better conditions for Greece than those already known; because Turkey insists on a war indemnity, a demand from which Greece had asked to be relieved. This news has created a painful impression both in Government and general circles. The Cabinet at once assembled and sent a reply declaring that peace on the terms stipulated by Turkey threatened the very existence of the Greek nation. It is believed that the Powers will establish some control over the Greek debt. Grave anxiety is felt by the Government regarding the result of the negotiations.

London, 25th.—The P and O boat Aden is overdue; it is feared that she has been wrecked in the China seas.

The Eltonboys serenaded the Queen to-night.

The Belerophon, recently wrecked, is to be burnt.

**THE MADERO PORT.**

If it is possible, as many assert, for the shades of the departed to share our joys and tribulations, then the spirit of Don Eduardo Madero must have witnessed with exultation the ceremony of last Thursday, when the authorities, the engineers, concessionaires, contractors and the sovereign public assembled to celebrate the completion of our beautiful port. The details and salient features of this ceremony we have already described, but we may again say that the crowd which gathered for the occasion surpassed in numbers and enthusiasm the patriotic throng that usually invades our streets on the great national anniversaries. We estimated the crowd at 50,000. Some of our colleagues, however, put down the figure at 100,000, but, whatever were the numbers of the gathering, it is safe to say that the whole nation is convinced of the usefulness and monumentality of our port, and that in the minds of all who know anything of the enterprise, the name of Don Eduardo Madero is associated with this huge and necessary public work. Fate willed that he should not witness the completion of the port, but he was not mowed down by the Grim Reaper without having caught a glimpse of the end, for the works were so far advanced that it required only a feeble effort of the fancy to perceive the Finis in the mist of futurity. Don Eduardo Madero devoted his time, his energy, his talents, his life to the realization of a gigantic idea, which all to-day may appreciate and understand, for the words which convey its meaning, are not articulations that vanish into thin air but huge blocks of stone and enormous quays, that breathe all the strength and majesty of the parent project. It is this language that the public understand. The beauty, the usefulness, the excellence, the solidity of the work appeal at once to the eye, and by contrast cause the memory to conjure up the image of the old mole, and the shallows, the caris that plied in the water, the army of washerwomen cleaning the dirty linen of the city, in a word the ancient foreground of our capital.

Don Eduardo Madero was the enchanter who caused that scene of primitiveness, and we might say barbaric simplicity, to

disappear. It was he who wielded the wand, who pronounced the spell that called into existence our splendid port filled with steamers. It was not, however, such an easy task. Don Eduardo experienced many disappointments, met with numerous obstacles, and was encompassed repeatedly with difficulties that would have deterred a less energetic man. But he was endowed with such will and perseverance, and earnestness, that he overcame all obstacles, carried his project through the Chambers, and obtained capital in London to accomplish it. The public who to-day admire the gigantic proportions of the noble port know little of the expenditure of energy involved in the struggle to carry the scheme through the Legislature; but there are men amongst us who are aware of all that Don Eduardo Madero suffered and encountered for his pet project, and it is they who are to-day subscribing to raise a statue to his memory. There could, however, be no more splendid monument to perpetuate the memory of the concessionaire that the port itself.

The docks and basins extend for three miles along the city front. The works were begun in March 1887, on the plans of Sir John Hawkshaw, the contractors being Messrs. Walker and Co. The works were carried out without interruption during four years until May 1891, when the crisis weighed so terribly upon the country that the Government was compelled to continue them on a reduced scale. The port is divided into the following sections:

Cost, when finished, £7,000,000, more or less, for the North Channel and the warehouses along the newly built docks have yet to be finished. These warehouses, when completed, will be imposing structures. There are on the quays 46 travelling-cranes of 90 cwt power each, besides two that lift 5 tons and a fixed crane of 30 tons power.

Such briefly is an outline of the Madero Port. It is a monumental work, reflecting credit on the concessionaire, the engineers, the contractors and the Government. Large as it may seem, it will be found small within a few years for the ever-increasing commerce of B. Ayres.

**ROSARIO.**  
 JUBILEE COMMEMORATIONS.  
 (From our own Correspondent.)

June 24th.  
 Brilliant, undoubtedly brilliant and successful, have been one and all of the features got up by our British community in honour of England's great Queen and Empress, on the occasion of her Diamond Jubilee; we likewise have had "Queen's weather," if cold, bright and exhilarating, and which has gone far to aid both indoor and outdoor manifestations.

Our British community may well feel proud of the successes obtained, not a single "nota discordante" having been noticed throughout, which together with the spontaneous and general cooperation of our local authorities, have made of our Jubilee celebrations a series of uninterrupted and pleasant events which will ever constitute a bright page to be turned over with pride and pleasure in the years to come, as dear reminiscences to our British colony of Rosario.

Sunday, 20th.

The great thanksgiving service and Te Deum was held at St. Bartholomew's Church, with a more than full attendance—in fact our church could barely contain the numerous crowd. The service was carried through in the most impressive manner, the music and choruses being exceptionally good.

The Consular Corps, National and local authorities, and officers of H.M.S. Basilisk, attended in full dress and uniforms, while the crew, sailors and marines of that gunboat formed a fine guard of honour on the esplanade opposite the church.

Monday, 21st.

The great soiree and concert organized in honour of the Diamond Jubilee took place at our M.E. Church, with a full and select house, the very interesting programme being gone through in a perfect manner. Consul Mallet's elocution was one of the successes of the evening, and we were indeed sorry that Consul Baker who was to have delivered an address, had suddenly to leave for your city on account of the sad accident which befell his esteemed father, and which has been sincerely regretted by all circles of our society.

On the same evening, the grand Cinderella dance in honor of the Queen was given at Mr. and Mrs. E. Kennard Davies' residence, a festival which has proved one of the most brilliant and successful we have had in Rosario.

On entering the hall, the guests were confronted with a magnificent trophy artistically arranged with Argentine and English flags, a good picture of Her Majesty, making the centre.

The two spacious drawing-rooms and the hall itself, all brilliantly lighted up and decorated, were very soon the animated scene of Terpsichorean movement, and the "coup d'œil," which sixty couples presented with the feminine "ensemble" of colour, beauty and elegance, is one not easily to be forgotten, nor yet the splendid music to the tunes of which the happy crowd gracefully undulated, on the well polished floors.

At 12 sharp the orchestra struck up "God Save the Queen," and the doors of the banquetting hall were thrown open. What a sight for a hungry party! The room, beautifully decorated, displayed a number of artistically arranged tables materially loaded with delicacies supplied by flesh, fish and fowl; sweets and confectionery of all kinds, and wines of the most renowned old-world vintages.

The dance ended at 3 a.m. amidst the greatest enthusiasm, and Mr. and Mrs. Davies are greatly to be complimented on the brilliant success which has attended their "soiree."

Space will not allow me to give the names of the guests. Suffice to say that the "elite" of our British society was there, and also the officers of H.M.S. Basilisk.

I may add yes, that the ladies' toilets were magnificent, and the glitter of diamonds the order of the night—bright glitter, but not so bright as that of many a pair of beautiful eyes, at which I longingly gazed from my post of observation as a wall flower.

The ball given on the 21st at Roldan was a splendid affair and numerously attended. Good music, good locale and untiring exertions of the Committee made of the evening such a success that the sun made its appearance ere the festivities ended with "God Save the Queen" and "Rule Britannia," sung in splendid style by Mr. Greenlees.

Tuesday, 22nd.

The reception at the British Consulate was held from 12 till 3 p.m., being attended by the diplomatic corps—local authorities, considerable number of British residents and sympathizers, and officers of the Basilisk, Consul Mallet doing the honours in his usual hearty and polite way.

The torch-light procession organised by Mr. Newell with his pupils was very good indeed. The procession started from the school premises formed in double column, 150 strong, each boy carrying a Chinese lantern, with a band of music and torch bearers in front, and proceeded in orderly manner to visit the Consulate, local authorities and press, ending by cheering from the river bank the crew of the Basilisk, who heartily answered.

The commemoration Ball given on the 22nd at St. Bartholomew's schoolroom was in all details a most signal and brilliant success, and the members of the Committee deserve, indeed, great praise. Music—decorations—refreshments and supper arrangements, left nothing to be desired, and the attendance comprised the elite of our Rosario and camp British society in full numerical force.

Our Chief of Police, Consular corps, Captain of the Port, other officials and the officers of the Basilisk in full dress and uniforms were present, and proceedings were opened by the police band entering and playing first the National Anthem and then God Save the Queen in most correct and splendid style.

Wednesday, 23rd.

The Christy Minstrels' performance by the officers and men of the Basilisk, in aid of the Victoria Benevolent Fund of Rosario, was given at the Olimpo with a full house—I should say that some 1600 persons were present, who all thoroughly appreciated the very good programme of entertainment.

The football match at Plaza Jewell between the volunteers who have served Her Majesty and the Club was a well played and contested game, ending in a victory for the latter by eight points.

To-day the Athletic sports will take place at Plaza Jewell, taking a principal part in them the crew of the Basilisk and pupils of St. Bartholomew's School. Of this and of the grand children's entertainment promoted by Mr. Loveday, which has been postponed to the 29th inst. I shall let you know in due time and now, considering I have written enough to-day, I "pongo punto final" to this letter with a hearty "God save the Queen" on my own account.

The weather was again as cold as charity yesterday, and red noses and imperial blue ears and digits were the order of the day, and of the night also, till shivering citizens got under the blankets. It's a splendid, bracing temperature for healthy people, but trying for the old and weak.

**THE BRAZILIAN NAVY.**  
 NEW SHIPS.

So much attention has been paid here to the strengthening of the Chilean fleet, in view of possible complications with that country, that what Brazil has been and is doing to increase her navy has attracted little attention and caused no comment.

Turning to reliable sources of information we find that Brazil has completed, is completing, or has in some stage of construction, no less than eight new vessels.

First, come the two coast-defence ships ordered some time ago from the Forges et Chantiers de la Méditerranée, and named the Marshal Deodoro and Marshal Floriano. Construction of them was for sometime suspended, as the Government wished to introduce some changes in the design, but it was again resumed, and is being pushed forward rapidly now. These ships would seem to embody an enlargement and improvement on the design of the Argentine "Libertad" and "Independencia." They have about 45% greater displacement, are much better protected by armour, and carry a heavier battery; although the guns added will be considered of doubtful value by most naval officers.

They are of the following general dimensions, etc.—Length, 267 ft. 6 in.; beam, 47 ft. 3 in.; maximum draught, 18 ft. 2 in.; displacement, 3,162 tons. Two sets of triple-expansion engines of 3,400 horsepower actuate twin screws and are supplied with steam by eight D'Allest water-tube boilers. With modified forced draught the speed expected is from 15 to 15½ knots, being somewhat more than that obtained by the Argentine ships, and with natural draught 14 knots. There is an armoured belt 5 ft. 6 in. in depth amidships, varying in thickness from 18½ in. to 4 in., and a deck 1½ in. steel. Forward and aft, on the centre line are two barbettes of 8½ in. Harvey steel, each containing one 9.4 in. Armstrong gun. There are four small casemates of 3 in. Harvey steel in each of which is mounted a 4.7 in. quick-firer. The balance of the armament consists of two 5.9 in. howitzers; four 6 pounders; two 10 pounders; two machine guns and two torpedo-tubes, also two field guns. The armour for these ships weighs no less than 1,050 tons each. The coal supply is 236 tons and the complement of men about 200.

Next, we have to consider, three sister cruisers very like the new Chilean ship Zenteno. Two of these vessels are named, one Amazonas and the other Barroso; the third ship is not yet launched. The Amazonas is a ship 390 ft. 2 in. long on the water-line, with a beam of 43 ft. 3 in. and when drawing 17 ft. of water displaces 3,600 tons. She is wood sheathed and coppered, and has a complete armoured deck 3 in. thick on the slopes and somewhat thinner on the flat. Her engines, consisting of two sets of the vertical, inverted cylinder, triple expansion type, are to develop 7,500 horse-power, and give the ship a speed of at least 20 knots, and the bunkers will hold 700 tons of coal with the ship at normal draught. The armament will be six 6 in., four 4.7 in. and 6 pounder and four 1 pounder Armstrong quick-firers; four machine guns and three torpedo-tubes. The 6 in. and 4.7 in. guns are 50 calibre long and are so arranged that three of the 6 in. guns fire direct ahead and three astern. The gun positions are protected by 4 in. armor-plates.

The remaining three ships are classed as torpedo-gunboats of the "Patria" type, they are named Caramuru, Timbiva and Tupy and all are nearly or quite completed. The Germania yard at Kiel was given the contract for their construction. The Timbiva has been delivered; her length is 259 ft., beam, 30 ft. 9 in., and draught, normal, 10 ft. 2 in., at which she displaces 1,030 tons. The engines are of the usual triple-expansion type and collectively indicate over 6,000 horse-power, giving the ship a speed of about 23 knots. The coal capacity is sufficient to give a radius of action of 3000 miles at 10 knots speed. Her armament is two 4 in., six 6 pounder and four 1 pounder quick-firer guns and three torpedo-tubes. This ship is really a little faster than the Patria as would be expected, for with practically the same dimensions of hull, she has engines of some 1,500 greater horse-power.

All of the new Brazilian ships are of useful and effective classes and will tend to greatly strengthen the fleet.

**THE BLACKWALL TUNNEL.**  
 A TRIUMPH OF ENGINEERING.

As a great engineering work the Blackwall Tunnel will rank as one of the most important achievements of the Queen's reign, and as the result of municipal enterprise it deserves the praise of the rate-payers of London, who, of course, will have to pay for it.

The need of additional means of communication between the north and south banks of the Thames below London-bridge was felt to be urgent, even in the beginning of the century, and it had become accentuated as the manufacturing districts extended eastward along the river. Up to the present time however, the population of the East-end, numbering 1,700,000, or a larger number than the combined populations of Liverpool, Man-

chester, Salford, and Birmingham, have not possessed a free river crossing between the Tower Bridge and the Woolwich Free Ferry, a distance of nearly nine miles. At the end of 1891 the contract for the present tunnel, designed by Mr. A. R. Binnie, chief engineer to the County Council, was obtained by Messrs. Pearson and Son, their tender being £871,000. The tunnel crosses the river 1 1/4 mile below Greenwich and three miles above Woolwich. The river here is 1,200 ft. wide and 46 ft. deep at high water. The total length of the work is 6,200 ft., or nearly 1 1/4 mile, being about the same distance as from Charing-cross to St. Paul's. On the Kent side of the river the incline is on a gradient of 1 in 36, and has a run of 2,408-6 ft.; the portion under the river for a distance of 1,212 ft. is level; and the north incline has a gradient of 1 in 34 for 2,579-6 ft. In other words, the inclined approaches will be about as steep as the Haymarket. The tunnel proper is circular in cross section, 27 ft. outside diameter (or 6 ft. larger than that of St. Clair, the largest hitherto constructed), built up of 14 cast-iron segments and a key-piece. The inside diameter is 24 ft. 3 in. Within this the road of 16 ft., with two footpaths, each 3 ft. 1/2 in. in width, is formed, resting on an arched subway 12 in. in width and 5 ft. 6 in. in height for the reception of water pipes.

Although the most difficult portion of the work was that under the river itself, almost as many difficulties were encountered in land on either side, as the ground was saturated with water in direct communication with the river. For some distance in mid-river the tunnel was driven within 5 ft. of the river bed, and the intervening ground consisted of coarse gravel. The mode of driving the tunnel was by means of a shield which was worked under compressed air. This shield was a structure of steel, weighing about 250 tons, cylindrical in shape, 19 ft. 6 in. in length, and 27 ft. 3 in. outside diameter. It was stiffened by two circular portions 3 ft. apart, and its forward or working face, which pressed against the material to be excavated, was divided into 12 pockets or cells by three horizontal and three vertical partitions. It was within these spaces, which were 6 ft. in height, that the men worked. Between the two circular stiffening partitions were formed air-locks and shoots for passing out the excavated material. Arranged round the inner circumference of the shield and attached to it, and the circular partitions were disposed 28 hydraulic rams for the purpose of pushing the shield forward. The enormous water pressure of two-and-three-quarter tons to the square inch was used in thrusting the shield forward, and sometimes the total pressure was as much as 5,000 tons. In the rear of the shield, or that portion of it which faced the completed tunnel, was a space which was merely enclosed within the outer skin of the shield, this, which is called the "tail" of the shield, always overlapped by 2 ft. 6 in., or one cast-iron ring, the last completed portion of the tunnel, and within it were built up the various rings of iron which the tunnel is lined. The face of the shield was kept open when working in clay, but when in gravel its shutters were opened by a very small amount at one time, and for several weeks near the centre of the river all the excavation was done through small holes 7 in. by 5 in.

In all tunnels where water is encountered in large quantities compressed air is now generally adopted. The air is compressed by engines on the surface to the pressure of the water met with in the workings, and is then taken by pipes to the tunnel. The air drives the water out and keeps the ground to be excavated comparatively dry. To prevent the air from escaping along the already completed portion of the tunnel a brick bulkhead is built across the tunnel at some distance behind the working face, forming what is practically a horizontal diving bell, the space between the bulkhead and the working face being filled with compressed air. Entrance to and exit from this space is obtained by means of locks in the bulkhead. At the Blackwall Tunnel an air-pressure of about 27 lb. to the square inch beyond the ordinary atmospheric pressure was necessary, and engines of about 1,200-horse power were required to compress the amount of air used. To insure the safety of the men, and to prevent the compressed air from blowing up the ground above the shield, a layer of clay about 10 ft. thick and 150 ft. wide was deposited from barges over the line of the tunnel. Absolute safety was not, however, attained by this method, as twice holes were blown in the bed of the river and the water poured into the tunnel, but on each occasion the men happily escaped without accident. A large portion of the clay placed on the river bed was afterwards excavated in the tunnel. As working in compressed air is very dangerous, for some persons, great care was exercised in selecting the men, and every man was medically examined before he was allowed to start work. The County Council furthermore obtained powers to compensate workmen injured while working under compressed air, and in cases of death to make allowances to widows and orphans. Owing to the precautions taken, however, compensation for injury has only been necessary in half-a-dozen cases, and there have been no deaths directly due to the effect of compressed air. The interior of the tunnel is lined with white glazed tiles, and there is constant electric lighting.

The following figures, in addition to those already given, will be found interesting:—The number of men employed at one time on the works was 300. In the construction of the tunnel there were used 17,000 tons of cast iron, 7,000,000 bricks, 1,000,000 white glazed tiles, 20,000 tons of cement, 110,000 tons of concrete, five acres of asphalt, and 12 miles of electric-light cables. The quantity of earth excavated is set down at 600,000 tons. The total time occupied in the construction of the tunnel has been a little over five years, the contractors having begun operations in 1892; but at least a year of the time was occupied in preparatory work, such as the diversion of sewers. The portion of the tunnel under the Thames was constructed in almost exactly 12 months, which is at an average rate of 100 ft. per month.

The County Council are entitled to take some credit for the fact that the actual cost of the work has been below the estimate of their engineer. It is satisfactory, also, to know that the accidents, which are inseparable from every large engineering work, have been few and far between at Blackwall. The engineer-in-chief, Mr. Binnie has won the admiration of all eminent engineers. Speaking last month Sir Benjamin Baker said that he had visited all the subaqueous tunnels of importance except the Thames Tunnel; the Hudson Tunnel and others he had been intimately associated with as consulting engineer, and he had also visited Sarnia, and there was nothing in the world to be compared with the work accomplished at Blackwall.

**CAPTURE OF THE U.S.S. "CASTINE" BY THE SPANIARDS.**

In pleasing contrast to the animosity supposed to be felt by Spaniards for Americans, and the violent attacks of their press in the Plate, is the recent action of Spanish Club in inviting the officers of the American warship "Castine" to their ball last Wednesday evening. The invitation caused some surprise here, as we visited all the subaqueous tunnels of importance except the Thames Tunnel; the Hudson Tunnel and others he had been intimately associated with as consulting engineer, and he had also visited Sarnia, and there was nothing in the world to be compared with the work accomplished at Blackwall.

At all events, the American officers, who concern themselves little with political squabbles, joyfully accepted the invitation in the same spirit in which it was sent, and a number of them attended the ball, where they were the objects of the most continuous and cordial attentions on the part of their hosts, who were indefatigable in providing them with the prettiest girls as partners. Though the gallant conversation powers were handicapped by a foreign tongue, the Spanish Club supplied them with a vocabulary which was quickly understood by the bright-eyed, dance-loving señoritas, and the "modus vivendi" thus established quickly led to a perfect "entente cordiale." A delightful evening was passed, and the officers departed charmed with their hosts, particularly the hostesses, inviting both parties to the ball on the next day.

Accordingly, on Thursday afternoon the "Castine" was boarded and captured by a large party of officers by Messrs. Errausquin, Tenorio, Domenech, Aleu and many other members of the Spanish Club, in command of a large force of their sisters and their cousins and their aunts, all armed for the fray with the latest creations of the local Worth. The officers were aided in the defence of their ship by Mrs. Berry, wife of the Captain, and Mrs. Wilson, both looking irresistible in gowns fresh from Paris, from which city both ladies have recently arrived to join their husbands on this station.

When the Presidential guard arrived the ship was dressed, a band of marines drawn up and presented arms, and eleven rousing American cheers, led by Lieutenant Houston in stentorian tones, were given for the President, not allowed to be fired in the docks. Once the Presidential salute and the deafening din of steam whistles and fog horns had subsided, it was discovered that the long wait on deck had chilled every one. One of the Señoritas suggested that dancing would be the best means of restoring the circulation of the blood. While the deck was being cleared for action all adjourned to the ward-room, where a collation was spread, and a certain adreumatic punch, of which Paymaster Webster has the secret, filled the beautiful silver tankard presented by the city of Castine to the gunboat on the occasion of its baptism.

We left by the 8.00 a. m. train from the Central Station by the Central Argentine and Rosario line, with a return ticket to Rosario de la Frontera, and took tickets to Salta.

The journey from Buenos Aires to Santiago del Estero and near to the approach of Tucuman is of a monotonous nature, as the flatness of the country along the line offers no variety to the eye. The villages and towns we passed on our way are all much the same, not differing from those of the Province of Buenos Aires, except perhaps in importance.

As we approach Tucuman, the mountains make their appearance. On the left along the line we notice already some high ones. Also some snow was visible on the higher summits.

However, the train finally carried us safely to Tucuman, where we were assaulted by the Railway porters, each in eager desire to be the first to welcome us, and not knowing that we were accustomed to travel, soon repented their hastiness; for we handed our luggage in charge of a very pressing, athletic looking young man, sent to American officers by this Club, and in view of the somewhat strained relations existing between Spain and the United States the action of a representative institution like the Spanish Club could not have been more felicitous and opportune as tending to demonstrate that the virulent attacks of such sheets as *Don Quijote* are not approved by the upper class of the Spanish colony.

The large patios of the houses called our attention, especially the variety of tropical plants that adorned them. My friend was always eager to peep and see whether he might get a glimpse at a coffee-tree, but such was not the case. The banana tree predominated, and a beautiful large tree with a red flower called, as I was told, "flor de mi corazon." The churches are very nice also. The Plaza resembles much that of Concepcion del Uruguay, with its range of orange trees and a stand for some band to display their musical talent, whilst diverting the public, who seemed to me to be much in want of being cheered up. I do not wish to be cynical in this expression. Far away is it from my intention to harbour any such feeling; but in the short conversations I have had with a few store-keepers, I found out that everything was very dull for the public, especially business. In fact, one party confessed to me that in most cases what they sold was "sold on credit," and that they in their turn, obtained the equivalent from others in the same way. In other words "barter." Early the next morning we took the train for Salta. Soon we found ourselves in a semi-tropical district, the vegetation on either side of the line being very vigorous, trees of different growths with larger shaped leaves abounding, the thick bushes hiding the red cacti and cacti. Now and then in the depth of the plain, appeared to me to be of more than ordinary size and a half in thickness, with a white clay foundation.

We stopped naturally at the various stations, the first of importance after Tucuman being "Tafi." Here the women go round selling oranges, sugar cane, empanadas, sausages, but not their famous cheese. There was none of that to be found, neither in Salta nor Tucuman. Tafi is well situated at the foot of elevated mountains. It is in aspect an insignificant looking place at present, but must necessarily develop into importance with time as the lands surrounding are very rich in pasture. We then came to Tala having passed a tunnel previously, as well as several streams. A beautiful estancia house exists in front of the station. The land about is well stocked with cattle, mostly to Rosario de la Frontera, the lands being overgrown with dense bushes, the grasses being of a coarse nature in their majority. Any quantity of timber exists in the vicinity. Large trees are not visible along the line, but plenty of fire-wood at the stations. I thought I would have come across sleepers ready to be forwarded to the Bs. Aires market. It was not the case. It is interesting to notice all along the line the difference in plants disappear, but appear again much farther north, where the soil and its relative elevation over the sea seemed to concur. Especially is this the case with the cactus species.

At the station Alurralde we were obliged to make a halt, as the cargo train that was coming, owing from Salta on the previous night had gone off the line, managing to block our way. It seems this often occurs on that line. The engine driver with the help of a few peons, however, cleared the way and at 2 p.m. we went ahead arriving at Rosario de la Frontera at 4.30 p.m., where we had breakfast. The lands, about "Alurralde" are good for pasture, there being a very important Establishment near the station.

**THE ARGENTINE HORSE.**

Lieutenant Colonel Amadeo Jolly, who recently rode from Rosario to this city, accompanied by a few National Guard officers, has forwarded to the Chief of the Army Staff a short account of the ride accomplished on native horses. The distance from Rosario to this city is 400 kilometres, and was covered in the very short time of 83 hours, 36 of which were given over to repose. The party left Rosario at 11.30 on the morning of the 7th inst. and arrived at Arroyo Seco at 2.30 the same afternoon, having ridden 35 ki-

lometres, equal to 21 miles. The party continued the journey and arrived at San Nicolas at 6 p.m. the same day, thus riding 68 kilometres in six hours and a half. Paraiso station was reached the next day at 10 a.m. and San Pedro on the 9th. The heaviest ride, 120 kilometres, was accomplished on the same day. Lieutenant Colonel Jolly and his officers rode into San José de Flores at 10.30 p.m. on the 11th inst. It is worthy of note that all the horses which accomplished this remarkable journey had never been prepared for the ride. This once more proved the wonderful resistance of the "coloured" horse. The ride is made still more remarkable when we take the fearful condition of camp roads into consideration, the want of stables in which to give the animals a proper rest, and the scarcity of forage. Similar rides accomplished by officers belonging to the German, French and Austrian cavalry regiments were done under very different conditions. All the horses used for the purpose were well fed and looked after, while the roads over which they travelled were all macadamised. Lieutenant Colonel Jolly in his report declares that the regulation army saddle used on this occasion is most inconvenient to horse and rider, as it is too heavy and clumsy. This officer, furthermore, states that the horses were not fatigued with their long journey, and could, if necessary, have returned to Rosario in the same length of time as employed in the ride down. It would be well for some cavalry regiment to try the experiment.

**EDITOR'S TABLE.**

The echoes of the Jubilee still lingered in the British ambient yesterday, but grew fainter and fainter as the resumption of business got into swing. At home the grand naval review at Spithead to-day attracts almost as much attention as the Procession on Tuesday, and hundreds of thousands of people are flocking from all parts of the United Kingdom to witness it. The world has never before seen such a display of naval strength, which will force it to admit that Britannia never before held the Sceptre of the Seas with a firmer grasp. Our German friends were startled considerably by the narrow escape of their Kaiser at Kiel, where His Majesty had a narrow shave of going to Davy Jones's locker. The Emperor showed on the occasion such cool, even rash, courage that he has well won his right to don an Admiral's uniform as often as he jolly well pleases. For particulars of his narrow escape see our telegrams-column. The Sultan's fanatical subjects are threatening to "do for him" because he has submitted to the terms of peace imposed by the Powers, and there are grave fears that the massacres of Christians will be renewed. The *New York Herald* says that Secretary Sherman is about to spring a Creation-licking surprise on the world in connection with the Cuban question in a few days. What can it be?

The venerable and illustrious General Mitre is 77 years old to-day, and will be the object of several affectionate demonstrations. The *Standard* joins them heartily in spirit, wishing the distinguished patriot, statesman and author many happy returns of the day.

The Jubilee festivities in Junin were carried out in a most successful manner. Though counting only some 60 Englishmen in all, the celebration was of the most enthusiastic description, and said much for the loyalty of Her Majesty's faithful subjects in the district. The day began with a breakfast at the station, and after a patriotic speech by Mr. Colin York, and the National Anthem, an adjournment was made to the cricket field, which was thronged with hundreds of children, all eager to take part in its sports. A most enjoyable afternoon was spent, an interesting feature being a tug of war between shops and offices, the former winning after two desperate struggles. Then followed the distribution of some 200 prizes among the children, and also of 100 Jubilee medals kindly sent by the Railway manager. The proceedings concluded with the singing of "God Save the Queen." At night a grand Christy Minstrel entertainment by the "Junin Black Stars" was given in the Reading Room before a crowded audience and was in every way a success, especially the finale, a tableau entitled "The Queen." After this followed a ball, and dancing

was kept up till 4 a.m. on the following morning. Mr. and Mrs. Colin York were indefatigable in their zeal for the success of the fête, and were ably supported by a hardworking committee.

A husband and wife, with a Spanish name, were yesterday arrested by the police on the charge of having beaten to death a little Indian girl, aged eight, whom they retained, presumably, as a servant. It is very painful that such an accusation should be even possible, and reminds us what absolutely heartless wretches there are in this fair world. Mahan, U.S.N., who after quoting the letter of Catherine II to Grimm, in which she predicted the coming of a Caesar who would put an end to the murders, carnage and uproar in France—refers to the work accomplished by Napoleon, as Commander in Chief of the Army of Italy, and then says:—"Caesar had come to rule the destinies of France for 18 years, to overturn the entire system of Europe, and to prove himself the greatest master of land warfare that the world has known."

There was a crowded gathering at the Argentine Geographical Institute last night to hear our gitted colleague Mr. Guillermo Godio lecture on the Pampa Central, Neuquen and their general features. As was to be expected in such talented hands the lecture was a great success and a treat for those present.

Kaiser Second to None is said to look with anything but a pleased eye on the growing cordiality between France and Italy, so, in his usual off-hand way, he has invited himself to Rome in September next, to argue the point with placid and popular Humbert.

Our up-to-the-mark-and-date contemporary the *Uruguay News* publishes in its last issue the following interesting paragraph about National airs:—"The national airs of great countries are short, while those of the little countries are very long. For instance, "God Save the Queen" is fourteen bars, the Russian hymn sixteen bars, and "Hail Columbia", the foremost among the American airs, has twenty-eight bars. On the other hand Siam's national hymn has seventy-six bars, that of Uruguay seventy, Chile's forty-six and so on. San Marino, the smallest Republic in the world, has the longest national hymn. The national air of China is so long that when people want to hear it they have to take half a day off to be able to listen to its dulcet strains. With hardly an exception, the national airs of all the savage or semi-civilized nations are invariably written in the minor key. To make an air popular, so that it can be sung and whistled by everyone, it has to be written in a very limited compass. "God Save the Queen" is written in a compass of seven notes: "Hill Columbia", "Rule Britannia" and the "Marsellaise" within an octave and a note, the Austrian hymn within an octave. But "The Star Spangled Banner" is composed of thirteen notes, and for that reason it is very difficult for untrained voices to sing it with the proper effect.

"Ho! la". A colonel in the army named Gonzalez and another gentleman named Clementino (He is now Clement-in-oh!) have been clapped into quod the Rio court for five and four years respectively for, as Directors, having caused the smash of a boom bank called the "Banco Territorial y Mercantil de Minas". What special kind of irregularity the two worthies were guilty of this deponent knoweth not but, judging by their sentences, it must have been pretty stiffish. It is good to see that 'there are still Judges in Berlin'—we mean in Brazil.

A Christian Pigtail, and an Ambassador to boot. The Flowery Land is improving. The new Chinese Minister at Washington is a Christian, a member of the Church of England. His suite nearly all speak English, and one of them, who it is expected will be Consul-General, belongs to a well-known British family in HongKong. The mass has begun to move, slowly and heavily, painfully almost, but it is moving, praise be to—the fine, cold weather which has frozen off the locusts, the approaching liquidation and the increased certainty of Roca being the only candidate. These are really the factors of the situation, though from a superficial standpoint it would seem that the shaking-off of the lethargy and climbing down of the quotations were simply the result of the backwardation beginning to take shape. It is so evidently, but what does the backwardation spring from? Clearly from the promise of a good hard winter, large crops, and every prospect of general welfare. The effects of the commercial depression are beginning to wear off, and though it would hardly be correct to suppose that the market is actually discounting a prospective prosperity and possible crops, practically it amounts to that, since the clip has to be taken into account as well as the wheat, maize, linseed etc. Taking things all round, it must be confessed that if they have been pretty bad they have not been nearly so black as anticipated, which shows the wonderful vitality of the country, even under circumstances as adverse as we are ever likely to see them. We have had almost everything except war or revolution to contend with, miserable crops, cattle plagues, bad wool, and commerce cracking. Still we have pulled through all, if not without turning a hair, at least very successfully, and what wonder that gold should begin to break with the prospects brightening. The crisis after all never seemed to strike very deeply, never got at the working classes, hardly did more in fact than crush off the parasitical shoots that an abusive credit system had grafted on to commerce; these have fallen away, and but that the Centro Comercio is still inquiring into causes and results, there is little, at all events to outward appearances, to show any strain, much less dislocation or rupture. We have it is true, a couple of dozen business houses in moratoriums, but they are sound at bottom and will pull through. The sugar business perhaps has really struck the root, but that was bound to come, fair or foul, and the sound part of it will come off all right, relieved from the top-hammer. The gold market thus has begun to wake up, and though the real stir may not be just yet, it is not very far off.

Though business in gold at the first hour barely ran to about a good 3 million dollars, the market showed very marked symptoms of a bearish hue, due to the abundance of first-rate signatures offering to sell for dates. Buyers were scarce, which with the cash supply fairly free, brought prices down steadily, opening at 295 to close weak at 294.50 with a small backwardation difference both for end of month and July. After the hour there was gold over and the price relaxed to 293.90. Stocks on the whole were not very animated. Some National G's were done at 84.10. Municipal Bonds '97 at 76.80 and Catalinas at 82.20 to 8. Santa Fé Consols are back to 89, which bears out our remarks of a few days ago about the "gatos," as otherwise with the quarterly coupon falling in, the quotation should at least be steady. A batch of Buenos Ayres ports was done at 23.

It seems that unfavorable breezes are blowing, as some of our poetic colleagues nautically put it, for Minister Escalante's projected reforms in the National Mortgage Bank's Charter, and it would appear that the coral reef on which they will be stranded is the clause constituting a mixed board, which would give the cordula and bondholders a very decisive voice in the management of the establishment. Now this reform would seem on the face of it most advisable, one guaranteeing a proper and safe working, but on the grounds that it might create friction between the liberal-minded directors named by the Government and the more stringently disposed members elected by the bondholders, it is vigorously opposed. The objection seems trivial in itself, inasmuch as it is not
