

London, August 1st.

Prince Battenberg has been honored

The Daily News correspondent in the Soudan telegraphs that Osman Digna has been killed. This news yet needs confirmation, and if true, the Soudan insurrection may be considered at an end.

## PRESS TELEGRAMS.

New York 29th.—The military and civil corporations have applied to assist at General Grant's funeral. Over 30,000 veteran soldiers, bearing the colors of the last war, will also assist.

Washington 30th.—As a mark of public grief the post-offices will remain closed on the 30th August, which is the day fixed for General Grant's funeral.

The remains of General Grant will arrive here from Mount McGregor on August 5th.—Great preparations are already being made for the funeral. Riverside Park will henceforward be the scene of the general Grant's funeral.

Madrid 29th.—Cholera has broken out on the French border. The fourth part of the population of Montevideo, Soria, have fallen victims to the terrible plague within the last two days. The rest of the inhabitants have fled.

Rome 29th.—Several Liberal Italian Associations are organizing a society for the care of cholera patients in Europe.

St. Petersburg 29th.—According to the military organ, the Zev, the number of Afghan troops on the Afghan border amounts to 20,000 men. The Russian forces comprise thirty companies stationed in Pendjeh and Zuljan.

Madrid 29th.—Castellar is travelling through Galicia. The greatest popular enthusiasm prevails, but the Government have prohibited all demonstration.

Paris 29th.—M. Jules Ferry has delivered a speech in the chamber of Deputies defending his colonial policy in Government. The eloquent ex-premier was repeatedly interrupted.

Madrid 29th.—In consequence of the new taxes, the inhabitants of Huesca have risen, burning down the Government offices.

Paris 30th.—Yesterday the Panama Canal held their annual meeting under the presidency of M. Ferdinand de Lesseps. The President's report was generally accepted.

Constantinople 31st.—Said Pasha's health is worse, the Pasha being at present in a state of delirium, which retards the progress of the Egyptian Finance question.

It is said that England will endeavour to arrange the Egyptian finances without the consent of Turkey.

Cairo 31st.—It is stated that the greatest disorder prevailed amongst the Mahdi's followers, after the prophet's death.

Moscow 31st.—Seventy rebels condemned to work in Siberia rebels on the road, and killed two soldiers. Although they were unarmed, they kept the soldiers at bay for two hours.

During the fight 30 prisoners succeeded in escaping and 20 others were killed.

Paris 31st.—A heavy storm has broken over the departments of the South of France. The harvest at Roche, Aragon, has been completely destroyed.

Washington 30th.—Col. Burrows and Dr. Duncan have been named Commissioners to examine the South American markets, with a view to encouraging trade with the U.S. States. Col. Burrows will visit the Pacific Coast and Dr. Duncan the Atlantic Coast. Both Commissioners will leave on Aug. 1st.

London 29th.—Consuls are quoted as follows:—

Rosario August 1st.—Dr. Irigoyen leaves to-day for Santa Fé accompanied by his secretary and several members of the Committee.

Another building society is on the tapas. Details as yet.

Patagonia Aug. 1st.—Dr. Jose M. Cabo, surgeon in the 2nd division of the army, and collaborator of the *Patagonia*, Gen. Winter's organ, received yesterday a note from the Governor, blaming him for not assisting at the recent political meeting, organized by Com. Roca on July 25th. This means that the worthy doctor is about to lose his post. Cabo has telegraphed to Pres. Roca for protection. In the meantime he takes the Villarino.

Later.—This afternoon an interview was held by Dr. Cabo with Gen. Winter, who gave satisfactory explanations.

The Juez de Paz in Pringles, which is under Gen. Winter's jurisdiction, has been unexpectedly requested, not to say compelled, to resign. The Juez de Paz states that the cause of this destination is on account of his having given Padre Fagano the keys of the church, for the purpose of celebrating a marriage and several baptisms.

General Winter has decreed duties on all carts running between Patagonia and the National territories.

The Villarino has sailed with Com. Palacios and his 120 Indians on board. Don Marcelino C. Crespo has been named Juez de Paz of the district. Everybody is delighted with this nomination.

THE PENNANO RAILWAY.

This great and important up-country scheme is now before Congress, and has given rise to such animated discussion that the Ministers have been called and interrogated on the measure.

The bill, it seems, passed the Senate last year, and in the hurry of business to close the session, was postponed to this year, and now comes up for a final reading. The Provincial Governments of Salta and Jujuy last year concluded a contract with Mr. Pennano for the construction and the working of a railway to run from the Central Northern (Tucuman) at a point between the cities of Salta and Jujuy, to the town of Oran, passing through the Pampa Blanca, San Pedro, Ledesma, San Lorenzo, and Rio de la Plata.

Art. 2.—The line to be of narrow gauge of the same kind and with the same materials as the Central Norte Railway.

Art. 3.—The railway to be divided into sections, as follows: from Oran to Rio de las Piedras; from Rio de las Piedras to Ledesma; and from Ledesma to the junction.

Art. 4.—The concessionaire to present the surveys 12 months after the signing of the contract, and begin work six months after these surveys have been approved by the Executive.

Art. 5.—The concessionaire is entitled to the fiscal lands necessary for the building of the railway.

THE PRESENT occupant of Sir Isaac Newton's Professorial Chair at Cambridge University, Professor G. G. Stokes, F.R.S., who is also Secretary of the Royal Society of England, delivered a remarkable address at the Annual Meeting of the Victoria Institute, in London, towards the end of June. Sir H. B. Barlow, G.C.M.G., F.R.S., occupied the chair, and the audience, which included many members of both Houses Parliament, filled every part of the large hall. Professor Stokes gave an important account of the progress of physical science during the past quarter of a century, and, reviewing the results, specially noted that as scientific truth developed, so had men given up the idea that there was any opposition between the Book of Nature and the Book of Revelation. He said that for the last twenty years or so one of the most striking advance had been made in the application of the spectroscope, and in the information obtained with regard to the constitution of the heavenly bodies. The discovery that there were in these particular chemical elements, which were also present in our earth, exalted our idea of the universality of the laws of Nature, and there was nothing that contrasted with what he had learned in Revelation, unless we were to say that the God of the hills and of the valleys was the God of the hills and of the valleys. Entering upon some particularity into the composition of the sun, the Professor said this gave an idea of an enormous temperature

sugar factory now working, which turns out besides the canes, about 8000 ar. of sugar. Pampa Blanca is irrigated by a canal from Rio Grande de Jujuy, and the people grow in abundance sugar, cane, rice, and tobacco, and there are also large cattle estancias. From Pampa Grande the line runs to San Pedro where there is one of the largest sugar establishments in the public turning out 100,000 ar. sugar yearly and 6000 litres of aguardiente, and the fabric has capacity to turn out 150,000 ar. sugar, and it is in this district that kerosene superabounds. From thence it runs to Reducción a most delightful spot between San Pedro and Ledesma. Here the sugar business once flourished, was abandoned, but now that there is prospect of a Railway a strong company is formed to work the place.

Reducción is one of the finest properties in the country, with a splendid water power and the richest timbered country and magnificent pastures. From thence the line runs to Eden, which is the principal sugar factory in Jujuy; here it was that the first sugar refining machinery was introduced into this Republic. After Eden came San Pedro, and after that came the Tucumán sugar factories and those of Santiago del Estero. At Eden they turn out 150,000 ar. sugar and 2,000 barrels per annum. Close by is the fine establishment of San Antonio, a great coffee plantation producing better coffee than that of Santa Cruz or Brazil. Next the road runs to San Lorenzo, another important sugar station, which gives 20,000 ar. sugar and 4000 barrels aguardiente yearly. This is a great fruit district and here they grow mandarins, coffee, rice and wheat.

At San Lorenzo one plantation has over 2,000 coffee plants; the owner prefers coffee to sugar; it gives more All the land at Rio de la Plata Piedras is studded with the richest timber, and cattle do admirably here and are renowned for their great size. From Piedras to Rio Colorado, 40 kiloms., it is all forest and from thence the line runs clean into the city of Oran.

We shall reserve for a future chapter all about Oran, and not to extend too much on this most interesting subject, we now give the law as passed by the Senate and which is at present under discussion in the Deputies. We consider Mr. Pennano's scheme one of the most necessary of all the different Railway projects at present mentioned.
