THE CENTRAL NORTHERN RAILWAY.

The tunnel imbroglio and the interpellation in Congress are entering a new phase: There are two sides to a question, as there are two months to a tunnel. The interpellation, with its view of the question, has been heard; and now the tunnel and viaduct are being heard. The Minister of the Interior admitted the works; the engineers who accompanied H. E. expressed their approval of the route; correspondents of newspapers were sent to Tucuman to inspect the tunnel and wrote against the works begun by Engineer Staelius. Public opinion sided with the interpellation, it was being round now, and the Government organ has published two private letters to the President of the Republic from the Governor of Tucuman, and from the Bolivian Minister, on the vexed question.

Both the tunnel and viaduct are so far away that it is indeed very difficult to gather any very definite notion of the proportions of the imbroglio, but, falling back on the great admiration excited by same in the mind of the Minister of the Interior, and on the ingenious and private opinions of the Bolivian Minister, the tunnel must be a wonderful job and the viaduct must be a monument of Egyptian solidity; this may account for the fact that 2000 men could not advance more than 25 kilometer in a twelve-month. It may be also that many people in this country never before saw a tunnel, and perhaps have entertained a hazy idea of viaducts, accustomed as they are to the easy laying down of rails in the pampa without even the necessity of ballast. Such works must necessarily produce a great impression on the minds of those who never saw any works of such magnitude before.

The Bolivian Minister writes to President Roca, under date, Tucuman, March 4th. His Excellency studied with care the route up to the river Vipos, 15 leagues from Tucuman. The following extracts from this private correspondence are most interesting:

"The works may be called great works. The rails skirt the slopes of the Andes, stretching through a broken Aconcagua, which dashes destruction. Six or seven table-lands interrupt the passes, with their deep valleys and ravines and slopes going until they embrace the hills on the river Sal. Cuttings and embankments follow each other in turning succession; some deep, others high, with the tunnel and viaduct in the

contre-gigante works—they stagger one.

"There are twenty-two cutters, which is the 'day appointed' for the execution of the first of the convicted Phoenix Park murderers, Joseph Brady. The Dublin people are accustomed to make a great holiday of Whitsun-Monday, and to take excursions on that day. It shows the feeling of sympathy with the assassins of Mr. Burke amongst the Irish; even of the middle-class, that it is generally agreed that out of respect for Mr. Brady's execution an immense number of people have determined to stay at home this Whitsun week and forego their ordinary pleasures.

Here follow some considerations on the magnitude of the works, and the difficulties of the cuttings through the rocky sides of the mountains. The volume of earth removed is compared to the removals of many hills."

Edward O'Brien and Thomas Doyle were arraigned to-day for conspiracy to murder certain persons—to wit, public officials. They both pleaded guilty and were put back.

Edward McCaffrey was also brought up on the same charge. He pleaded not guilty. The same man is also indicted for the wilful murder of Mr. Thomas Henry Burke, to whom he pleaded not guilty, and his trial will proceed.

The Gallaghers, Whitchurch, Wilson and the other dynamite conspirators six of them—were committed at Bow Street this afternoon for trial on the charge of treason-felony. Norman was committed for misdemeanour.

Another of the 1st, Dalton, was discharged but afterwards re-arrested and sent to Liverpool to answer another charge.

The members of what is known as the Vigilance Society, Kingston, Healy and Gibney, were committed for trial to-day at the Dublin Police Court, on the charge of conspiracy to murder. The principal victim in this case was Pooles.

Matthew Brady, the brother of Joe Brady, has also been committed for trial on a charge of threatening a juror in the Brady case, Mr. King.

This is a pretty respectable list of Irish convictions, executions and committals for one day, and shows that the Government, thanks to the informers, have got their hands fairly on the neck of the conspiracy. It would be astonishing that if out of the long list of convictions, political and criminal, there were not a few who had given the best result!"

The impartial opinion of the Bolivian Minister is important; the works are on a great scale and mark a new epoch in railway construction in this country. No serious difficulty has been encountered in the construction of the existing lines, and for the first time engineering difficulties of magnitude have occasioned delays that were inexplicable and swayed the opinion of the public. The committee named by the members of the interpolation in Congress should make a trip to Tucuman and see with their own eyes the works and the great difficulties of a route through a mountainous country. The committee is one thousand miles from the scene of action; let the members stand like the Bolivian Minister on the top of the embankments and cutters see 3000 mafives with pick, axe and shovel in hand, and think with him of the "eternal" solidity of works that may recall to their minds the Pyramids of Egypt or the Chinese wall.

LONDON LETTER.

(From our own Correspondent.)

THE IRISH CONSPIRATORS.

May 11.

The Southampton steamer will have conveyed the news that Timothy Kelly, at the third trial, had been found guilty and sentenced to death. Since then Joe Mullet has been arraigned and convicted on a charge of conspiracy to murder. He refused to plead or employ counsel on the ground that his case had been prejudiced by the English press, and that therefore he could not have a fair trial in Ireland. This absurd plea was overruled by the Judge, who ordered a plea of "not guilty" to be entered, and the trial proceeded. His sentence was penal servitude for life. Mullet is a hunchback and stands under five feet high. He was neatly dressed in a suit of blue serge. His dark moustache was carefully twisted at the ends, and his linen was spotless. His manner was exceedingly fierce and arrogant. As the wretched and poor, he is a martyr and a patriot.

The Nova Scotia Fenian Cruiser seems to have been unbound, at all events nothing has come of it.

PARIS LETTER.

(From our own Correspondent.)

A loan in autumn of one million pounds square the Budget, whose deficits have been caused by voting millions to satisfy local electors. The Home Minister (Waldeck-Rousseau) advocates the merciless transportation of life to New Caledonia of all related criminals; but he forgets that the majority of the latter are manufactured in the prisons, where reformation ends are next to unknown. The Minister has gone too fast in advocating the participation of the employed in the employer's profits as a solution for the capital and labour question. That reform is very general that the American Government will consent to the extradition of Tyrone Walsh and Byrne, as soon as the British authorities have completed the evidence they will present on making the demand. The case, however, is very delicate and would be recognized as such in England, where we are sensitive on the point of political crimes.

In respect to the dynamic business, the United States authorities have already made a good beginning, in Pennsylvania at least, by introducing stringent laws in regard to the sale and manufacture of explosives; but unless people in England are killed by an explosion, and the crime is brought home to the principals engaged, there is no clause in the treaty of 1842 by which refugees could be given up.
