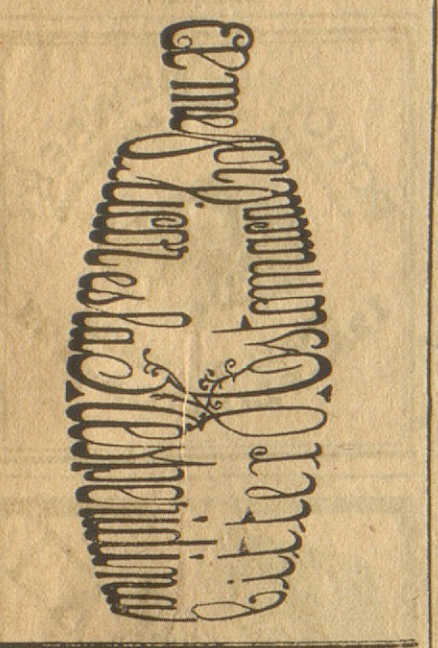

ASSOCIATED PRESS TELEGRAMS.

HAYAT AGENCY

Vienna, 29th.

Telegraphic advices from Belgrade

announce that Serbia has not complied

with the order to disarm, and that

King Milan exacts a condition of

doing so that the Balkan provinces

be put on the same footing as before

the Bulgarian-Roumelian alliance.

Berlin, 29th.

The Reichstag has been convened for

the 19th prox.

Rome, 29th.

Various names are mentioned as

likely to succeed General de Robilant

as Ambassador to Vienna. Up to the

present no appointment has been made

though expected shortly.

PRUSSIAN TELEGRAMS.

London, 29th.—A sum of 250,000 ster-

ling has been remitted by Baring Bro-

kers to the Provincial Bank per Lampert

and Holt remittance.

St. Petersburg, 29th.—The *Novoye*

Vremya publishing an interview of its

correspondent in Philippopolis with M.

Karavoloff Prime Minister of Bulgaria.

The Prime Minister, it is stated, de-

clined that England or Austria had made

any arrangement, before the Roume-

lian difficulties arose.

Constantinople, 29th.—The Porte

continues co-ordinating troops in all

ports, commencing a strategic im-

portance, with regard to aggressive

movement towards Eastern Roumelia.

A telegram from Smyrna states

that 20,000 reserves received orders to

march from Salonica towards the Bul-

garian frontier, but that these were

Glasgow, 28th.—Shipbuilding on the

Clyde is declining rapidly; 70 o/o of the

workmen are without employment.

Charitable institutions are being

opened to relieve the misery of the poor.

London, 28th.—Government has sent

20 Spanish political prisoners, to the

Azores Islands, complicated in a Re-

publican conspiracy against the throne

of Spain.

London, 28th.—A telegram from

Madrid confirms the report that the

North-American Government have

declined Spain that in case of the Spanish

sovereignty over the Caroline being

established, the protestant mission in

those Islands must be respected.

Copenhagen, 28th.—The recent re-

volutionary movement has obliged the

Government to take great precautions

to prevent further disturbances. The

police have been considerably re-

inforced.

Berlin, 28th.—An association has been

started to encourage German emigra-

tion to South America especially Rio

Grande, of which territory the agents

have given very favourable reports.

The "empress" has a capital of one

million marks. Little interest, how-

ever, is taken by the public in this

new undertaking.

St. John, 28th.—A terrible hurricane

raged here yesterday and destroyed 70

vessels. Great loss of life.

Albany, 28th.—President Cleveland,

it is said, will pass through this city

on Sunday, on his way to Buffalo. He

will return to Washington on the fol-

lowing Monday.

Washington, 28th.—Secretary Bay-

ard, it is stated, will not make any

change in the Consular corps, for

some time.

New York, 28th.—The vacancy

in the stock exchange caused by the

death of Charles Knight has been

filled for \$3,400, the highest price known

since the Exchange has been started.

Montevideo, 28th.—Politics are now

the topic of the day. Much excitement

has been caused owing to a rumour

that the opposition are concerting with

the Oriental emigrants residing at

present in Rio de Janeiro. The name of

General Arredondo is mentioned as

being mixed up with this ugly affair.

THE BARRACAS INUNDATIONS.

It appears that the money voted last

year by Congress for plans and

surveys, etc. for draining, levelling

Of course, none of us will consider

44,000 m/a too much money to save all

our friends in Barracas and the Bo-

ca from drowning; but the rule is, will

this amount suffice? We think not,

and next year we shall be as we are

to-day "preparing to begin."

It was more the mercy of Providence

than the genius of St. Ives or White

that this year our friends in the Calle

Larga were not again drowned out;

and had it rained here as in the Banda

Oriental last month, perhaps the

Southern Railway bridge would have

been swept away, since in truth nothing

has been done since last year—not a

new drain or culvert opened. The plan

is positively worse off than when we

took the Prison down in the furna-

ture van in Sept. 1884.

Let us hope that the slight ventila-

tion which this matter has had in the

Senate will lead to something more

practicable than mere plans and sur-

veys, which, although necessary and

good enough in their way, take longer

to make and draw up than the culverts

and channels which every one is out

of Barracas knows must be made to

flow off the water.

Query—If the plans cost 44,000 m/a

how much will the culverts cost?

PENAL CODE.

The following is the concluding

chapter of Dr. Solvay's splendid

speech on moving the adoption of Dr.

Tejedor's new Penal Code:—

The Committee, Mr. President, to per-

fectly fulfil the task which it has been

entrusted, had to decide be-

tween two codes; the one drawn up

by Dr. Tejedor, in obedience to the

orders from the Provincial Govern-

ment of B. Ayres; and the other the

same code revised by a special com-

mittee named by the National Govern-

ment.

Dr. Tejedor, in drawing up his code,

had based his studies on the Bavarian

code; the Committee for the revision of

the code had grounded their work on the

Bavarian and Spanish codes; that is to

say, to attain the end in view the

Committee were guided by the laws,

customs, and traditions of two distinct

different races.

As I have already observed, we

were to decide between two codes, the

one of our own and the other of a

foreigner, and our unanimous decision was

in favor of Dr. Tejedor's code. Our

decision was not only unanimous but

prompted by the more immediate in-

fluence of a heavy remuneration.

the action of his sentence, with this

difference, however, that the judge

himself is at liberty to specify the

maximum and minimum of penalty.

We have likewise introduced other

modifications, such as the suppression

of civil responsibilities (provided for

in the civil Code) and of punishment

of would-be suicides and their accom-

plices.

I do not think, Mr. President, that

the moment is suited for lengthy re-

ports, since the sessions, as I before

remarked, are much advanced; but

there is one point on which I wish to

draw your attention. I do not wish to

enter into questions of philosophy or

doctrine. I allude to the penalty of

death.

My hon. colleague for Cordoba, Dr.

Pose, and I have always warmly ad-

vocated the abolition of this punish-

ment, which we unhesitatingly con-

demn and consider as most unneces-

sary. However, we met with a strong

opposition in the Committee, three

of whose members supported capital

punishment.

I have said I did not wish to enter

into questions of philosophy or

doctrine. I shall not, therefore, prove to

you that capital punishment is neither

exemplary nor instructive. On this

subject philosophy has pronounced her

last word. But I shall cite a few in-

cidents, that will interest and instruct

you, while they will clearly show the

inefficiency and injustice of capital

punishment. Only a few years ago in

England a robbery was sometimes

punishable by the gallows. At the

time of the revision and reform of the

legislation, three hundred unfortunate

awaited the approach of the hangman

to cut this world. The reform of the

legislation saved them, they returned

to their homes and were ever after

wards most useful and honorable

members of society. This incident you

will find in the pages of a recent report

by the Chaplain of Pentonville Prison,

England.

I recollect the story of an English

woman, whose husband had been con-

demned to death for forgery of bank-

notes. She applied to the police for

her husband's corpse, a request which

was attended to immediately after the

death of the unfortunate man. The

police soon came to the conclusion that

the woman was the forger of the notes;

they immediately went to the house

and entered it at a moment when the

woman was hiding the forged notes in

her dead husband's mouth. These

notes she was about to sell to an in-

dividual waiting for them in the house

at the time the police made their ap-

pearance.
