I consider San Juan a bad province to start in, except a young man come here with a fixed determination of some sort, be it in mercantile or any other pregnant with danger to our independway. The character of the natives is such as will profit from the necessity of strangers, whose value they well know, but seek to depreciate.

In the year that I have been here, I have come into contact with more people than generally falls to the lot of a stranger, through the position I occupy, and I can sum up my experience into this, that there is not a man in the province that I would trust, even so far as executing a small commission.

I shall always be happy, my dear sir, to give you any information in my power. Greatly as the immigration of foreigners would benefit the province, cannot help saying that I doubt the province will benefit them.

#### LETTERS FROM ENTRE RIOS. Gualeguay, January 10th, 1865.

Relative to the terrible occurrences at Paysandú, Mr. H., who was an impartial spectator, will be able to furnish you with full details. An awful tragedy has, however, been enacted which calls for special mention on the part of the press.

General Flores, after the murder o the valiant Leandro Gomez, set at lib erty the surviving officers on parole 'not to take up arms during the pres ent war. They were all sent to the island where the refugee families were encamped, but some 15 of them returned to Paysandú to look after seve ral wounded soldiers whom they had left in hiding places, or recover some articles of property which remained in in the town. Soon after landing, they were seized and at once put to death By order of The "liberators" their throats were cut! These particulars have learned from a person just arrived from the ruined city, who had been sent thitler by the Government of En tre Rios.

Ardiff, the blacksmith who fired on hundred shots at Leandro Gomez in the first siege, was found murdered a Concepcion, his corpse bearing several stabs. Five houses, belonging to Brazilians or Colorados, were burnt down at Concordia, on the night that the fall of Paysandú was known. We are certainly on the eve of strange events, for there is a general indignation about the Oriental question, and if President Mitre shows any friendship for the Brazilians, the whole Argentine Republic will burst into a conflagration.

Some overtures were made to Gen. Urquiza, who replied that if the National Government formed an alliance with Brazil, the provinces of Entre Rios and Corrientes would unite with Paraguay.
