KIDNEY'S TABLE

A body of men, about two hundred strong, it is said, passed up last week from this province into Santa Fé. The National Government has got notice of it and it is rumored that these men are marching for Rosario, with a man named Golta at their head, to take part in the election row at Rosario. Colonel Flores was despatched to Rosario in consequence of this news; but what he could do, without a single soldier under his command, we cannot conjecture.

President Mitre dashed down the Larga Barracas, about seven o'clock on Sunday morning, making for Lomas de Zamora. His carriage was drawn by four splendid greys, which attracted great attention in the city.

Flores Government at Paysandú has attempted to embargo the bank, notes, and specie of the Paraná Bank, owing to the manager in Montevideo having sent orders to remove all the property of the bank to Montevideo. Some difficulty, however, seems to have arisen, as the Brazilian officers in command refused to recognise the embargo.

The last advices we have from London, respecting the Echagay Land Grant, which is being tried to be converted into a company, are to the effect that unless the matter is done by private subscription, there is not the slightest prospect of the business being effected. Mr. Echagay offers his one thousand leagues for thirty-four thousand pounds, but even this small amount cannot be raised. The Flores' revolution, Brazilian invasion, and Paraguay, have caused a general distrust amongst all in London who are connected with the River Plate: and until peace is entirely restored, we need not attempt any Argentine scheme on the European markets.

On Sunday it was generally believed that the Argentine Prime Minister, Dr. Urquiza, had left for Montevideo. This, however, contradicted yesterday's news, that every vessel that enters Buenos Aires now brings gunpowder, cartridges, etc. Our readers will have some idea of what opinion is held at home must have of the late news.

The Salado navigation has been interrupted. We saw Mr. Urquiza's report for December, in which he stated that the floods in the Salado had been unusually high, and had done some damage to a part of the navigation.

The Brazilian Minister arrived here yesterday morning. The Brazilians last week were soundly rebuffed in the harbor of Montevideo, we suppose by order of Baron Tamandaré—a small row boat, with half a dozen Brazilian sailors rowed up to within a few yards of the mole, and yet not even the officers at the Captain of the Port's seemed to take any notice. It is said that Baron Tamandaré has given Montevideo six days to surrender.

By the last mails received per Pavon we received a new exchange, "El Constitucional," from San Salvador. There is nothing particularly new save that owing to the American war, a great business is doing in resin.

The points where the Brazilians mean to disembark their heavy cannon, soldiers, &c., are Sta. Lucia, and the Buco.

Captain Johnson, of the Dotorrell, is greatly spoken of in Montevideo. He it was who lent the most effective aid to the unfortunate families in the island in front of Paysandú. One of our correspondents states that his name is mentioned in Oriental His-

tory, as the good Englishman who rescued so many of the fair daughters of Paysandú. Captain Johnson is a whole-souled British sailor, and is an honor to the flag under which he serves.

Sr. Juanico, it appears, who left Montevideo in the Saintonge, with twenty thousand patacons, went for the purpose of purchasing some rifled cannon, in England, wherewith to liberate the slaves of the Rio Grande. It is rather improbable that he will succeed in his mission.

It is estimated that the Oriental Revolution has up to the present cost the Oriental Government one hundred and four millions of patacons. Well may our London colleague say that there were good reasons why Flores was not put down. If we add on to this Flores' expenses, then the Brazilians, and then the foreign claims, we will arrive at what this scandalous revolution has cost this once flourishing republic.

Yesterday, the long-talked of elections came off in Rosario; it is the general belief that there was a fight, as both parties seemed well prepared, and arms and ammunition were distributed on Saturday: what a sad state of things. We will learn the full particulars by the Pavon.

The Mersey will leave on Thursday next. Our packet edition will be ready to-morrow. We forward by her Dr. Burmeister's able and interesting work on the Museum of Buenos Ayres, to the Royal Dublin Society, where the Parana fossil whalebones are at present on exhibition and attracting the greatest attention.

The new comet, with its prodigious tail is now visible (S.W.) every night from 8 to 9 o'clock. These celestial visitors invariably presage war in the River Plate.

Mr. Klappenbach has received another invoice of bar-silver from his mines (Marayés) in San Juan. The story in the "Tribuna" about one of his peons being murdered is quite false, which we have to apologise for repeating on such bad authority.

A rumor is current that Gen. Urquiza will proceed to Paraguay to see about arranging the Oriente-Argento-Brazilo-Paraguayan difficulty.

The "Mosquito" has a capital caricature of D. Hector Varela embracing the Yankee and Brazilian flags, advocating the Abolitionists in N. America and the slave-drivers in Brazil.

There is some talk of a skirmish between Saá and Caraballo at Las Piedras, which we believe incorrect.

The Florentine Infant Co. played again on Sunday night: they draw thin houses, although deserving public support.

In to-morrow's edition we will review the "River Plate Magazine," and publish the Foreign Racing list for the Autumn meeting.

We have received the "Uruguay" to the 19th, and "Porvenir" to the 18th. The Entre-Rian Bank Co. had a meeting and elected Gen. Udinarraín as President, and Sor. Sagastume as Vice-President.

"La Patria," of Mercedes, informs us, (16th inst.) that Gen. Flores, wife and servants, paid that town the honor of a visit.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

TERMINAL TIMES ... ALL REPLYING - NO VISITING ...

Every succeeding day renders it more and more probable that the Government of Montevideo will find itself obliged by the course of circumstances and public opinion, either to enter into an amicable arrangement with its foreign and domestic enemies, or to abandon the reins of the country to other hands; there will be too many and too influential and powerful interests in jeopardy if matters should be carried to extremes on the appearance of the Brazilian forces before the town, and there are too slight hopes of successful resistance on the part of the garrison to render it possible that things should come to such a pass as to bring about the destruction of the city; that such an event cannot take place seems to be the unanimous opinion of foreigners of all nations, an opinion admitted in the French address

which was published in the local press, and also in the British one of the 9th inst., also published on the 22nd by the native papers, in which the Government is plainly told that it "can only oppose a brave but useless resistance" to the forces they will have to contend against. In some remarks in this address a writer says: "that noble England would not counsel its Government to make peace if one of its towns had been destroyed by the invader, and its bravest sons had perished in its defence. We think that if Liverpool had been destroyed as Paysandú has been, and London in the same position as Montevideo was in, that it would be little short of madness to attempt resistance unless it had better hopes of making a successful one than Montevideo has, and that the Government that should carry out the war to the last extreme would take upon itself a tremendous responsibility in case of non-success, a responsibility which the noble English would bring most heavily to their doors. It cannot be forgotten also that foreign invasion is in the case of Montevideo coupled with civil war, and that whatever may have been the illegality of Flores' invasion still there have existed and still do exist two rival political parties in the Oriental Republic, and that the Government that now holds the town cannot be said to represent the totality of the population of the country; but all through the unfortunate war there has evidently existed a determination in certain parties to suffer anything, the ruin of their country not excepted, rather than make it up with the rebels; this may be the result of a firm conviction they entertain of the justice of their cause, of the resolve to sustain to the last what they consider legal, but we may also be allowed to surmise that hatred of their political opponents, and a strong repugnance to letting them have any share in the Government of the country have also played their part; such at all events has always been the case in civil wars, and we cannot well see how it can be otherwise.

The French and English Admirals had an interview with the President yesterday, 21st. It is said its object was to propose landing forces to take charge of certain public establishments. General Lucas Moreno refuses to take advantage of the decree suspending the procedures of court-martials in all pending cases, and demands that his be gone through, as the only way of vindicating his character; this is perfectly correct. It is too bad to throw a slur on a man's reputation by calling him to judgment for his deeds, and then to tell him that the cause is not to proceed, but that he has an opportunity of retrieving his reputation by serving the country again, thus implying his guilt. These details are of little interest to foreign readers, but it is as well to slightly mention them, as they may give some slight idea of the 'modus operandi,' of party machinery. Upon the whole, there appears to be much better hopes of a bloodless termination of this war than we could have ventured to expect two weeks ago.

By a decree dated the 20th, the President of the Republic has assumed the command-in-chief of the garrison, Saá being now second in command. An ammunition cart also blew up opposite Danaso's barraca; the soldier in charge of the powder was wounded and fell crying "viva la Independencia," supposing, probably, that the Brazilians had done the mischief. A Brazilian vessel appeared off the fort yesterday, apparently sounding. The French barque Saupharde, bound from Bordeaux to Callao, entered this port yesterday, having lost her gully and being short of water. The heavy rain yesterday filled the trenches and damaged the earthworks of the fortifications. A note has been passed by the Minister of Foreign Affairs to Sor. Dominguez, Governor of Entre Rios, thanking him for his humane conduct to the victims of Paysandú, also one to the Spanish and other Ministers for the friendly conduct displayed by the commanders of the men of war that were at Paysandú during the siege. The commanders of the naval stations have come to the resolution of disembarking men, for the purpose of protecting the foreign population from a sack, in case of an attack on the town. A rumor is afloat, to the effect that a cordon will be drawn outside the Plaza

de la Independencia, inside which neither attackers nor attacked will be allowed to pass; runaways are not mentioned, for of course there will be none.

Montevideo, 9th January, 1865.

Sr.— The undersigned British Subjects, resident in this Republic, gratefully appreciating the spontaneous efforts which you have deemed it right to make in the endeavour to avert an imminent danger which exposes their lives and properties to the momentary expectation of utter destruction, and furthermore, being deeply solicitous to ward off other perils to their lives and properties which they believe to be not only imminent but certain to occur unless restrained by the spirit of humanity—venture to solicit that you will be pleased to lay before H. E. the President of this Republic the enclosed manifestation of their sentiments, the purport of which speaks for itself.

Should you think proper to support the presentation of the enclosed by any expression of your valuable coincidence with the sentiments therein expressed, you will add much to the gratitude and esteem already entertained by,

Sir, Your most obedient, Humble servants.

Montevideo, Jan. 10th, 1865.

Gentlemen, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of the letter which you and other British residents placed in my hands, bearing the date of the 9th inst., accompanied by a manifestation of their sentiments addressed to his Excellency the President of the Republic, upon the perils to which their lives and properties are at present exposed.

In accordance with the desire expressed in the letter referred to, I have placed that manifestation in the hands of the President, calling his attention to the magnitude of the interests referred to in that manifestation, and it affords me sincere pleasure to be able to acquaint you that from the manner in which his Excellency received the remarks which I addressed to him, I cannot but hope that that manifestation will meet on the part of his Excellency with that consideration to which it is so justly entitled.

With your letter of the 9th instant I received also another letter dated the 5th instant, wherein the British residents are pleased to express themselves in terms of lively gratitude for my endeavors to bring about the removal of a great danger with which this city was menaced.

In truth, however, I am nowdays entitled to their praise for my conduct in that matter.

It so happened that none of my colleagues were actually within the magazine as I have been. To this latter circumstance is to be attributed the intimate conviction which I possessed, of the extent of the danger impending over us, and being thus convinced of that danger, far from deserving credit for my conduct in the matter, it would have been highly culpable on my part not to have acted as I did.

I shall, nevertheless, be greatly obliged to you, gentlemen, if you would make known to the other British residents how truly sensible I am of their kindness and good will.

Montevideo, 9th January, 1865. May it please Your Excellency,—

The undersigned British Subjects, inhabiting this Republic, approaching Y.E. with all due respect, deem it an imperative duty which they owe to themselves, their families and connections to lay before Y.E. the following manifestation of their sentiments regarding imminent perils to which they believe that their lives and properties are and will be exposed; and they do so in the confident belief and firm expectation that the powers and influence wielded by Y.E. will be wisely and humanely directed to remove the cause of their just apprehensions.

1st. The British residents cannot conceal that they unite in a senti-

ment of justifiable surprise inspired by the fact that the timely and considerate warning addressed by H.B.M. Chargé d'Affaires, W. G. Lettsom, Esq., upon the 30th ult. to H.E. the Minister of Foreign Affairs, has failed to procure an adoption of measures calculated to insure the public safety against the imminent danger attendant upon the deposit of some Six Hundred Quintals of Gunpowder in a central part of the city, and the sentiment is rendered more acute by the knowledge they possess that the precautionary measures promised have not been put into execution.

In order to show that their apprehensions regarding the consequences of an explosion are by no means exaggerated, they crave your Excellency's perusal of the annexed copy of a letter, addressed to H.B.M.'s resident Minister on the 5th inst., by Rear-Admiral the Hon. C. Elliot, Commander-in-Chief of H.B.M.'s squadron on this station; and they entertain the assurance that this, their direct appeal to the Chief of the State, will not fail to procure the fulfilment of the hopes already held out to them, and the immediate avoidance of so awful a catastrophe as may now at any moment be expected.

2nd. The British inhabitants of this Republic, animated by sentiments of humanity, view with deep concern the continuance of a fratricidal warfare; a warfare which, whilst it embitters all the relations of life, and clothes the population in mourning, impedes the due action of the laws, and paralyses all the efforts of industry.

Therefore, considering the prolongation of this warfare, since April, 1863, and its present results, which are the armed interference of a Foreign Power, the limitation of the Executive Power within the neighbourhood of the capital, and the imminence of a siege and blockade, to which the existing authorities may offer a valiant but certainly a hopeless resistance. Considering the loss of lives, destruction of property, ruin and desolation to which they themselves, in common with the other inhabitants of this commercial city would be exposed by vain efforts against an overwhelming force. Considering that the actual Government has done all that could be expected from it to maintain its position by force of arms, and that, in sooner or later yielding, it will only succumb to mere numbers and superior force, they urge upon your Excellency, and upon your Excellency's Government, for the sake of true patriotism, humanity, and the protection of the material interests of the community at large, to take such early measures as may be most convenient to procure the establishment of peace and the consequent retirement of foreign forces, by which means your Excellency, and the Government of your Excellency, will secure the lasting respect and gratitude of all the inhabitants of the Republic, native and foreign, and by which means only, as the British residents believe, will the safety of their lives and properties be effectually insured.

May God preserve your Excellency many years, is the prayer of your Excellency's most obedient and humble servants.

SLANDERS AGAINST PARAGUAY.

THE "NACION" AND "TRIBUNA" EXPOSED. The press of Buenos Ayres has earned for itself a bad character, and it is generally understood by natives themselves that the editors of official or non-official organs will stoop to any subterfuge, adopt any trick, or invent any story, which may serve their party.

The most unblushing inventions of the present month are those respecting Paraguay, in which the whole squad of B. Ayrean writers vie with each other, racking their brains, to get up the most catch-penny column of horrors. The various editors not only know these stories to be diabolical exaggerations, but puff them and excite the minds of the vulgar by such "sensation" narratives.

It is a daring and wilful lie, on the part of the "Tribuna" and of President Mitre's official organ, to publish a column of news as given by "a passenger of the Ypora." Captain Parish says the name of such a production, but the

editors of the above-mentioned papers are not ashamed to invent the story and father it on Captain Parish. The old tale of Bluebeard is brought to our mind, in the story of "a string of Brazilians' ears," which was told on board the Ranger by an Italian pilot, who had heard from a countryman that a native pilot believed something of the kind was related to a friend of his by a party who had it on good authority.

It is a falsehood in our colleagues to say that the little steamer Anambay was taken by the whole fleet of Paraguay. The little steamer is a "crack" Brazilian gun-boat mounting 4 fine swivel-guns and was pursued by the cockle-shell Ypora which single-handed captured the enemy by boarding, the Brazilians throwing themselves into the water. The Ypora had not 500 men aboard as she can hardly carry one fourth of that number.

The other slanders against Paraguay are so bare-faced as not to need refutation. Suffice it to say that Capt. Harrison testifies the conduct of the Paraguayan forces was worthy of a civilized nation, and the "Tribuna" anecdotes are supplied by the Brazilian consulate.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT. PARAGUAY COMING OUT.

THE RUBICON CROSSED. Yesterday, the Brazilian Minister, Sr. Paranhos, received despatches, advising him of a large Paraguayan force having crossed into Argentine territory. He at once communicated the intelligence to the Government, and remained closeted with Mr. Elizalde, the Foreign Minister, for the greater part of the day. The exact strength of the invading force we have been unable to discover, but believe it consists of two brigades of five thousand strong each. The news came down from Restauracion, which town is in the greatest alarm, as it is feared the Paraguayans will carry all before them as in Matto Grosso.

Persons who are well acquainted with the geography of those districts, affirm that the country through which the Paraguayans have passed is disputed territory, and consequently affords the Argentine Government no pretext for declaring war.

IMPORTANT FROM THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT. We have learned from an official source that Mr. Thornton received despatches by last packet, directing him to wait on President Mitre and congratulate him on the part of the British Government for his conduct in directing the administration of this country.

FESTIVAL AT LOMAS DE ZAMORRA. On Sunday morning, President Mitre, accompanied by the Minister of War and D. Pastor Obligado, proceeded in a state-coach drawn by 4 white horses to the Lomas de Zamorra. The day was remarkably fine and invigorating, and several pleasure-seekers also went to the Lomas to assist at the village fête.
