THE GREAT VICTORY IN TENNESSEE.

OFFICIAL CONFIRMATION OF THE FACT. Washington, Dec. 1.

The following despatch, confirming the report of the victory in Tennessee, has been received at headquarters:

"Franklin, Tenn. Dec. 1. 'Maj. Gen. Thomas:

"The enemy made a heavy persistent attack with about two corps, commencing at about 4 o'clock, and lasting until after dark.

Parties arrived from the front, and who witnessed the battle of yesterday, describe the attack of the rebel forces as desperate.

About 6 o'clock last night heavy reinforcements reached Gen. Schofield, which caused a complete rout of the rebel forces.

The city to-day is full of fleeing residents from Williamson and other counties South.

One hundred and seven rebel officers, including one brigadier-general, with one thousand prisoners arrived in this city this morning.
