



Colonel Conesa's trip to Rosario... it appears, without a single soldier... under his command, disarmed one of the disorderly clubs in Rosario, and chased the fire-eaters out of the town.

The monetary affairs of the Government were not satisfactory, but the companies would soon be on a proper footing, to stimulate and other public works.

The most important news from England is the negotiation by Baron Mauá of a part of the Montevidean national debt, amounting to one million sterling, on the London Stock Exchange, the particulars of which, as taken from the Times, are, that the 6 per cent Bonds taken by Mauá & Co. at 40, realized 60 per cent, thus leaving a profit of £200,000 sterling to the Baron: this is in pursuance of the law of the Oriental Chambers dated Nov. 14th 1863, and it is perfectly immaterial whether Gen. Flores recognise the Mauá loan, as the matter is now in the hands of English Bondholders, who will stand to no loss.

The question of Sleswig-Holstein seems to assume a new phase, as Russia seemed inclined to restore North Sleswig to Denmark, annexing all the remaining duchies. Meantime a host of claimants sprung up, in offshoots of the houses of Brandenburg, Hapsburg, Randzan, Stieroum and Oldenburg, which caused the Prussian Minister, Count Bismark, to appoint a council of Austrian and Prussian lawyers to decide on the several merits of this intricate suit. The election of Von Pefortien as minister of foreign affairs for Bavaria was the signal for reviving the league of second-rate German powers to counteract the preponderance of Austria and Prussia, but the scheme promises little success. In Hesse Cassel there has been a new conflict between the Elector and his deputies, the latter accusing the government of violating the Constitution.

Accounts from the East are more favorable. The king of Greece had summoned Professor Kyriatow to form a new Cabinet. The Chambers of the Danubian principalities were opened with an eloquent discourse from Prince Couza, praising the sultan and other governments which guarantee the independence of the country: this is the first time that Catholic, Protestant and Armenians sit together in the Chambers.

The Italian Parliament suspended its sittings for the Christmas holidays to re-open on January 5th, the Minister Bellia declaring that the seat of Government would not be removed from Turin to Florence before the middle of February. General Angioletti was named Minister of Marine, and the War-office issued a decree making considerable reductions in the army. The Grand Duke of Russia was expected on a visit at Naples. A great sensation was caused in Rome by the monks closing all the convents in Poland, and a triumphal reception was prepared for all the refugee monks in the Eternal City, which caused much coolness between the Russian envoy and the Papal Court, the former referring to Florence to avoid the Christmas festivals. A Lisbon telegram says that Baron Meyendorff returned to Rome on the 27th and assisted at the Pope's usual levée in the Vatican, with the other members of the corps diplomatique. Another telegram announces that Rattazzi had received permission to retire from Turin to his estates at Viterbo.

Madrid papers are to the 25th Dec. The Cortes were opened on the 22nd and the Queen's speech makes flattering mention of the relations with foreign powers, excepting Peru, with which, it was hoped an amicable arrangement would be arrived at. The Emperor Maximilian is expected to be a new era of commerce.

THE RIVER PLATE MAGAZINE.

The editor has begun the year well, the present being decidedly the best number yet issued. There are twelve very interesting papers. The Ensenada Railway is a treatise on this important enterprise, showing also the advantages of the proposed port in that locality: the contributions of scientific Englishmen here resident will always be read with interest. An essay on sheep-farming in Buenos Ayres commands the attention of our camp friends. The Jesuits of South America is a subject far from being exhausted. We have a detailed account of Mr. Cox's celebrated journey in 1863 across the Southern Andes of Chile. The continuation of Dominguez's History of the Argentine Republic is getting rather tedious, and the Horrors of War being in rhyme is beyond our criticism. We have not read Manners and Customs, or the Legend of Gelnhausen, but the Frenchman's account of his three years' captivity among the Patagonian Indians is a most remarkable and interesting paper. The Latin and Teutonic Races is an Ethnological dissertation of some weight, and the Annals of the Museum of Buenos Ayres has already elicited flattering mention in our columns. The Chronicle of Current Events concludes the volume, and we cannot but wish Mr. Williams every success, if he keep up the character of the Magazine to the level with which he has begun his 2nd year.

SWISS COLONY, BARABERO.

Under date January 10th, 1865, we have Sor. Piffiro's report of the condition of this flourishing colony in last November, in its eighth year of existence. It was founded in 1856 by ten Swiss agricultural families, who were soon after joined by eight others. The colony now supplies Buenos Ayres, Rosario, Entre Rios and Banda Oriental with several valuable staple products, especially potatoes. There are 374 farms under cultivation, covering a superficies of 3,064 English acres in lots averaging eight acres all wired in and fenced with flandubay, besides 222 gardens of two acres each—making a total of 3,508 acres under cultivation, which (without counting fruit, etc.) produced in 1864 the following crops: maize, 5,610 fanegas; wheat, 1,860 do.; barley, 1,000 do.; potatoes, 62,000 do.; vetches, 3,960 arrobes (930 cwt.), beans, 550 cwt.

The number of houses is as follows: azotea or tile-roofs 36, brick houses 83, mud cabins 84—total 203. Number of inhabitants, 1,115.—El Cosmopolita

AMERICAN NEWS.

Plot To Burn The Government Stores. Cairo, Ill., Dec. 1.

Memphis papers of yesterday give detailed accounts of a plot by rebel agents to burn the Memphis and Charleston Railroad Depot and Government Stores worth \$2,000,000. The plot was discovered by a U. S. Detective, to whom the matter was entrusted by Gen. Washburne, and the incendiaries were caught in the act of firing the buildings. It is alleged that these emissaries were to receive from the rebel Government 10 per cent of the value of the property destroyed. Dr. McMillan, proprietor of the Charleston House of Memphis, is among those arrested. He is charged with being the Agent of the rebel Government and with concealing the plot. The prisoners are to be tried by a Military Commission and will probably be hung.

Corrientes, at 25 rls, and 15,000 Entre Rios mixed classes at 23 to 24 rls, duty payable by purchasers. There is a considerable stock of the latter kind held for higher prices. Sheepskins—Arrivals falling off, especially of good skins; prices flagging. Hair—Very little coming forward; demand languid; it sells at our quotations. Bone-ash and Bones—Several lots have been sold at \$8 silver, and \$8 1/2 silver per 240 lbs, with shin shank and common bones. In the Uruguay we notice two sales at Paysandú, and \$11 silver, and one at Fray Bentos, at \$11 1/2 silver per 2,240 lbs, f. o. b.

Rumors are afloat that Spain will abandon Santo Domingo, but there is nothing of this in the Queen's speech, and Gen. Gandara has moved his head-quarters from Monte-cristi to the capital.

Colonel Conesa's trip to Rosario, the very heavy rains—no revolution, the talk of town. The gallant colonel it appears, without a single soldier under his command, disarmed one of the disorderly clubs in Rosario, and chased the fire-eaters out of the town. The elections proceeded, only one side voting. We think it would be a good idea to send the colonel down to Montevideo; possibly, he might be equally successful there. The captain of the Water Lily has kindly placed in our office a beautiful drawing of the burning of the Bom- bay. The renowned photographers, Messrs. Meeks and Kelsey, who reside on the top of our office, have taken a photograph of the picture, and in a few days album cards, representing this melancholy disaster, will be on public sale.

As far as we can learn respecting the Paraguayan invasion of the Uruguayana, it appears that Pres. Lopez has merely concentrated a body of 13,000 at an old Paraguayan fort on the right bank of the Parana, but there is nothing to show that these troops have entered the interior of the country: it is more than probable that this force will remain there, in order to keep the Brazilians from ascending the river.

Our remarks about the coal mines of Azul have, we are happy to say, attracted attention in the right quarter. Application will be made to Minister Dominguez on the subject by two respectable foreign gentlemen, who have both capital and capacity to undertake the matter. We have perfect confidence in the Minister that he will lend every assistance to the parties in question.

The five generals who were to command the six brigades of the garrison, with the President in person at the head of the sixth, acting as a reserve, are reduced to four, including the President, viz.: General Gomez, in command of the centre, General Medina, the right flank, and General Diego Lamas, the left of the fortifications, with the President as Commander-in-Chief. General Sañ was reported yesterday to have resigned, but to-day the newspapers indignantly contradict the rumor. The powder was said to have been removed, but now it appears that this is not the case. Maná & Co. were said to have paid up their part of the loan, but now it is asserted that they refuse so doing unless the Commercial Bank pays up also. Some say that the Brazilian forces will be here to-morrow, some maintain that they are off to Rio Janeiro. Telmo Lopez, who was in Rio Grande with an invading force, arrived yesterday together with Estomba and other officers. The "Reforma," complaining of the foreign petitions, which it says appear to point out to the Government the propriety of resigning, remarks that foreigners ought to put themselves in their places, and think how their national spirit would be affected if such a dishonorable proposition was made to them under equal circumstances, that let them be fair and honorable proposals, etc. The decree about shutting up at 8 in the evening, opening at 7 in the morning, forbidding flags to be raised, rockets to be fired, etc., and ordering that in case of a serious attack nobody is to go on the azoteas, is again in force. Our opinion of all this is, that if the Brazilian forces come to attack the town, the thing will be of short duration, but that if they should leave the matter in the hands of Flores and Netto, it may as well last twenty years as not, for of one thing it is certain the Spanish race have always proved themselves perfectly capable, i.e., making a war last for any indefinite period of time. But fortunately the opinion of the great number of foreigners residing in the country must ultimately have its weight, and we can conceive of nothing more likely not only to ruin it, but also to confirm the opinion rapidly getting abroad that let it be from what cause it may, the Spaniards and their descendants are peculiarly insensible to the evils, horrors, and destruction that war brings in its train. As foreigners whose interests are bound up with those of this country, it is our duty, from humanity and friendship towards these inhabitants, to point out what we consider as the evils which are corroding us, and which we are convinced that natives perfectly agree on the main point, and will with indulgence accept, although it may grate on some cherished prejudices, they nevertheless are dictated by for the welfare and country.

These precursors of more serious, but not in the long-run more murderous, warfare are attracting the attention of the inhabitants, the mass of rumor is so great and the reports current so conflicting that it is next to impossible to discriminate the true from the false. Two days ago the papers said that there was a private letter in town from General Antonio Muñoz, in which he stated that he had entered the province of Rio Grande, distributed three ounces a head to his men out of contributions he had levied on the saladeros, and had in his power 1,000 slaves; now it appears that he is at Acegua, a place not far from the Cerro Largo, in the Oriental Republic; again, that General Goyo Suarez is on the march to meet him in the retrograde march which he is said to be making.

**EUROPE.**  
The most important news from England is the negotiation by Baron Maná of a part of the Montevidean national debt, amounting to one million sterling, on the London Stock Exchange, the particulars of which, as taken from the Times, are, that the 6 per cent Bonds taken by Maná & Co. at 40, realized 60 per cent, thus leaving a profit of £200,000 sterling to the Baron: this is in pursuance of the law of the Oriental Chambers dated Nov. 14th 1863, and it is perfectly immaterial whether Gen. Flores recognise the Maná loan, as the matter is now in the hands of English Bondholders, who will stand on their own sense.

**TEN DAYS LATER FROM U. STATES.**  
**SHERMAN NEAR SAVANNAH—SIEGE OF NASHVILLE.**  
Dates from New York are to Dec. 14th. According to Richmond papers Gen. Sherman in his raid through Georgia would be within five miles of Savannah on the 13th, but it was not known whether he would attack the city or continue his march for the coast. It was rumored that he had engaged and beaten the Confederates at Bloomingdale, 15 miles distant from Savannah; but later accounts represent him drawn up in line of battle before a formidable army of the enemy. The Confederates were concentrating in Tennessee, to make some decisive movement: General Brackeridge (Southern) was marching to support Hood who was besieging Nashville in which the northerners were commanded by Gen. Thomas.

The long-expected steamer, Corrientes has not, as yet, made her appearance from Paraguay. She will probably come in on Sunday or Monday, as we have reason to suppose that she was detained in Asuncion until the arrival of the Salto with dates from Buenos Ayres, which was probably on the 20th inst., as the Salto left here on the 13th inst. M. Varela's letter to the Rio editor, appeared in yesterday's Tribuna, which was strikingly original. He omitted, however, to mention Captain Parish's stunning denial of the statements published in the 'Nacion Argentina.' All the papers in Buenos Ayres, with the exception of the 'Standard,' have joined in a coalition against Paraguay. Our little French colleague, the 'Progres,' taking the lead.

Respecting the recent rumor of another Indian invasion in the South, an English estanciero, who resides very far South, informs us that he has recently arrived from his estate, and that he heard nothing whatever about it; still, owing to the scandalously defenceless state of the frontier, he affirms that there is positively nothing to keep the Indians, if they think proper, from coming into the Barraca bridge. We would not publish this sad fact, only that as we have no Indian subscribers, we have no fears of the savages learning our weakness. The bones of the defunct heroes of Paysandú, both Blanco and Colorado, must, after all the prayers offered up, rest quiet in their graves. At the funeral service on Wednesday, Minister Paranhos and suite attended, as also his Excellency Sr. Vianna de Lima (who so narrowly escaped having to walk down from Asuncion to Parana through the Gran Chaco.) It was unmistakably the feeling of sorrow. Every Brazilian looked 'triste.' Verily, we believe their anguish was less for the departed Colorados, than for having embarked in the present war, which no man can say how it will end.

Our agent in Moreno, Sr. Cesario, has half a flock of sheep for sale cheap. He has requested us to advise the British public of the fact. The mole is at present in a very ticklish state: the celebrated hole has been stopped up, but now the principal posts are beginning to give way. Experienced men say that in less than a year the mole will be falling to pieces. A private letter received yesterday morning from Montevideo states that gold is at a premium of only 5½ and 6 per cent. 4,000 quintals of jerked beef have been bought up by the Government to prepare for the siege. The Brazilians are at Las Piedras. The blockading squadron expected to arrive yesterday morning. To-morrow we expect the Corrientes mails per Esmeralda, and also files of the "Semnario" from Asuncion. We have papers from the Uruguay to Tuesday, 24th inst. Nothing new, except a warning to Prresident Mitre about public feeling in Entre Rios. The Mersey left yesterday: there will be a supplemental mail this evening per Rio del Plata. Among the passengers yesterday for England, per Mersey, was the Rev. James Anderson, of Helensburgh, Scotland, who came out to the River Plate for the benefit of his health. The reverend gentleman delivered a lecture at the Scotch Church on Sunday morning, and again at the American Church on Wednesday evening, to the great admiration of the audience on both occasions.

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The question of Sleswig-Holstein seems to assume a new phase, as Russia seemed inclined to restore North Sleswig to Denmark, annexing all the remaining duchies. Meantime a host of claimants sprung up, in offshoots of the houses of Brandenburg, Hapsburg, Rantzau, Stierion and Oldenburg, which caused the Prussian Minister, Count Bismark, to appoint a council of Austrian and Prussian lawyers to decide on the several merits of this intricate suit. The election of Von Perfortien as minister of foreign affairs for Bavaria was the signal for reviving the league of second-rate German powers to counteract the preponderance of Austria and Prussia, but the scheme promises little success. In Hesse Cassel there has been a new conflict between the Elector and his deputies, the latter accusing the government of violating the Constitution.

General Grant at last effected a movement in front of Petersburg, which he had been threatening for some time; two of his divisions under Gen. Warren destroyed part of the railway from Richmond to the south west. Southern papers report Gen. Beauregard in full march on Fort Pillow. The recovery of Atlanta by the Confederates is doubtful. The chamber of Representatives at Washington resolved to notify Great Britain of the termination of the reciprocal treaty respecting Canada. The American Cabinet as yet gave no official indication of the conduct it intended to pursue in the affair of the Florida: the N. York tribunal of Commerce denied that it had offered any reward for the capture of the privateer, and some journals state that the outrage was committed at the instigation of Mr. Wilson, consul at Bahia. Although Captain Collins is ordered to stand his trial, the papers are studiously silent on the subject.

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Accounts from the East are more favorable. The king of Greece had summoned Professor Kyrilaw to form a new Cabinet. The Chambers of the Danubian principalities were opened with an eloquent discourse from Prince Couza, praising the sultan and other governments which guarantee the independence of the country: this is the first time that Catholic, Protestant and Armenians sit together in the Chambers. The Italian Parliament suspended its sittings for the Christmas holidays to re-open on January 5th, the Minister Sellia declaring that the seat of Government would not be removed from Turin to Florence before the middle of February. General Angioletti was named Minister of Marine, and the War office issued a decree making considerable reductions in the army. The Grand duke of Russia was expected on a visit at Naples. A great sensation was caused in Rome by the escape of the monks in Poland, and a triumphal reception was prepared for all the refugee monks in the Eternal City, which caused much coolness between the Russian envoy and the Papal Court, the former retiring to Florence to avoid the Christmas festivals. A Lisbon telegram says that Baron Meyendorff returned to Rome on the 27th and assisted at the Pope's usual levee in the Vatican, with the other members of the corps diplomatique. Another telegram announces that Rattazzi had received permission to retire from Turin to his estates at Giarbo.

The bazaar at Liverpool in aid of southern prisoners held by the southerners realized £17,000 sterling, but Mr. Seward refused to allow this sum to be distributed among the prisoners, alleging they wanted for nothing and the contribution was an insult by Englishmen to the American Government.

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The flour mill in the Plaza 11 de Setiembre, which was sold by auction some time ago, and bought in by Sr. De Marehi, is at last beginning to work. Owing to its locality, and the abundance of wheat this year, we think it will do a good business. The comet out in the camp is producing quite a sensation. Although this country is young in years, it is old in traditions. Generally speaking, the 'gauchos' believe that the comet augurs a war; and the country people are beginning to be very apprehensive of the solidity of the Government; luckily, they hold few of the National Bonds, else we might look for a serious fall in this class of securities until the comet could be induced to move on. General Netto, we hear, has wheeled round, and is now marching for his native country. Muñoz, the Montevidean General, is on the frontier near Tacuarembó.
