THE ORDER OF THE ROSE.

A great dispute has sprung up be-
 tween the papers, whether the three
 doctors, of the medical family Montes
 De Oca, ought to accept the ribbon of
 the Rose so kindly offered them by the
 Emperor of Brazil. The *Pueblo* says
 it is anti-republican, and in this we
 fully concur, but the *Nacional* urges
 it is a pity to deprive them of the
 sweet-smelling Brazilian decoration,
 when they can still continue to exer-
 cise their profession and fulfill their
 duties as good citizens.

Frankly we admire the order of the
 Rose, better than those crosses which
 are so common in Europe. It is sug-
 gestive of botany and becomes like
 the flower-sellers of Cremona, or the
 gentleman who sports it in his but-
 ton-hole. It is as natural as the Or-
 der of the Cucumber invented by the
 late Emperor Souloque, of Hayti,
 which was bestowed on 49 persons in
 a public assembly who were able to
 spell the word "Cinnamon" correct-
 ly. We take it for granted that the Do-
 ctors in question will not demand
 higher fees of their republican patients,
 because the odour of the Rose and the
 splendor of an Imperial decoration are
 diffused around the sick-bed. For
 that matter they might promise not to
 wear the ribbon unless on holidays,
 although it would be difficult for the
 Chief of Police to fine a man for wear-
 ing a Rose all the year round, even
 when out of season, if his horticultural
 tastelastay that way.

It remains to be ascertained whe-
 then the Rose be white or red, as ho-
 wever trifling it may seem, this little
 difference caused much bloodshed in
 olden times in England, and *Blanco*
 and *Colorado* factions might turn this
 historical fact to a revival of such dis-
 sensions in the River Plate.

On principle we should be inclined
 to exclude this dangerous innovation,
 as it is quite possible the next cam-
 paign of Brazil in Paraguay may bring
 us the Order of the Mandioca, which
 would be an ungraceful appendage in
 a ball-room: Fancy Dom Pedro crea-
 ting a number of Chevaliers de Fariña
 among our brother-editors, in acknow-
 ledgement of the *floury* articles in their
 papers, or conferring the decoration of
 the Zapallo or cauliflower, on Argenti-
 nes who admire Brazilian institutions.
 In a word, we consider the order of the
 Rose, or Tulip, or Stockgilly as the
 fore-runner of a whole host of horticultural
 honors, which would soon con-
 vert the quiet city of Buenos Aires into
 a Nursery of Brazilian plants. Individu-
 ally we have no objection that Hec-
 tor Varela become a knight of the Po-
 lyanthus, Mariano Billinghurst a rho-
 dodendron, Velez Sarsfield a wall-flower
 Gibson the tailor a fuschia, Manuel
 Ocampo, a jessamine, Rufino Elizalde
 a scarlet creeper, and Olivera the cigar-
 man a hyacinth—But where are we go-
 ing to end?

Dom Pedro intends his Rose no doubt
 as a compliment, and the *Nacional* says
 he has no other way of expressing him-
 self but we want nothing of his Lan-
 guage of Flowers, and smell a rat under
 his rose-bush. It has been suggested to
 us that he made a mistake, and should
 rather have sent the order of the Rose
 to Mme. Mollo for her beautiful render-
 ing of the last Rose of Summer.

If Messrs. Montesdeoca [we had al-
 most said Mandioca] accept the proffered
 Rose, regardless of the thorn which
 lies beneath, we should recommend
 them to send his Majesty in return a
 bunch of shamrocks as St. Patrick's
 Day is at hand, and Dom Pedro would
 take it as a graceful insinuation that
 [if not clearly of Irish descent] there
 was something at least very green about
 him, besides his banner.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We have received a lengthy com-
 munication about a grand fete which took
 place the other day in San Nicolas: it
 appears that several friends, subscri-
 bers and shopkeepers of this city de-
 termined to inhale a Parana breeze,
 ran down in the train to the Tigre, and
 jumped on board Captain Price's popu-
 lar steamer Estrella del Norte, which
 was just leaving for up the river. Our
 correspondent omits all particulars
 during the voyage up the river, but on
 arriving at San Nicolas the excursion-
 ists formed in procession, and led on
 by a spirited grocer waving the little
 flag of the steamer (a lone star), they
 entered the town and took possession
 of the Club Hotel. When they landed
 at the Mole, the leading men of the
 little town approached the boat and
 welcomed the Britishers. Our friends
 entered the Plaza to the tune of "See
 the conquering hero come," played
 on a violin, a flute, and a drum. Dinner
 was provided, and genial wines flowed
 on all sides. Determined to see every-
 thing about the place, the party in
 question paraded through the town,
 calling first at the 'Standard' office:
 they then started for the old battle-
 field of Pavon, galloped through the
 quintas and estancias, and at last ar-
 rived on this memorable spot. After
 vainly rummaging about for flattened
 bullets or broken swords, they returned
 to the town, where full steam being
 on, they again put themselves under
 the protection of Captain Price,
 and next morning arrived in town. As
 too much laughing is considered bad in
 extremely hot weather, we refuse to
 publish the speeches made by some of
 the party, suffice it to say that the elo-
 quence of a well-known tailor, and the
 patriotic enthusiasm of a wholesale
 grocer, were the themes of universal
 praise on the voyage home.

The Gualeguay railway seems at last
 about to be commenced in good earnest.
 Several workmen are said to have been
 engaged in town for the work, but who
 the contractor is we have not yet heard.
 The 'Flying fish,' which our readers
 may recollect caused such a sensation
 in Montevideo on the occasion of its
 trial trip, has got hopelessly stuck in
 the mud near San Fernando. This is
 a rather unfortunate mishap, as if the
 owners could run her up to Paraguay
 we have no doubt she would fetch a
 good price. The Flying-fish is a strong
 iron-built steamer, very narrow, and
 with powerful engines, she can run
 into and cut in pieces any Monitor that
 the Brazilians may send down.

Caraballo, with Netto and Carabajal,
 have moved their troops in the direc-
 tion of the Rio Negro. We suppose
 they are going to look for Munos and
 Aparicio.

The Brazilian Government has char-
 tered a number of small vessels to
 load provisions, ammunition, &c., for
 up the rivers, and has contracted for
 five thousand horses, to be delivered
 on or before the 20th of March.

A meeting of ale and porter mer-
 chants was held on Friday night to
 take into consideration the present
 scandalous system of swindling going
 on in this city by the counterfeits of
 the best London and Dublin brands,
 and to adopt some measures to put a
 stop to same. Mr. Elizalde attended
 as the counsel for the British mer-
 chants. We have not heard the result
 of the meeting, but hope that some
 relief will be obtained.

The price of sheep in the Banda
 Oriental at this moment attracts our
 attention. Formerly sheep in that Re-
 public ruled from 50 to 75 per cent
 dearer than in this province, but in
 consequence of the revolution they
 have fallen considerably, and we learn
 from estanciaos in the Banda Oriental
 that picked sheep can now be bought
 at from 2½ to 3 national dollars per
 head; as this price is about the same
 as that of sheep in Buenos Ayres,
 we think it well that our readers should
 know it, although we strongly advise
 our friends to prefer Buenos Ayres or
 Santa Fé, to either the Banda Oriental
 or Entre Rios, notwithstanding the
 very high price of land in this pro-
 vince and the very large number of
 sheepfarmers. As far as our experience
 goes, beginners do better this side of
 the river. In the district bounding on
 the Arroyo Medio and Pavon, many
 foreigners have within the past twelve
 months purchased estancias and rented

puestos; they are all doing well, and
 in that locality there is abundance of
 room for all the passengers the Liver-
 pool steamers can bring out for the
 next twelve months.

The rain seems at last to have paid
 us a visit. People in town can hardly
 imagine how much it was required in
 the camp. In some districts the sheep-
 farmers were beginning to be alarmed,
 as if the winter set in before the rain
 came, we might experience another epi-
 demia similar to that of 1859.

The Ministry appointed by General
 Flores has given universal satisfaction,
 and has, to a great extent, dispelled
 the fears of many of his own party,
 who fancied that he would not be able
 to find the proper men for those posts.
 Vidal and Castro are new names in
 Oriental politics, and consequently
 the most adapted for a new situation.
 Battle is a gentleman of about fifty
 years of age, and the best recommen-
 dation is, that his political enemies,
 the 'Blancos,' have not attempted to
 molest him throughout the war. Don
 Juan Ramon Gomez is one of the prin-
 cipal merchants and saladeristas of
 Montevideo, has been resident for
 many years in Rio Janeiro, and both
 in that city and Montevideo has always
 taken an active and prominent part in
 most of the charitable institutions.

The Progreso Ball last night, it
 seems, was given at the private ex-
 pense of one of the members, whose
 name is a secret. The 'Nacion Argenti-
 na' attempted to work it out by naming
 our friend, Mr. Lelong, and throwing
 on him the 'onus probandi.'

Some of the charges against the
 Custom-house clerks, lately published,
 have been gratuitous; they must fol-
 low orders, and their head man, the
 Minister of Finance, is to blame in the
 majority of instances.

The University is open, we hear, to
 yet heavier attacks from our colleagues
 for inattention to the students. We
 hear there are in a single class over 90
 boys; the lesson lasts half an hour,
 and most of the children retire with-
 out having delivered their lessons.

The editor of the 'Tribuna' has evi-
 dently taken a hint from one of the edi-
 tors of the 'Times.' Morderai B.
 Sampson, Argentine Consul, and has
 obtained the appointment in a similar
 capacity from General Flores. We
 shortly intend applying ourself for
 the vacant Vice-Consulship of the
 Hawaii group in the Pacific.

We have received a poetic communi-
 cation touching the smashed crockery
 in the Montevidean Custom-house, but
 as the verses in question are rather se-
 vere upon one of the leading English
 merchants of Montevideo, we can find
 no room for them.

A Brazilian paper, 'El Comercio,'
 gives details of some very curious dis-
 turbances in Rio Grande. The slaves,
 it appears, are revolting, and all the
 vagabonds are plundering and com-
 mitting frightful barbarities. It would
 seem that these disturbances have no
 connection whatever with Munoz or
 Aparicio.

The Federal Court has at last decided
 the great question between the Muni-
 cipality and the National Government,
 respecting the right to collect the 'con-
 tribucion directa,' which was raised
 by Dr. Quintana. As a matter of
 course, the Municipality lost; and the
 decision has given universal satisfac-
 tion.

Another Brazilian contingent of over
 fifteen hundred men has arrived in
 Montevideo. The drain of gold in Rio,
 consequent on this war, is enormous,
 and the new war, which the Brazilians
 are about to enter into with Paraguay,
 will cause Brazilian securities in Lon-
 don to fall sensibly. The expenses
 attending the Oriental war, we learn
 on good authority are enormous: the
 Paraguayan war is apt to cost twice as
 much. When the Brazilians go up the
 river it will cause a great stir in Cor-
 rientes, and drive the price of cattle
 up, realising the old proverb, "it's
 an ill wind that blows nobody good."

The Juez de Paz of Marchiquita is
 again before the public. The charge
 against this rustic dignitary now, is for
 merely killing his neighbour's cattle,
 and driving off their mares to supply
 the Indians. Several of the neigh-
 bours, men of the greatest respecta-
 bility, have sent in a petition to Go-
 vernment, accusing him of these 'pe-
 cadillos.' When judges are open to

such charges, we leave our readers to
 imagine what must be the conduct of
 the 'tenientes.'

The 'bell-ringers' will give a few
 more performances in Colon before
 they leave for Montevideo. We ad-
 vise our friends to go and hear them.

MAILS FROM PARAGUAY.

GREAT NATIONAL CONGRESS.

The Salto arrived on Friday evening
 from Asuncion with files of the 'Sema-
 nario' to the 26th ult. The stories of
 a Brazilian victory are totally devoid
 of foundation, and Barrios remains
 with the expedition encamped at Co-
 rumbá.

By decree of the 15th ult. President
 Lopez convenes a grand National Con-
 gress for the 5th of March. The dele-
 gates were to be elected by plebiscite on
 the 26th ult. It does not appear what
 precise measures will be submitted to
 this assembly, composed of 600 of the
 leading citizens, but their delibera-
 tions will naturally turn on the best
 manner of carrying on the war with
 Brazil. This step shows that General
 Lopez relies on the support of the na-
 tion, as it is quite an extraordinary
 event, since Congress only meets every
 ten years under usual circumstances.

The telegraph wires are now laid
 as far as the river Tibiquari, and in
 full working order from the capital
 to Villa Oliva, a distance of 120 miles:
 they will soon be completed to Humay-
 tá. The material progress of the coun-
 try is not paralyzed by the war, several
 splendid buildings being also in course
 of erection at Asuncion.

The relatives of the six Paraguayans
 in Buenos Ayres have come forward
 with an indignant protest, full of the
 harshest epithets, respecting these
 "traitors." This is very bad taste as
 they should rather try to screen their
 erring brethren, or leave them in si-
 lence: the Buenos Ayrean press says
 that the protest was written by order
 of Government.

The steamer Paraguari arrived on
 the 18th from Curumbá, towing the
 schooner Jacobina, with 100 prisoners
 of war including some officers and a
 quantity of arms. The Paraná also
 brought 25 prisoners, 3 of them officers:
 all these have been quartered in the
 Lanceros' barracks. The movements of
 troops and artillery continue to be ac-
 tive: 1200 recruits arrived by railway
 have been encamped on the Hospital
 ground, where a new barrack is being
 built. The new battery over the arse-
 nal has been tried with great success.
 The troops at Cerro Leon were attacked
 with diarrhoea, which was happily stop-
 ped by a vegetable diet.

The band of volunteer nurses return-
 ed to Asuncion, after tending their
 wounded countrymen at Coimbra:
 among these ladies were the wife and
 three daughters of the chief-judge San-
 chez to whom the President sent a spe-
 cial note of thanks. The gun-boat
 Itapiri has been launched, with an ar-
 mament of one 80-pounder: she left
 Asuncion for down the river on the
 17th ult. Brigadier General Robles
 arrived at the capital on the 20th ult.
 from the encampment of Cerro Leon,
 and after a conference with President
 Lopez returned next day: the 'Sema-
 nario' says that the object of his visit
 related to some new expedition with
 which the Government has entrusted
 him.

The cargo of the steamer Marques
 de Olinda has been sold by public
 auction, and the effects of the prize are
 now distributed among the various
 shops of Asuncion. Preparations were
 made for a brilliant Carnival, and a
 ball took place at the theatre. The
 river Paraguay, after the recent high
 tide, was falling very fast.

The obsequies of the late bishop
 Urbieto were celebrated with due
 pomp on the 13th, and those of the
 gallant Lieut. Herreros on the 20th,
 both were attended by an immense
 concourse of persons.

Under the heading "poisonous
 flour" we read that the police disco-
 vered a very injurious kind of flour re-
 cently imported: the vessel is to un-
 dergo examination.

A French silversmith, named Emile
 Rolon, died on the 24th ult., and ha-
 ving made no will, the authorities
 took an inventory of his goods. Two
 Germans, named Heinrich Graf and
 Carl Felker, blacksmiths resident in
 the Plaza Vieja, were found dead in

their room, with a quantity of bottles
 around them: it is supposed they com-
 mitted suicide by poison after a great
 "spree."

Bishop Palacios administered confir-
 mation on the 16th inst. to 200 children
 at the Cathedral. Numbers of fresh
 recruits arrived from Limpio, Luque and
 Guarambaré. The steamer Paraná left
 on the 14th for Humaytá with a batt.
 of infantry and several pieces of arti-
 lery.

Barrios had despatched three stea-
 mers to explore the rivers to Cuyabá.
 A great quantity of zinc and machinery
 was taken from the magazine at Dora-
 do. Numbers of Brazilian families found
 escaping in little boats have been quiet-
 ly conveyed back to their homes. An
 official inventory has been made of all
 the property found in Corumbá, and
 the only robberies committed are as-
 cribed to the Italians, who have deli-
 vered up a quantity of powder con-
 ceded by the Brazilians. Two spies
 have been taken and shot.

BRAZIL & PARAGUAY.

[From the Anglo-Brazilian Times.]

The present army of Brazil is small
 and, though from its discipline and
 equipment probably fully competent
 with the aid of the fleet for a suc-
 cessful completion of the war so long
 as the object was simply to obtain re-
 paration from the Uruguayan govern-
 ment for a long continuance of most ex-
 tortionate and barbarous treatment of
 Brazilian subjects, now that Paraguay
 has thrown the sword upon the scale
 and has invaded Brazilian territory,
 must be rapidly and largely increased
 to enable it to commence offensive op-
 erations or even to defend the large ex-
 tent of exposed country which lies at
 the mercy of the invader, whose eava-
 lry if not checked by the troops now
 sending from the adjoining provinces
 can speedily over-run and devastate
 the thinly populated and unprotected
 province of Matto Grosso which with
 an area of 785,000 square miles posses-
 ses a population of only 90,000.

Brazil thus enters into this war, with
 Paraguay, laboring under great and
 manifest disadvantages and no expec-
 tations can be entertained of its speed-
 ily successful termination when it is
 considered that the main population of
 Brazil is congregated along its coast
 and at a considerable distance from the
 threatened regions and that, access to
 Matto Grosso by water being cut off by
 the Paraguayans, all troops, munitions
 of war and even the food for the main-
 tenance thereof her forces whether in
 the garrison or the field must be for-
 warded from the seaboard over roads
 which are at the present time mere
 bridle-paths for the pack-mules of the
 traders, and we must be prepared for a
 wearying and exhausting war in which
 the results will be by far grossly incom-
 mensurate with the expenses and the
 sacrifices necessary for its successful
 termination, Brazil, like England, hav-
 ing a large extent of territory from
 which she derives but little advantage
 yet considerable responsibility.

In the engaging of Paraguay in this
 war there is no doubt but the sole mo-
 tive was the personal ambition of the
 present President General Lopes, who
 has long been known to have cherished
 a desire to rival on the South Ameri-
 can continent the territorial acquisitions
 of the first Napoleon and who eagerly
 avails himself of the entanglement of
 Brazil with the Banda Oriental to fix
 his grasp on the fertile regions lying
 north of Paraguay, so often the battle
 ground of the Portuguese and Spaniards
 in former days.

Lopes it is said has a well-appointed
 army of twenty thousand men trained
 and officered by experienced Euro-
 peans, his policy having been to attract
 to his standard the disciplined and
 adventurous soldiers of Europe. No
 minally the president of a Republic he
 is the Dictator of a nation of serfs. In
 Paraguay the cultivator of the land is
 simply a tenant-at-will of the govern-
 ment which exacts a heavy yearly ren-
 tal and title of all the produce. The
 collection of the great staple of the
 country, mate, the Jesuits' tea of Pa-
 raguay is a government monopoly
 as is likewise the whole foreign import
 trade, a large proportion of the revenue
 of Lopes being derived from the profits
 on the sales of the goods imported. Lo-
 pes, thus, with the army and the finan-
 ces of Paraguay at his sole command
 and the people crushed and servile un-

der a well devised system of espionage
 and terrorism gives loose rein to his
 ambition and after seizing without a
 declaration of war, the hull and impris-
 oning the crew and passengers of a
 Brazilian merchant steamer which, un-
 der the faith of express treaties was
 peacefully engaged in the navigation
 of the common waters, has invaded
 Matto Grosso with a large force and,
 at the latest dates, was reported to be
 marching another to the aid of Monte-
 Vidéo.

Brazil possessed at the breaking out
 of the war with Uruguay a force of only
 twelve thousand men available for the
 protection of the southern frontier of
 Rio Grande from the incursions of the
 Uruguayans and for the exaction of
 reparation from their government. But
 with the entry of Paraguay into the
 struggle arises the immediate necessity
 of increasing the army to at least sixty
 thousand men, a large call on the mili-
 tary spirit of a peaceful nation like
 the Brazilians long unaccustomed to a
 resort to the deadly arbitrament of the
 sword. But with the emergency seem
 to rise their spirit and their patriotism.

The troops in garrison are either al-
 ready on their way or waiting for the
 transports. The police forces of the
 different provinces are volunteering en
 masse, and in all parts of the country
 meetings are called to stimulate the
 laggard and to concert plans for fur-
 nishing to their government support
 moral and material.

The population of Brazil is usually
 estimated at between eight and nine
 millions and the national guards at six
 hundred thousand or about one eighth
 of the free population, a number which
 though frequently considered an ex-
 cessive statement can scarcely be con-
 sidered exaggerated in the face of the
 evidence supplied by the conscription
 rolls of the Northern United States
 which give the same proportion of ma-
 les between the ages of twenty and for-
 ty five to the whole population of those
 States.

If then there volunteer even but ten
 per cent of this body, Brazil without
 drawing largely on her resources ought
 to be in possession of an army suffi-
 cient, not only to end her quarrel with
 the unhappy little Republic of Uruguay,
 but also, driving the invading Paraguay-
 ans from her territory, to carry the
 war even into the country of her enemy
 until she obtain reparation for the past
 and security against a repetition of the
 injury.

MONTEVIDEO.

Our correspondent in the sister-city
 seems to have met with some calamity,
 as we have not heard from him these
 three days.

The 'Reforma' of Friday contains
 several decrees of the new Govern-
 ment—1st. To prolong the term for
 paying coach-patent and Contribucion
 Directa till April 9th. 2nd To appoint
 ex-President Villalba, commissary of
 city banks and report on their condi-
 tion. 3rd. To remove D. Bernabé Ma-
 garinos, appointing in his stead D.
 Manuel Aguiar as Chief of Police. 4th.
 To remove D. Fidel Lopez from the
 university-chair of political economy,
 and restore his predecessor. 5th.
 To abolish the new kind of University
 Council established by President
 Aguirre. 6th. To repeal the law con-
 sidering horses as an article-of-war,
 and guarantee the rights of property to
 estanciaos. 7th. To institute a new
 Registry office for receiving all the
 decrees of the Provisional Government.

The Oriental *Tribuna* has appeared,
 and a general change of names and
 ideas has taken place in the press, ex-
 cept the *Reforma* and *Telegrafo*, which
 pursue their way as undisturbed as if
 nothing had happened in the political
 world. The *Siglo* was revived under
 Dr. Castro, but he is now Minister of
 Foreign Affairs, and Dr. Ramirez suc-
 ceeds him as editor. Confidence seems
 to be gaining ground, and the theatres
 and carnival continue as usual.

Some disorders have taken place in
 the *Campagna*. On the 20th ult., while
 the surrender of Montevideo was being
 arranged, a band of soldiers under Capt.
 Taveres sacked the Sierra estancia at
 San José, carrying off 12,000 sheep. In
 Salto, D. Felix Lorente has been robbed
 of all his horned cattle, it would seem
 by the authorities, as the cows were
 publicly sold by auction.

The board of engineers has been
 convened to report and discover the va-

rious mines through the city, which are still a source of anxiety. General Caraballo has been named commander-in-chief of the rural districts.

DARING CAMP OUTRAGE.

The diligence which left San Vicente on Thursday, at 2 p.m. for Lobos, was stopped on the high-road by Captain Feliciano Fernandez, at the head of eight soldiers, and accompanied by the clerk of the Juzgado of San Vicente.

This horrible outrage, committed in broad daylight by the public authorities, caused a great sensation, and profoundly affected the lady and daughters of a leading foreign merchant, who had the misfortune to be passengers.

We are happy to learn that the Postmaster-General, Mr. Posadas, has demanded of the Governor satisfaction for so shocking an affair, which is calculated to make Europeans believe our camp authorities rather worse than those of Arabia or Japan.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

Captain Corbett, who was in command of the steamship Sea King (now the Shenandoah) when she was transferred to the Confederates for service as a cruiser, was again brought up at Bow-street police court on Thursday.

The Shrewsbury sham detective case seems to have led the people of that town to form a very contemptuous feeling for the magistrates and police constables who were so cleverly outwitted by the pseudo John Morgan.

The accusation against Mr. Harris, the official assignee in bankruptcy at Nottingham, of having kept back certain sums which he ought to have paid into court, has been disposed of. Mr. Commissioner Sanders gave judgment in the case on Tuesday, and fully acquitted Mr. Harris, who, if the charge had been sustained, would have been compelled to pay a penalty of 20 per cent, detained by him.

The inquest on the bodies of the eight colliers who perished by the recent irruption of water into the Leeswood Colliery, near Mold, terminated on Tuesday night. The jury returned a verdict of "Manslaughter" against the proprietors of the pit.

It has been ascertained that six persons lost their lives at Edinburgh theatre on Friday. All the bodies have been recovered.

The inhabitants of Dublin are highly gratified by a report that the International Exhibition which is to be held in that city next summer will be inaugurated by the Prince of Wales.

IRELAND.

The county of Meath, which bears the reputation of being one of the richest in Ireland, being chiefly occupied by wealthy graziers, seems to be in a very disturbed state. A correspondent of a Dublin journal says that a

notice was posted up on a chapel gate near Navan, on Sunday last, bearing the figure of a death's-head and cross-bones, and threatening three magistrates and three farmers with death. Several other outrages of a similar character are reported, and it is said that the magistrates are about to apply to the Government to proclaim the county.

In striking contrast with the reports from Meath is the following well authenticated account of the present condition of the county of Limerick:—

The county of Limerick has never been in such a satisfactory state as it is at the present time. Crime is continuing to diminish; leaving but very few cases indeed to be tried by the chairmen at quarter sessions. By a strict observance of the reports of country petty sessions it will be seen that the people are day by day getting more and more orderly, and many of them who previously committed minor offenses are now found rather to aid the constabulary in the discharge of their duty than obstruct or offend themselves.

Let the sheep infected with this disease in the feet be put into a dry place, after remaining an hour, take a brush and cleanse the dirt from between the claws then shaking the bottle well, dip a stick or feather into the liquid and anoint the diseased part all over, after which let them stand dry for an hour; if properly applied, one application is generally sufficient.

To destroy maggots it may be used in the same manner but sometimes requires to be applied three times; it also cures all sorts of ulcers arising from them, and may be applied to any cut to prevent the flies from forming maggots.

Experience has proved it to be the best preventive that can be applied after castrating stallions and one application of this liquid may save a valuable animal.
