HORRIBLE and MYSTERIOUS AFFAIR. MURDER AT THE GOVERNMENT-HOUSE.

One of the most tragic and extraordinary scenes on record occurred yesterday at the Provincial Government-house. About half-past eleven o'clock, some parties in the office of the Defensor de los Menores complained of a most unpleasant smell, and the attention of the officers being called to the matter they had the rooms adjoining the office in question searched, when one of the most appalling sights presented itself, a young man, aged about 17, in the most disgusting state of putrefaction, was hanging by the neck, with both his hands tied. No language can describe the horror of the spectators. The air was so impregnated with the foul smell, that the officers had to be deserted. The Comisario was sent for, and one of the black servants of the Government-house immediately apprehended. Such was the excitement caused by this frightful disclosure, that at twelve o'clock there was positively no passing up or down Calle Moreno. It certainly is one of the most extraordinary cases that ever occurred in B. Ayres, and calls for the most searching inquiry. The place selected for the perpetration of the crime, the very Government-house. The attitude of the unfortunate victim, and the fact that the very room the poor boy was murdered in, is next to the very office of one of the most public places in Buenos Ayres. The whole affair requires to be cleared up to satisfy the public, and, come what will, the guilty must be brought to punishment. We hope to obtain further particulars about this truly mysterious murder before going to press.

LATEST PARTICULARS.

About 11 a.m. when the clerks entered the office, they found an insufferable stench, and supposing some dead animal was concealed, proceeded to look under the tables and presses, but could see nothing. At length they pulled down a press in the corner, and to their horror found the putrefied body of a youth apparently 16 or 17 years of age, with the feet up and the head, which presented marks of strangulation, downward. The hands and feet were tied and although the first rumor said the body was hanging, this is incorrect, and the victim was evidently murdered before being concealed behind the press.

The crowd soon became very great, and the stench almost defied entrance into the office, while the police was sent for, to take proper steps. The Minister of Government (Provincial), Dr. Cardenas, attended in person to assist at the sumario drawn up on the subject. A black man was at once arrested on suspicion, and, we believe, also the porter.

Several persons soon identified the victim as a youth who sold lottery tickets, and distributed the morning papers. He was in the employment of Sr. Leguina, who had given him some subscriptions (amount \$7,000) to recover, and when he was missing, it was supposed he had absconded with the money. For some days past the clerks remarked an unusual quantity of flies in the office, but no smell.

The office in question is the Defensoria de Menores, next door to Sr. Madera's office, being the fourth door from Calle Bolivar, in Calle Moreno. There is a back-door into the court-yard of the Government-house, with entrance in Calle Bolivar. Much suspicion is attached to the porter, but perhaps unjustly, and the popular impression (which is generally found correct) seems to implicate the new Germaneria quartered in this yard.

The murdered youth was robbed of \$5,000 in lottery tickets, and it is supposed he was treacherously invited into the yard to sell some tickets, and then strangled by one or more ruffians.

It is wonderful, in an alarming degree, how this murder was perpetrated in the Government-house, with sentinels, officials, servants, &c., on the premises, how the corpse was introduced into this office, and how it remained undiscovered by the numerous persons who frequent it. Governor Saavedra and his Ministers have been sitting for some days in close contact with the murdered youth, whose starting apparition seems as an indication of the hand of Providence, to remind us of the inefficiency of our criminal justice.

All the incidents of the tragedy are calculated to arouse the dormant police, and fix attention on the Government house as the scene of a horrible tragedy, wherein public suspicion points the finger at the very servants of Government as the perpetrators of the murder.

It is something remarkable that in that same court-yard which has witnessed this awful crime, we had three years ago an interview with Minister Acosta relative to the Guardia Monte murders, which his Excellency treated with unbecoming levity. Now it is not an Irishman who has got 'seraggled' by a gaucho; but the bloody fingers of Murder trace in the Government office itself, a warning which we hope will not prove fruitless.

MORE DETAILS.

The 'Nacional' states that the porter in sweeping the passage observed some spots of blood leading to a press behind the door, where the corpse was found hanging and quite putrid. In one of the pockets was a slip of paper. The 'Tribuna' has not been delivered at Messrs. Peta and Betts for 2 or 3 days. The keys of the office were kept by one of the clerks. Deceased was a Spaniard named Silva, and has been missing three days. Messrs. Blanca and Puiggari are making a post-mortem examination, and the police are making enquiries.

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES.

CORRIENTES.

The 'Progreso' of the 7th inst brings no news from Paraguay. The Governor of Corrientes has named Mr. Fitzmaurice C.E. on the committee for revising a map of the Province. The Tribunal of Justice has rejected the claim made by the Spanish Minister for outrages committed on a subject named Isidro Busquet: the Minister of Foreign Affairs has demanded information in the matter. D Adolfo Calvo is about to remove his residence from Corrientes, probably to return to Paris. The wife of Deputy Cabral died on the 23rd ult. Fray Patrici has concluded the chapel of Monte Alto, and gives a promising account of his mission among the Chaco Indians. The notorious assassin, Sosa alias Tuyá who escaped from the prison about 4 months ago, took refuge on the frontier of Entre Rios, where Urquiza's vigilant police soon overtook and killed him: he fought single-handed against the whole troop. Another murderer named Cabrera, escaped from Bahia Blanca, was taken and shot in the same manner. Sor Roibon is constructing a floating dock at Corrientes, through joint-stock shares. Sor Benitez is named Supreme Judge, Dr. Arias succeeding him as Fiscal for the Province. Governor Lagrãna received official intimation of the appointment of Sor Portal as Governor of Jujuy, in a despatch from Mr. C. Barro [of Waterford?] prime-minister of that province. Sor Balbastro has been named inspector of the Colegio Argentino, which re-opened on the 1st inst. Latest accounts from Paraguay represent the garrison of Humaytã at 8,000 men, with 100 guns mounted in position.

Paper-currency improves at Corrientes, doubloons falling from 244 to 238. Cordoba currency 20.

THE TRAGEDY AT CORDOBA.

MURDER OF EX-GOVERNOR POSSE.

The story about an intended revolution turns out, as the Rosario papers said, completely false. The Exo of Cordoba now confesses that ex Governor Posse was brutally murdered near his own door, and gives the following account.

Don Gregorio Ortiz and some other gentlemen saw Dr. Posse taken from the house of the Federal Judge under arrest. When passing his own door, his mother-in-law, surprised to see the soldiers, asked him what was the matter, and where they were taking him to? Sor Ortiz then joined Dr. Posse, and they proceeded to the corner of Sta. Catalina, when the word was given "kill him:" the soldiers at first hesitated, but then fired, and Posse fell dead. Sor Ortiz narrowly escaped the same fate.

The murder of Posse caused a profound sensation: Deputy Bouguet sent in his resignation, and Deputy Cuenca called on the Chambers to make an investigation into the affair.

The Chief of the Garrison, Major Pizarro, gives a pigmarole history of the revolution, under date 2nd inst. Twenty days before, the drum-major Estrella informed him that a revolt would take place, headed by Cires and Arguello. He directed Estrella to attend as usual the meetings of the conspirators and watch their steps. Soon after Lieut. Arraigada stated that ex-Governor Posse sought to tamper with him, and had frequently invited him to his house: this officer also assisting at the meetings, it was arranged he should work with Arguello for a mutiny in the barrack. Sergeant Rojas followed the same course. Pizarro next directed Lieut. Arraygada to implicate Posse still further by getting money from him, which Posse accordingly gave him. Sergeant Rojas also received money twice from the conspirators, amounting to 40 doubloons. Intimation being given to the Governor Dr Luque, it was arranged to place the Chief of Police in accord with Major Pizarro. The spies gave word that the revolt would take place on the 1st of March, the officers within giving the signal of mutiny. At the proper hour Pizarro gave the signal and awaited the attack. Capt. Cires with a group of men came up, and the leader being shot, as well as a corporal who had deserted, the rest were pursued. Lieut. Vasquez simultaneously attacked a group near the Plaza, and Capt. Cordoba went with a reinforcement to the Merced. Just then Pizarro ordered Lieut. Albornoz to arrest ex-Governor Posse who was hiding in the Federal Judge's house.

It was found, however, that Lieut. Vasquez had already shot him in front of Ferreyra's house. Most of the other conspirators were then arrested, including Sor Ortiz. Three were taken in the attack on the barrack, six in the street, and two hidden in private houses. The arms taken comprise 3 muskets, 2 carbines, 11 cartridges, 3 swords, 1 revolver, 4 pistols, and a dagger.

From the above narrative, in which Dr. Posse's death is purposely shrouded in ambiguity, it seems that the revolt was really concerted in the barrack, for some end either of the commander or Governor; and the murder of Posse precludes any hope of discovering the real facts of the case. Ex-Governor Posse was formerly accused of stealing cattle, and his reputation as a ruler somewhat tarnished, but the barbarous act of shooting him while in custody and near his own door proves how delusive Republican liberties are in these countries.

LATEST FROM CORDOBA.

We have files of the Eco to the 5th inst. The indignation about the murder of Posse increased so much that three more Deputies and the commander of National Guard renounced their posts in an energetic protest to the Governor. On the 3rd inst the Government replied to Major Pizarro's despatch, thanking the officers and troops for suppressing the revolt of the 1st inst. On the 4th, however, a change came over both the Governor and press: the former ordered the arrest and trial by court-martial of Lieuts. Vasquez and Albornoz for the murder of Posse, and the Eco heaps infamy on the actors in a deed which first elicited its praise. If the revolution was planned by Government, the court-martial will prove a sham-as we expect. The Ocean Circus is playing at Cordoba: Miss Rogers performs on the tight-rope.

ROSARIO AND THE INTERIOR.

The 'Cosmopolita' brings dates to the 10th instant. The awful occur-

rence at Cordoba engrosses all attention. D. Camilo Gutierrez has been named Comandante-general of Rosario. The news from the upper Provinces is unimportant. Sor Portal was sworn in Governor of Jujuy on Feb. 4th. In Salta they are reforming the provincial Constitution. Things are going on well at Rioja, and the Quillay plant causes much notice.

Vice-president Marcos Paz, and the Minister of Education, Dr. Costa, arrived in the Ubieny on Wednesday evening, and the Minister started next morning for Mendoza. Rosario has been visited with heavy rains. The 'Cosmopolita' very unwisely attacks the Jesuits, whose college in Sta Fé is the finest in the Republic.

KLAPPENBACH'S SAN JUAN MINES.

VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR TO MARAYES.

Mr. Klappenbach junr. received yesterday a piece of silver weighing 186 marks (93 lbs.) and worth over £300 sterling from his mines at Marayes, along with a letter from his brother announcing the arrival of Governor Rojo and suite to visit the Klappenbach works and refining furnaces. Everything is going on splendidly and these frequent remittances of barsilver to Mr. Klappenbach are the first tangible proof of the richness and good return of the San Juan mines. Another invoice of 100 lbs. is to arrive in 15 days and Mr. Ed. Klappenbach promises to flood our city with native silver, when the mines and furnaces are in full play. The only news from Hilario is the departure of Mr. Gibson, book-keeper of the Company, who writes to us from Valparaiso a rather gloomy account, and the journey of Major Richard who starts for England via Chile on the 20th inst.

Mr. James Klappenbach leaves today for Rosario en route for San Juan: we cordially wish him a pleasant journey and every success in his promising enterprise.

NEWS FROM THE URUGUAY

The steamer yesterday brought dates—Concepcion 5th, and Concordia and Mercedes 9th inst. The papers are full of the Montevidean question, but have evidently cooled down. The 'Uruguay' quotes a private letter as follows:

"The Brazilians have been defeated at Paso de Los Libres above Uruguayana. Last night a neighbor of San Borja arrived with news that Gen. Canavaro was routed and his army cut to pieces by the Paraguayan vanguard: the Brazilians lost 800 killed, besides a quantity of prisoners, baggage and artillery which fell into the hands of the victors." This news is probably as true as the defeat of the Paraguayans with 2000 killed invented by the 'Tribuna.'

The folks in Mercedes celebrated the peace at Montevideo with great rejoicings: the English residents gave a grand ball. A Frenchman, named Batiste Roboul, was found murdered in his rancho: he was a sheep-farmer, and his body presented several stabs and the throat cut.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

GREAT NEWS FROM THE CAMP.

GOVERNOR FLORES SICK A-BED.

This day's news from the country is rather important. In the Partido of Durazno a number of Munoz's troops have presented themselves, delivering their arms, accoutrements, &c., to the authorities. The principal in command was the Capt. D. Benito Viana. The moment the intelligence was received, Commandant Rafael, with a body of men under his orders, set out to assist the authorities in case of emergency, but everything passed off quietly, much to the satisfaction of the population in general. When the disarmament of the remaining portion of Munoz's forces, has been effected, it is said that Caraballo will disband the victorious Colorado troops, taking good care, however, to leave a sufficient force of 'policia' throughout the different departments, which force will maintain the public peace, guarantee, and finally establish a 'lasting' peace in the Oriental Republic. However great Flores, faults may seem to have been, no one can help admiring and coinciding with his present measures, combining as they do lenity, with a strong will and power of raising our hitherto unhappy republic to its former

position, one of wealth and internal prosperity. By the way, as we have been talking about Flores, it will probably surprise you to hear that the old gentleman is unwell; in fact, he is confined [they say] to his bed. The conjectures as to what his ailings may be are so numerous and absurd, that it is nearly impossible to discover the real truth. Some say that it is all owing to the 'Standard.' You, of course, are aware that the General has of late taken a wonderful fancy to anything connected with English or Englishmen; in fact, it is commonly reported that he intends reversing European court etiquette, i.e., substituting the English language for the French in all diplomatic transactions. Others ascribe the 'liberator's' illness to an over-dose of Rio Negro water, which water is supposed to possess powers of the highest revolutionary orders. If it be the case, it certainly has effected a revolution in the corporal system of Governor Don Venancio Flores. Some dissatisfaction has been caused in town by the rather scandalous conduct of some Brazilian officers the other night. It appears a Brazilian soldier having been guilty of some very serious misdemeanor, was, as a matter of course, arrested. However, the Brazilian officers interfered, drew their revolvers, and forcibly wrested the culprit from the hands of the 'serenos.'

The Kate Fitzgerald has been cleared for New York by Mr. Horne, with a cargo of hides, wool, and horsehair. I take the present opportunity of intimating to all subscribers and friends of the 'Standard,' that on to-morrow I open the office, and shall be most happy, as far as my powers reach, to oblige the public in general. Henceforward I will make it my most special duty to see that the paper be punctually and regularly delivered to all subscribers in Montevideo, as also will I pay the strictest attention and promptitude to all advertisements, instructions, &c.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Letters received by the mails from the provinces state that Mr. Rickard of the San Juan mines leaves for England via Chile, about the 20th of this month. He expects to return via Buenos Ayres in the month of July.

The Brazilian squadron it is said will leave for Paraguay on next Thursday. Baron Tamandare goes up along with the fleet. We hear nothing more about the iron-clads from Rio, but it is said, we know not with what truth, that the mouth of the Paraguay river is being staked, and torpedos are being manufactured in Asuncion to blow up the whole Brazilian fleet.

Sr. Alsina's letter from Rio Janeiro has been published in the 'Tribuna' and 'Pueblo.' It is interesting, inasmuch as it affords us Argentine views of matters when away from home. Mr. Alsina was the leader of the Crudos here, and is a young man of decided talent; he has gone to travel through Europe for the benefit of his health. We look forward to some interesting letters when Don Adolfo arrives at the lakes of Killarney, or the Thames tunnel.

The most important news we have from Montevideo is that Flores is really very sick, and confined to his bed; a wag says his complaint is a sort of revolutionary reaction in the region of the heart, and that a leading homoeopathist is of opinion that a winter campaign in Paraguay is the best thing for him.

We have at last secured the services of a University man for our office in Montevideo; he will be found at his post on and after Monday next. We trust that our office will prove a convenience to our countrymen, as it is for this purpose we have opened it.

The desertion of soldiers of the line from Argentine regiments is becoming so systematic since the law of Congress abolishing the lash, that the President's attention has been called to the matter; the 3rd of the line has been ordered up to town from Azul: we learn on the very best authority that this regiment at present consists of only fifty soldiers and twenty five officers—it usually mustered three hundred men, but owing to the constant desertions it has dwindled down to the present insignificant number.

Friends from the camp state that it has rained copiously during the last

few days, particularly in the neighborhood of Ranchos, San Vicente, and the city of Mercedes; the rain has been a great god-send, as the state of the camp was really becoming alarming. The Jersey is not expected to arrive before Wednesday, owing to the last month having only 28 days.

The new brigade of camp police has received orders to march for San Nicolas; great expectations are entertained as to the efficiency of this new corps, which we hope sincerely will be realised.

The drought in the north is becoming most alarming; the recent rain it appears was not limited to town, as in many of the northern partidos it rained heavily; meanwhile the thistles are springing up, and there being no grass the sheep eat the young thistles until they die from suffocation. A foreign gentleman who has recently paid a visit to the north, gives it as his opinion that the sheep-farming business to be a paying and secure business must undergo a complete change, and that the farmers instead of sowing only small patches of alfalfa, must regulate their alfalfa fields to the size of their flocks; at estancias where one or two squares of alfalfa are sown, there should be at least fifty—and in fact every puesto in the country, no matter how small the flock, should have from 8 to 10 squares of alfalfa. Owing to the enormously high rate of wages and the difficulty of getting hands, it is a grave question whether the sheep business could afford such heavy expenses, but there can be no doubt that the seasons being so precarious the farmers must do something and that at once.

In the police-list of Thursday we find a native woman aged 28, and an Italian, taken up as Lunatics, three women and two soldiers for rioting in calle Cordoba, a 'changador' for being found concealed in a private house, an Italian for drunkenness, a bullock-driver for beating another instead of his own oxen and a sprinkling of natives and foreigners for small offences.

The 'Tribuna' says that the distinguished diplomatist [read poet], D. José Marmol, will shortly leave for Rio Janeiro, to conclude the mission entrusted to him by the Argentine Government near the Brazilian court. The same paper contradicts the rumored visit of Flores to Buenos Ayres.

Parties in Montevideo requiring-packet numbers for the mail, will find same on sale at our office in that city. Mr. Klappenbach leaves to-day for his mines in San Juan; we wish him a pleasant journey, and congratulate him on the splendid success of his silver mines.

The new steamer 'Iniciador,' built by Messrs. Sherman and Co., we learn reflects the greatest credit on the builders; she is nearly as large as the Pavon, has very fine cabins and superior accommodation for passengers; we are glad to see that she starts from the Tigre, and hope to see her well supported.

We have received a terrible attack against the Custom-house, signed 'Chicote' but require the writer's name previous to publishing it, as there are many charges accusable.

The British steam corvette, Satellite, arrived in port yesterday. We understand that she will shortly go over to Colonia.

An English estanciero, belonging to the Banda Oriental, has recently purchased some splendid rams, and shipped them over to his estancia.

A sentry at the Government-house made a stab at some unfortunate cart-driver, as the poor fellow was driving before the Government-house. We are ignorant of the cause of the assault, but an English gentleman, who was present, states that the driver narrowly escaped being stabbed in the shoulder.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

The "Constitucional," San Salvador, dates to Dec. 29th. The four lilliputian Republics enjoy a temporary peace: in the recent elections two Englishmen, named Horace Parker and Martin Mahon, and General Peter Scallion (Irish) were elected Deputies to the Congress of San Salvador. Sr. Iribarri, plenipotentiary for Guatemala and Salvador, in the U. States, sent a long official note to the cabinet of Washington denying any intention on the part of his Governments to seek annexation with Mexico. Secretary

Seward replies that he is very happy to learn such contradiction, but that he feels confident no state runs any risk of the fate of Mexico or losing its independence if it only exhibit morality and justice in its dealings with foreign powers.

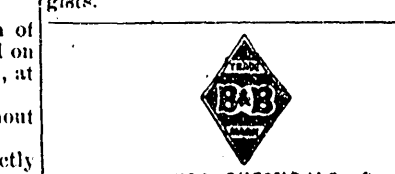

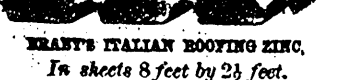

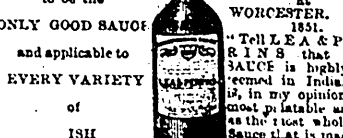
