## EDITOR'S TABLE.

Our colleague the 'Nacion Argentina' threw the whole city into a most serious alarm yesterday, in consequence of the particulars which it gave respecting the new revolution attempted by Waldino Urquiza. Passengers recently arrived from the Uruguay profess to know nothing whatever about the movement, which we sincerely hope is traceable to the inventive genius of some of our colleagues. The 'Nacion' states that Waldino Urquiza is at the head of three hundred men, including officers and soldiers, all of whom belong to the partido Blanco in Montevideo. A special 'chasque' from Paysandú was at once despatched to notify the press. It is said that the terms of Salto

The Montevidean Government has conceded to the Brazilian Government the right to import into Montevideo, free of duty, all articles necessary for the prosecution of the war against Paraguay. As the duties collected in the Custom-house are pledged to the English bond-holders for the payment of the interest and amortization on the bonds, we take exception to the generosity of his Excellency Gov. Flores.

The Liverpool steamer Paraguay sailed yesterday from Montevideo, from whence she will start about the 21st for Liverpool: we wish Captain Pim a pleasant voyage and speedy return.

## THE GOVERNMENT-HOUSE MURDER.

We learn that all the particulars we have published about this horrible tragedy are correct, except the decision of the Court, since the matter is still *sub-judice*. The police have not concluded their investigations, having so late as Thursday taken the deposition of Sor. Andrade, grocer, who saw the door of the Government-house opened on the morning of the 10th at 4 o'clock. The trial of the two porters and policeman will constitute a *cause celebre* in Buenos Ayres.

The windows of the office where the crime was committed are left open every night to purify the apartment of the stench which has not yet ceased to fill the place; but it will be much more difficult to remove the stain of infamy which attaches to the scene of crime. It is said that the Defensor de la Ley, Sor. Saravia, declared before the Court that the crime was committed by natives and not foreigners. The evidence of our colleagues respecting the matter is unintelligible.

## IRELAND.

Dublin, Feb. 8. (Special Correspondent.)  
Something peculiarly disconcerting fact that, from time to time, in Ireland will force its attention, and this too at a moment when some gleams of a brighter future have begun to make their appearance within the past month across the distress prevailing among the population in the west of Ireland. Their appearance in the west is always some hundreds of miles from the coast with fur-

owing to the disturbance of the market of the States. Few are the ability to send money home from New York or other cities of the Union; and hence the number leaving Ireland for the States has steadily diminished. The Colonial Governments have already commenced to take advantage of this drawback to emigration to the States; and Queensland, Victoria, and the Cape have agents here offering peculiar advantages to intending emigrants. The home Government lends every possible aid to these gentlemen; and such is their devotion to the object in view, that the only wonder is how little success attends their energetic and indefatigable labours. The fact is, however, that the Irish people generally have never shown any very great desire to emigrate to the British colonial possessions. They lean, somehow or other towards those countries which are Republican in matters of Government. But I will not seek for their reasons in so doing. It is my purpose to direct your attention to the favourable opportunity presented to your Government for encouraging emigration from Ireland to the Argentine Republic. That country can only truly prosper where the population show an increase; therefore, it should be the first care of any executive to nurture with kindly and firm hand the germ of population. I feel assured that if the Irishmen settled in the Argentine Republic were called on to subscribe to a Government loan, to be devoted to bringing out some of their countrymen, they would give a ready response. Such a mode of relieving the distressed agricultural population of Ireland would be far better than the system of alms-giving too long resorted to in times of distress.

The markets here are falling. Provisions have declined fully 10 per cent. within the past fortnight. Cattle now are in very bad condition, owing to the fact that money is not to be had to supply house feeding, and the farmers have lost much by a prevailing distemper among horned cattle. There is hardly any stock, and prices in local markets remain firm. Flax is declining in price owing to the fall of cotton of a few days. Still the flax crop is not so good as those who had the good sense and diligence to undertake its cultivation. There is good room for importation of cheap food to large towns; but in the rural districts the food of the people is, indeed, wretchedly indifferent, and they have no means to procure better than Indian corn meal. Never have the people of Ireland missed the much-abused potatoe more than at present. Truly, the potatoe was the poor Irishman's best friend, for the 'childher' always had 'plinty' spare of food, when the 'murrins' and the 'crops,' the 'pink-eyes,' the 'apples' were abundant. We well remember, when fishing in the beautiful and

just learned that the difficulties hitherto existing between Great Britain and Brazil have been amicably arranged, and commercial relations and interests in South America will be placed on a secure footing. The policy of the Argentine Government is much approved here, and a neutral policy is still considered the safest course at the present crisis.

Some large failures in connection with the provision (home) trade here are announced. Trade, generally is dull; but there is a good prospect of a safe expansion as the spring advances.

The produce markets show much firmness, with exception of cotton, which has fallen on the aggregate, 3d per lb. Speculators who can not wait or who fear a further decline, will suffer severely. The wool trade is in a satisfactory state for the operations of importers, inasmuch as stocks are merely nominal in Yorkshire, and prices are advancing. Scotch wools are enhanced in price; while for top lots of foreign the offers are numerous at an advance of at least 12 per cent on the rates of this time last year. The rumours of peace in America have tended to contract the transactions of manufacturers here; and immediately affected the operations of mining companies and iron masters. A short time, however, will change all this, as the spirit of adventure and trade now-a-day is too strong to be impeded by any transient obstacle.

MEXICO—ALLEGED CESSION OF TERRITORY TO FRANCE.  
San Francisco, Jan. 23.

Letters from Mazatlan to the inst. announce the arrival there of Captain Beauregard, a brother-in-law of General Beauregard, of the States, in the capacity of secretary to Wm. M. Gwin, United States Senator from California. Captain Beauregard reports that Gwin has been created a duke by Emperor Maximilian of Mexico, that Sonora, Sinaloa, Chihuahua, Durango, and Lower California have been ceded to the Emperor Napoleon by the Mexican Government, in payment for the troops furnished by the French Government to subjugate Mexico. That Mr. Gwin has been appointed viceroy over those States, and will enter upon the duties of his office. This story is not believed here, that Mr. Gwin has obtained grants of land, and is authorized to encourage immigration from the States.

AMERICA.

New York, Jan. 27. Several Confederate vessels from Richmond appeared off Fort Parsons, in James River, on Tuesday, supposed with the intention of destroying the Federal works at City Point. The fort opened fire, and one vessel getting aground was blown up and abandoned. The others retired.

Admiral Farragut has been ordered to James River.

The government refuses credit to New York City on previous drafts, and calls for 20,000 men by the 15th of February.

Schofield's corps from Thomas's army has arrived in Virginia. It is not known whether he will reinforce Grant or Sherman.

The committee on the conduct of the war exonerates Butler for failure at Fort Fisher.

Augusta papers report large arrivals of fugitives from those portions of South Carolina liable to Federal interruption. The movement was ordered by the governor.

Federal troops are leaving Nashville for New Orleans.

Fort Smith and the garrison, numbering 2,000 men, was reported captured by General Price.

The "Richmond Sentinel" says there is no danger whatever that any irregular peace measures will be passed by Congress, that body being now wholly given up to war.

An expression of want of confidence in all members of the Cabinet except Trenholm, has been made by an influential delegation of Congress. A thorough reconstruction is therefore regarded probable.

An incendiary attempt, supposed by parties from New York, was made, on the 18th, to destroy the Confederate steamer Lavinia, formerly Harriet Lane while lying at Havannah.

The Colonel Lamb, with 140 men on board, has left Havannah, believed on a cruise. Doubtful rumours prevail of the capture of the Denbigh with a valuable cargo. The blockade-running fleet were notified on the 21st of the capture of Fort Fisher. The Owl had escaped capture and returned to Bermuda. The Charlotte, Stag, Rattlesnake, and Camelion, were out, supposed bound for Wilmington.

New York, Jan. 28.

The "World" says that the Emperor Napoleon's Mexican development is big with future danger, and even California may be wrested from us, as we could not conduct a war to advantage on those distant coasts.

The French journal, the "Courier" says that the Emperor Napoleon aims to secure, by means of the Mexican empire, the establishment of a balance of power on this continent.

Mr. Blair has returned from Richmond unsuccessful. This news has caused an advance in gold and cotton. The "Examiner" says—"Adieu to all hopes of peace by negotiation; our policy, diplomacy and statesmanship now centre in unsparing battle." General Singleton has also returned.

The "Tribune" says that President Lincoln is urged by his friends to make peace before Europe recognises the South. Washington correspondents report foreign affairs delicate and critical and that steps are taking to strengthen our representation abroad.

The resolution in the Confederate House, proposing armistice and peace negotiations, has been referred to the foreign committee.

Admiral Porter says he has found dispatches from General Lee stating that if Forts Fisher and Caswell are held he will have to evacuate Richmond. The exact language of the dispatch is not given. Porter further says in every fort was an Armstrong gun with the broad arrow upon it. He replies to Butler's report upon his failure, and openly accuses him repeatedly with falsehood.

The Stag and Charlotte were among the vessels captured on the 21st.

The gun boats were four miles above Fort Fisher. The Confederates have breastworks from the beacon to the river, above the Federal lines, to contest the advance on the city.

Colonel Lamb is reported mortally wounded.

General Gordon has superseded Early.

General Breckenbridge goes to the trans-Mississippi department.

Wilmington journals say that the Federals attacked Clingman's brigade at Sugar Loaf, but were repulsed.

It is rumoured that the Confederates have captured battery Harrison, on the James River.

Captain Parkes, in command of the iron-clad Onontaxis, has been dismissed for cowardice on the occasion of the Confederate fleet appearing off City Point. Had not the Richmond and the Virginia grounded millions of property would have been destroyed.

It is rumoured that Mr. Benjamin has resigned the office of Secretary of State.

The Confederate House has passed a bill authorising the issue of 20,000,000 Treasury notes in lieu of bonds.

A petition has been presented to indemnify citizens of Savannah for losses sustained by Federal occupation.

General Sherman offers planters greenbacks for cotton. He has issued an order setting apart South Carolina Sea Islands, and abandoned the rice and cotton fields on the Florida and South Carolina coasts for settlement by freed negroes, and upon these lands no white person except military will be allowed to reside.

President Davis has signed the resolution appointing a commander in chief for the army.

Port Gibson dispatches report trade with Mexico developing rapidly, Texas filling up with goods.

It is reported that the Federal armies of the James River and Potomac are to be consolidated, with Sheridan as commander.

The "Examiner" reports gold 100 per cent.

The Confederate Government refuses to allow Federal bishops to visit Southern prisoners.

It is reported that the substance of President Davis's ultimatum to Mr. Blair was, first, the recognition of the independence of the South; and secondly, an armistice and negotiations. It is understood that the Senate will call on the President for a copy of the correspondence between Blair and Davis.

It is rumoured that General Banks will be appointed Secretary for War. The "Tribune" says that no dispatch from General Lee was found at Fort Fisher. It was merely a current story which Admiral Porter repeated in his dispatches.

An attempt to expel Mr. Foote from the Confederate Senate has failed.

At Charleston the Federal fleet is being increased. Their infantry has advanced seven miles nearer Charleston from Pocotaligo Bridge.

THE BEEF MOVEMENT IN ENGLAND.

Mr. E. B. Neill, the Montevideo Consul-General in London, seems at last to have inspired sufficient confidence in what was long looked upon as his Quixotic enterprise, in regard to Rio Plata meat, to have led to the inauguration of a large company for working Professor Morgan's process, as now being adopted by the British Admiralty and the French Marine. This process is now being practised by Dr. Fleury (Professor Morgan's representative) on one of the Uruguayan estancias of the Baron Mauá, who is at present in England encouraging the association referred to; and of the practical progress we expect to be able to give substantial evidence on the ar-

rival of the South American, and of the 9th of March. Liebig's emphatic recognition of the nutritious quality of the meat prepared by Morgan's method, is conclusive as to the chemical merits of the invention, while the ease, simplicity, and economy of the mechanical portion seems to meet every possible requirement alike of the producer on this side and the consumer in England (the bone being retained and the hide preserved by the same operation that conserves the flesh), at a cost of less than half-a-dozen shillings per animal. This discovery, coming simultaneously with the general agitation of the whole meat supply question in Europe, is an omen of magnificent promise for all La Plata, if once peace were restored; and assuredly the initiation of so much good, will have established an enduring claim to South American remembrance.

ANGLO-BRAZILIAN ENTERPRISES.

The directors of the Rio Janeiro City Improvements Company have received by last mail a copy of the Imperial decree approving in the most satisfactory manner the drainage works of the first district of the city. Considerable progress has already been made with the other two districts.

At the meeting of the shareholders of the Brazilian Land and Mining Company the report of the directors and balance-sheet were presented and considered very favourable: the whole of the acts of the directors were confirmed. The resolutions which appeared in the advertisement calling the meetings were passed. As soon as the affairs of the Old National Brazilian Mining Association are settled, the prospects of the present company it is asserted will be in a very good condition.

The Bolsa was well attended to-day, but the transactions in specie were limited. Gold drooped, owing to heavy pressure on the market by the 'bears.'

The news by the packet was the absorbing topic of conversation. Some cargoes of wool of the last clip had sold in Europe, and the improved quality of the wool was at once recognised, and realised better prices. Salted hides have given way, and have fallen 1/2 to 3/4 per lb. The market still looks weak.

Sheepskins—Market dull and drooping; no business to report; nutria skins firm.

Tallow dull during the last fortnight, with a downward tendency; demand limited, and prices have fallen 6d. per cwt.

It is not to be surprised that market reports, with remarks like the foregoing, could be satisfactory to any save the sheepfarmers. Exporters feel rather nervous, particularly the shippers of salted hides.

The new English bank, which will shortly be started in this city, was discussed. It was the decided opinion that, connected as it is with the first names in England, and with the most renowned English bankers, whose principal business is with South America, the new concern will do a large business; indeed, it is popularly believed that shortly we shall have so many banks that the managers will be hat in hand to their customers.
