RIVER-PLATE AFFAIRS IN ENGLAND

The River Plate is at a premium now in England, and we are sincerely glad of it.

Baron Mau's Montevideo loan was a kind of monetary coup-d'etat, in which the success was as complete as the time and circumstances were unfavorable.

Sor. Etcheagaray had similar good fortune in his Cordoba concession, and the subject of emigration to the Argentine Republic was no sooner mooted in England for the first time than it met with a favorable reception.

A second English Bank with large capital comes at this auspicious time to open an establishment in Buenos Ayres and offer its millions for the greater development of every branch of honest industry.

But the kindness of our English friends is not confined to lending us money, peopling our Pampas, and providing us improved means of traffic.

Another new feature is the introduction of South American beef into the markets of G. Britain and Ireland.

While our countrymen sheep-farmers produce three-fifths of the total exported value of the Republic, we can also claim a monopoly of all public enterprises.

REVOLUTION IN PERU.

INDIAN OUTBREAK IN CHILE.

We have received files from Lima to the 10th and Chile 21st ult. with most disastrous news.

The riots at Callao on Feb. 5th were attended with much loss of life, a dozen Spaniards being killed or mortally wounded, and a much larger number of citizens injured by the troops firing on them.

The alarming news reached Valparaiso on the 20th ult. that the Araucanian-Indians had invaded the Bio-bio frontier on the 12th, in great force near the banks of the Renaico.

The press indicates that a rupture between Spain and Chile is imminent.

NEWS FROM THE PROVINCES.

The Rosario papers mention a fire which broke out in a grocer's shop on Monday night, and there being no fire-engine in the city buckets of water were conveyed from the river which proved unavailing.

The "Eco de Corlobn" publishes several articles about the Posse murder and announces that the Government has withdrawn its monthly subsidy to that paper.

when dying: four of them, named Juan, Caballero, Faria and Padilla are now in Cordoba, and the "Eco" vainly calls for their arrest.

From Mendoza we learn that a gang of French thieves has been arrested, previous to leaving for Chile with their booty. Several of Olascoaga's desertors had gone to San Juan and committed robberies.

THE ETCHEGARAY CORDOBA LAND-Scheme.

We had the pleasure of a visit yesterday from Mr. Edward Etchegaray, who looks in good health and spirits after his successful visit to England. He expresses himself much indebted to Messrs. Fair and Sampson, and informs as that, among the Directors will be Mr. McKenna, National Bank [Ireland], Mr. Rivolta, G. Southern Railway, Mr. Houden, River Plate Bank, and other well-known names, Mr. David Robertson subscribed £3000. The capital will not at first exceed £400,000. Contracts have been made to send out 10,000 Irish emigrants, within a year, giving the preference to men who have served in the Constabulary. Offices will be opened throughout Ireland and at London and Buenos Ayres. Mr. Etchegaray acting as Manager here. He proceeds to-day, with the prime-minister Dr. Rawgon, for Cordoba, and will commence the measurement of the land besides making some reforms in the concession.

PUBLIC LAND OFFICE.

The Provincial Government is at last doing what it ought. Yesterday we were visited by a gentleman from the Government Land Office, who applied to us for the residences of some of our subscribers who own Government lands: he showed us a long list, almost every name on which we knew, and expressed the greatest surprise when we offered to publish any notice which would interest our readers, free, gratis, and for nothing. He left our office promising to give as henceforth all useful information from his department.

The following notice is very important, and we call the attention of all parties residing on Government lands to it. The names of the parties have been supplied to us, but as the Government gentleman consider it might possibly annoy them we merely publish the following notice:

"Public Land Office."

"Notice is hereby given to all tenants or occupiers of Government lands, who have not as yet paid the rent due and ending the 31st December last, that if not paid during the present month, they will incur the fine fixed by law, (2 per cent.)

THE GERMAN TIMES.

This is the name of the new German paper started in this city, we have received the first copy, and are agreeably surprised at the vivacious tone and style of our Teutonic colleague.

The 'German Times' will appear three times a week, we hope to see it well supported, and as the Germans are most liberal supporters of the 'Standard,' we trust that our English merchants will reciprocate.

The German public in the River Plate although limited in members is second to none in influence, for the most part occupied in commerce, they take a deep interest in all that concerns the welfare of this country. We hail, therefore, with pleasure our new German colleague, and look forward to the editor taking sides with us in all appeals for reform and condemnation of abuses; the grovelling tone of many of our deceased foreign colleagues was probably the principal cause of their premature demise. The "German Times," we have no doubt, will by its independent tone prove an ally to the 'Standard,' and be every way deserving of the land and literature of Guttenberg. It is remarkable that the first number appeared on St. Patrick's Day, and had a complimentary notice of the patron saint of Ireland.

THE AMERICAN WAR.

The report of the capture of Wilmington is not confirmed by the news brought by the City of Edinburgh. Indeed; these latter accounts throw some doubt on the destruction of Fort Caswell, at the mouth of Cape Fear River. The Richmond papers are urging strongly that any cotton which has been brought down to Wilming-

ton for shipment should be destroyed if the position of the place becomes at all critical.

Accounts from Havana state that the port of St. Marks, in Florida, has become a place of resort for blockade runners. The capture of Wilmington will render it still more so. But the main source of supply to the Confederacy will henceforth be the ports of Mexico. These cannot be closed by the Federals; and through them the Confederates will obtain some articles of absolute necessity. Everything else they will have to dispense with for the present. As for the Imperial Government of Mexico, it will, no doubt, be anxious to render every service to the Confederates, now that the Federal House of Representatives has shown itself ready to go to war with France for erecting a monarchy in Mexico, and the Federal Senate has actually voted money for a Minister to the "Republic" of Mexico. There can be no doubt that the Emperor Maximilian will have to fight for his crown if the Federals should ever obtain possession of the adjoining State of Texas. With the Confederates for neighbours he can get on very well but the Federals would raise a republican insurrection against him very soon, and would send plenty of men to support it from their own armies. If that state of things should arise, the Emperor Napoleon will have to choose whether he will abandon or stand by the empire which he has erected in Mexico. It is not easy to see how he can abandon it without disgrace, or uphold it without engaging in a war.

The Confederate armies were said to be collecting in strength, under the command of General Beauregard, between Charleston and Branchville, to resist the advance of General Sherman's forces. We shall know in a few days whether the Federals are about to lay siege to Charleston, or to push forward Augusta. There are strong motives for each of these movements. A successful attack westward on Augusta would give Sherman possession of the greatest of the Confederate arsenals, and would cut off Georgia and Alabama from the Confederacy. A successful attack on Charleston would not only be a great military and naval triumph, but would gratify the fiercest passions of the Northern people. On the other hand, a successful march northward might possibly compel General Lee to abandon Richmond. Each of these enterprises has also its peculiar difficulties. An attack on Charleston would involve a difficult attack on a strongly fortified position, and one likely to be defended with the utmost obstinacy. A movement inland, either westward to Augusta or northward towards Columbia, would be very hazardous with a large Confederate force in Charleston and along the sea coast. There is only a choice of difficulties, and nothing has yet occurred to show which of them Sherman will decide to encounter. At present the movements of the Federals seem to indicate an attack on Charleston, so conducted as to close the city in on every side. But if this is the plan, it will not be effected without heavy loss and much hard fighting. If the land defences of Charleston are as strong as the sea defences, such an undertaking would require many weeks if not months to bring it to a successful issue.

In an attack on Charleston General Sherman would have the assistance of the fleet, which would be entirely unavailable in a march on Augusta, and of little use in a march northward with Charleston in the hands of the Confederates.

The rumours of peace are still repeated, but with variations and with much less confidence than before. There are also reports that the Confederates have enlisted or enrolled large bodies of negroes—one account says 200,000—and that they are training them in camps of instruction in North Carolina, Sherman's advance will hasten this movement, which has been postponed much too long, and will be too late if not taken at once.

MARKET REPORT OF RIVER PLATE PRODUCE

New York, Jan. 24th, 1865.

Since the opening of the new year buyers for consumption have manifested a greater disposition to purchase, and in some articles of merchandise

there has been a lively trade at improved prices. This activity has been suddenly checked in the last few days; not by the absence of demand, but from inability to settle on satisfactory prices for goods, in consequence of the decline in gold which has fallen below 200. Until something definite as to the future course of gold appears certain, operations will be on a limited scale, and prices vary with the daily fluctuations of gold. The success which has attended the operations of the army and navy recently, leads to the belief that the days of the rebellion are numbered and we may have an early peace. This naturally supposes a severe and perhaps rapid decline in gold, and consequently lower prices for merchandise. To the importing merchant whose goods have been purchased in gold, or by exchange not yet settled in currency, this decline will be beneficial rather than injurious, as it will enable him to purchase more gold with the proceeds of sales than formerly, although made at lower prices, but on the other hand there is a large stock of goods imported and settled for when gold was high, and on which heavy losses will have to be made if gold declines. The present is an anxious time, and requires cool judgment and firmness to manage while everything is so unsettled. The holders of merchandise will not suffer gold to decline if they can prevent it, and if there could be a revelation of the operations of gold speculators, we might find that neither the state of the finances of the government, the volume of currency, or the movements of the armies, affected the price of gold so much as the daily speculations in it, for either a rise or a fall, and to these insignificant speculations, the whole commerce and wealth of the country must contribute and suffer.

During the past month General Sherman has captured Savannah, and the suffering citizens there have been supplied with ship loads of food by the citizens of our northern cities, a striking contrast to rebel usage, and a foreshadowing of peaceful and fraternal intercourse between the PEOPLE of the different sections, when the rebellion is subdued by the dispersion of the ringleaders, who by military force, have despotically ruled the country. The expedition of Admiral Porter and General Butler against the forts below Wilmington failed for want of cooperation by the army, but on another trial with troops under command of General Terry, Fort Fisher has been captured, and we now have command of Cape Fear river, which will effectually stop blockade running there, to the great grief of Her Majesty's "neutral" subjects. There is a report of Wilmington being in possession of our troops, and as Sherman is now operating again in the interior, our armies will be in position to cut off Lee's supplies from Richmond, and prevent his escape southward. We have rumors of peace negotiations, but the only feasible mode is through the army and navy. Government Securities have not fluctuated to a great extent, and although a trifle lower, are freely taken at quotations.

RIVER-PLATE PRODUCE REPORT.

A concession of 1/4 to 1/2 per lb. having been submitted to, we have to report more business done in salted River Plate hides, but the trade shows no anxiety to go freely into stock, and sales can only be made as the wants of buyers force them into the market. Leather is not reported in better request, and although the weather has been against the tanner drying out, supplies have been ample for the demand.

Rio Grande ox for arrival are not worth over 5/4d per lb, and only those of heavy shipping average weights (over 68lbs), would meet a chance of selling.

Horse hides—Nothing of any importance done during the last fortnight. Stock here quite trifling.

Hair—No sales, and arrivals extremely small; prices unaltered.

Sheepskins—Market dull and drooping. No business to report. Prices nominally as before.

Nutrias firm, in absence of supplies. Tallow has been dull the last fortnight, with a downward tendency in value. The demand has been limited for most descriptions, and prices have declined about 6d per cwt. The present value of Russian tallow being

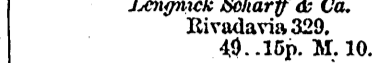
