THE RIVER PLATE BANK.

This case has been the greatest "caus celebre" known in Buenos Ayres for a long time among the foreign and commercial public. Even the murder in the Government-house was for the interval lost sight of, and while Burr versus Green was the topic on every tongue, the opinion was almost unanimously in favor of the former, although some thought the Bank in London was more to blame than the manager here.

So much has been already written on the matter by neutral parties only interested in fair play, that we are spared the trouble of giving our views to the public, who are intimately acquainted with every feature of the case.

Apart from the grievance of Mr. Burr, the general character of the Bank and its manager was unfavorably drawn into the question and severely handled by the German paper 'Deutsche Zeitung.'

It is plain that the River Plate Bank has not gained golden opinions, and we little suspected when inserting Mr. Burr's letter that it was a match which would ignite such a conflagration.

The present exposé will however be infallibly productive of two great benefits, in cautioning persons coming to this country with capital how they trust their fortunes in a similar manner, and impressing on the London shareholders the necessity of having a popular manager and polite officials in their establishment here.

BRAZIL AND PARAGUAY IN THE LONDON MONEY-MARKET

We have received most reliable information from gentlemen connected with the financial houses of England and the Continent that Brazil experiences an almost insurmountable difficulty in the proposed loan of Three millions sterling to carry on the war against Paraguay.

mean to prevent that against Paraguay. The covenants entered into with Rothschild also expressly stipulate that they can only be reformed in the first six-months of every three years. In this difficulty Brazil had only her railways and internal Debt to fall back upon.

Paraguay on the other hand, without such urgent need of extraordinary relief, has even a chance of negotiating a loan, though not to the amount of £5 millions sterling, which will be doubly mortifying to Brazil.

NEWS FROM MONTEVIDEO.

CARABALLO PRESENTED WITH A PARAGUAYAN RED.

TELEGRAPH WIPES SENT FOR.

OIL LAMPS GOING OUT—MONTEVIDEO IN DARKNESS. It will amuse many of our readers to learn that the friends of Caraballo have presented this heroic Oriental with a Paraguayan hammock, very beautifully worked, which he prizes so much that he expresses his determination to liberate the country which produces such beautiful but rather awkward bedsteads.

Yesterday we received no news from Montevideo, as no steamer came up. The last we heard from that city was that there was a tremendous bonfire in the Government house. Old bonds and bank-notes were being consumed in the most wholesale manner.

We have all heard of the over-land route to India, but now the route is to Matto Grosso Engineers, and guides are called into requisition to pilot an immense park of artillery, which is being forwarded by over land to Matto Grosso. Is there no Albert Smith to accompany this expedition, and enlighten Buenos Ayres with some gigantic panorama?

ORIENTAL PROSPECTS.

Nothing of importance has transpired within the last few days. The news brought by the packet has been received with the greatest apathy, which is not to be wondered at, as nothing very interesting has occurred since last we heard from over the seas. Autumn has set in: the mornings and evenings are cold, but during the day the weather is beautiful.

carry out the good intentions of the last Government, which looks well. Positive orders were to be sent by the packet to Europe to the gentlemen engaged in the Telegraphic scheme between Buenos Ayres and Montevideo, to go on with the enterprise, as the Government would afford every assistance. We are glad to see this, as really a telegraph line between the two cities is badly wanted.

The brokers' reports for the packet show the following trade:—Wool sales during the month 148,340 ar., at from 1.80 to 4.35; washed oriollo, 3.60; stock of wool on hand, 180,500 ar. About 48,500 ar. shipped for account of estancieros.

The steamer Tevere is still in limbo. The owners, hoping to have her off the Government rocks, upon which she struck, advertised a trip to the Numancia. But they must have meant the Styx, for the whole affair proved a 'fiasco.'

The Government has received information that some fellow in the camp is going his rounds as tax-collector, and getting in the 'contribucion directa.' A decree has been published, dismissing the officer, and cautioning the public against paying the tax to any but the newly appointed man.

It appears that there is a terrible row going on in Rio about the communications with Matto Grosso. Months and months pass, and the Government receive no advices. The Emperor is all in the dark as to whether Barrios has swept the whole place clean or not, and says that positively Hong-Kong is nearer than Cuyabá.

The Brazilians, besides sending to Europe for money, have also sent for sailors. An agent has left Rio, for Lisbon to engage 2,000 sailors.

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We learn on good authority that a portion of the Boca railway will shortly be opened to the public. This road will be a great convenience in rainy weather. Letters received by the last packet state that the Liverpool and Buenos Ayres steamship Co. intend to establish a monthly line direct to the River Plate.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

There is a petition being got up praying of Government on the opening of the legislature, to introduce a bill to change the present land law: it will bear numerous signatures, and, we have no doubt, will lead to something. The petitioners pray that the valuation of the lands be altered, and that ten years, instead of six, be allowed to purchasers, and no interest charged. It is very remarkable that important auction sales of ships, &c., in Montevideo, are never advertised in the Buenos Ayres papers. The British Consul in Montevideo, and the captain of the vessel, think they comply with their duty by simply advertising the auction in the Montevideo papers, when very probably if due notice were given in Buenos Ayres, buyers at much higher prices might be got here.

Now auctioneers are starting up every day, formerly the favorite avocation was that of a broker, but now it seems the auctioneer. The last new member of the hammer brigade bears the immortal name of Milton. We wonder if he has ever read 'Paradise Lost.'

An important trade auction will take place next week at the well-known English house, Bates, Stokes, and Co. We have no doubt it will be well attended; and whilst speaking of auctions, we may notify our readers that the celebrated Southdown and Shropshire-down rams will be sold by auction on next Thursday.

Martin Garcia is going away by piecemeal. Sailors and lightermen are hard at work cutting the side of the Argentine Gibraltar. We see that the Municipality has called for proposals for five hundred tons of Martin Garcia rock. Now really this is most monstrous.

Probably the heaviest specie remittances ever received from the provinces arrived on last Wednesday in the Pavon: the Mauá Bank has its office so crowded with huge boxes of Bolivianos that there is hardly any room for the customers.

The native papers publish very severe critiques. We have not yet heard him, but hope he is better than Lelmi. Opera-goers should bear in mind that it is almost impossible to get a first class singer to come to South America, and any who do come dislike going farther than Rio Janeiro.

The last elections in the camp were the most novel ever recollected; in some of the partidos no one attended the booths but the judge and teniente alcaldes: the country people declined the privilege of voting. It appears that the tenientes find it almost impossible to rule in the camp now as formerly.

The little town of Moreno, which owes its existence to the long temporary termination of the Western Railway at that point, has been elevated into a partido, and Mr. Pedro Martinez appointed Judge. The town is falling away rapidly, and our agent informs us that it is now the dullest place in Buenos Ayres.

In Bahia Blanca the Government has nominated Mr. Eustaquio Palao, to be Justice of the Peace. The Provincial Government has paid out \$75,000 for the repairing of the San Isidro school, and \$20,000 for the public works in Saladillo.

THE FRONTIER LAND VALUATION. To the Editors of the Standard. Gentlemen, As the new land-law is an important question to all sheep-farmers that bought land on the frontier, a few observations on the subject will not be amiss, especially when brought before public notice by an organ that has always been the advocate of justice, as it has proved for itself on so many occasions.

The land on the frontier has been valued by Government at the high price of \$250,000 mpc per league. It is an injustice that the land fifty leagues from Buenos Ayres should be valued at the same price as the camp near the Salado, which is twenty leagues nearer. Sheep-farmers who have bought the title to land on the frontier have suffered very heavy losses; firstly, by moving their flocks on coarse camp not suited to sheep till refined; secondly, as you cannot drive sheep without incurring some loss. Is this an inducement to populate the frontier? Certainly not, those who purchased the right to land there had no idea such a law was pending, and now see the folly of improving camp they cannot purchase. How few will be the purchasers when land is to be obtained at the same price nearer Buenos Ayres.

Why not sell the land for its real worth, as experience teaches us that the camp every ten leagues beyond the Salado has a different value, on one side the price is 400,000, while on the other it is 150,000 less. In conclusion I hope what I have already said will not be passed by without your commenting upon it.
