WAR BETWEEN PARAGUAY AND BUENOS AYRES.

The native and foreign public re-
ceived a great shock yesterday morning
on reading in the official and semi-
official journals that war was declared
by Paraguay against the Argentine
Republic. The money-market was at
once seized with a panic, and people
began to discuss in various manners
the prospects and issue of the impend-
ing war.

The 'Nacion Argentina' makes an
appeal to the enthusiasm of all citizens
reminding them that however opinions
may have been hitherto divided be-
tween President Lopez and the Bra-
zilians, all are now bound, since war
has been declared by Paraguay, to
rally around the Argentine banner. The
official organ regrets that Buenos Ayres
is interrupted in the midst of a peace-
ful and progressive career, but rejoices
that the ruler of Asuncion has been
the first to throw down the gauntlet and
provoke a joint crusade which must
prove his ruin.

The 'Tribuna' states that all its
predictions have been verified, and
blames President Mitre for not having
forestalled the aggression of Paraguay;
it represents the province of Corrien-
tes as wholly defenceless, and expects
an immediate invasion by President
Lopez. Regarding the war as beyond
all doubt, it promises that before the
end of the week a triple alliance will be
entered into by the Argentine, Monte-
videan and Brazilian Governments.

The 'Eco del Comercio' reports a
rumor that the Argentines in Para-
guay have been notified to leave the
country within eight days.

But when we come to examine the
grounds for so serious an alarm we find
them not only faulty and inconclusive,
but highly improbable; and we have
little hesitation in rejecting the whole
story. In fact war has been declared
only by those organs who have main-
tained such a persistent, and perhaps
conscientious, hostility to Paraguay.
The wish has evidently been father
to the thought in supposing President
Lopez had afforded an excuse for Bu-
enos Ayres uniting with Brazil; and
the news from Corrientes last Satur-
day far from flattering such an as-
sumption completely contradicts the
same.

The steamer which was awaited with
such anxiety arrived, but without either
papers from Asuncion or correspon-
dence of any kind, private or public;
the letters, despatches and newspapers
from Corrientes report everything per-
fectly quiet, the only news from the
frontier being, that Gen. Robles had
assumed command at Humayta. The
good folk of Corrientes and we may
presume also of Paraguay are as igno-
rant of the declaration of war as we are,
expecting rather that it will come from
Buenos Ayres than from Asuncion.

In the absence of despatches or news
of a warlike character, it will naturally
be asked what overt act or suspicious
circumstance, has been made the
ground-work for all this alarm? Has
the artillery of Paraguay been heard
near the Tres Bocas? Have the cor-
pses of any Argentine citizens been found
(with their ears cut off) floating down
the river? Has Sr. Eguisquiza been
recalled from Buenos Ayres? Has Go-
vernor Lagragna received a hint to leave
Corrientes?

Nothing of the kind! Affairs are in
status quo, and the past fortnight has
been so barren in events up the river,
that not a single circumstance occurred
which could be twisted into a sem-
blance of danger. Some persons, en-
gaged in the gambling of the Bolsa,
circulated a rumor last Saturday that

the Paraguayan agent was making
heavy purchases of specie, but neither
the statement, nor the inference pre-
tended, received much credence, as the re-
turns of the money-market show. The
rumor was general and might have
afforded our colleagues a pretext for
publishing 'sensation' news next mor-
ning, but they did not do so, rightly
supposing that if Sr. Eguisquiza were
buying gold on superior information
he could readily have kept his name
a secret in the transaction. We are
informed that he flatly contradicts the
alleged purchases, and no respectable
money-broker doubts his statement in
this particular.

Yet this is the sole argument, cou-
pled with the arrival of a young man
from Asuncion, which is made a reason
for causing a tremendous alarm in
this city two days later. Nothing
fresh is learned from Saturday to Tues-
day, and the quiet of Sunday is to be ru-
dely broken simply because the editors,
of the morning papers had terrible
dreams during the thunder-storm of
Sunday night.

War may come, and those who are
acting as Job's comforters by lamen-
ting its ill effects before it is on us
may have the pleasure of seeing their
anticipations verified. But President
Lopez and his Congress have categori-
cally announced that even "if it be
necessary to cross the Argentine Pro-
vince of Corrientes, this will not im-
port a declaration of war;" and it then
remains for President Mitre to decide
whether such a violation of our terri-
tory constitutes a *casus belli*. Things
look indeed stormy, but a declaration
of war against Buenos Ayres is the
last thing President Lopez will think
of, although his marching across Mi-
sionis is highly probable.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The only subject of conversation
through town is the war with Paraguay.
As yet nothing official is known, but
all our colleagues have swallowed the
stories, which we for our part still
strongly question and adhere to the
idea that things are not so bad as are
represented. Until the Salto arrive
there is no possible way to verify the
news; she is expected hourly with D.
Anacarsis Lanuz on board. Virasoro
it is said will seize Corrientes, upset
our old friend Gov. Lagragna, and turn
out all the ministers and others to
make room for his own friends.—Cor-
rientes is in a pastoral point of view,
one of the wealthiest Provinces in the
Republic: the Norhed cattle are so
numerous, that the estancieros have for
years been exporting live cattle. Horses
are also said to be abundant; we hope
however that this beautiful province will
not be laid waste by an infernal, un-
meaning and unnecessary war, and
that if there is to be a fight President
Mitre will take every measure to con-
fine the war to Paraguay or Brazil;
this can be easily done if the Argenti-
ne and Brazilian Generals are of accord
but we strongly suspect that it is the
interest of the latter that the fighting
should be as far from their country as
possible.

The heavy rain which we had during
the last few days, has extended north,
south, and west. The camps are
flooded, but, as far as we can learn, the
storm has done very little damage, the
lambs being strong and the rain not
cold; the sheepfarmers have lost
nothing. The roads, as a matter of
course are positively frightful. The
milkmen can hardly get into town from
the south, such is the state of the
'pantanos' and 'arroyos.'

The Southern Railway bridge over
the Riachuelo is all but finished; and
we learn from one of the engineers that
on the 1st of May it will be ready for
the engines and waggons to pass over;
the railway carriages are hourly ex-
pected, and the present wet weather
tries the solidity of the works, which
is precisely what the engineers de-
sire.

The committee appointed by the Go-
vernment to inspect the Oliden beef,
and to report on the great secret, have
been for the last ten days hard at
work. Messrs. Lezama, Atucha, and
Cambaceres, are the gentlemen named.
We are told they dined together on
Oliden beef, cooked in all manner of
ways, and pronounce the beef as the
very best. The price Mr. Oliden
asks for his secret is a trifle, sixteen
thousand ounces. Colonel Morris, who

is curing beef in Rosario, laughs at all
the secrets and promises to export
prime mess beef as good as that ex-
ported from England or the States.

We perceive that the Government
has had to pay a second time the
amount due to the troops at Melincuo,
some six thousand silver dollars, in
consequence of the non-payment by
the 'comisario.'

The rumor about Sr. Eguisquiza hav-
ing purchased a quantity of patacons
on 'Change on Saturday last is flatly
contradicted by that gentleman. We
are surprised the editor of the 'Eco del
Comercio' would give currency to such
a rumour, without previously enquiring
of the parties the truth of the report.

In Gualeguay, Entre Rios, the sa-
laderistas have been pretty busy this
season. Sixteen thousand head of
cattle have been killed up to the 1st of
last March, and ten thousand more,
it is said, will be slaughtered before
the 'faena' is over. Sheep are in-
creasing so fast in Entre Rios, and
'capones' are becoming so numerous,
that they are now being sold to sala-
deristas for the grease. In the partido
of Gualeguay, we learn that over
35,000 capones are offered for sale.
Several sales recently in this district.
Land is becoming very valuable, but
excellent sheep are offered for sale at
2½ patacons.

Our agent in Montevideo has met
with another accident. It appears he
went out to shoot with some English
officers, the rain came on, and there
was no getting back. The conse-
quence is, that our readers must forego
the pleasure of perusing our correspon-
dent's letter for two days.

The National Government has, in
order to facilitate the exporting of pro-
duce from the colony of San José, in
Entre Rios, now appointed a 'Res-
guardo,' who will be dependant on
the Custom-house authorities of Uru-
guay. We highly approve of this
measure.

The claim of Sr. D'Espony to the
Aguapey territory in Corrientes, as
published in the 'Standard,' has caused
quite a stir in that province. The claim
is denied in toto, and the Correntinos
say that Sr. D'Espony never complied
with the terms of his contract, nor
was he in a condition to do so, having
been only a poor 'pulpero' up there.
This is altogether incorrect, as Sr.
D'Espony is a respected French gen-
tleman, and his father, the claimant,
was one of the leading merchants of
this city.

The navy bag, with the newspapers
and letters for the officers of British
vessels in port, came up yesterday by
the Rio de la Plata. We have been
kindly favored with two English pa-
pers, dated March 4th; there is, how-
ever, nothing further than what we
published yesterday. The 'United
Service Gazette' has an article on feed-
ing the British army on jerked beef,
which we will publish to-morrow.

The whole story, published by some
of the native papers yesterday, about
Mr. Eguisquiza selling off, turns out to
be a 'boka.' The Salto is not due until
to-day. Sr. Lotero, who arrived in the
Pavon on Saturday from Corrientes,
says that when leaving that city there
was not a single word about the Para-
guayans declaring war, &c. Our readers
may, therefore, safely put down the
whole news as 'got up' for a Bolsa
speculation.

Mrs. Knox's far-famed establishment
seems about to be broken up, as yes-
terday we received an advertisement
from Mr. Billingham, who purposes
to sell off everything by auction.
To-day being Spy Wednesday, the
usual Tenebrae service commences this
evening at the Cathedral. To-morrow
the holidays commence: no carts, car-
riages or horses allowed in the streets
until Saturday.

We regret to read that Emilio Cas-
telar, the talented correspondent of the
'Tribuna' has been arrested in Madrid,
on a charge of treasonable conspiracy.
The Wild Wave has arrived with
railway-iron for the Central Argentine.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

STANDARD AGENT 'CAUGHT OUT'

Yesterday the steamer Rio de Plata
entered port; owing to our agent hav-
ing gone a shooting and the rain com-
ing on, we were without his valuable
correspondence.

The steambot Tevere is still under
embargo, and the Government refuse
to allow her to depart; the petition
by Alvarez, the agent of the owner, is
printed in the 'Siglo,' but there are
not wanting parties in Montevideo to
assert that Aguirre is the real owner
of the boat and not Barboro.

It was rumored that the Brazilian
Government had arrested several Ori-
entals who reside on the Rio Grande
frontier, on charges of being friendly
to Mauoz.

The burying-alive case still occu-
pied public attention, and the 'Siglo'
in order to prevent a recurrence of
such a mistake, publishes a chapter on
the signs of vitality.

Colonel Pereira Vargas has been re-
moved from the command of Yagaron
for causes unknown.

The authorities of Rio Grande have
paid for six thousand horses bought for
the volunteers for the Paraguayan
campaign.

The Government has been busy
naming new tenientes, alcaldes, and
police officers throughout the camp
districts.

The Brazilian steamer Recife left on
Monday for Rio Janeiro.

The Peruvian iron-clad only brought
from Rio the letters and papers of the
British navy officers on this station.

D. Pedro Carril took an action against
Sor. Sainz-Rozas for a bet of 80 dou-
bloons on a horse-race. The arbitrators
decided in favor of Rozas, and the case
excited much interest, but the court
held that it had no jurisdiction.

A new paper called 'Eco Catolico'
has appeared and the 'Siglo' insinuates
that it is got up by the Jesuits.

A grand ball is about to be given
by Government to the Brazilians, and
Mr. Pofeil and Dr. Leonard are among
the committee.

Street-fights seem to continue: on
Saturday 14 men were taken up for
rioting.

A grand concert is to come off on the
19th inst under the direction of Sor
Ugarte. Mdles. Yrigoyen and Wilner,
and several other amateurs will per-
form; the proceeds are intended for
public works.

There will be a monster-meeting of
pilots at the Capitanía del Puerto, for
improving this branch of the service.

The 'Reforma' states that the French
Government in attention to the request
of D. Candido Barreira [Paraguayan
envoy] has seized the Brazilian iron-
clads in Marseilles and prohibited en-
listments for Don Pedro's service.

The 'Revista de Buenos Ayres' sub-
scribers in Montevideo complain that
they have received no numbers since
last October, although they paid sub-
scriptions to the end of the year.

The 'Reforma' is to be enlarged next
Monday.

LATEST FROM ENTRE RIOS.

EVERYTHING QUIET.

ALL TITLES TO LAND GOOD.

Yesterday the Steamers Uruguay
and Era arrived from the Uruguay,
bringing us our exchanges.

Our colleague the "Uruguay," pub-
lishes a long article in reply to the
'Standard,' about the titles to lands
in Entre Rios, and states that the titles
in Entre Rios are second to none in
the Republic, and that the estancia
lands are at present very scarce.

In Concordia we perceive several

cently arrived: Srs. Carreras, Sierra
and Tomé.

Mr. Gordon, the editor of the "Re-
publicano," has returned to his Ori-
ental chair from Buenos Ayres.

Concordia, we are glad to see is
making rapid progress, and business
is very active. The last grand ball at
Salto to celebrate the peace was at-
tended by all the pretty girls of Con-
cordia. The ball was very splendid.

The townspeople are at present sub-
scribing to purchase a good town
clock.

Urquiza is at his estancia: some
English gentlemen dined with him the

other day, and he remarked to them
that President Mitre was not taking
his advice in certain matters, and that
he would regret it. We hear that the
Captain General is very convivial, but
does not sing.

The camps are in splendid condition,
and all our countrymen in Entre Rios
are doing remarkably well.

EXPLORATION TOWARDS BOLIVIA.

We are very glad to learn from a
number of the 'Cosmopolita' of last
month, that an exploring party is
about to start from Rosario to Corrien-
tes,—thence crossing the upper Gran
Chaco by the line of the Vermejo ri-
ver to go to Salta, and proceed on
ward towards Bolivia. It is the inten-
tion of the gentleman, who is at the
head of these courageous men, to
examine the peculiarities of the coun-
try travelled over as to its capacities
for opening up commercial relations.

We do not join either with those who
prophesy evil, or augur success for
this expedition. Chiefly, because we
have a personal knowledge of the
many difficulties they will have to en-
counter.

But our best wishes for their suc-
cess are with them; and none of their
friends will rejoice more heartily to see
them return with practical records of
their triumph.

THE PERUVIAN IRON-CLAD.

rifle guns, 30 lb. each, and has a

The corvette was built, equipped, and
bought in Nantes, and cost two mil-
lions and a-half francs, or one hundred
thousand pounds. Her companion, the
Union, is expected shortly from Rio,
and the America will wait in Monte-
video for her.

THE ENGLISH GRAMMAR SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS.

MR. PONGEBARD'S ADDRESS.

My dear young Friends,
I shall not attempt to make any
oratorical display, but will be content
with giving vent to the feelings my
heart contains, with expressing the sa-
tisfaction your conduct and your ap-
plication during the past year have
given me, and with tendering you
that encouragement which your future
labors and the difficulties you have to
encounter may require. You have all
seen in the examinations that you
have just passed, and which were new
to you, both in their course and bear-
ing, that a steady run of energy and
perseverance is necessary during the
whole year, to acquire that know-
ledge of the different branches you are
studying, and in order to resist the
test you are then put to; and I hope
the experience you have gained in this,
your first trial, will teach you what is
expected from you at the next prizes.
You will bear in mind that once in the
lists, you have no other auxiliaries to
look for, but those you have lodged in
the innermost recesses of your mind,
by incessant labor and continued toil.

Referring to the result of the pre-
sent examinations, and considering the
ignorance you were in of our mode of
conducting them, I am happy to state
that you have satisfied the learned
professors, who have condescended to
answer my appeal, and have devoted
their valuable time to the forwarding
of this undertaking.

I am convinced that the importance

We attach to these proceedings is enhanced by that which all those who are here present will attribute to them, when they reflect that the most eminent men have considered themselves as rewarded by what appear to some empty titles.

Do we not know that a Bacon felt flattered at a baronetcy, and a Newton gratified at a knighthood, and that they looked on these titles, inferior though they were to their merit, as the just tribute of esteem they were called to enjoy.

Again do we not see old soldiers, who have braved the dangers of the field, and hardy seamen, who have seen death a thousand times, under its most awful shape, set their hearts on a stripe of ribbon or a bauble cross.

Such is the case, my dear boys, but the reason of it, is the honor and consideration attached to these titles and crosses and not their intrinsic value; indeed their lack of material worth adds to their importance in the eyes of those, who only court the expression of feelings of the highest order.

And I will say to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, that if we see men so actuated by what at first sight appears such trifling stimulants, how much more ought we to look gravely on the noble efforts of youth, whose heart is opening to the vivifying effects of loyal competition and generous stimulation!

Let this future generation, which the law of nature calls to the same trials as we have had to face, which is moved by the same virtues and the same passions as we have encouraged and combated, let that youth understand, I say, that this day will be entered in that log all men keep in their mind, if not with their pen, and will be reckoned at a future period as one of the memorable moments of the long and tedious voyage they have to perform in this world.

These reflections which at the same time, I impart to you my dear young friends, will suggest to you the evidence that during the coming year, the Examinations must be the beacon on which you will rest your eyes and never lose sight of, a beacon which will enable you to sail proudly into that port we will call the Port of Honor, where prizes await you, ready to attest your merit, your perseverance and your energy. If you fully comprehend the weight of these considerations and act up to them, I shall be content with the effect they will have on your future welfare, and pray to God they will contribute to make you dutiful children honest men and devoted citizens, for such is the true aim of a good Education.

SWISS IMMIGRATION.
In a recent number of the "Cosmopolita" appeared some editorial remarks, bearing on a letter from Mr. Charles Beck, and dated at Lausanne in Switzerland. It may not be known to all our readers, that Mr. Beck was the organizer, for the commercial house of Messrs. Beck and Herzog of Basle, of the colony of San Carlos above Santa Fe; and we believe Mr. Beck is very much interested in what every one knows to be the one thing needful for the Argentine Republic,—European immigration.

Mr. Beck says, that the Republic of Costa Rica has offered a concession of a hundred leagues square of land to a Dr. Schaffhausen for emigration purposes, and the Doctor has proposed its acceptance to a company of gentlemen in Switzerland, for the purpose of having it practically carried out. Mr. Beck suggests that the Emigration Commission in Rosario should offer something tangible to this society—adding very sensibly—"There is no doubt that the Argentine Republic is preferable to Costa Rica as a field for colonization; and I purpose, as much as in me lies, to propagate such opinion. But to make this understood, I should have a positive advantage of a certain lot of land to show in opposition to that of Costa Rica, in order to make its advantages understood."

No doubt of this, and we very much fear until the Governments of Santa Fe and Cordoba have measured out a hundred leagues of land to offer to immigrants, that the call for European labour to this part of the world will be a vox et proterea nihil. The land law of Santa Fe, passed by the Provincial Legislature on the 15th September last, gives the equivocal ad-

vantage of granting lands free of purchase, rent, or tax for six years, outside the actual frontier line, on condition of spending 400 Bolivian dollars per square league; and by 32nd article after the termination of six years, the occupier will have a preference price on their sale by auction of Government. Very few emigrants we suspect, with capital will be induced to spend their money in a thing of this kind. Without capital, how are the emigrants to proceed there,—to build brick houses and wooden forts,—to lay out a sum of 400 Bolivian dollars per square league; and do all this, with the possibility that in six years (time, some one, with more money than themselves, may buy them out, and order them to quit.

It is quite true what Mr. Beck mentions his having heard, that the National Government has entered into a contract with Messrs. Harrison and Mansilla for several lines of steamers, by which these gentlemen engage themselves to co-operate with the National Government in the matter of emigration, guaranteeing to lower the passage fares one-half, for those immigrants who are going to the interior of the Republic, whatever may be their number or condition."

Mr. Beck says:—"In an interview, which I had with the head of one of the principal houses in Switzerland, I pointed out to him the convenience of chartering vessels directly to Rosario; but he answered me, that in this case the ships could have no other cargo,—that no vessels larger than brigantines can go up the river, whilst for the transporting of immigrants three-masted vessels are necessary."

If Mr. Beck and his 'Swiss friend' be under the impression that small vessels only can come up to Rosario, we desire to refer them to our No. 2 page 30, where they will see, that two barques, which we mildly suggest may be counted as 'three-masted vessels,' arrived at Rosario, one the 'Charles and George,' drawing sixteen feet six inches of water, and the other the 'Feliz' drawing sixteen feet three inches. So that this objection to Mr. Beck's idea is perfectly absurd, as the passage, to as well as anchorage at Rosario, is fit for vessels drawing these amounts of water. Moreover, we tell Mr. Beck to let the Swiss Colonization Society know they can at any time get a vessel in England drawing a less amount of water than the foregoing, that will sail up gallantly to Rosario with three or four hundred emigrants.

Arriving at Rosario, we ask the Immigration Commission, what is to be done for such a lot of emigrants? 'Absolutely nothing!' answers the *Cosmopolita*, "for there is not a single lot or concession laid out by the Government for any family that may come!" This is not as it should be. Let either the National or Provincial Government do something practical, to prove, that under their rule this is no longer a land of *Quien sabe!* and *Muñanás!* (The Argentine Citizen.)

HABITS AND MODE OF LIVING OF THE PAMPA INDIANS.
The Querandi tribe, better known amongst us under the name of *Pampa Indians*, forms a part of the population of the Province of Buenos Ayres, and we are acquainted with their census only by the number of rations, granted them by the Government as a peace offering, and by the review lists of the Indians in the service of the State.

Juan Manuel Catriel, actual cacique of the Indians properly called *Pampas* is nephew of Cullifulemá a famous Chilian cacique, celebrated for his invasions more or less successful, and whose alliance with the Argentine Government has always been more a pretext than an act of adhesion and sincerity on the part of that Indian.

The Pampa Indians, as we have already said, render obedience to the National Government, and carry on the same footing with the army, the military operation on the frontiers. For the sake of truth we must declare that these Indians—friendly—have never given reasons to suppose that they are partial to the Chilian Indians. Between these there exists a profound hatred, so inextinguishable that even time has not been able to weaken it. Notwithstanding, in the risings of the Pampa Indians, in former years, these allied themselves with Cullifule-

curá; but an alliance of circumstances, and with the only object of combatting the enemy. In every thing else they nurtured their rancor and showed it in a marked manner by forming their encampment at a great distance from their allies.

Peace being made with the Government, the Indians returned to occupy their former *tolderías* and have remained faithful, and now form part of the frontier defence.

Indolence, which forms the principal basis of the character of the Pampa Indians, keeps them poor and miserable, without aspiration of any kind, whilst their mental faculties give no signs of a capability of adapting themselves to the benefits of civilization. For this reason, the idea of founding schools, for primary instruction, in the *tolderías* cannot be realized, in view of the proverbial sloth of the Pampa Indian.

Many causes contribute to maintain the Indians in their actual state of brutishness. One of these is the provision of spirituous liquor, for which the Indians have a great love, and will even commit robberies and other violence in order to obtain it.

The Evil Spirit, or, which is the same, the Devil, among the Indians has the name of *Ualicho, raticho, or gualicho*, according to the manner in which it is expressed. This Evil spirit exercises a powerful influence in nearly every act of the life of the Indians.

The enchanted of both sexes are those which possess the secret of driving the evil spirit from their homes, the Indians being so credulous in this particular that they become enraged at those who treat with contempt the predictions of these soothsayers.

That there will be a reaction, and a heavy one, there cannot be the slightest doubt, but when it may be expected is the question.

The National Bonds, as a matter of course, tumbled and look very depressed. The amortization was collected at 38.

The commercial news from Europe shows a slight improvement in saltd hides; wood is the same; the new clipshells well. The Bank of England has reduced the rate of interest to 4 and the Bank of France to 3 1/2 per cent.

Owing to an error in yesterday's quotation of exchange on England, we now give the closing rate 49 1/2, 49 1/2, about £200,000 is the amount.
