THE "STANDARD" ANNIVERSARY.

To-morrow we begin our fifth year. On May-day 1861 the "Standard" was unfurled to the breezes of La Plata, and in four years it has attained such robust growth as to become an institution of the country.

In these four years we have seen many of our colleagues laid in the dust, and of twenty papers now in the River Plate, there are but two older, and perhaps three with a larger circulation, while there is not one that has not changed hands in that time.

The history of a newspaper is in some manner the history of the country for same time, and in casting a retrospective glance over our files for the last four years we can trace not only the current of political events, but the growth of new enterprises, the defeat of many brilliant hopes, the error of more than one popular notion, the benefit of several wise measures, the opportunities that were lost, the dangers that should have been avoided, and the fluctuations of public men and paper-money.

In May 1861 the country was engaged in a lamentable civil war with which we had no sympathy and espoused no party. But when the victory of Pavon elevated General Mitre to power and the close of the year saw the great Argentine family re-united under auspices more favorable than at any former period, we gladly hailed the new order of things and braced our loins for a vigorous exertion to aid the National Government in pushing the country ahead.

Even before the Congress of 1862, we commenced an agitation for the planting of cotton which succeeded in causing a temporary fever for this new industry throughout the whole Republic and had an echo in the remote valleys of Paraguay. The silver-mines of San Juan, and navigation of the Salado also found in us a strenuous advocate; and in order to promote Argentine interests abroad we called attention in the English papers to the utility of starting an emigrant line of steamers from Liverpool, which is now so happily realized.

In 1863 we had the pleasure of seeing an English bank established, which we had loudly called for long before it was proposed in London. The grand enterprise of the Central Argentine Railway gave us additional hope of a splendid future for this Republic. But just then, a small black cloud rose in the horizon which we announced the precursor of a terrible storm, and our predictions about the Flores revolution have since unhappily been too fully verified. If the conflagration had been quelled in time, we should not be now involved in its flames, and even those who then fanned the almost dying embers, must now admit the rectitude of our judgment and reason of our prophecy.

The year 1864 saw us vainly battling for the cause of industry, which showed a passing animation in the cotton-planting of Corrientes and inauguration of the Great Southern railway. But

the full genius of politics and civil war was uppermost, and the year ended in an invasion of the States by Brazil, followed by torrents of blood and scenes of destruction while a new and dangerous complication sprung up in Paraguay.

It is premature to review the year 1865, upon which we have entered with such dangerous omens, both in the astronomical and political worlds. Let him alone who can pretend to supernatural knowledge, or can sway the fate of battles and of empires, tell what will be the condition of these countries at the close of the present year. The sacrifices we must make, the perils we must encounter, the complications of diplomacy which we must guard against, are not fanciful imaginings, but facts written in the history of the past, and realities inseparable from the actual prospects of the future.

But the "Standard" has lived through many vicissitudes, and is prepared, for weal or woe, to stand by the country whose errors it deplures and whose interests it unalterably cherishes. Our best reward after these four years of labor is the conviction that we have not only been useful to the foreign public, but in an eminent degree to the advancement of the nation, and this assurance will animate us to renewed efforts, as long as our paper holds its present influential position and merits public support.

TWO TRIUMPHS IN THREE DAYS.

SPLENDID EDITORIAL SUCCESS.

ALL OUR COLLEAGUES BEATEN.

On Thursday the "Standard" had the only English papers in town, of the 24th March, thanks to Captain Batty.

Yesterday the "Standard" had the only American papers in town, dated April 1st, thanks to Mr. Volck. Such unprecedented success speaks volumes. The "Standard," it now must be admitted, is ahead of all its colleagues in the River Plate. It is a surprising fact that we have New York papers 7 days later than those from England by the French mail: the news from the States will be found in another column. Messrs. Perry and Volck have arrived from the States: they left New York on the 1st April: this almost seems incredible. Cotton falling to 27 cents. Gold weak, 50 per cent premium.

We extract as follows from the New York Herald of April 1st:— SIGNS OF A GREAT BATTLE AND THE EVACUATION OF RICHMOND.

The latest news from the James River—though scanty, vague and indefinite—is intensely interesting. The facts are that on Wednesday last, Gen. Sheridan's cavalry leading the way, a portion of the Army of Potomac had moved off in the direction of the Southside Railroad; that the infantry column, after crossing Hatcher's run, had met some forces of the enemy and repulsed them with considerable loss, bringing in a number of prisoners; that General Lee was believed to be hurrying forward troops for the protection of the Southside road, but that Sheridan would, in all probability, be ahead of him. In anticipation of his success, it was expected the evacuation of Petersburg and Richmond would speedily follow.

ANNIHILATION OF THE REBELLION.

LEE SUES FOR PEACE.

TREMENDOUS FALL IN GOLD AND COTTON.

The United States steamer Colorado which is bound round for the Pacific, arrived in Rio Janeiro in 22 days from New York, with dates to April 1st (22 days later than French packet news). There was a great commercial crisis in New York, owing to the sudden fall of gold, which declined in the last fortnight from 201 to 150; cotton had also fallen from 100 cents per lb. to 37. Several decisive battles had been fought near Richmond and in North Carolina, the Federals being invariably victorious. President Lincoln had held a council of war with all the leading generals in the encampment on James River, after which considerable activity was noticed in front of Richmond. General Lee, the Confederate commander-in-chief, demanded a military conference to arrange an armistice; his resources are completely exhausted and unable to cope with the overpowering elements of the North. The new Confederate cruiser "Cass" left Havana.

EDITION TABLE.

Yesterday was a busy day in town. The French mail and Liverpool steamer Corlova came in early, the Estrella del Norte was true to her time at the Tigre, laden with Deputies and Senators for Congress, and the mole was crowded with loungers waiting the arrival of Urquiza, Dr. Rawson, Dr. Costa, and Capt. Batty. Our American friends were in the greatest spirits at the stirring news from the States, which will be found in another column. The Government House was crowded; beneath the western alcove were groups evidently on the lookout for the Felix Colon, or Era. The Colon Theatre was almost invisible, owing to the number of flags hanging down from the unwashed windows. The basement of the Hotel de la Paix was so surrounded with impatient Spaniards looking for their protection papers that many people imagined there was a fire discovered in some part of the building. Meeks & Kelsey's photographic gallery might be taken for a drill-room such was the number of officers getting photographs, and even our own office was so crowded that there was hardly room for the new subscribers to get in and put down their names and address on our books. For years we do not recollect such a day in Buenos Ayres. Verily these are stirring times.

The French mail brings us much political news of interest regarding the River Plate (which we give elsewhere), and also important intelligence of several Argentine enterprises.

On March 21st an extraordinary general meeting was held in London, of the British and South American Steam Navigation Company to read the Director's report. The number of shares allotted is 18,350, the rest to be taken up in South America. The company has purchased three steamers of 2,000 tons register, and 300 horse-power, the Bolivian, Peruvian, and Brazilian, for the sum of £160,000; three others are at present building. The steamers will run monthly between Liverpool, Falmouth, Montevideo, and the West Coast. The meeting was adjourned to March 30th.

At the general meeting of the Argentine Central railway Co. on the 8th March, there was some discussion about the low quotations of the shares (4 per cent discount), but the chairman and Mr. Brassy declared that neither any of the Directors nor contractors had sold out any shares. Mr. Gersten proposed to sell the lands conceded to the railway, but this was over-ruled. Upwards of 100 miles from Rosario will be opened to traffic in the beginning of 1866.

A great deputation including Messrs. John Fair and five members of Parliament waited on Sir George Grey on the 17th March relative to jerked-beef, and his Excellency promised that the authorities would not prevent its sale. Mr. John Bright advised him to invite the Cabinet to a dinner on 'charque,' and recommended its adoption in the refreshment-room of the House of Commons.

The steamer 'Gertrude' was to have left last evening for Martin Garcia to wait on Urquiza who was to arrive at 11 o'clock p.m., and take him to the Tigre.

Mr. Wheelwright has returned from Corlova, and is back again in Rosario, superintending the works of the railway.

The 'Saintonge' brought fifteen thousand pounds in gold from Rio for the Maua Bank.

President Mitre is getting ready to leave town on Thursday: he will proceed, it is surmised, to Entre Rios, and take command of the allied forces. The National Guard will march in a couple of weeks, during which time it will be armed and accoutred.

We omitted to mention yesterday that Flores when he landed had his overcoat on, which he used during the whole campaign: it looked rather shabby alongside the gay uniforms of his Aides. The pockets, button holes, even the buttons, wore the trace of time and bad weather. We suppose the Governor used it for the occasion purposely.

Yesterday the Oriental Minister, Castro, was received by President Mitre, and the whole day was spent in drawing up the basis of the triple alliance.

We have received a letter asking us why the Oriental Consul drove home from the mole in the "Dickey" of Admiral Tamandare's coach. We profess utter ignorance on the subject, but suppose there was no room inside. Baron Tamandare, Dr. Rodriguez, Mrs. Flores and daughter, were in the coach, so the Consul had no other alternative than go with the coachman; neither is there anything very undignified in this, as Cesar travelled once "summa diligentia," i. e. on top of a diligence.

Mr. Thomas Armstrong has subscribed most munificently towards the expenses of the war. The committee appointed by Government to collect subscriptions, waited on Mr. Armstrong on Friday: he at once put his name down for fifty thousand dollars, and stated that if unfortunately the war lasted any great length of time, that the present subscription might be regarded as a yearly one until the war terminated. This spirited conduct of our distinguished countryman calls for our unlimited praise, and will prove worth millions to the Government, as the rich native capitalists must now follow the noble and patriotic conduct of this distinguished foreigner.

Congress will be opened on Monday by President Mitre in person. We understand that there is a quorum in town at present.

The Argentine troops which left on Monday had orders to proceed to Esquina and place themselves under the command of Urquiza. It is rumored, however, that they went on board Gomersoro's squadron. Great anxiety exists for news up the rivers. Many are of an opinion that the Brazilian squadron has attacked the Paraguayan and driven the invaders back to Humaita.

Out in the camp there is nothing talked of but the war. Few of the gauchos yet understand what the fight is about. A subscriber from Pilar tells us that in every corner of that partido the soldiers are going about taking up men and 'ageno' horses. The vulgar characters which were such a nuisance to the neighbors, are now drafted into the army. The sheepfarmers are all enthusiastic in supporting President Mitre and the National cause.

Our colleague the "Eco" very properly comes down on Mr. Lezica for his paltry present to the National Government of fifty revolvers, which it seems is only equal to one personero, when Sor. Aguirre has given ten.

Mr. Goodair, the inspector of the London & Brazilian Bank, has written to a friend by this packet stating that he will leave Rio by the next English packet for Buenos Ayres. We have seen the letter in question.

To-day the period allowed by Government, to enrol, expires. To-morrow all Argentines who are caught without the necessary "papeleta" will be made soldiers of the line. Foreigners would do well to obtain from their respective Consuls their protection papers.

Last night the Tevere took down half our German singing population to the great concert in Montevideo, which we hope to get a full, true, and perfect account of from some of our Teutonic friends: 'Zozimus' we can't rely on in musical matters.

The troops all landed in Rosario where Gen. Pantero has established his headquarters.

Dr. Rawson did not arrive yesterday! He is expected on Wednesday.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

DULL TIMES.

BRAZILIANS ALL SICK.

THE RIESTRA MISSION IN THE MOUNT.

GERMAN CONCERT.

After a storm they say comes a calm. Here we are in Montevideo all as dull as can possibly be imagined; the ball fever is over; no news from the Paraguayans; Flores gone to battle; Baron Tamandare in Buenos Ayres; all the big wigs in his wake; and this lovely city as it were in mourning during their absence. So accustomed have we been to the joys of excitement, that the lull that has ensued is perfectly intolerable. Shipping preserved beef, salted hides and wool was once the great business of this place, but times have changed wonderfully since, and now our great trade is shipping Brazilians; the scenes which occur on the mole daily are, I assure you, perfectly in-

describable. When we see all these valuable live stock, the balance of trade must be beneficially in our favor, the Brazilians have spent their money with more liberality than discretion, and the shopkeepers are sorry that the army of occupation has so soon struck its tents. Notwithstanding that the climate here is generally termed salubrious, the number of Brazilians in the Hospital is quite alarming. On Wednesday 30 poor fellows were carried in feet foremost into the Hospital; the Doctors' say that the place is too cold for them, and that Paraguay will suit them better. I greatly fear the change will prove more injurious than otherwise, although they say here that one Brazilian is worth 4 Paraguayans. What is the ratio in Buenos Ayres?

The Maua Bank is doing an enormous business in cashing credits for the young officers, most of whom I am told are of wealthy families. All the gold which Maua is receiving now from Rio is in payment of these advances.

It is said here that the loan which M. Riestra goes to negotiate for the Argentine Republic in London will be guaranteed by the Brazilian Government, and negotiated by Maua, McGregor, and Co., of London, at from 75 to 80. This can only be a rumor, however, destitute of foundation, as it is every way more probable that the loan will be done through the house of Baring Brothers, one of the firm, as I am assured, is a friend of Don Norberto's; but the news from England is not so good, and people think here the business is not so easy for M. Riestra as he imagines unless Brazil goes guarantee. The Argentine Republic is unknown in London. People know Buenos Ayres, but nothing more, and since the American war, Confederate Republics are at a discount in Europe, too easily broken up, or what is worse, plunged into a never-ending civil war.

Had your Congress two years ago made the interest on the National bonds payable in London, President Mitre would now be able to borrow what he wanted, but Argentines will for ever close their eyes to their own interest. They now apply to England for a loan when no man in Lombard street knows them, or even who they are, or whether they are good for the first coupons that fall due? I doubt, (and most people are of the same opinion), if the Argentine agent will find money so cheap or plenty in England as the people in Buenos Ayres seem to suppose. The Buenos Ayres bonds, with the almost expired coupons attached, are selling at 90; and those securities are for the most part held up, but the day Mr. Argentine Robertson and a few others want to realize them, people may be prepared for a very different quotation.

There has been a great effort here to get up an Italian demonstration against Paraguay; the thing failed, however, not that the Genoese are opposed to opening up Paraguay, but that war is unpopular here, when people have to serve, and if Flores thinks he is going to raise 5000 men in this city, to fight Lopez, there will be another stampede as sure as fate. Flores knows this, and will not forget to tell it to your President either.

There is great noise about the imperfect manner in which this city is lighted. Some of your subscribers and friends complain that it is next to impossible to find their way home from the club at night, the streets are so dark. A deputation is about to wait on Mr. Bell, respecting the matter; he says he can put up lights in every street, but where's the money to pay him.

Mr. Le Long has been down here for some time: he is a great card here, and made a splendid speech Franco-Español at the Ball the other night. It is rumored here that he will go with the army to Paraguay as Provedor of the allies.

Caraballo, you of course know, goes to Salto with orders to organize the National Guard, and to incorporate his men when ready, with the allied army.

Mr. Samuel Walker, a British subject, died on Wednesday: he was aged 60 years, and a bachelor.

On Monday next four new newspapers are to be started: if they live till the end of the month it will be the most. This place is literally overrun with papers, supplements, &c. What we want mostly here are small boys to

sell supplements, the number of boys here at present is altogether insufficient and unable to meet the requirements of the trade.

I can write no more at present for my head is splitting. In the next room there is a German practising for the Concert; Do, re, me, fa, so, all the whole day and night. It is really fearful for poor

THE NEW STEAMER CORDOVA.

This steamer left Bahia 24 hours after the French mail steamer. She is one of the finest vessels afloat, and is the most suitable one that has ever been sent out, and had she not met with an accident, should have made the passage in 28 days. She has first-rate accommodation for all classes of passengers, and having three decks, there is an uninterrupted promenade from one end to the other; however, people ought to go and judge for themselves.

An accident occurred to the machinery in lat. 5 deg. 20 N., long. 23 deg. 30 W. She was stationary for four days, and then having repaired, pro tem., managed to reach Bahia under reduced steam on the 10th, got repairs done, and left again on the night of the 15th, since which we had strong head-winds and heavy sea, reaching Montevideo on the 30th inst.

This is the first of five vessels building for this line on the same principle. She brought 30 passengers.

RIVER PLATE AFFAIRS IN EUROPE. At the request of Mr. Maguire the English Government laid on the table of the House of Commons the official correspondence relative to the war of Brazil and the River Plate Republics, which is interpreted favorably to the empire. Mr. Thornton, the resident British minister considers the demands and proposals of the Brazilian Government very moderate, and deprecates the rash intervention of Paraguay, showing that the Imperial arms could not suspend hostilities after the fall of Paysandú and burning of the treaties in Montevideo by Pres. Aguirre. Mr. Lettsom, Chargé d'affaires in Montevideo, writes to Earl Russell that the war of Paraguay was a foolish demonstration against Brazil, censuring the threat of Carreras to blow up Montevideo, and charging him with concealing from Aguirre the opinion of the English and French admirals about the impossibility of holding out against the besiegers.

The diplomatic notes of the Paraguayan Government to the English and French cabinets represent the actual organization of the Argentine Republic as artificial and unstable, depending entirely on the support of Brazil, and dangerous to the balance of power in the River Plate. The Juanicó mission to Paris, if even it had arrived in time, had no chance of success. The French Government recognized the right of Brazil to exact by force of arms a reparation for the injuries received, all peaceful efforts having failed: the Minister declared to Sor. Juanicó that Oriental Independence was not menaced, and that France would not interfere without the co-operation of England, which it neither intended to solicit nor expected would be offered. This policy of France and England was wisely followed by the King of Italy who rejected the offer of Oriental protectorate.

On the adoption of this course, Earl Russell published a notification of British neutrality prohibiting English vessels from carrying munitions of war to any River Plate ports; and at the same time the French Government put an embargo on the iron-clad Don Pedro recently built for Brazil in a French port. This steam-corvette was ready for sea, and one of three ordered of the firm Forges and Chantiers: she was seized on the 2nd inst. and placed under a guard at Castignean near Toulon, when the commander, Enrique Baptista, went aboard and pulled down the Brazilian flag, protesting against the act. The contract for the other two iron-clads was rescinded, and the Brazilians intend to get them built in England where probably a similar fate awaits them.

In the debate of March 9th Mr. Maguire dwelt forcibly on the great destruction of life and property in the Banda Oriental by the Brazilian and Florist troops, and Lord Palmerston replied that the British admiral had instructions to protect the persons and properties of our countrymen: he regretted that the war in the River Plate was carried on in a manner not congenial to the opinions of Europeans.

THE PACIFIC MAILS. Owing to the lateness of the hour and great pressure of news from all quarters we are unable to give the Pacific mails. We have received an interesting account of Governor Rojo's visit to the San Juan mines: Major Rickard has left for Europe, but Mr. Houtley, his brother-in-law assisted at the banquet and festivities.

MEXICO. New York, March 8. New Orleans papers announce that General Mejia, Commander-in-Chief of the Imperial army of Mexico, together with his staff, had visited Confederate General Slaughter, at Brownsville, Texas, saluted the Confederate flag, and made a speech, declaring that the Confederacy would soon be recognised by his Government.

New York, March 11. Mr. Scarlett has had an audience of the Emperor Maximilian, at which he presented an autograph letter of Queen Victoria. The Emperor tendered Mr. Scarlett a cordial reception, and said he should be always happy to see the strengthening of good relations between the two countries. The Queen's letter, dated the 9th of November, desires to give the Emperor Maximilian immediate proof of her sincere friendship and lively wishes to maintain the most friendly relations with Mexico. Her Majesty accredits Mr. Scarlett, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Mexican Court. In a letter to the Empress, Queen Victoria expresses her unchangeable consideration and affection. Her Majesty addresses the Emperor as my brother, and the Empress as my sister and dear cousin. The victories of the French at Oajaca and Tacatlan have been confirmed. General Porfirio Diaz had arrived at the city of Mexico as a prisoner. It is reported that the French have suffered two reverses. The particulars are unknown. A large number of American emigrants have arrived at Vera Cruz.

THE DUBLIN EXHIBITION. From the "Freeman" we gather that the executive committee of the International Exhibition at Dublin has received an official intimation from Marshal Valliant, announcing that the Emperor of the French has given instructions to forward to the exhibition specimens of the Imperial manufactures of Gobelins and Beauvais. This magnificent donation will form one of the principal features of the French department, which, it is understood will be of an exceedingly rich and ornamental character. The Government of the King of Italy has also appointed the Baron Corrado Arezzo Despuches de Donna fugata special commissioner. The Royal Italian Committee at Turin have, it is stated, labored with great zeal in promoting the objects of the exhibition, and of availing themselves of the opportunity it affords to display to the world the progress which Italy has made in the useful and industrial arts. Besides the Central Committee in Turin, there are established by royal authority no fewer than 14 sub-committees in the principal cities of the kingdom, and at the ports of Genoa, Leghorn, Naples, Messina and Palermo, where the shipments are to be made, agents have been appointed to collect and receive the goods destined for exhibition.

ENGLISH ITEMS. We can assure our readers that Parliament will be dissolved in July. Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to confer the Order of the Garter on the Duke of Cleveland. We believe it is likely that her Majesty will confer the dignity of a peerage on the Lord Chief Justice.

Her Majesty will proceed to Coburg in August, to be present at the unveiling of a statue of the Prince Consort. Lord Granville will be the minister in attendance. We understand that a list of public servants, distinguished alike in the naval, military, and civil service of the state, is about to be submitted to her Majesty, for promotion to higher grades in the Order of the Bath. We are glad to hear that we are to have a military 'attaché' to the Embassy at Vienna. Colonel the Hon. St. George Foley, C. B.; who is at present assistant quarter-master general at Manchester, is to receive the appointment.

The country will leave with much satisfaction that it is in the immediate contemplation of her Majesty's Government to recommend to Parliament a considerable increase of the allowance made to the Prince of Wales. It was generally felt at the time when the original grant was voted, that it would hardly prove sufficient, and the experience of two years has shown that, owing to the peculiar and extraordinary demands chargeable to the purse of his royal highness, the first impression was not only justifiable in itself, but has had infinite weight added to it. It is no secret that his royal highness affords, in his household management, a model of careful and judicious economy; and we feel confident that the whole nation will approve of an addition to his income, which is equally demanded by his necessary requirements, and by the wish of the public that Marlborough House should adequately represent not only the hospitality which it is the wish of its royal owners to dispense, but also the dignity becoming the heir apparent of the British Crown.

The very high premium at which the Montevideo loan is quoted in London, is looked on as a favorable augur for Mr. Riestra's mission. One of the principal causes for the rise in specie to-day, was that brokers thought the packet would have brought much more gold than she has. The specie market could not be firmer. On 'Change to-day the enormous losses of some of the leading 'beers' was discussed. Fluctuations in the price of specie are now so great, that it is feared there will be a smash amongst the brokers. The exporters of wool this year will realize handsome profits. Orders have come out in the packet for large quantities, whilst the stock on hand is comparatively small. The political state of the country is beginning to tell on our markets; articles of war command fabulous prices; coal is going up, and it is surmised by many that unless specie is imported pecuniaries will see long return to their old figure of 29. No National Bonds were sold to-day; they are held up firm, as Congress will introduce some important changes into the payment of the coupon.
