EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday, thanks to our friend Cap-
 tain Curlew, we were again ahead of
 all our colleagues; our supplements,
 files of the Times, Star and Herald,
 we received early yesterday morning.
 Owing to one of our 'repartidores' be-
 ing in the Nat. Guard regiments which
 have to march, all our town subscri-
 bers will please send henceforth to our
 office for their supplements.

The mail steamer 'Paraná,' which
 arrived at Southampton on the 5th
 April, had on board ten thousand three
 hundred and eighty one pounds sterling
 in sovereigns, shipped by various houses
 in Buenos Ayres. We mention the
 fact, as many denied here that any
 gold had been shipped.

Yesterday we received information
 from an authentic source respecting
 the murder of the unfortunate Mr.
 Marshall: it appears that he was never
 in the habit of carrying any description
 of fire-arms. The British Consul is be-
 having in the most exemplary manner,
 and is leaving no stone unturned to
 discover and bring to justice the as-
 sassin; a large subscription has been
 made and a handsome reward offered;
 placards are being printed and posted
 all through Rosario, some will also
 be sent to the provinces. We cannot
 too highly praise Consul Hutchison's
 energetic measures in this melancholy
 affair.

The wet weather has at last come.
 On Saturday morning about 2 o'clock,
 the rain began and continued in tor-
 rents until daylight: all day yesterday
 the weather was heavy, and it looks as
 if we were in for a 'temporal.' The
 rain has not, however, come a minute
 before it was wanted; the lagunas were
 drying up, and any rain will now be
 beneficial for the camp.

Sr. Don Andres Lamás is at present
 in Montevideo, and there is a rumour to
 the effect that ultimately all objections
 will be overcome, and Sr. Lamás pro-
 ceed to Rio.

Palermo will soon be very crowded.
 On Monday and Tuesday, the National
 Guards whose turn it is to march, will
 be quartered and drilled there. 'Per-
 soneros' are not so dear as is alleged,
 two English shopkeepers secured sub-
 stitutes yesterday at \$ 6,500 per man.

The Argentine Government has made
 another seizure of Paraguayan prop-
 erty. Some cases arrived in a Ger-
 man vessel with 50,000 caps and two
 lances: they were at once confiscated
 and sent to the Parque.

In Cordova the war against Para-
 guay is so popular, that the citizens
 are all serenading the Governor and
 other leading men in that city. One
 of our correspondents in Cordova has
 been named Commander of the Con-
 tingent.

Up to the present no Argentine has
 given as much towards the war as our
 distinguished countryman, Mr. Arm-
 strong. We read that M. Cabal has
 given \$25,000 more for five 'perso-
 neros,' and offers to support them all
 during the war. This is very liberal:
 we believe the donor is General Ur-
 quiza's agent.

President-Mitre's note to Congress,
 asking permission to march against
 Paraguay, states that he may have to
 leave the Republic. We suppose this
 means march into Paraguay. The
 House will, as a matter of course,
 grant the necessary permission. He will
 start towards the end of the month.

The steamer Buenos Ayres is being
 armed and fitted up. Her commander
 will be Sr. Carreras, who was formerly
 on Admiral Murature's staff.

There is a rumor that the 'alcaldes'
 in town and camp are all in the most
 inexpressible grief, owing to the order
 compelling them to serve. They say
 that Lopez himself would not attempt
 such a thing. The 'alcaldes' are

noted for their domestic courage. A
 few of them are being walked off to
 the 'cuarteles,' being rather procrastin-
 ating in enrolling.
 We perceive by the Brazilian pa-
 pers that the 'no quorum' disease has
 crept into Rio. The Emperor has
 called and called the Chambers to-
 gether, but Parliament cannot meet,
 as there are not sufficient members for
 a 'quorum.'

The Captain of the Port of Goya
 has seized six small vessels with rail-
 way iron for Paraguay. We suppose
 the ships in question were Argentine,
 as on foreign bottoms railway iron
 could not be seized, not being contraband
 of war.

Our colleague, the 'Tribuna,' pub-
 lished yesterday Mr. Walker's case
 with the San Nicolas Judge. We hope
 to see the Government punish severely
 this judge, as if not, a foreigner in
 the country will henceforth sell sheep
 to a Justice of the Peace. And as
 there are many judges really good men,
 we should be sorry to see them com-
 pletely shut out of the market.

In the islands in the Parana, several
 hundred 'gauchos' are hiding. A
 'piqueet' of soldiers is about to start
 from San Pedro to look them up.

The Provincial Government is ac-
 ting with the greatest liberality at pre-
 sent. All the officers of the National
 Guards receive their uniforms, &c.,
 from the Government, and now the
 friends and relatives of all the soldiers
 will have a free pass on the Western
 railway. We have also several friends
 in the regiments, and suppose conse-
 quently we can travel free to and back
 from Mercedes.

The new French packet is expected
 out on the 28th May: she is nearly
 twice the size of the 'Saintonge,' and
 cannot come nearer than the outer
 roads. Now, however, with the little
 steamer, 'Lili' this is no inconve-
 nience, because one can run out and in
 in an hour.

We hear nothing more about our
 imprisoned colleague. It is really a
 nice question what the Government
 ought to do with that judge in San
 Nicolas: probably the best thing would
 be for the Government to send him
 up sufficient cash to pay the Irishman
 for his sheep, and liberate the heroic
 editor of the 'Amigo del Pueblo.' San
 Nicolas is better without a newspaper.

The Brazilian transport 'Paraense'
 is expected hourly in Montevideo with
 more troops.

A subscriber from Barradero states
 that in his neighborhood it is believed
 the war is all over, as the last soldiers
 that were sent to San Pedro have all
 come home again. We found it dif-
 ficult to persuade our friend that Lopez
 had not left in the French packet for
 Europe.

All the sailors at the Ponton have
 deserted, and not satisfied with leaving
 the ship, but they actually ran away
 with the vessel's boat: this is really
 monstrous.

The 'Mersey' will be in to-day, and
 the letters and papers will be delivered
 about 12 o'clock. The list of pas-
 sengers will be found in another col-
 umn.

The fall of Montevideo is published
 in the 'Times' of the 6th April. It is
 taken from the 'Standard.'

NATIONAL POST-OFFICE RETURNS
 FOR 1864.

(7th annual report).
 Congress having been opened on the
 1st inst. the indefatigable and talented
 Post-master General of the Republic,

Don Gervasio Posadas, has already
 sent in to the National Government
 his 7th annual report of that depart-
 ment corresponding to the year 1864.

This valuable and carefully-compiled
 work shews that in last year there was
 a great increase of correspondence and
 postal revenue over previous years,
 and that many improvements and re-
 forms have been introduced into this
 important branch of public service by
 the attentive official who emulates
 Rowland Hill in these countries. Among
 the rest we may mention the connec-
 tion established between the Post-office
 and railways for postage and con-
 veyance of letters, since the 1st of Jan-
 uary last.

In glancing over the returns, we find
 the principal statistics as follows. In
 1863 the number of letters passing
 through the Post-offices of the Republic
 amounted to 1,137,493 (or 3,159 per
 day); and in 1864 to 1,859,402 (or 3,776
 per day) shewing an increase of
 221,909 equivalent to about 20 per cent.
 This includes registered letters which
 were 3,477 in 1863, and 3,493 in 1864.

Newspapers &c. amounted in 1863
 to 718,298 (or nearly 60,000* per month)
 and in 1864 to 961,482 (or over 80,000
 per month), shewing an increase of
 243,184, equivalent to 33 per cent.

Official correspondence has also in-
 creased, from 97,181 in 1863, to 101,834
 in 1864, being an excess of 4,653: this
 gives an average of 278 official despat-
 ches per day.

For the circulation of this immense
 correspondence the Post-office has been
 able, last year, to dispose of improved
 communications both by land and
 water over those previously in use.
 Thus a new postal route has been open-
 ed direct from Cordoba to Rioja, an-
 other from Salta to Copiapó (Chile); the
 Mensajerías coaches have also opened
 direct traffic between Cordoba and Sa-
 lavina [Santiago del Estero]; and the
 river steam-boat lines have arranged
 their sailings in harmony with the mail-
 coaches, all along the river board,
 which greatly facilitates public cor-
 respondence.

The various lines of Mensajerías or
 mail-coaches engaged in the conve-
 yance of mails have traversed during
 the year the enormous sum of 251,412
 Spanish leagues. The mail-bags
 alone from Rosario to Cordoba, San-
 tiago del Estero, Tucuman, Salta and
 Jujuy usually weigh from three to
 four cwt. [12 to 15 arrobes]: those for
 Catamarca via Cordoba from 8 to 9
 arrobes, and those for Rio Cuarto, San
 Luis, Mendoza, San Juan, Chile and
 West Coast about 50lbs. Consequently
 the Iniciadores coaches from Rosario
 to the above destinations carried dur-
 ing the year no less than 11,160 arrobes
 [140 tons] of mails, of which, let-
 ters stand for 2,232, and newspapers
 &c. [gratis] for 8,928 arrobes.

The mail steam-boats (not including
 ocean-steamers) have travelled 321,910
 miles, in carrying 5,761 sacks of cor-
 respondence and 26,365 passengers to
 and from Rosario, Corrientes, Santa
 Fé, Entre Rios, Paraguay, Montevideo,
 and Matto Grosso, starting from Bue-
 nos Ayres.

The receipts of the year amount to
 53,535 silver dollars, being an increase
 of 15,888\$ over the previous year, equi-
 valent to 42 per cent. The Post office
 of Buenos Ayres expended during the
 year much less than allowed in the
 Budget, shewing a saving of 13,520\$,
 in this particular, and yielding more-
 over a net profit of 14,461\$, the expen-
 ses only amounting to 16,778, and the
 gross receipts to 31,239\$.

Taking account of the total post
 office expenses of the Republic, we see
 that the Budget allowed Sr. Posadas
 for the year a sum of \$60,517, but not-
 withstanding the increased business
 and expensive improvements the Post-
 master general has contrived an econ-
 omy of 17,455\$, the total expenses
 only amounting to 43,062\$ (silver).
 This of course does not include the sub-
 sidies to steam-boats and mail-coaches
 which alone sum up \$106,830, and if
 added to the Post-office expenses would
 make up a total \$167,347 (of according
 to the Budget), and leave a deficit of
 118,067\$, the gross revenue being
 53,535\$.

LATEST FROM THE INTERIOR.

A TRIAL NARRATED BY A WITNESS.

Letters from Rioja to the 28th ult.
 mention that a mendicant friar has
 been murdered and his remains burnt.

The Justice of Peace of San Vicente
 (Rioja) is very intelligent in horse-tracks
 and perceiving the foot-prints of mules
 (mounted) near the highway, which had
 not stopped at any house, or to take
 water on the route, he suspected some-
 thing wrong and followed the tracks
 back wards. Having learned of the
 disappearance of a friar near Punta
 (Catamarca) he again followed the trail,
 taking with him six armed men: he
 judged the track to be seven days old
 and after six leagues journey found that
 one of the mules was apparently un-
 mounted, the owner having probably
 been murdered. Going six leagues
 further, still backwards, he came on
 broken ground in the midst of a thicket
 and digging up the site discovered the
 friar's corpse bearing several wounds
 and partially burnt, the habit, beads
 and penknife of deceased alone
 remaining, and the face being
 putrefied. The Governor of Rioja
 at once sent to track the murderers,
 and within 24 hours one of them was
 seized, named Nicano Vera, who had
 on his person a silver jug, 90\$ silver,
 some blood-stained handkerchiefs and
 other articles belonging to deceased.
 The Padre was named Avelino Soria,
 and en route from Tarija for Europe.

Dates from Tucuman are to the 23rd
 ult.: the new road from that city to
 Catamarca has been already traced
 out. Two new schools have been estab-
 lished by Government, and a mining
 expedition sent under Colonel Andra-
 de to examine the district of Rayo.

From Jujuy [16th ult.] we learn that
 the road to Salta is being repaired.
 There is nothing new from Salta.

The indigo fever is at its height in
 Santiago del Estero: Sr. Quintan has
 commenced measuring the land ceded
 to him, and is about to start a great
 plantation for this new and valuable
 industry.

In Catamarca they are building a
 new market-place: the Governor con-
 tinues his visit to the Departments.

We have nothing important from
 Cordoba: Gen. Emilio Mitre is making
 peace with the Ranqueles Indians.

ENTRE RIOS.

The 'Porvenir' gives dates from
 Gaaleguaychú to the 19th inst. A de-
 monstration took place on the 8th, but
 only foreigners assisted; speeches and
 Vivas as usual, the affair terminating
 at 9.20 p.m. The local militia is to
 march under the orders of General
 Lopez Jordán. Letters from Federa-
 cion to the 6th inst. announce the
 crossing of numerous Paraguayan
 troops, and that 2,500 Brazilians had
 arrived at San Borja. 8,000 more being
 daily expected under Gen. Canavarro.

NEWS FROM ROSARIO.

The 'Cosmopolita' of the 11th inst.
 reports a large meeting held at the
 British Consulate on last Monday to
 consider measures for aiding the authori-
 ties in carrying out the ends of justice
 with reference to the murder of Mr.
 Marshall. The chair was taken by 'H.
 B. M. Consul, Thomas J. Hutchinson
 Esq.; several energetic speeches were
 made, alluding to the barbarous nature
 of the crime and the unfortunate es-
 cape of the assassin. The amount of
 subscriptions for the arrest and punish-
 ment of the criminal was announced to
 be \$1,027, Mr. Perkins of the 'Cosmo-
 polita' acting as secretary. It is sup-
 posed the crime was committed by
 some gaucho anxious to escape military
 service, who took the victim's horse
 and money, to make off for the interior.
 Mr. Marshall had no revolver at the
 time: his horse was marked - L. B.
 with an arrow: the committee have
 forwarded placards to the authorities
 of Santa Fé, San Nicolas, San Luis,
 Cordoba, and other provinces, for dis-
 covery of the murderer.

On Tuesday evening there was a
 meeting at Governor Oroño's residence,
 for the formation of a Club in Rosario
 thirty gentlemen attended, and a com-
 mittee was elected of Messrs. Macludo,
 Garcia, Fraguero, Hutchison, and
 Santana. Some annoyance is felt at
 the delay in casting lots for those who
 have to march against Paraguay:
 those on whom it will fall fear they will
 now be able to get 'substitutes.' An
 accident occurred to some workmen

engaged in excavating the calle San
 Lorenzo, the ground falling in and bur-
 rying two men, one of whom is not
 expected to recover, and the other is
 badly fractured.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

TERRIBLE TREATY DISCOVERY.

ARGENTINES AND ORIENTALS SOLD.

MORE GOLD COMING IN.

The holy alliance which Governor
 Flores consummated in Buenos Ayres
 threatens to cause an unholy row here:
 some fellow has had a peep at it and
 the cat's out of the bag: Argentines here
 and Orientals in Buenos Ayres will
 have to serve. So intense is the ex-
 citement in this extraordinary place,
 that I verily believe a deputation com-
 posed of peaceable Argentines will
 shortly wait on Mr. Lettsom, who is en-
 deared to them all, having so long ac-
 ted as their Consul, to request of him
 another English gunboat to give them
 free passage to the Falkland Islands.
 What is the meaning of making such
 a secret of this treaty?—the sooner it
 is published the better. If Argentines
 are to fight, why at least send us down
 swords, muskets, and uniforms; for,
 unless we dressed the soldiers up in
 back numbers of the newspapers, or
 antiquated supplements, there is no-
 thing else for them, as the Blancos
 have not left even a 'kepi' in the bar-
 racks.

People here who are regarded as au-
 thorities on the campaign, state that
 there are altogether too many banks
 in the Paraná for any respectable
 squadron to attempt to go up to Cor-
 rientes, and that the Baron is waiting
 for it to rain before he sends up any
 more of his vessels. They say here
 that three of the gunboats Barroso
 took up with him are hopelessly stuck
 in the mud, and that the pilots on
 board were all Paraguayans and spies
 of Lopez. A certain well known law-
 yer who was last year in Paraguay,
 states that Lopez knowing the strength
 of the Brazilians on the water, got Mr.
 Whitehead to construct a sort of in-
 fernal machine, which on being thrown
 into any part of the river, explodes
 heaving up a big sand bank in even
 the deepest channel. If this prove so,
 then is it any wonder that the gunboats
 are so long going up, or so many of
 them run aground?

Every one says here, oh! why don't
 Baron Tamandaré go up himself. I am
 told on good authority that he is wait-
 ing for one of the long-talked of Moni-
 tors, which should have arrived last
 week from Europe.

The news brought by the 'Galileo'
 from Rio is not to say the best: the
 papers of that city are becoming ram-
 pant, and one states that the troops in
 Matto Grosso are all deserting. Para-
 guay has retired completely from
 public life: he is regarded as a sort of
 Oriental Coriolanus. Money is tight,
 gold and silver at a premium, and busi-
 ness dull.

There is a rumour in town to the
 effect that a Paraguayan force has
 dashed into Rio Grande with a crim-
 son banner with the motto—

"River Plate Equilibrium!"
 "Liberty for the Niggers!"

On the reverse of this is beautifully
 worked in-silk, a pair of scales turned
 upside down and a nigger killing his
 master. But this place is so full of
 Paraguayan sympathizers, that it is
 hard to believe one word that is told.

Governor Flores' new house is greatly
 talked about. Some say that the rea-
 son it looks so shabby, is that there is
 a heavy mortgage on it; others that
 the 'azotea' is bad, and it rains in.
 For an Oriental Governor it is by no
 means the thing: Lezama's coach-
 house is twice as respectable, but the
 rent is very moderate, and Mrs. Flores
 says she prefers it to Dr. Hector's
 mansion in Buenos Ayres.

The moment I saw Flores name Sr.
 Battle Minister of War, I knew that
 peace was out of the question. This
 minister, who is by name and office a
 warlike character, has carried out
 Piel's scheme of shutting the port
 rather quickly. His last decree pro-
 hibits Orientals to leave the port
 without a pass. Guards are placed on
 the steamer, and every evening a few
 migratory Montevideans are sent
 back.

You have heard, I suppose of the
 'triple alliance' neck ties. They are all
 the go here, particularly among the
 friends the English clerks, who, 'apro-

are avfully dejected about Jeff
 Davis and Lee.

Mr. Bading leaves in the Galileo.
 Some say he will be out shortly again,
 as he has on hand a scheme for popu-
 lating the Gran Chaco, which he
 means to introduce on the London
 market.

Gold keeps coming in fast, and there
 seems to be no doubt as to the res-
 sumption of specie payments. The
 greatest caution is observed about this
 gold business. One gentleman who
 goes and comes rather frequently, with
 a capacious black travelling-bag, is
 said to have it full of sovereigns each
 time he comes down. Small bags with
 specie, long wooden boxes with metal-
 lic. I do verily believe that the pas-
 sengers bring specie in their stockings.
 What is the result? We have more
 money than we want: interest has
 fallen to 8 per cent. per annum. My
 opinion is, that some of these fine
 mornings Mauá will come out with an
 advertisement, stating all who want
 to change Mauá bills for gold, can do
 so; and then, as a matter of course,
 no one will take the trouble of going
 to the bank for it. Why does not
 Mitre stop the gold ounces? None of
 your National Guards can leave with-
 out a pass, and yet is not the ounce
 the real National Guard: the best
 guard of all. Oh! what a pity that I
 am not a Finance Minister or an ounce
 broker. Great betting is going on about
 your paper money. The odds are here
 ten to one that in less than four months
 paper money will be emitted by the
 bank or the Government.

The new bank which I told you
 about the other day, has everything
 ready now but the capital. The offi-
 cers, offices, furniture, &c.; every-
 thing is prepared. Next week the di-
 rectors intend to look up the capital
 and the plates, as for paper, there is
 plenty of it in the market.

The greatest enthusiasm for peace
 reigns in the camp. No more fighting,
 is the universal sentiment. The natives
 say they cannot go to the new war, as
 they had not time yet to 'campar'
 their cattle. Paraguay is detested by
 all, and war is cried down as the curse
 of the Republic, but the listing goes
 on, and several hundred men are
 marching.

The harbor is crowded with ship-
 ping. The packet has just arrived,
 and the papers for the Club and
 'Standard' go up to night. I am told
 she has brought no specie for any
 bank, but several boxes of ounces for
 Mr. Ropes.

As a proof of how things are in Rio,
 we are loading wheat, flour, maize, and
 afrecho for that port. The next thing
 will be biscuit and cakes. There was
 a time when the Rio houses were ship-
 ping every week hundreds of barrels
 of American flour to Montevideo, but
 now it is the other way.

The long lost Belgian brig Eugenie,
 from Antwerp, has at last arrived. She
 had to put into Falmouth in distress,
 where, in order to pay for repairs, she
 had to sell part of her cargo. She
 brings a great quantity of printing
 paper, and several cases for Makorn.
 What a pity the printing paper was
 not sold in England. I hear you have
 an immense stock under Meeks and
 Kelsey's photographic gallery.

The duel I mentioned in my last
 never came off, owing to one of the
 seconds refusing to act, and assert-
 ing when on the ground authorita-
 tively that it was all a mistake, that
 the party in question was not 'Zozimus'.
 The party adjourned to Villal-
 ba's hotel, and had a good breakfast,
 which was wound up with a 'Kerosene
 cocktail.'
